




A New Lake? It used to be dry land, but when the Verdegris River overflowed in October it looked more like a lake.





The nominees and their escorts were Keri Bowman-Matt Locke, Tosha Hoy-Jason Harden, and


Lisa Smith-Mark Hallum. The court consisted of Jr. Shelly Stewart-Jr. Mike Brown, Soph. Britney

Ivey-Soph. Gib English.



Other state sports participants included ten from the boys swim team, eight wrestlers, five from the girls cross-country team, and two girl tennis players.





# Going for the Gold



















Making a big splash is certainly what the 1986-87 Field Kindley swim team did by bringing home the third place trophy at state for the second year in a row.

The members of the FKHS swim team were made up of special kinds of athletes that push themselves to the limits. The swimmers dedicate themselves to swimming several thousands of yards a day. Not only do the swimmers show this dedication by swimming from three to five in the afternoon, but also from six to seven-thirty in the morning.

This hard work and dedication really paid off for the swimmers. Eight swimmers and two divers qualified for the State competition in Lawrence on February 20-21.

In addition to the state swim meet, the NADO swim team had a record of 39-8 and brought home their own trophy from the FKHS Invitational for the first time.

To the victories, however, there is one loss to the team after this year. The FKHS swim will be losing the seven veteran seniors that will be graduating this year. Next year Coach Whalen will be working with an all new team.





This ends another good season for the NADO.









Both organizations were important to contributing to the success of the year. By taking challenges, being different, involved, and giving their all, Stuco and NHS 'dared to be more' in 86-87!















In order to make their Social Science classes more interesting, teachers have brought in outside speakers and politicians. They also held political elections.



Not being able to cheer or sit with friends at football games, marching band members keep the football players going with their peppy music.



MTV, concerts and radio fullfilled many people's musical enjoyment. For some FKHS students musical enjoyment came from participating in their own band.








But, in the end, one thing became clear: determination, unity, and a little luck along the way were the building blocks of debate . . . . and the roadway to a season to remember.






### Music


"Veal birds are the best. I love them," says sophomore Vanessa Bardwell. Many of this year's sophomores feel the same way about their favorite foods.

Living up to the standard became the task for the 18 staffers and the editors in chief, Becky Bordine, and Tosha Hoy, of the 1987 Field Kindley staff, as they pushed to get "The Gold Standard" finished in time for a spring delivery.

Book sales ran for two weeks during January with the book selling for \$20 to students and \$10 to teachers. Staff members ordered 500 books.

Mrs. Lyn Logelin, adviser for the first year, worked with two editors to adapt and design spreads for use in the entire book. The staff developed the cover.

The cover custom stamped on deep purple #449 with applied gold foil #527. The contents were printed on front endsheet and "The Gold Club" on the back endsheet. 80 pound gloss was the paper stock used.

The body was set in 11/12 Palintino and captions were in

8/9 Palantino. Caption headlines were in 12 point Palantino, while other headlines varied from 36 point Palantino to a Pendry script. 12 point Palantino was used for folio tabs and page numbers.

Pictures that were not taken by the yearbook photographers were provided by the Coffeyville Journal, Tony Hoy and Bonnie Smith. The Coffeyville Journal provided football pictures for pages 26-29. 
