















































































Body copy is 10 point Times and captions are 8 point Times. Headline sizes and typestyles vary per section.

The 1995-96 Twister was designed and created by the staff in the Writing Lab using PageMaker 5.0.

All photographs were taken by staff photographers unless otherwise noted. Staff photographers develop their own film and photos in the publications darkroom. Group and class photos were taken by Doyal's Studio and Lifetouch provided the mugshots.

Press run for the 1995-96 *Twister* was 350 and was sold for \$20 and \$25. The book's estimated cost was \$13,150 and was paid for by book sales and advertising.



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
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
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
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
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
