As the end of May approached, the 1997-98 school year became a part of the past. August and everything after will forever be remembered by the students and faculty at FKHS.

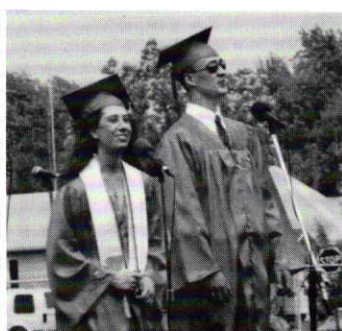

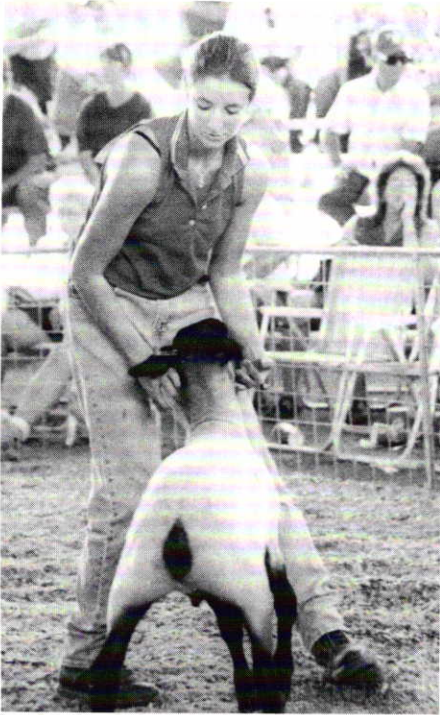

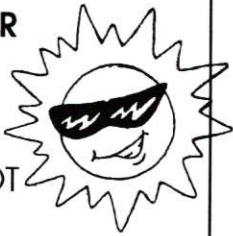

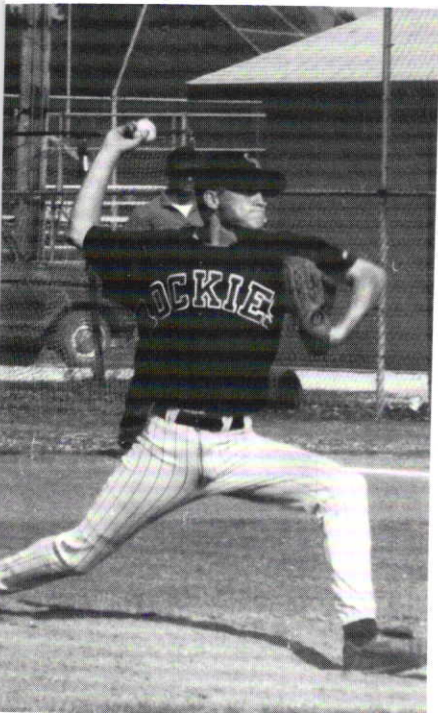

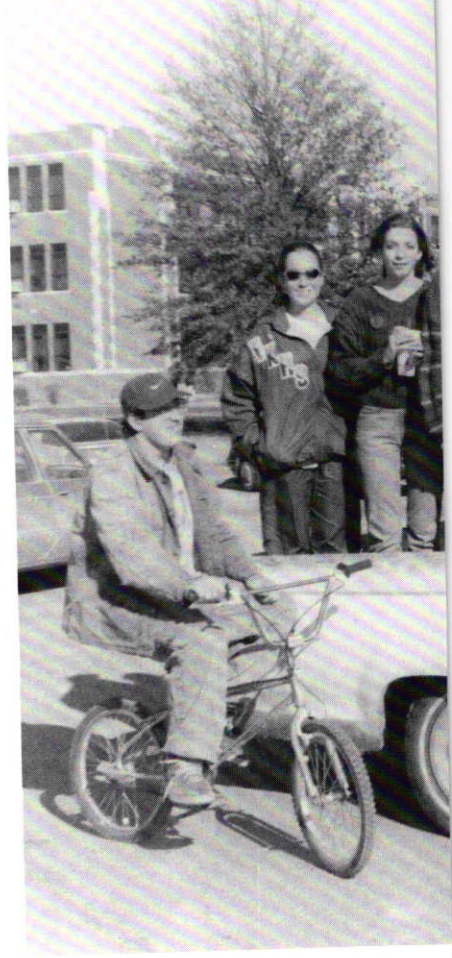

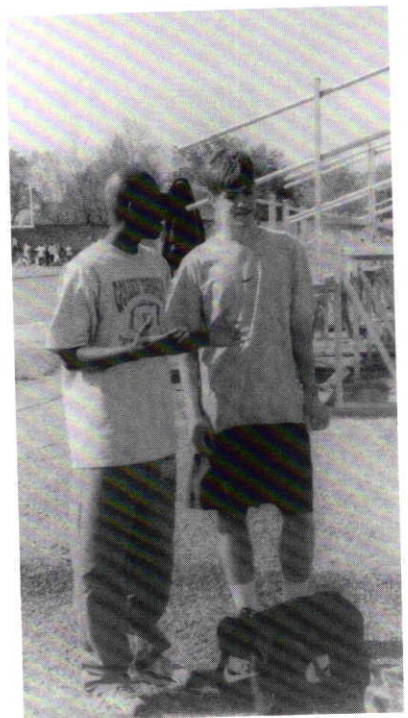

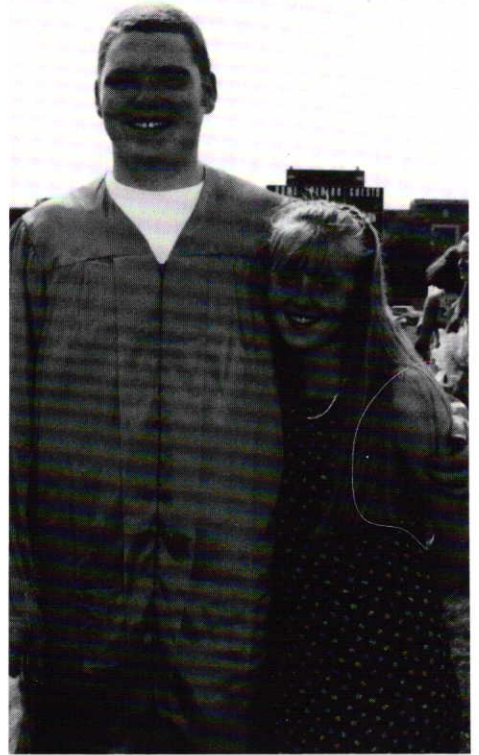

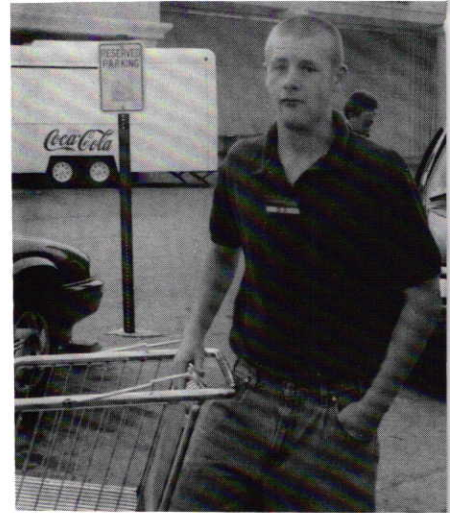

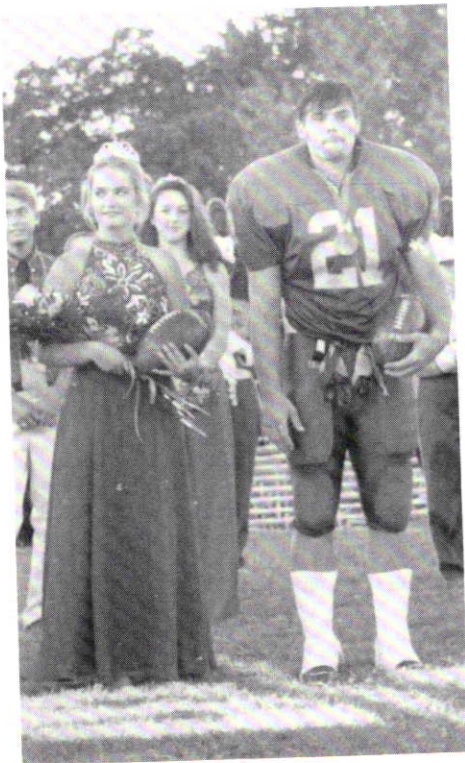

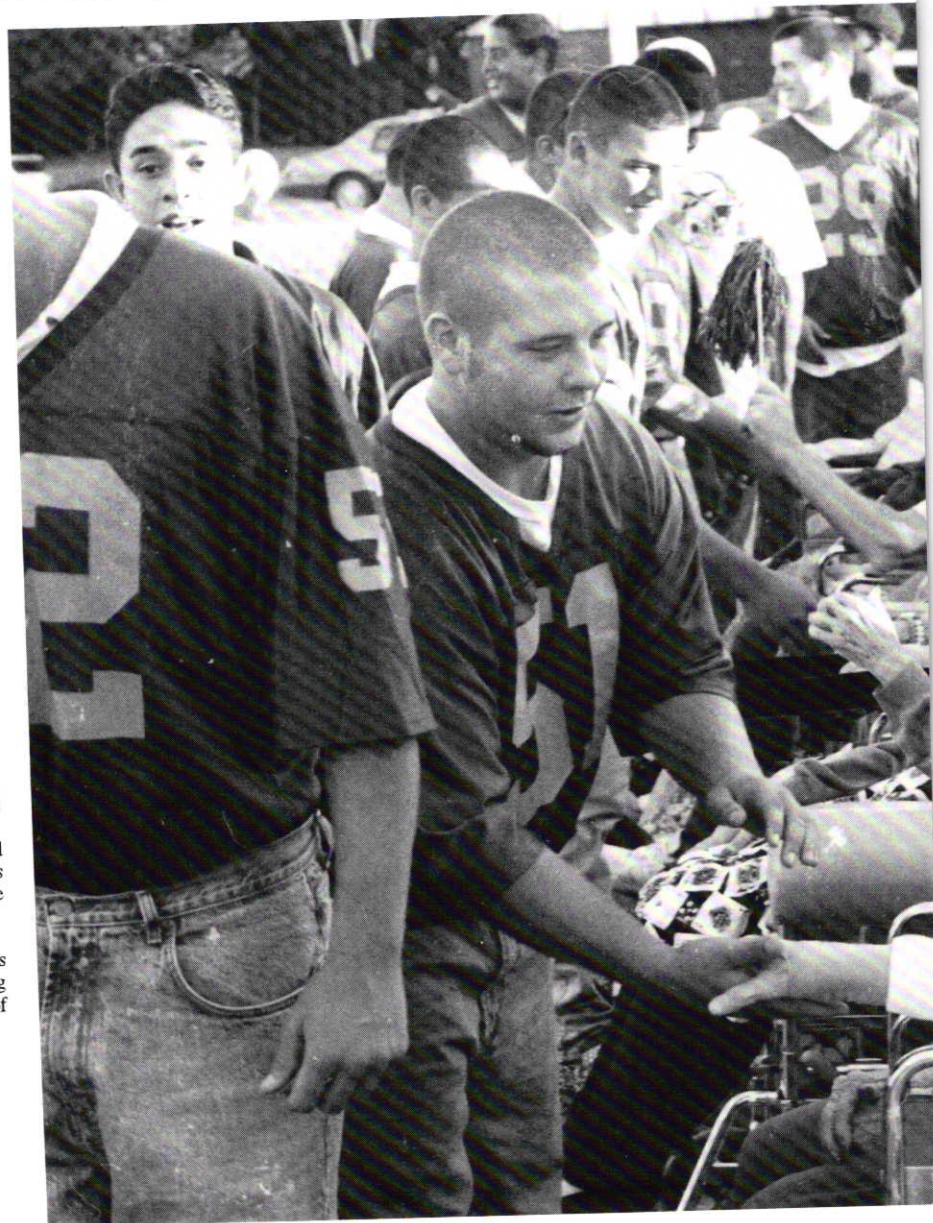

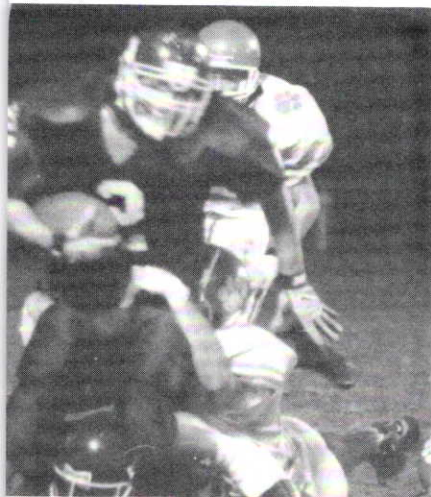

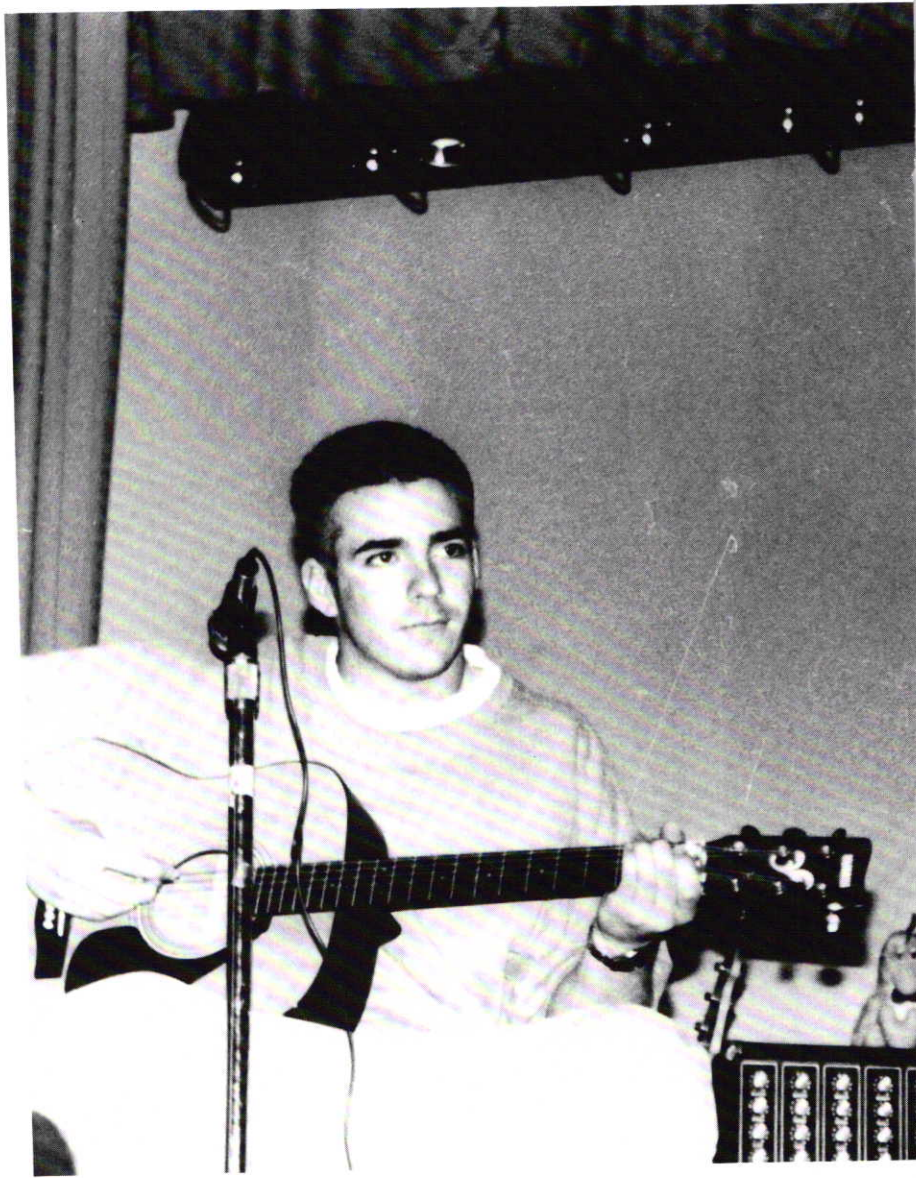

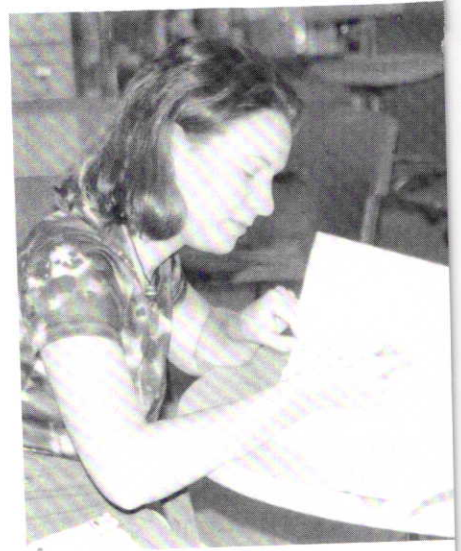

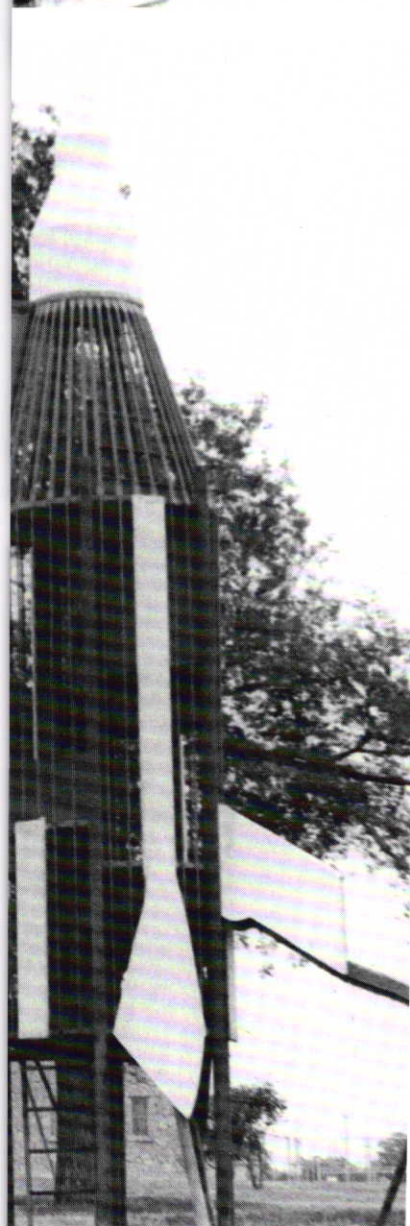

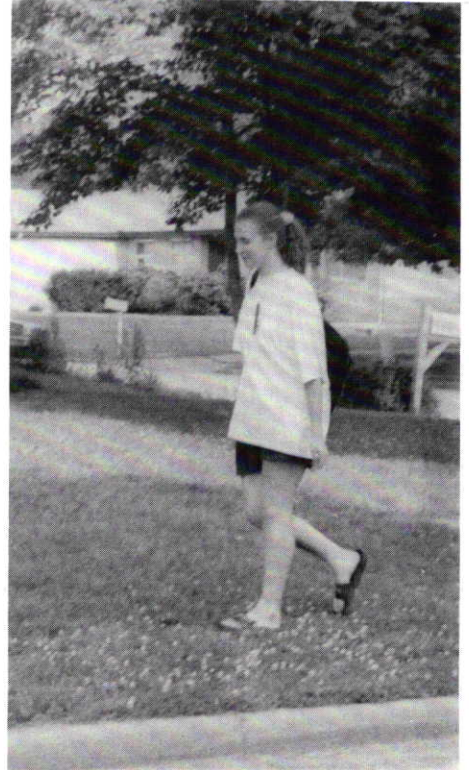




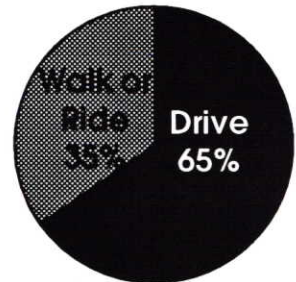

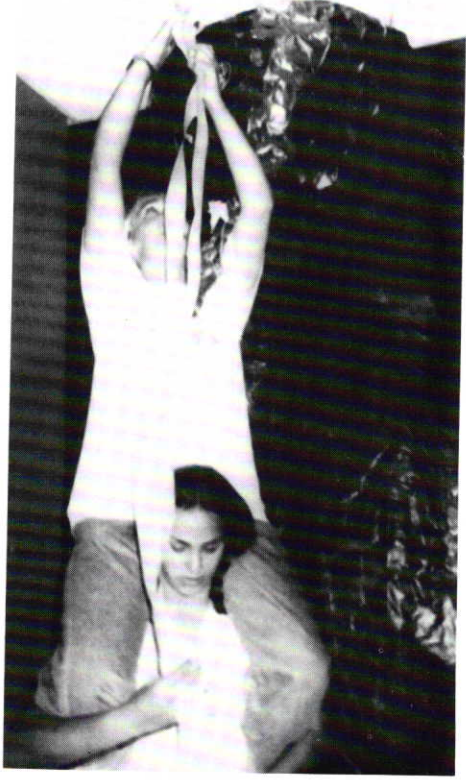

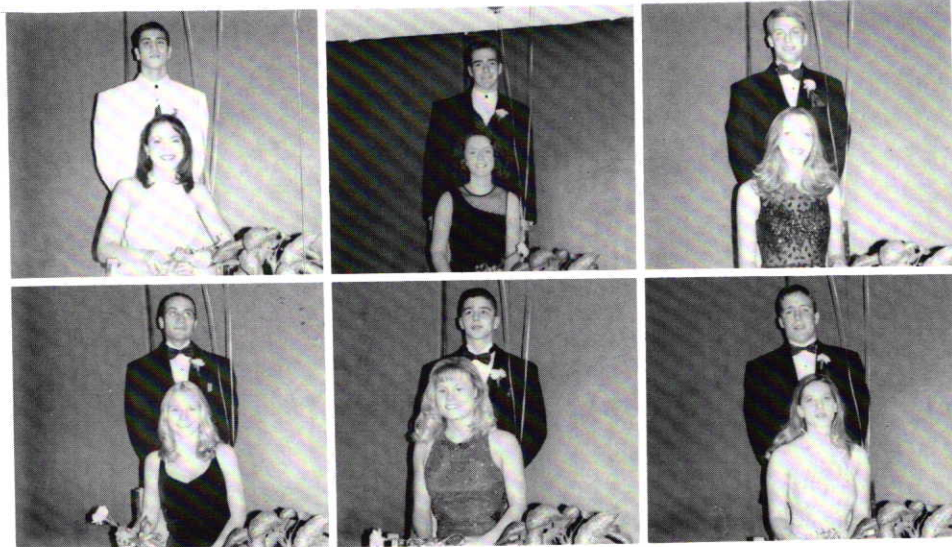

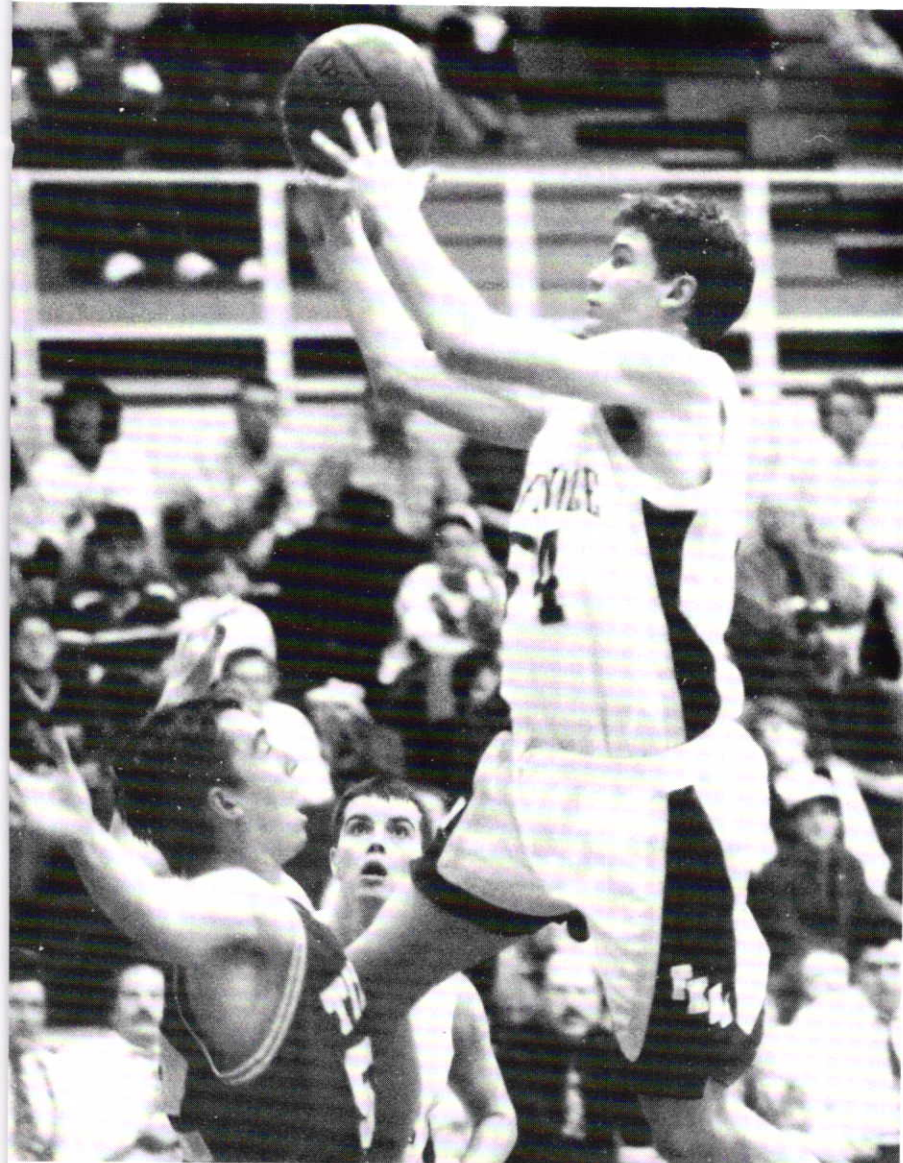

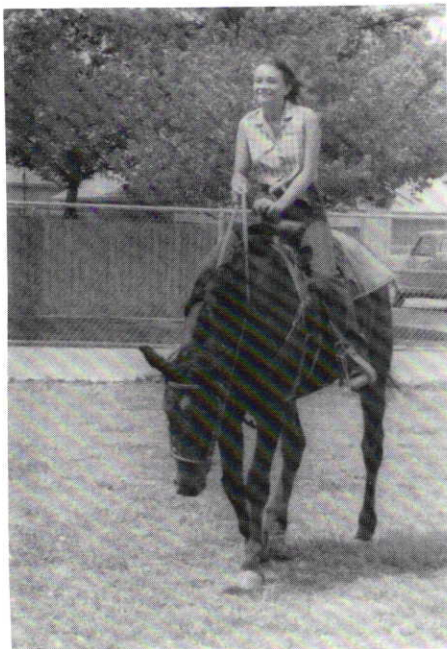

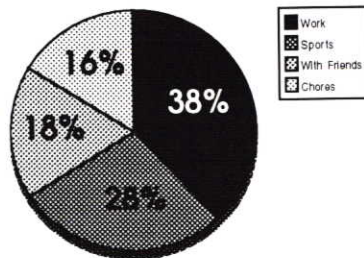

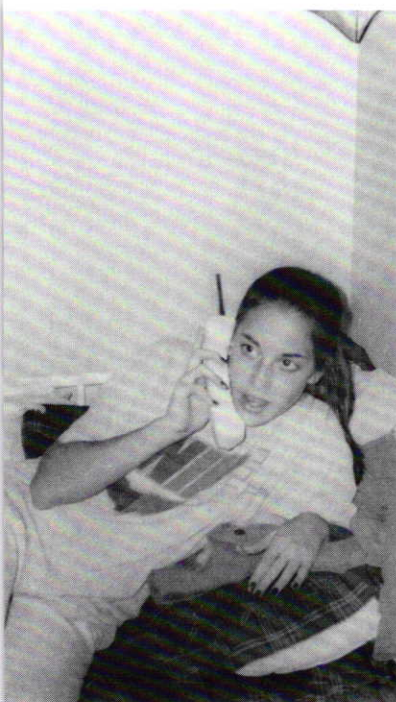

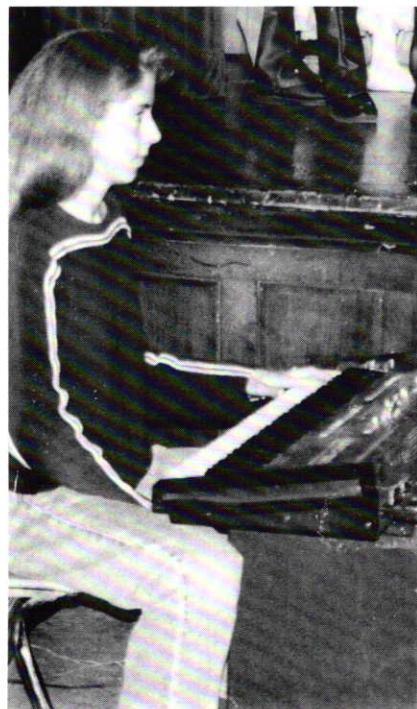

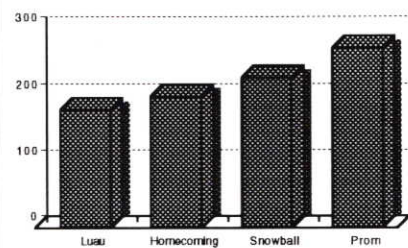

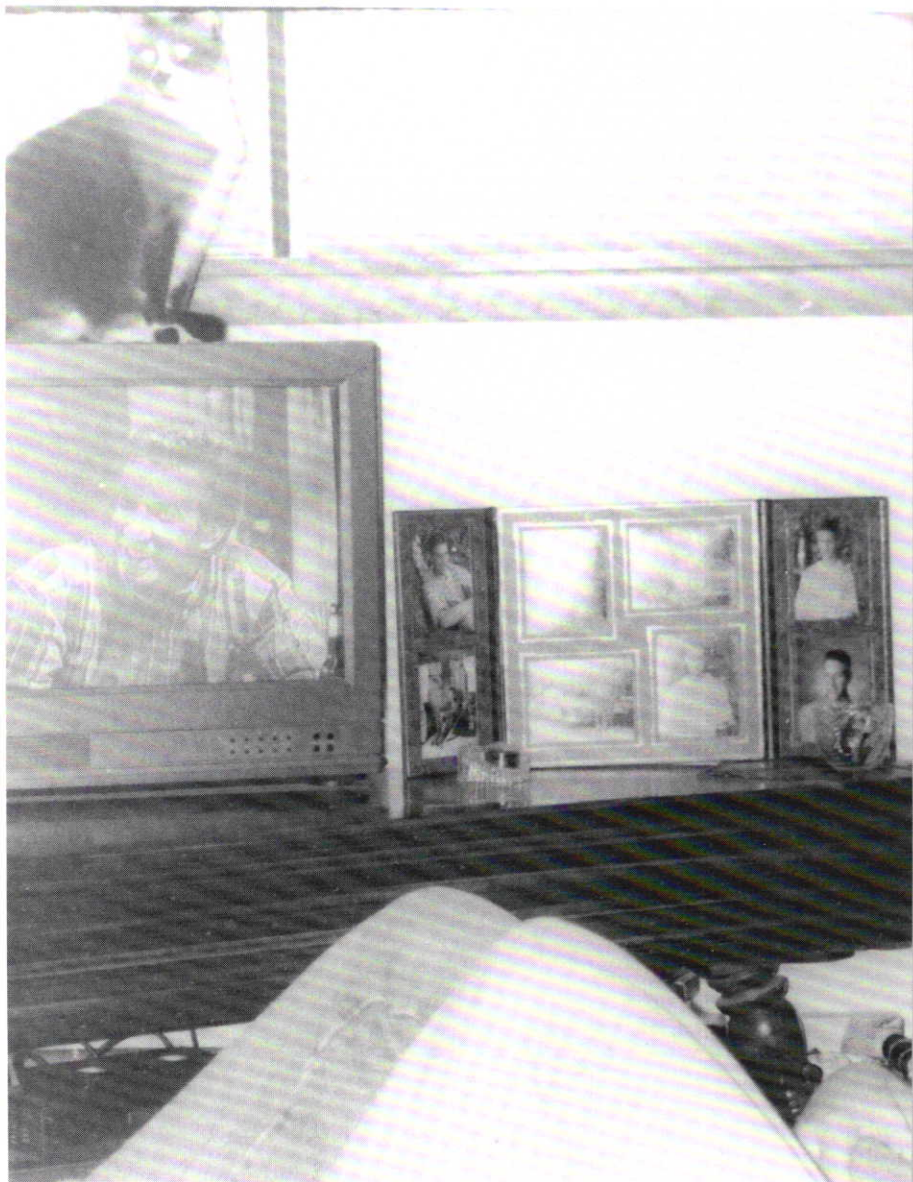

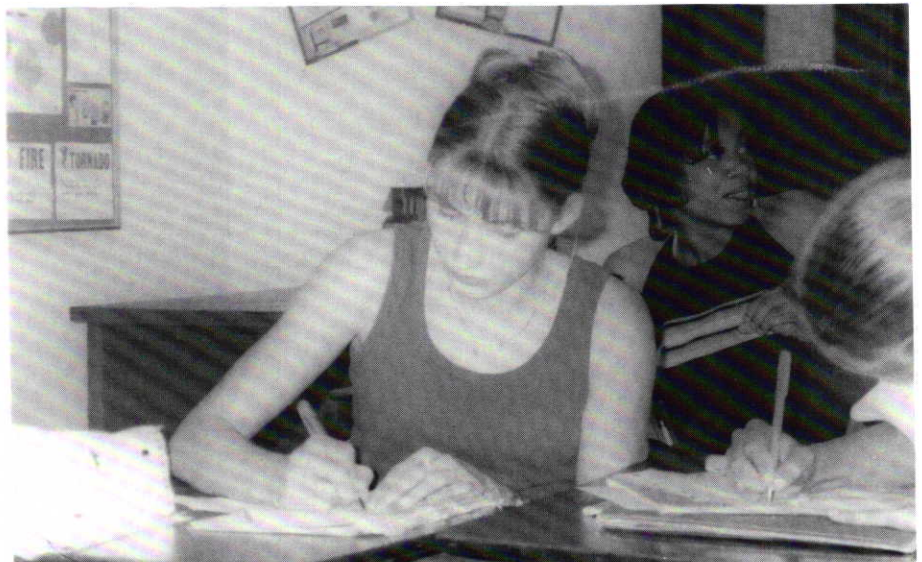

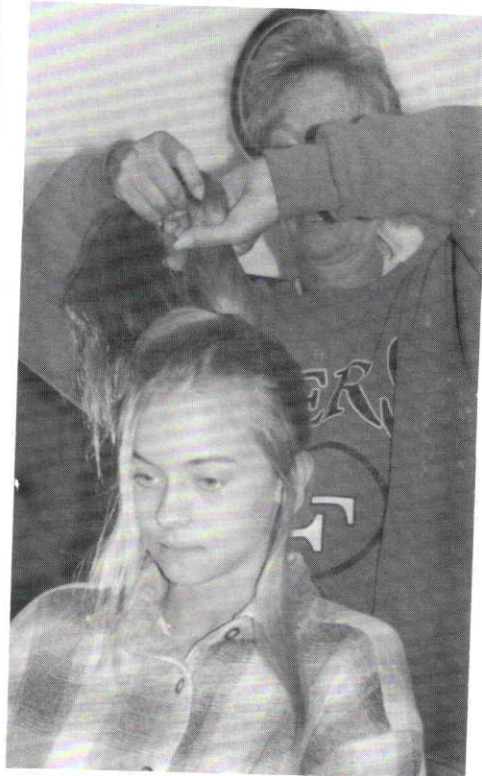

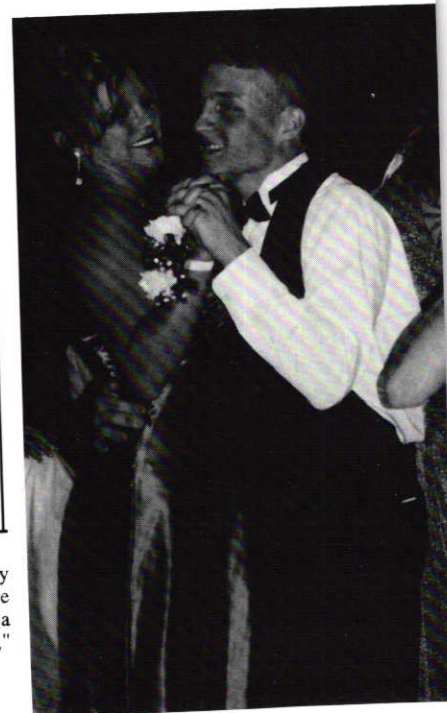

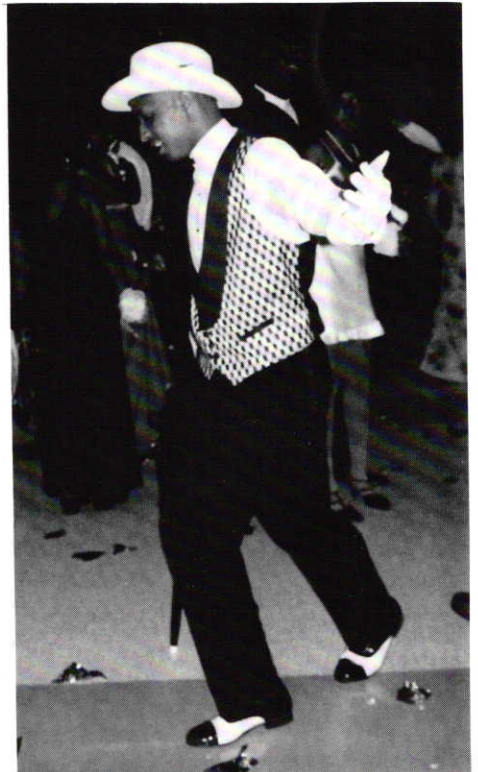

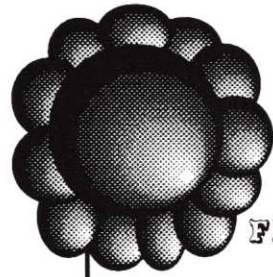

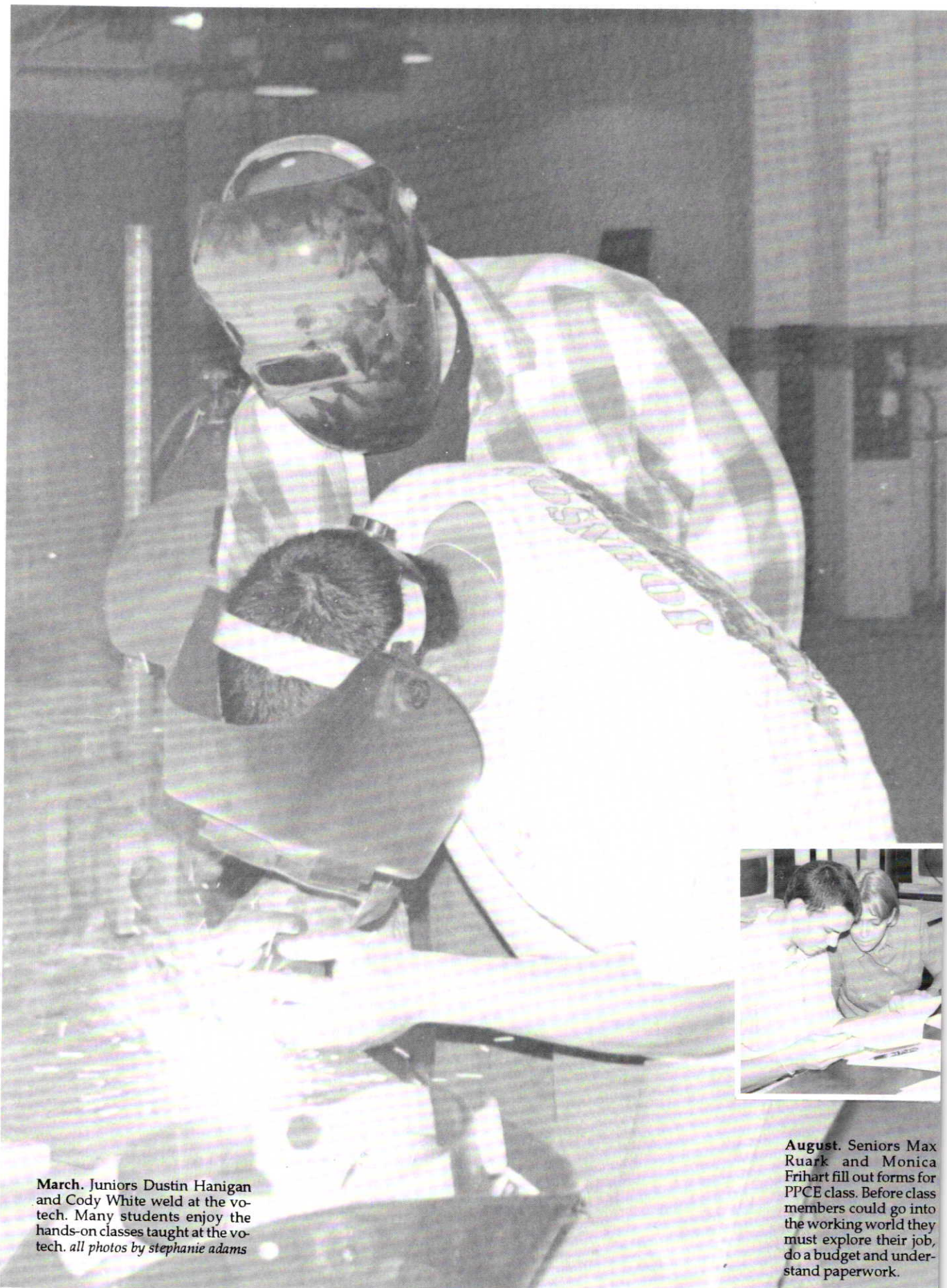

"Renaissance is a good program for students who want to succeed," Peri Hartzell said.

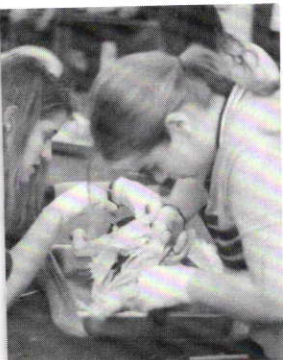
The Renaissance program continued to reward students for academic excellence while the school acquired many new computers.

"The computers I received at semester were better than what I had. If used and distributed properly, the new computers could help," Rachel Nally said.

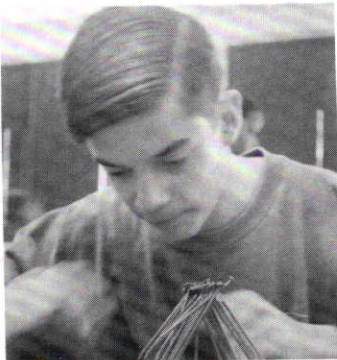

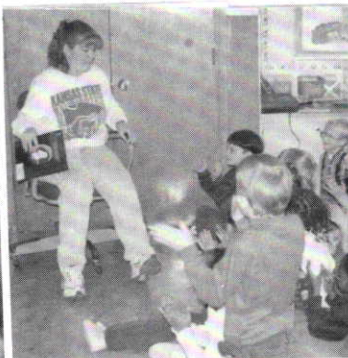

When you think of seminar, what is the first word that comes to your mind? Sleep? Boredom? Excitement? Students interviewed have mixed feelings on this issue.

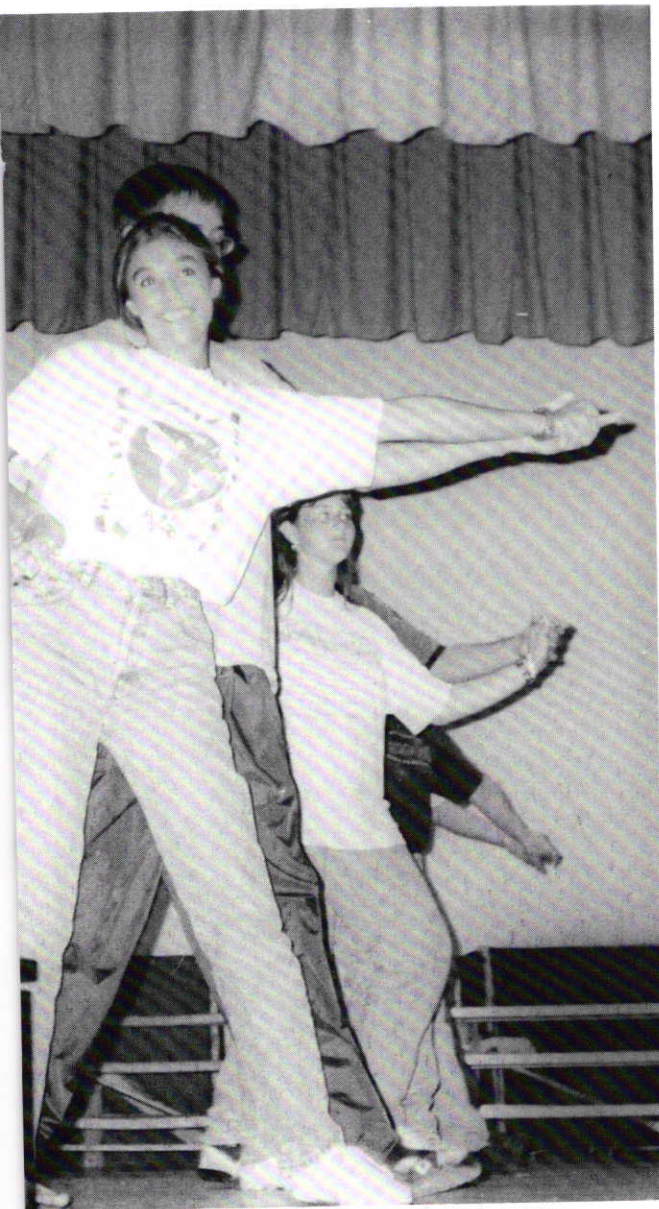
Most students say that seminar is good because they can do their homework in class and have time to relax a little bit.

Overall, most of the students agree that seminar is a useful program concentrating on helping students get their work done and turning it in on time.



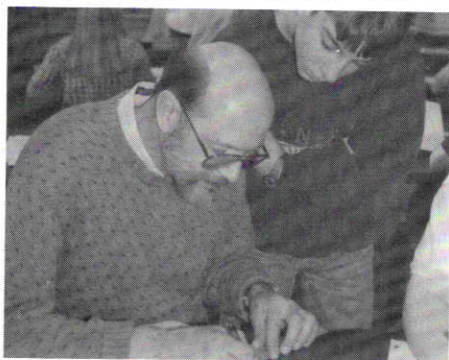

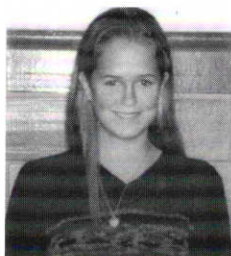

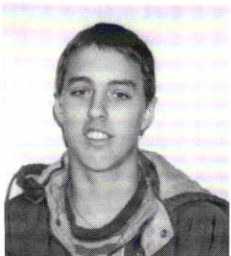

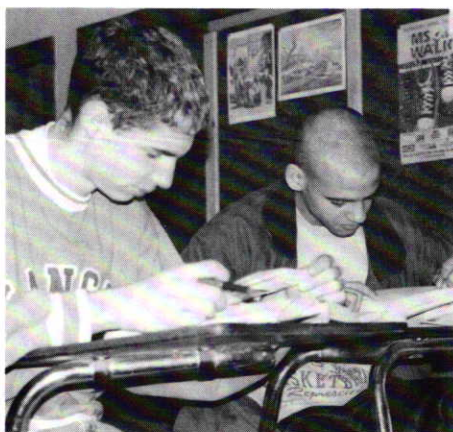

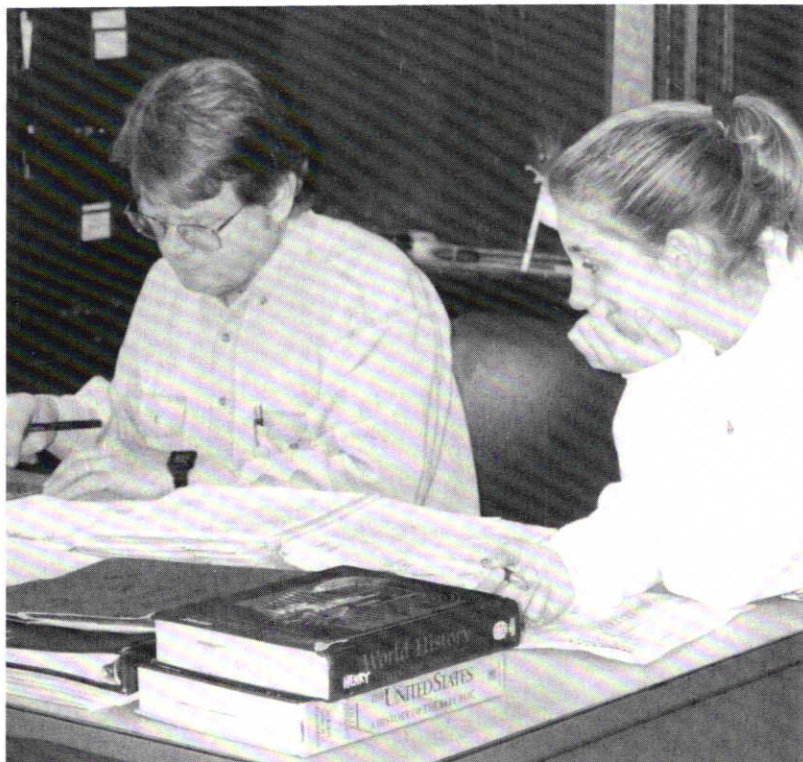

Some students have found that they do need good English skills for their future occupations.

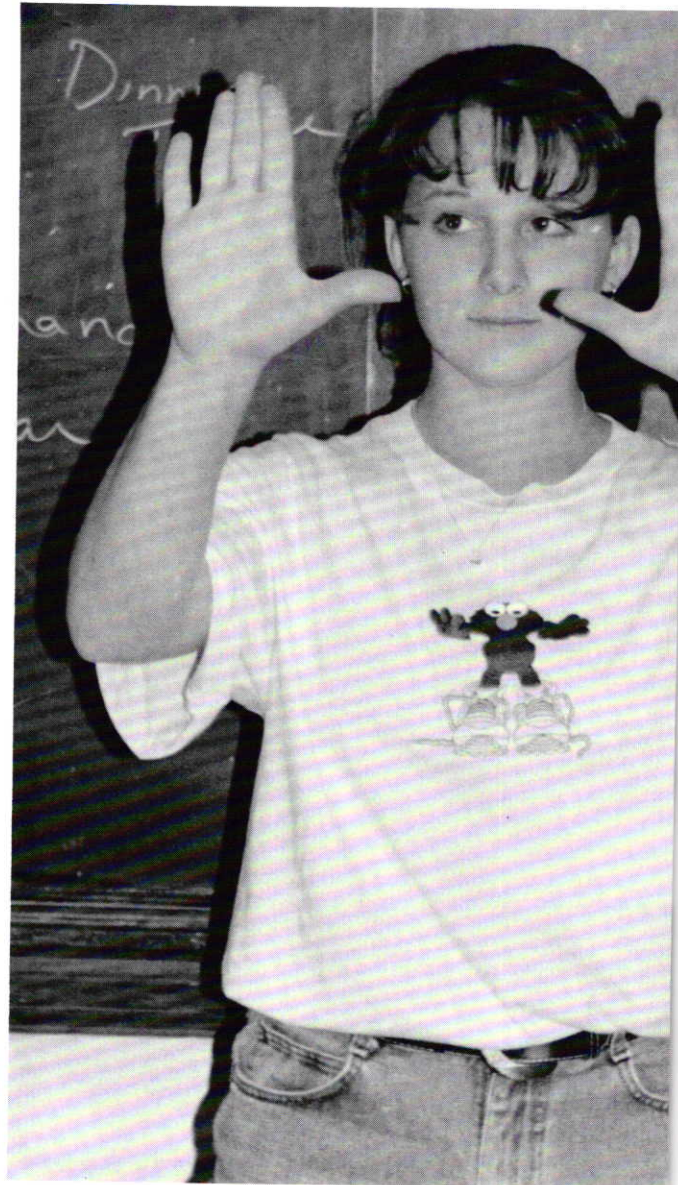

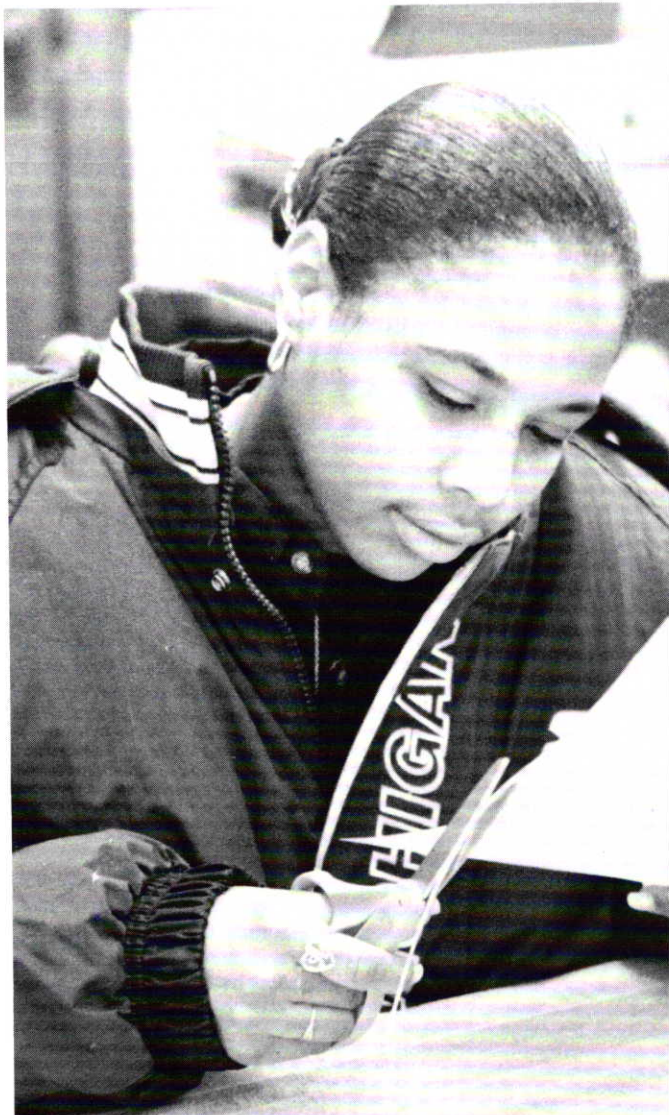

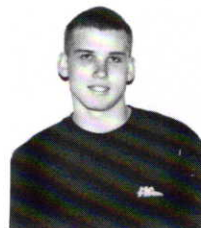

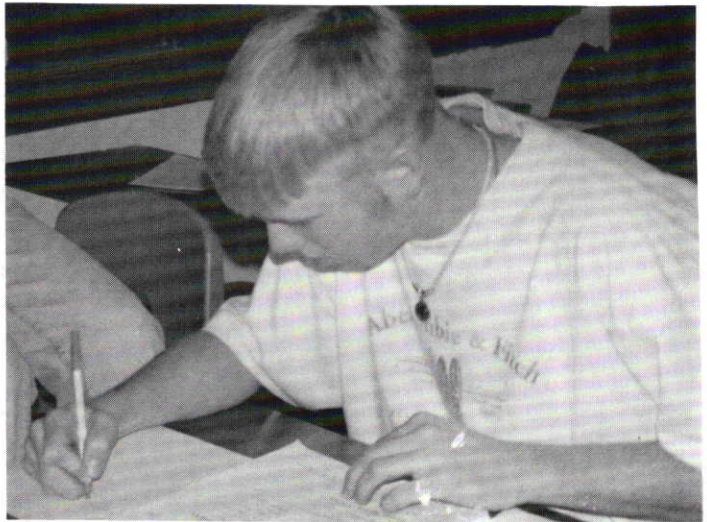

Field Kindley offers a wide variety of business classes to prepare its students for the work place.



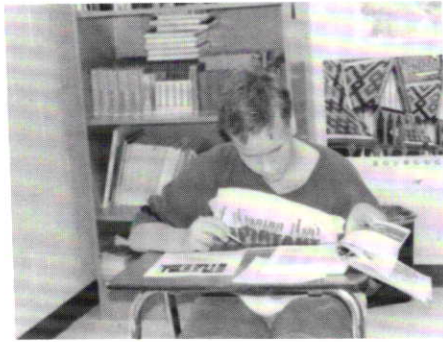

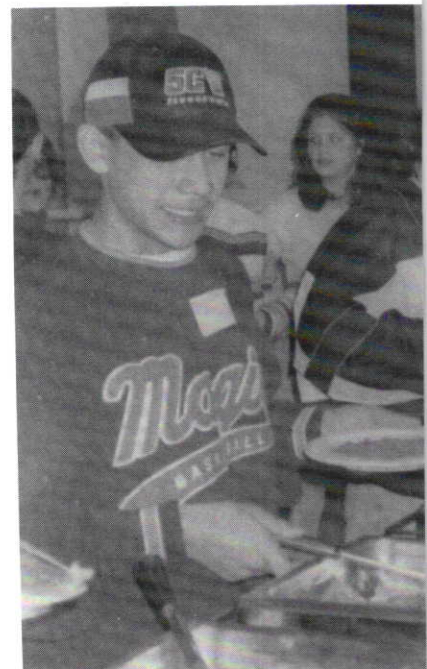

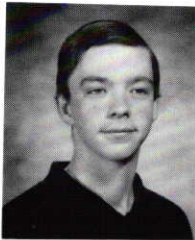

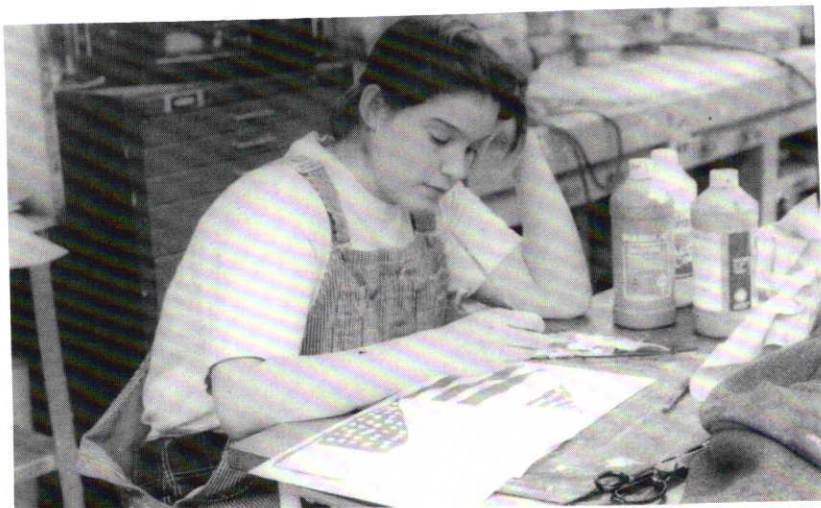

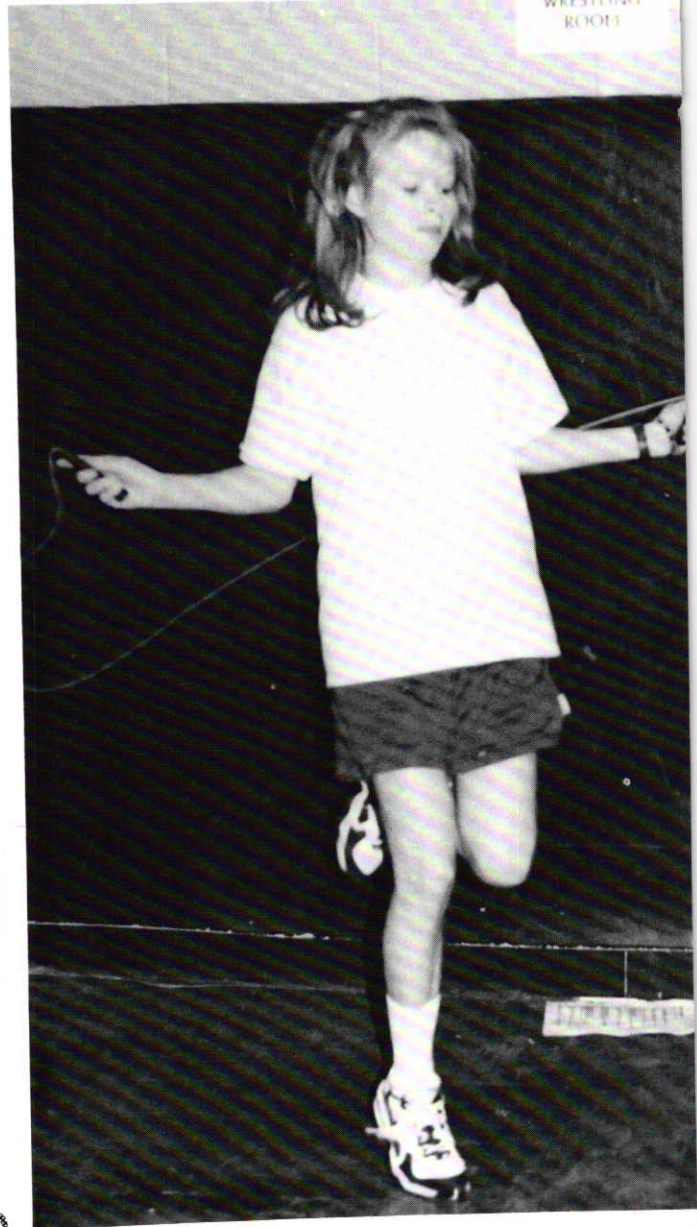

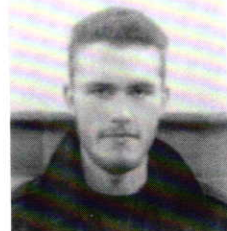

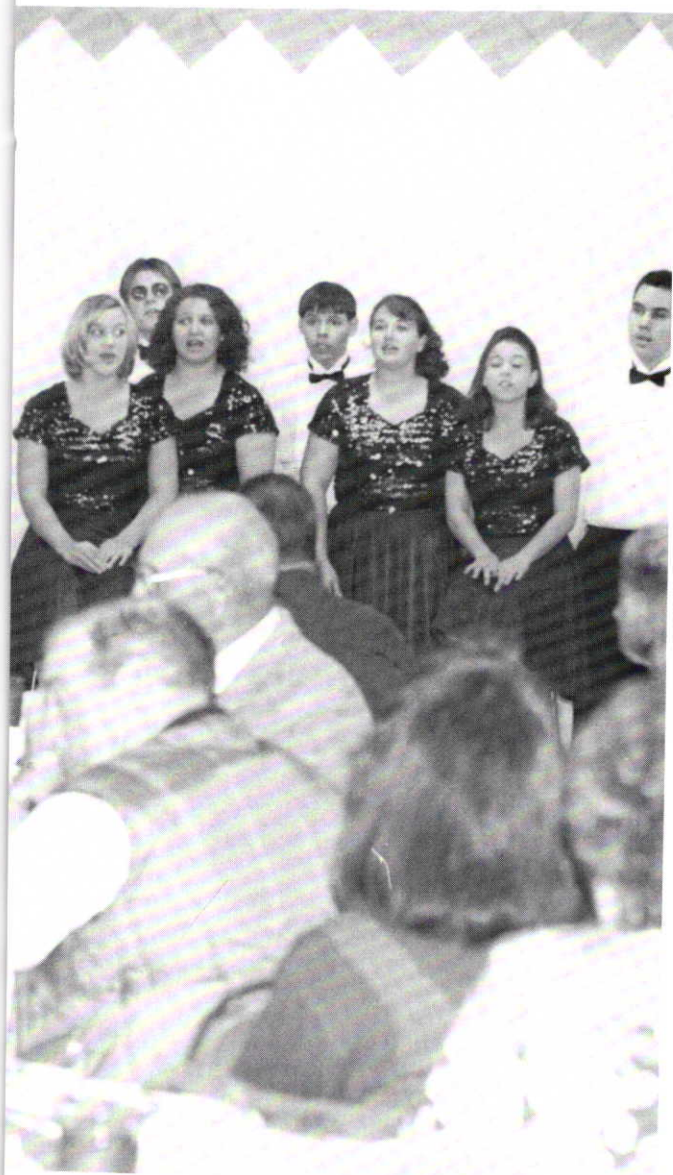
# Go with the flow

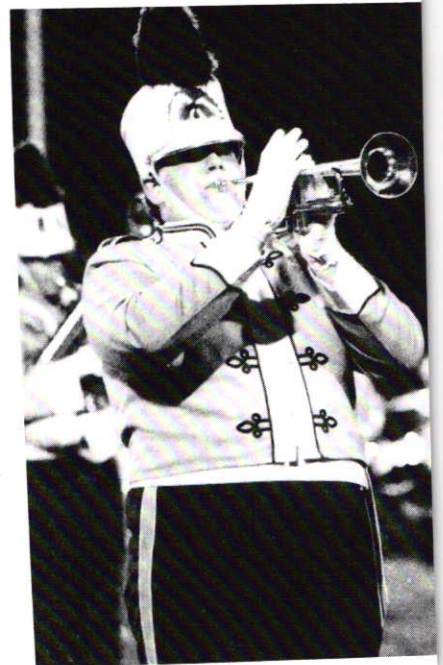
"There were times where I wish I did not have to be in that position but in the end it was well worth it," Handshumaker said.

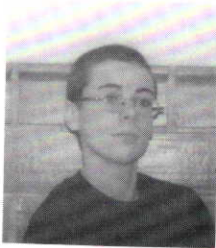

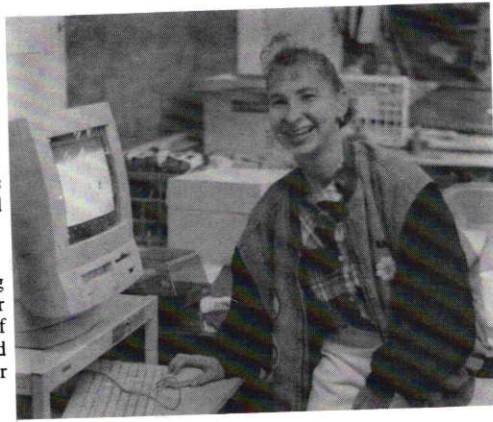

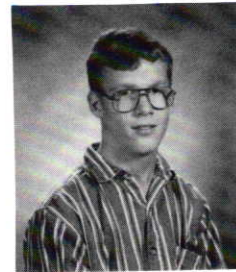

Keeping busy and expanding their knowledge is a task often accomplished by Field Kindley's special education students.

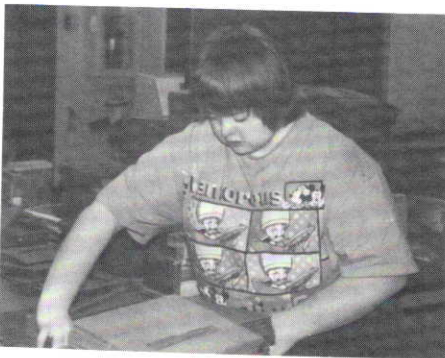
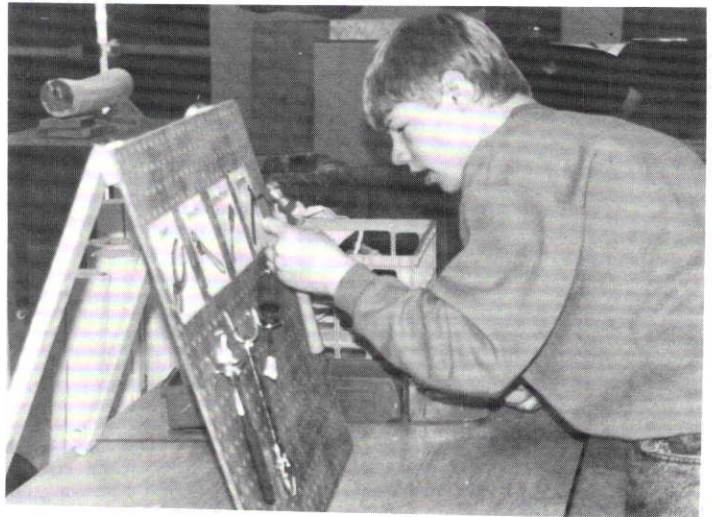
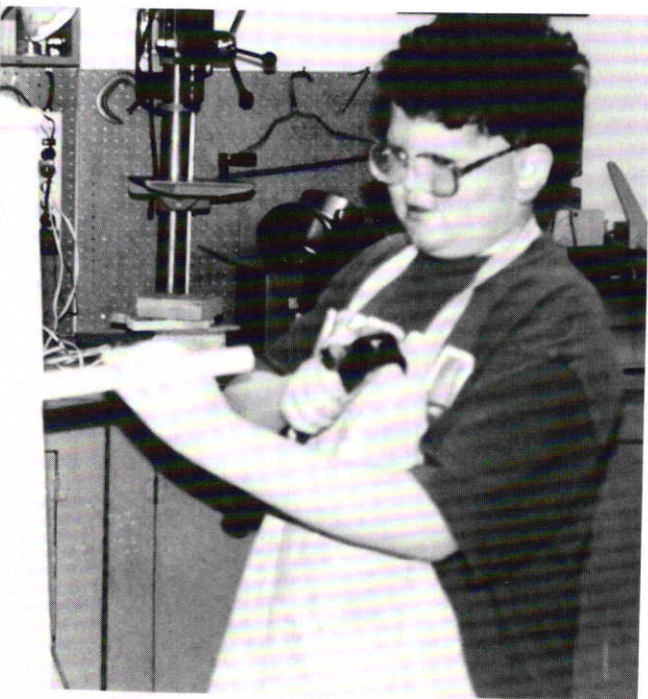
As part of the special education program, students are taught many fundamentals. This includes living skills, pre-vocational skills, and basic social skills.

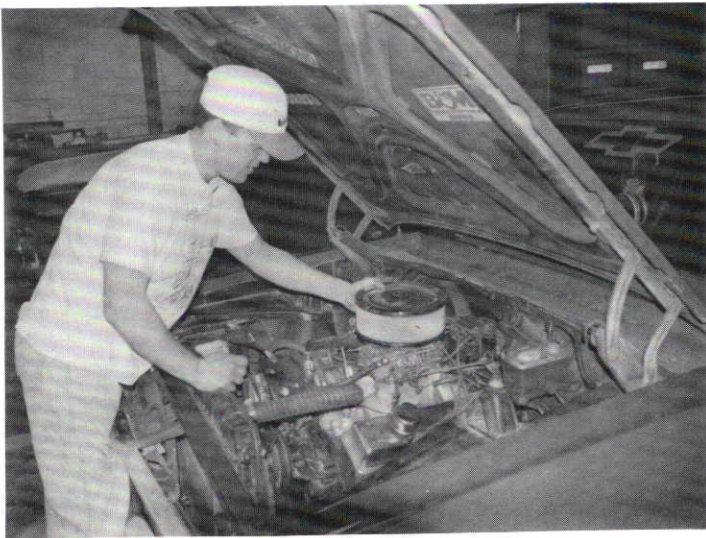

The classes also give students great opportunities to work on projects. It allows the students to actually see what they have accomplished and gives them a head start when they get to college.

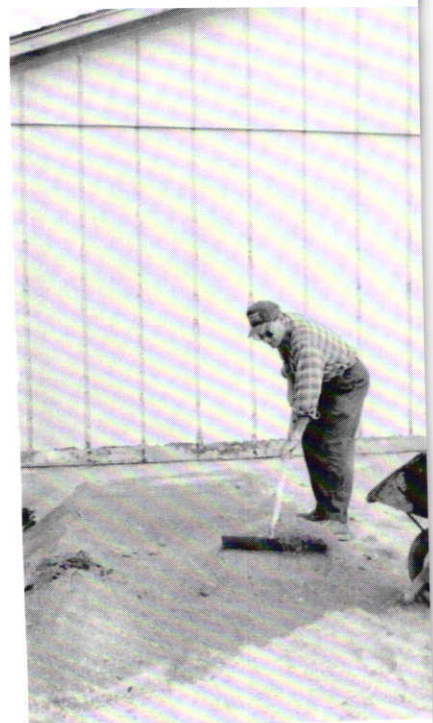
"Art is the coolest class because all we do is drink, eat, and listen to music," junior Mike Hudson said.

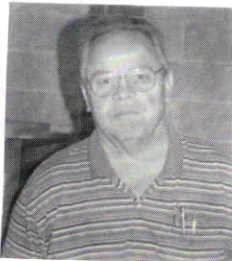

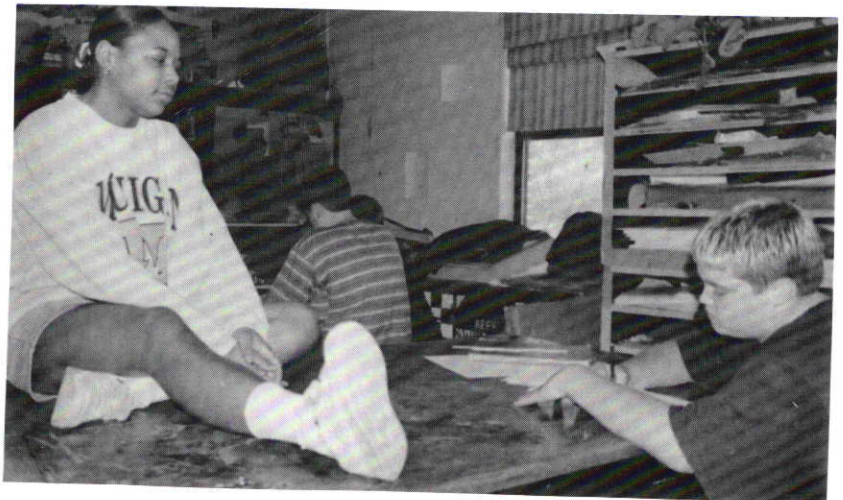
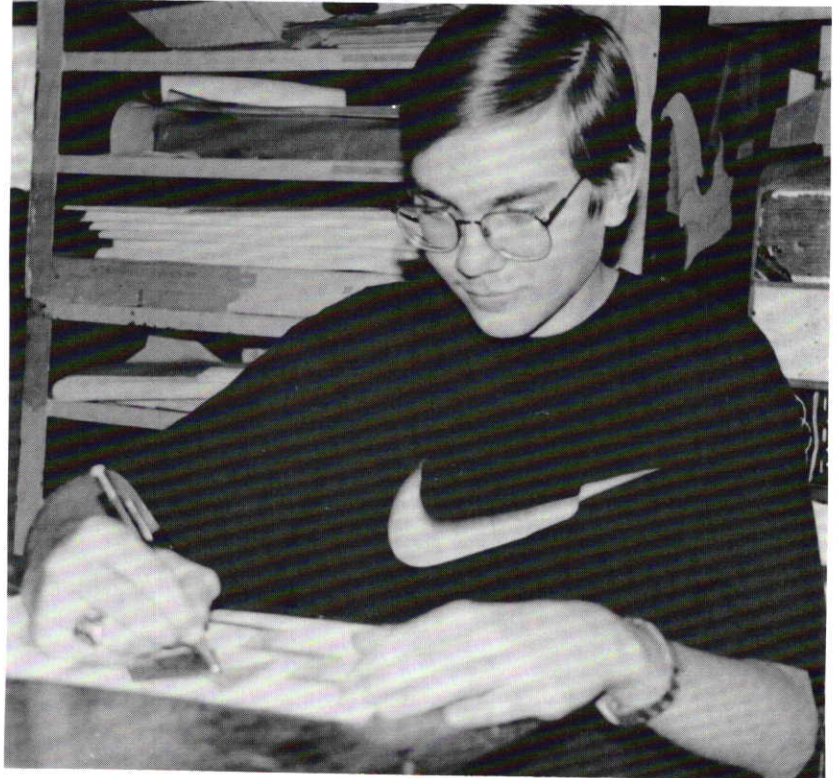

"I've had a great first year teaching and coaching in Coffeyville, I have no complaints," McDonald said.

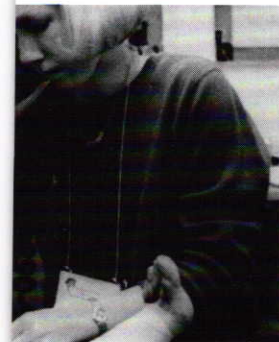

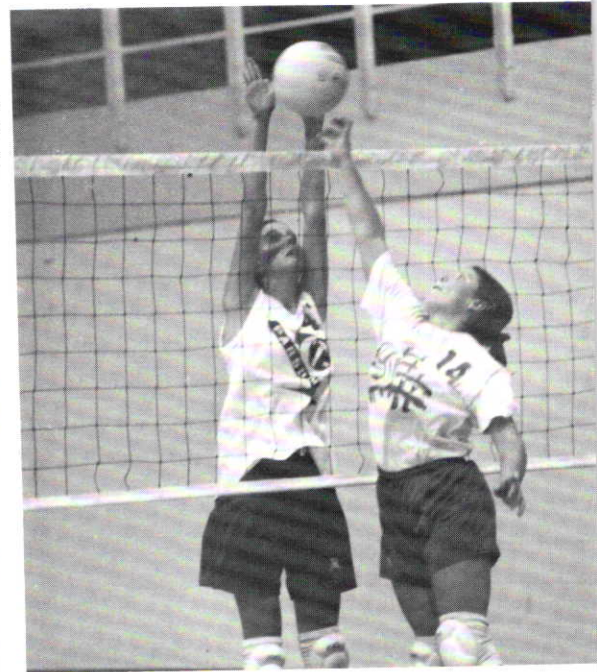

One of the highlights of the junior varsity season took place at a home meet when they defeated Parsons and Labette County.

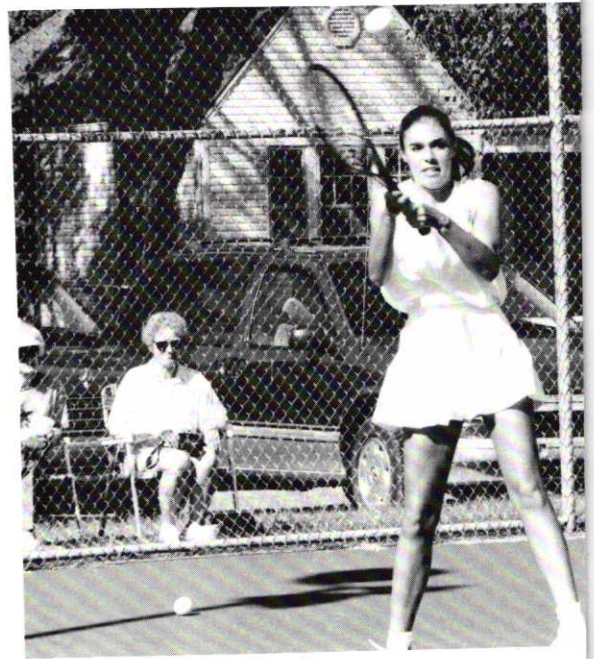
"We were pumped and ready to play, because everybody's friends and family were there to pump us up," junior Kristi Phillippi said.

"The part I like the most about basketball practice was taking my teammates to the hole cause none of them could handle me," said junior Darryle Vernon.

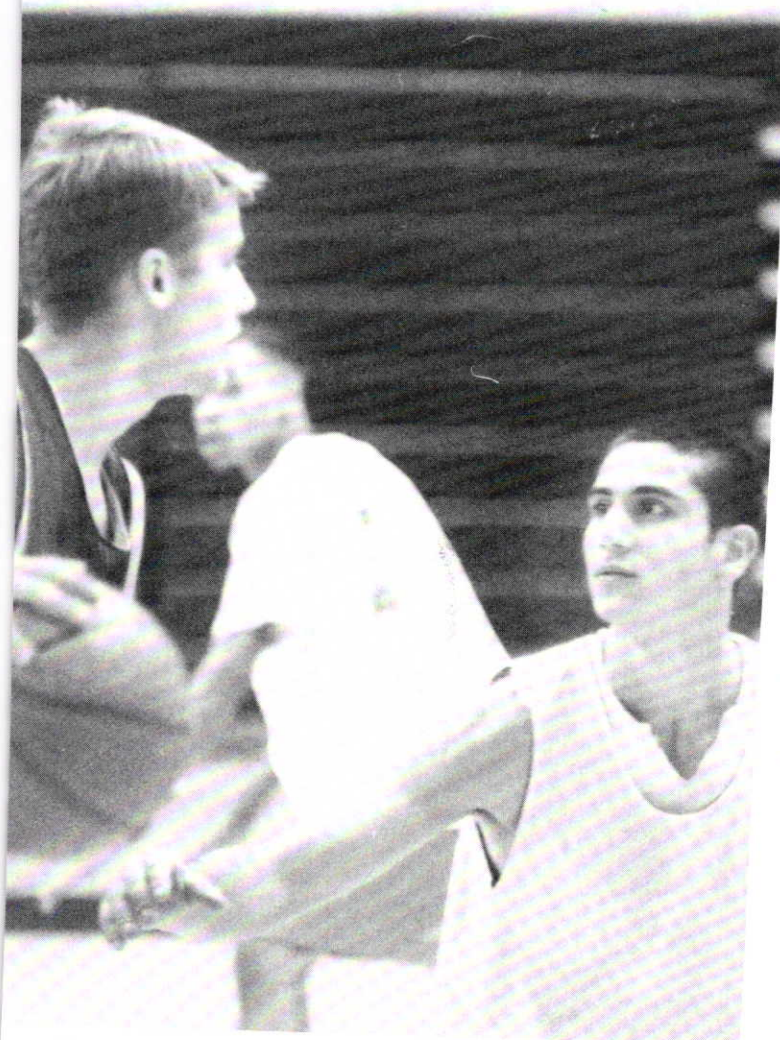

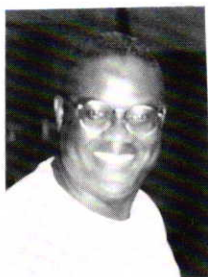

Fritz, and John McGehee. The second team included Cody White, and Miller; Mike Rogers made honorable mention.

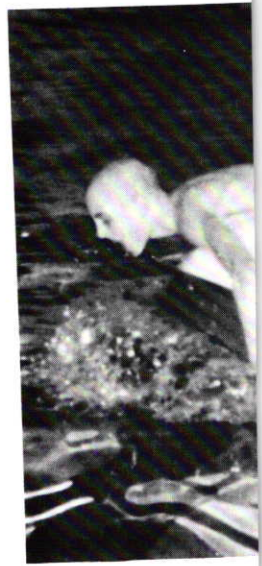
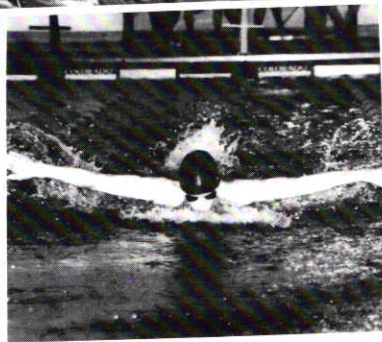
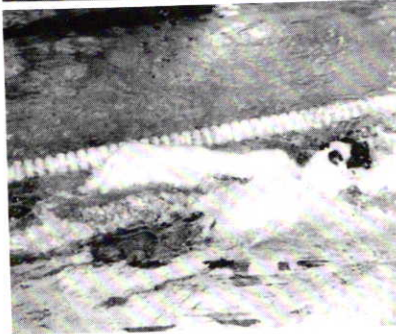
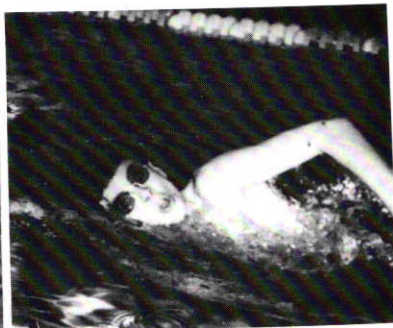
The scoring record for the varsity team ended up 0-6. The junior varsity team finished 0-1. The season's final record for the freshmen was 2-3.

placing at state, the goals for next year will be high.

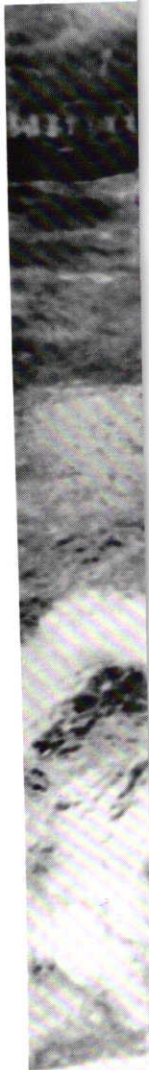
"My advice to anyone wanting to swim next year is to swim as much as you can in the off season and lift weights," Coach McDonald said.

"It was a fun, gratifying season, and my teammates made it worth while," DeVore said.

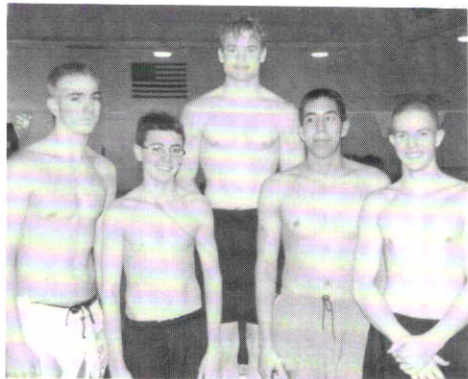

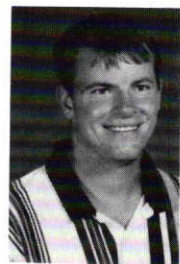

well-earned second place.

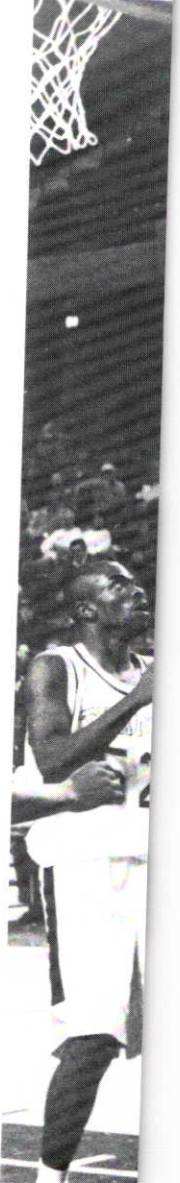

"This team has certainly laid the foundation for our future success that we will experience in the coming years," Coach Dan Wall said.



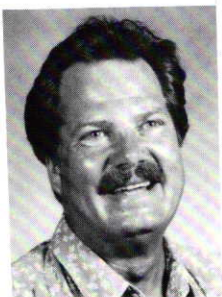
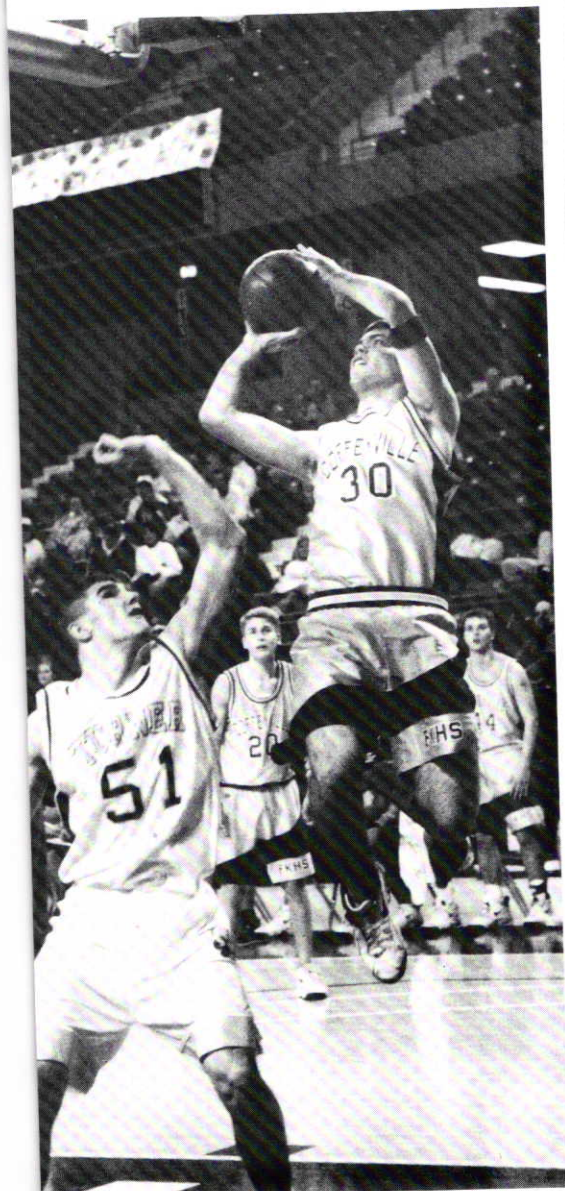

"I felt lonely being the only senior," Clough said.







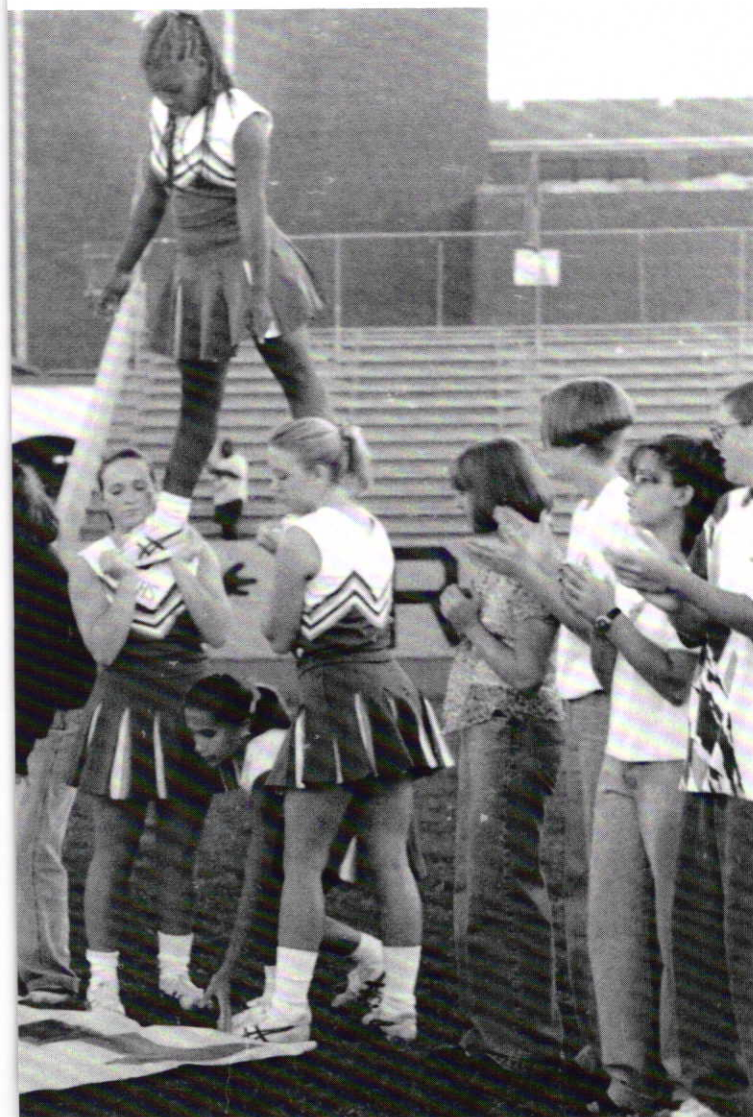

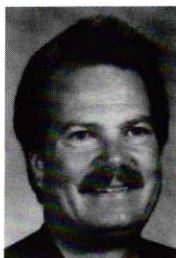

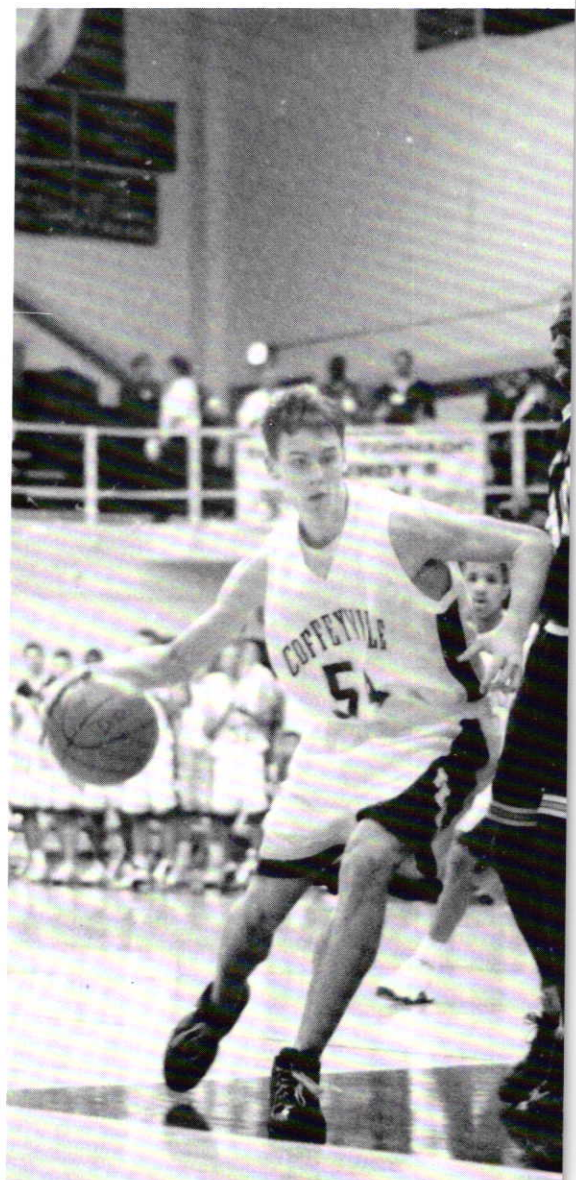

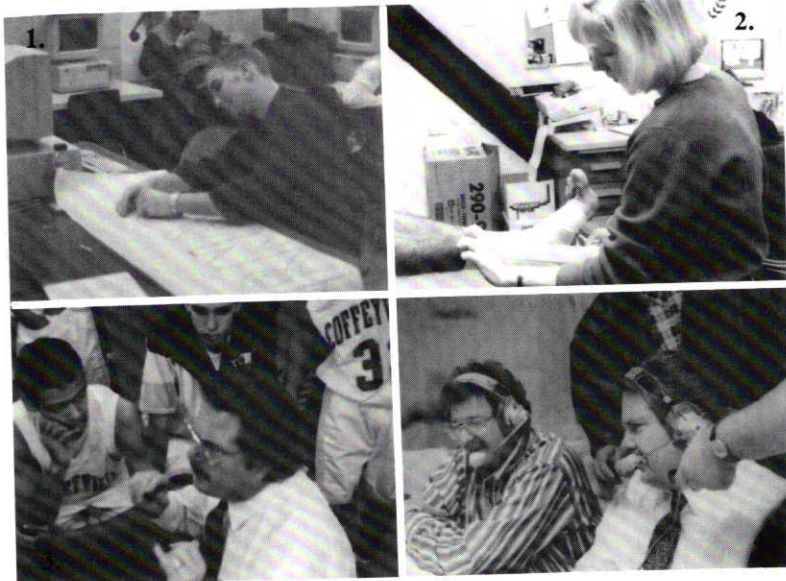

The goal for Nado was to complete the tournament with a first place finish, which has never happened in the 25 years of the tournament.

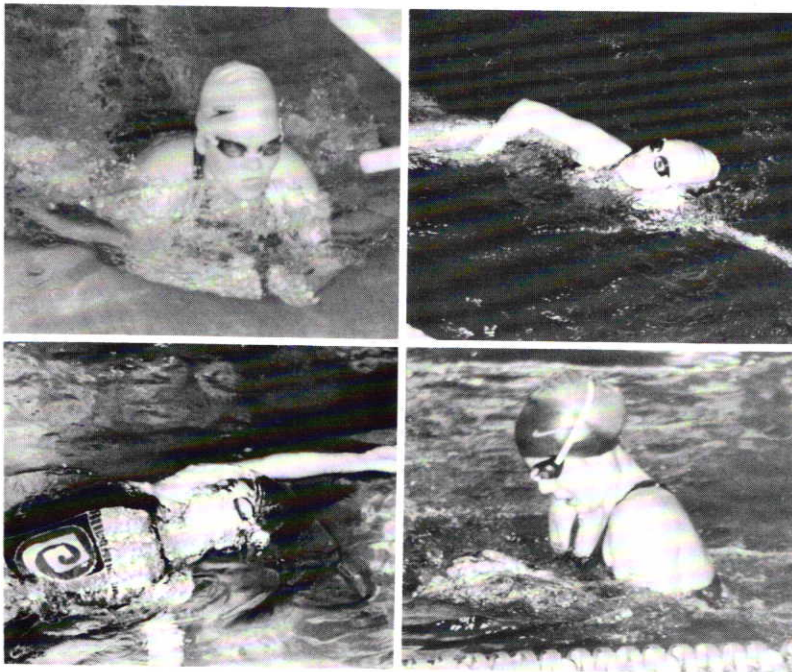
"We fell a little short of our goal; to win the Interstate Classic, but I was very pleased with the effort and intensity that my team exhibited during the classic. I was

"This year was fun although I wish that we could have won more of our meets, but that is all right because we tried our best," freshman Amanda Scullawl said.

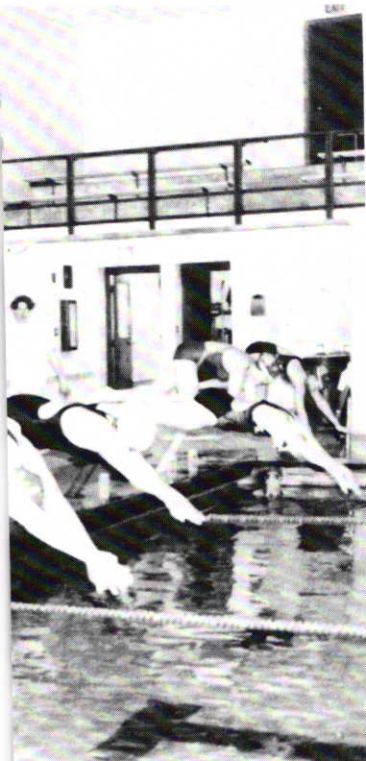
Two divers, senior Jeannie Byrne and sophomore Ashley Daugherty took it farther and even excelled enough to make it to the state competition.

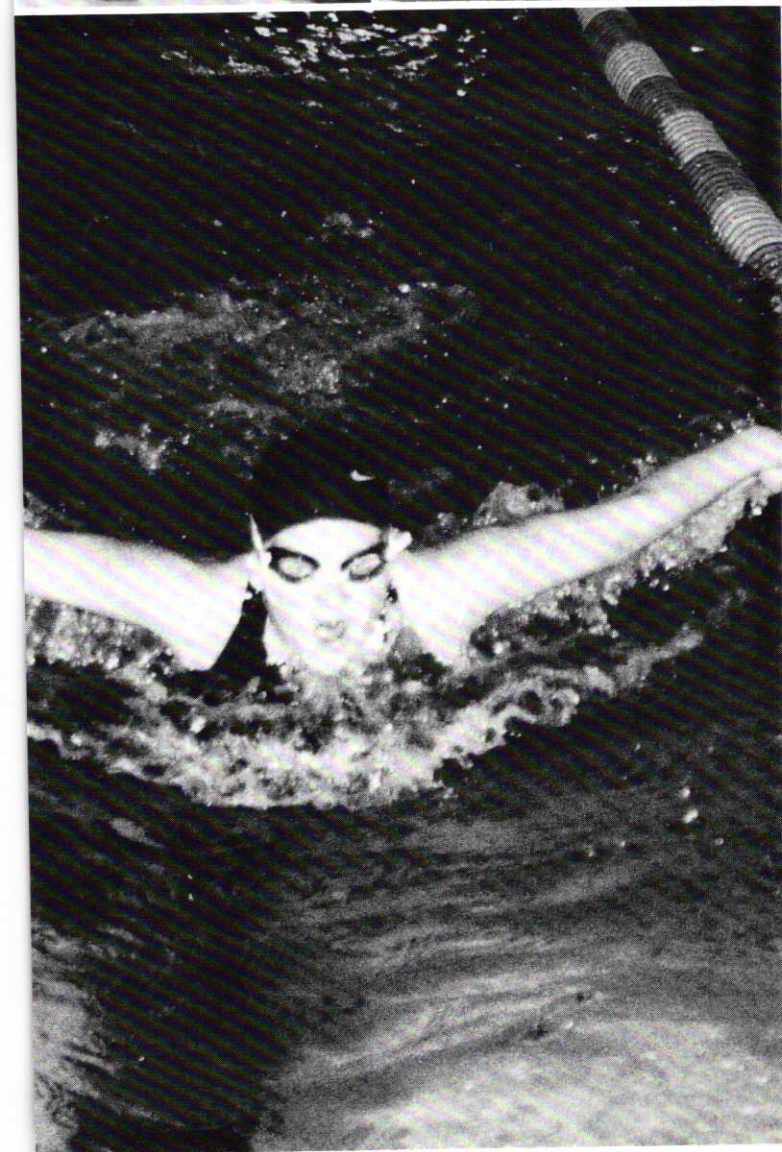

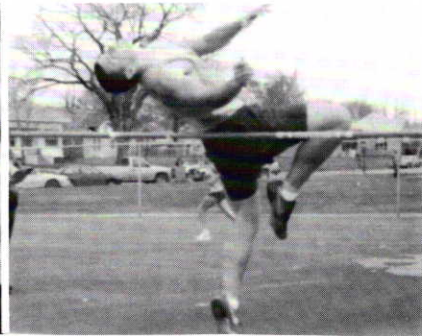
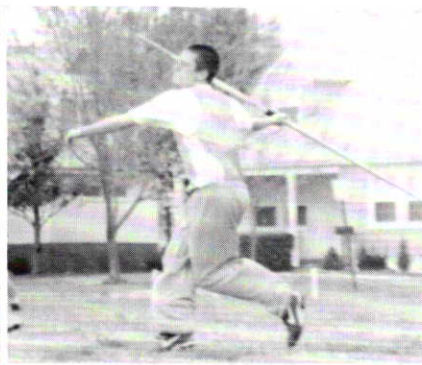

"I am expecting a lot from the boys next year. We will have our three top pitchers returning, and some great hitters," Newton said.



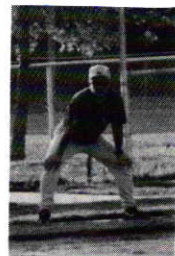

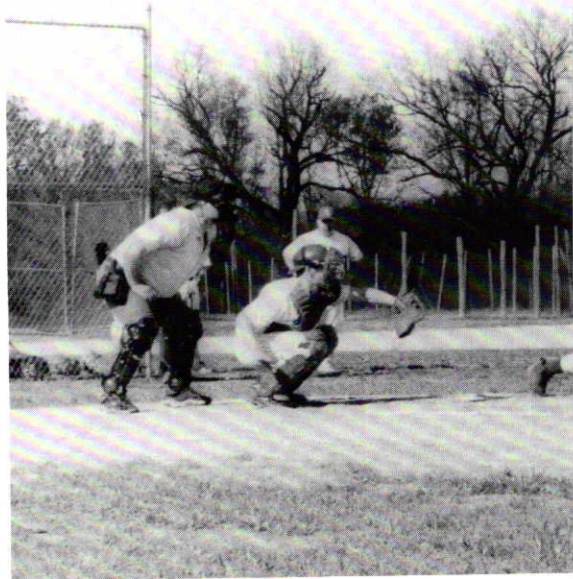

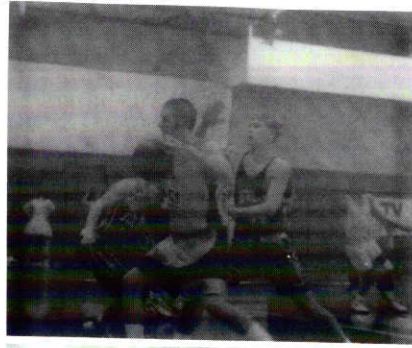

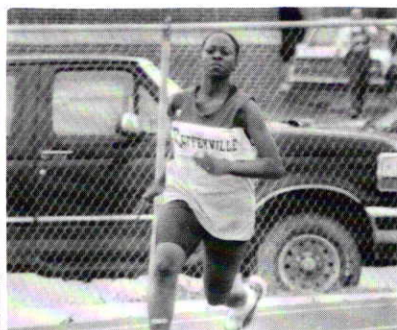

The team this year was a small one. With its small size, the team had to rely on incredible teamwork.

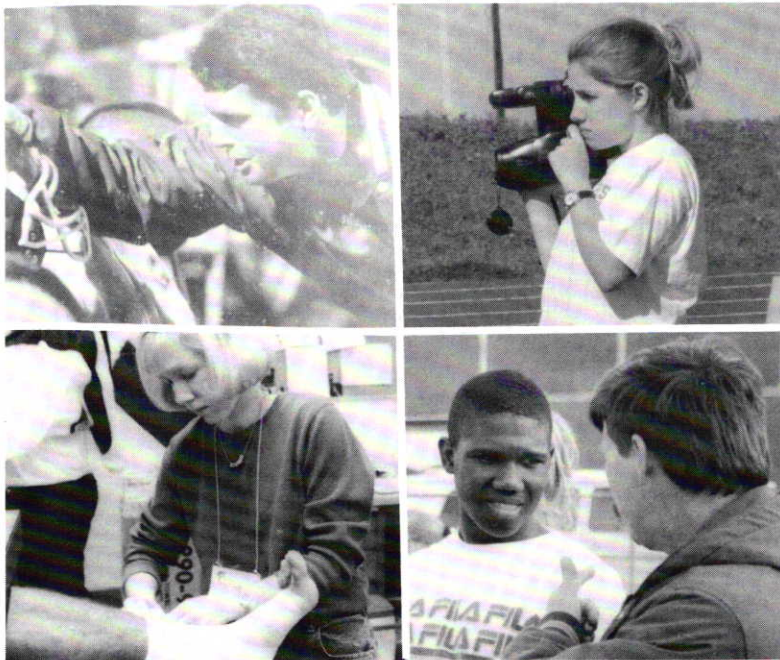

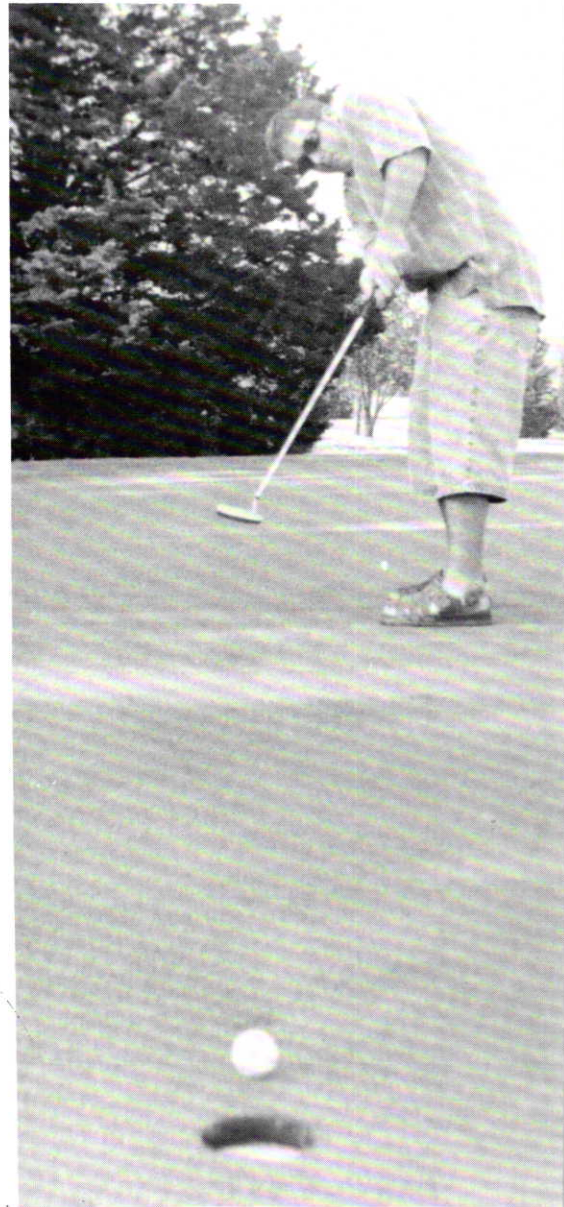

"I had lots of fun in Stuco this year and we got to eat a lot of food," freshman Chris Noel said.

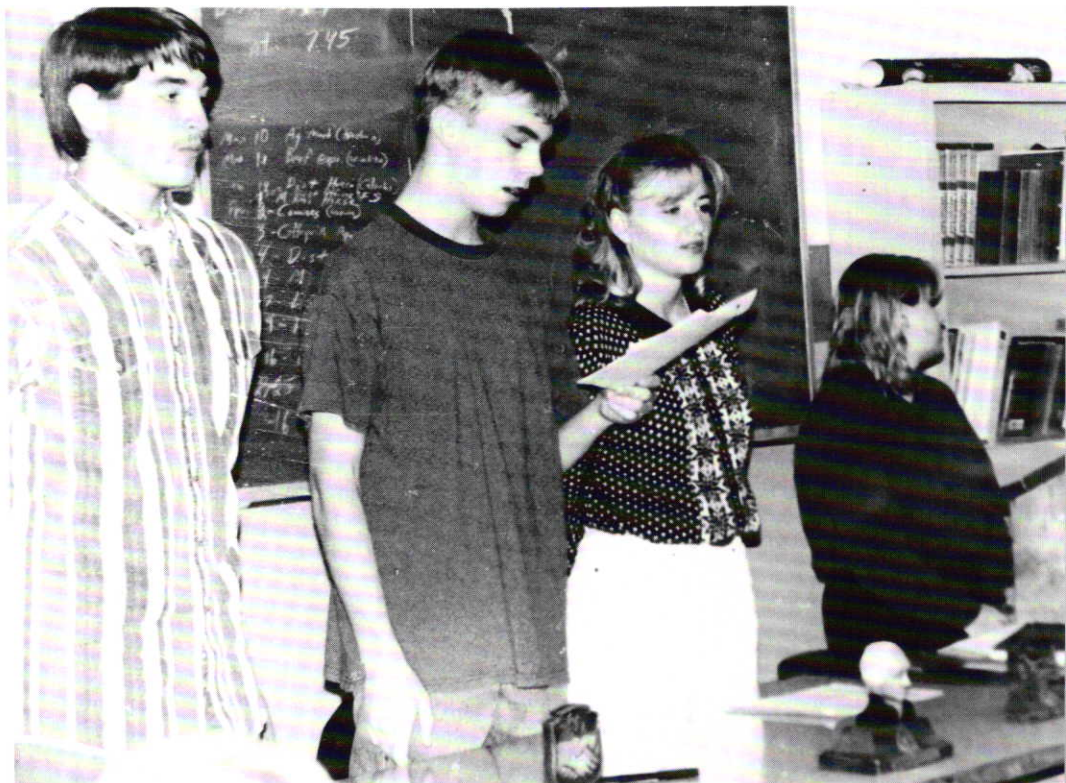

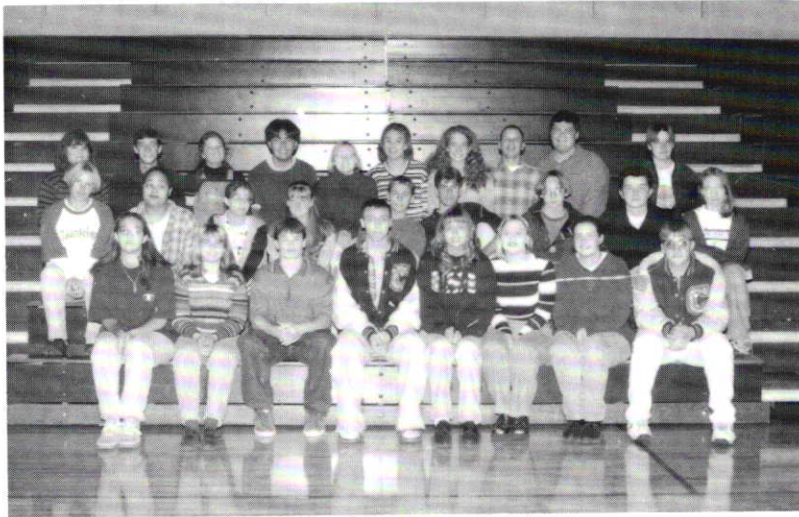

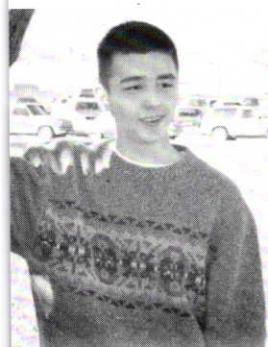
While students often depend on their friends, they also look to teachers to guide and teach them. Teachers often not only teach a subject, but teach students to learn for a lifetime.

Overall, it is a general consensus that the junior class is well on its way to seniority. It won't be long until the class of '99 is on its own in the real world.

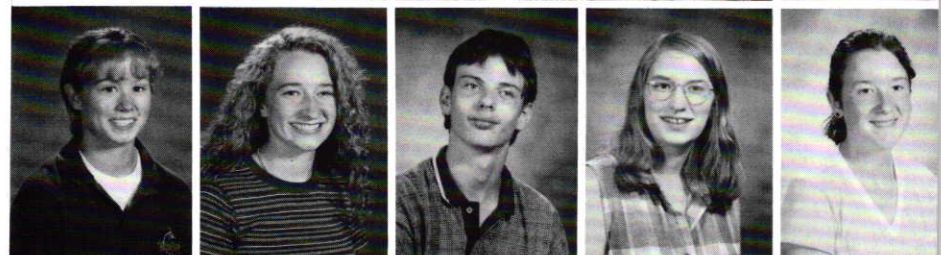
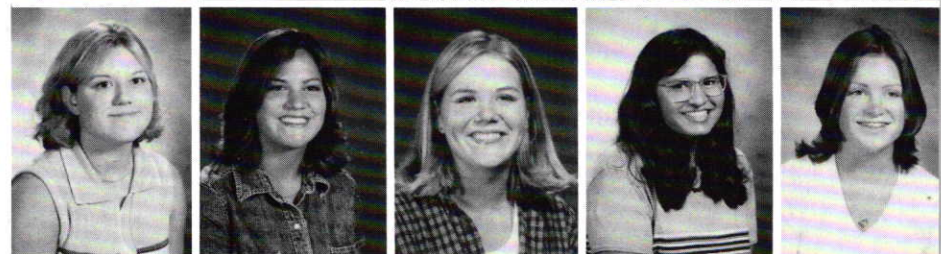
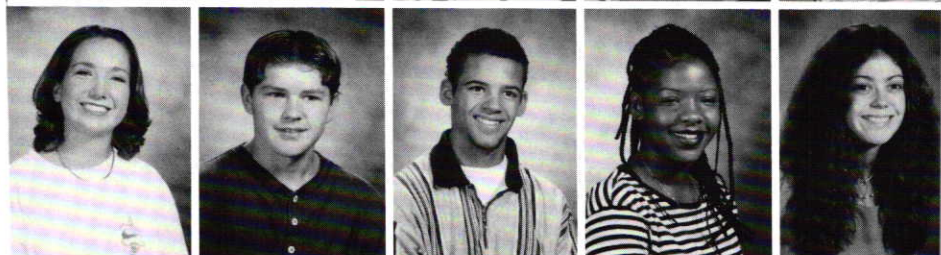
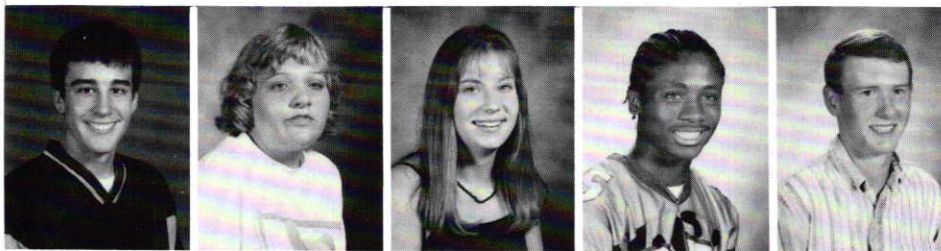

Watching the tube. That's how many students spend their free time. Whether it's Jerry Springer or Jerry Seinfeld, many religiously watch their favorite television shows.

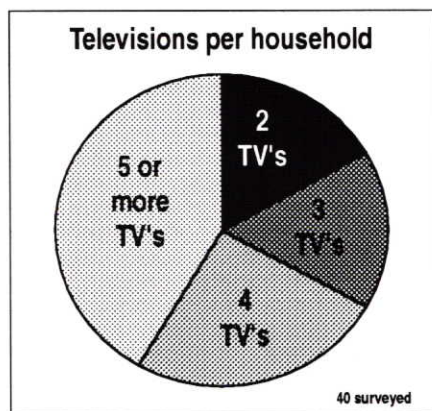
"I watch Mad About You because it's comical," Julene Gardner said.

For another popular show, Seinfeld, this season was its last. Kramer and his buddies will now live through reruns late at night.

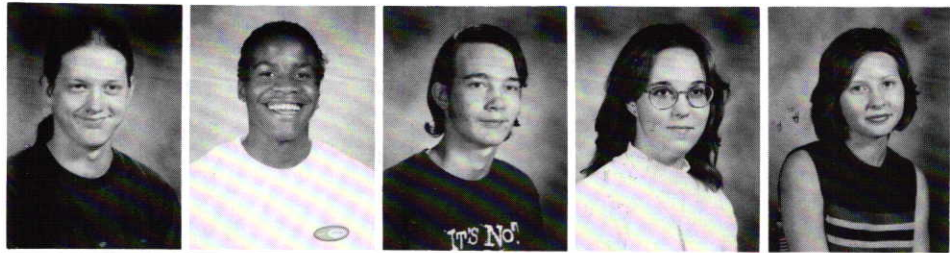
Last, but not least, many students lived for the Jerry Springer Show where guests violently confront their foes.

"I hate riding with my brother in his beast that dies every five seconds, so I ride with Carrie Price," Jamie Littleford said.

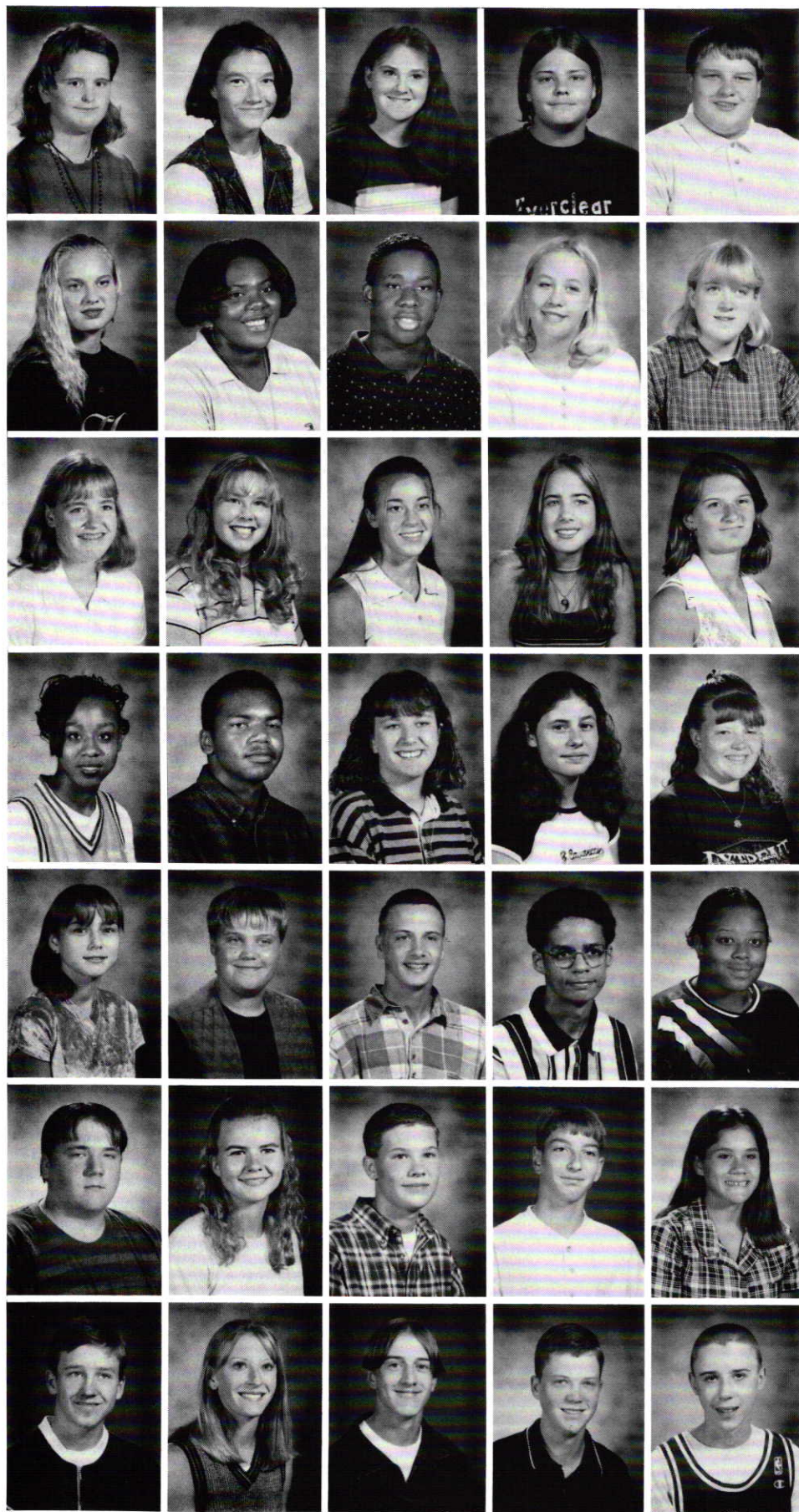

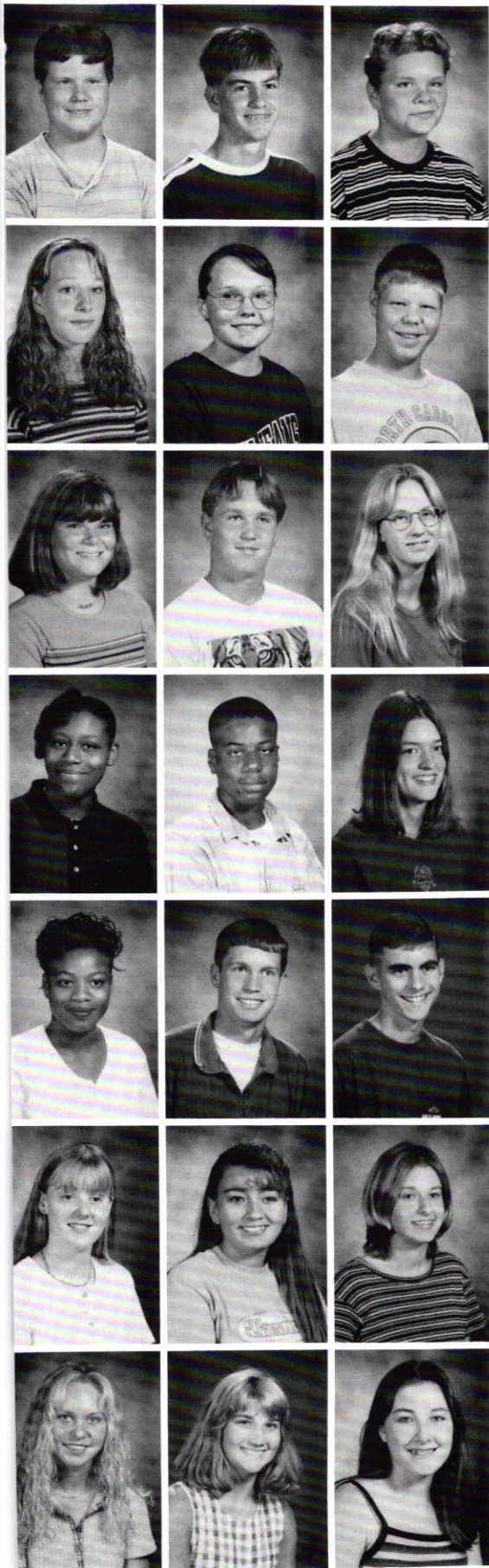

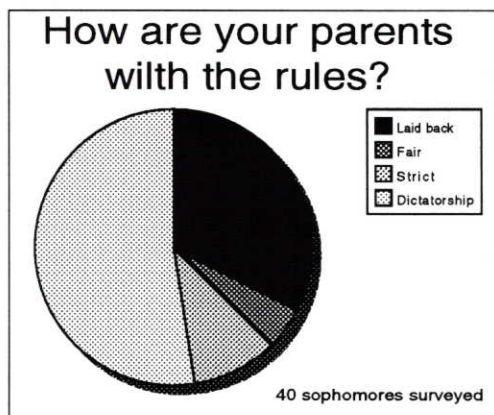
It's the moment of truth. You walk through the door and are met by at least one angry face. In a split second, you realize a rule has been broken and it's time to pay.

think the rules set by their parents are unfair and hypocritical. Others, however, believe these same household regulations are necessary for protection from the harsh world.

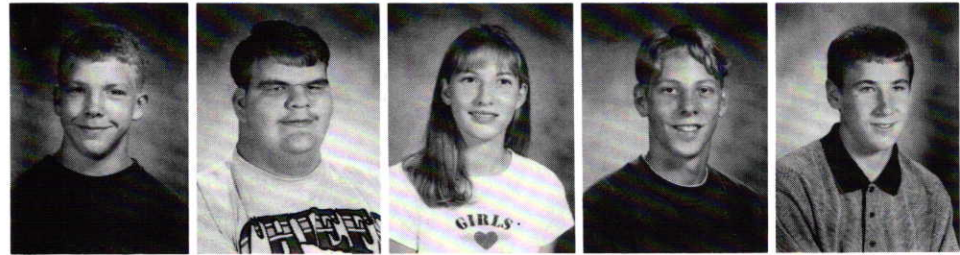
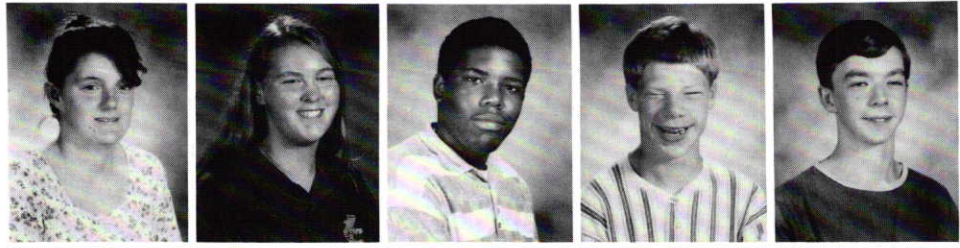
Although rules are here to stay, every home has different enforcers. Some parents are more strict than others and a few even employ parenting skills used in the 'flower power' era.

No longer being at the bottom of the high school totem pole, most sophomores say that being a sophomore means having to take on more responsibilities.

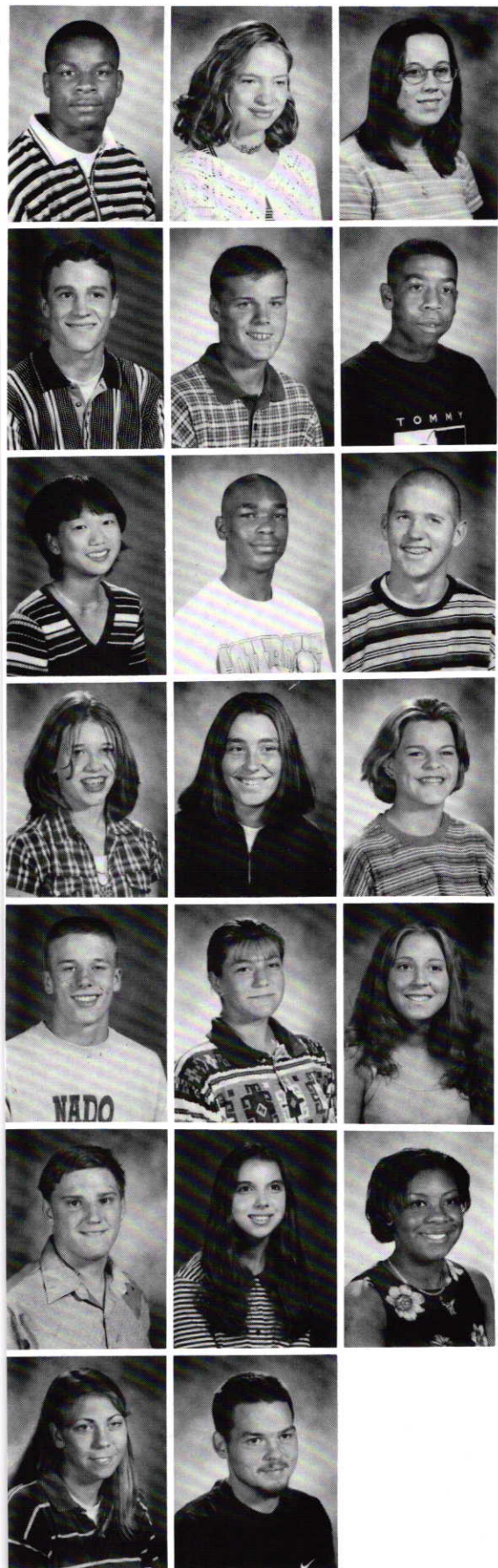
"The main difference from being a freshman is that since we are older and more mature, we get treated more like adults," Carlita Wilson said.

The parents at FKHS feel it is an advantage to be at school with their children. They have an inside scoop on what is going on in their lives.

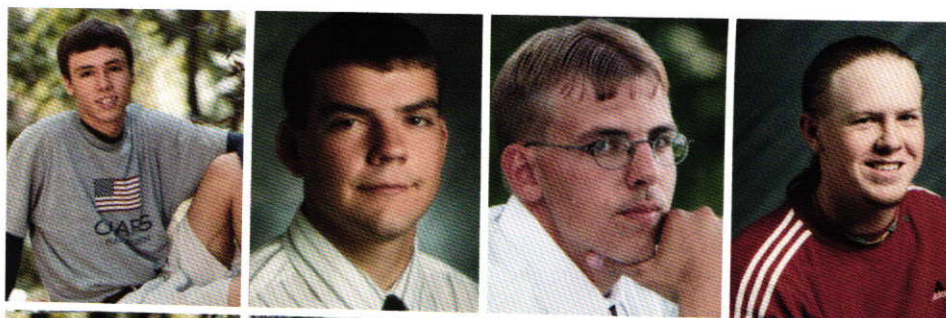

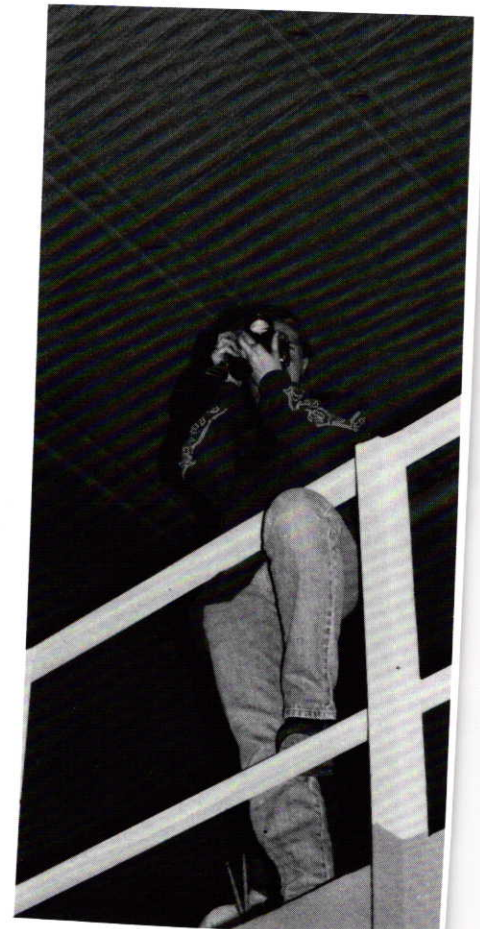

The seniors of 1998 definitely have different expectations than those of previous classes.

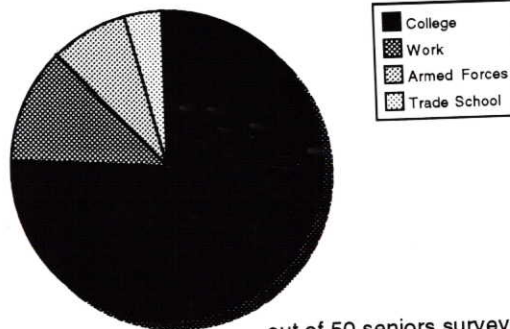

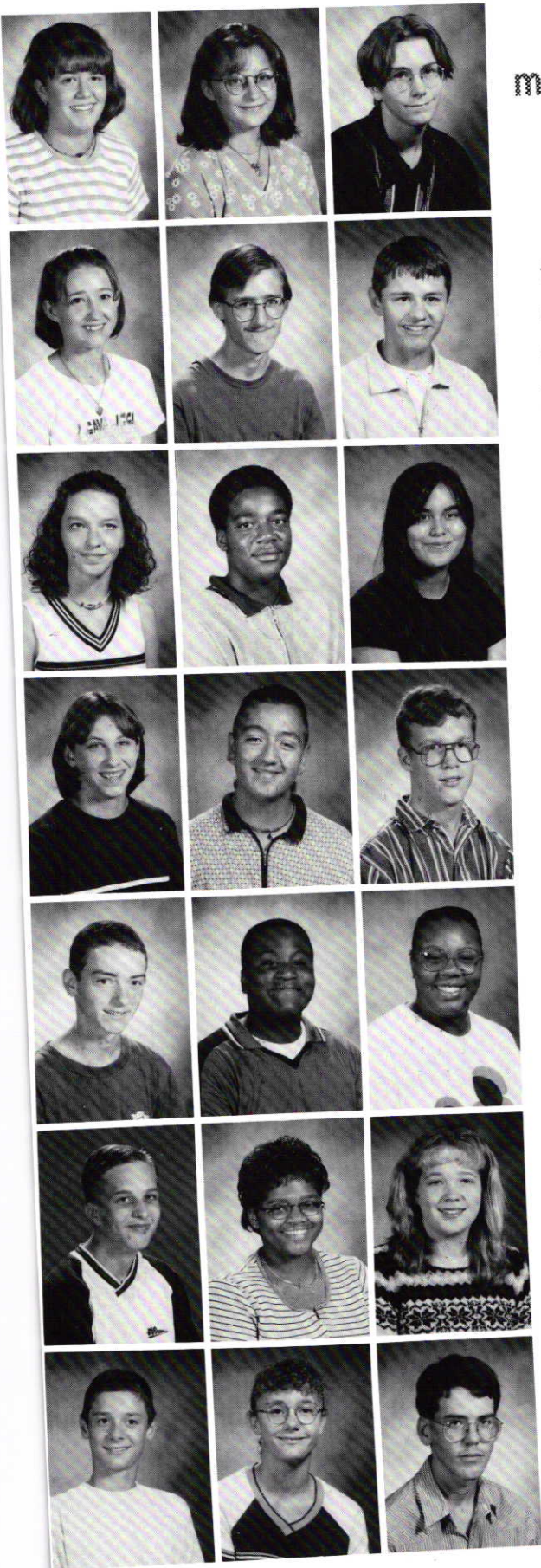
"At first it was confusing and I got lost going to Mr. Brown's room," Jerry Banzet said.

The long hallways and many stairways can be intimidating. Often freshmen find themselves lost and far from where they are supposed to be.

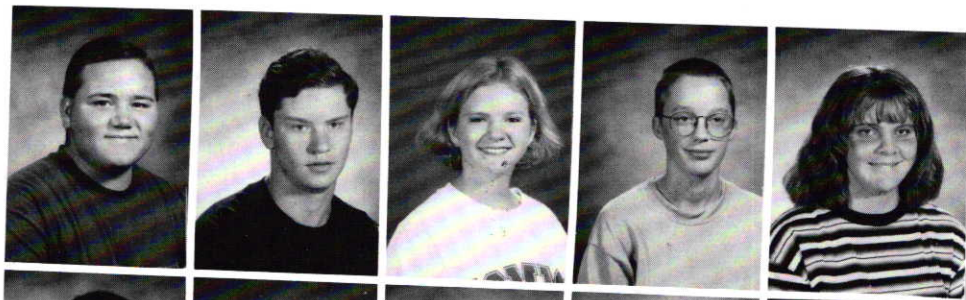
