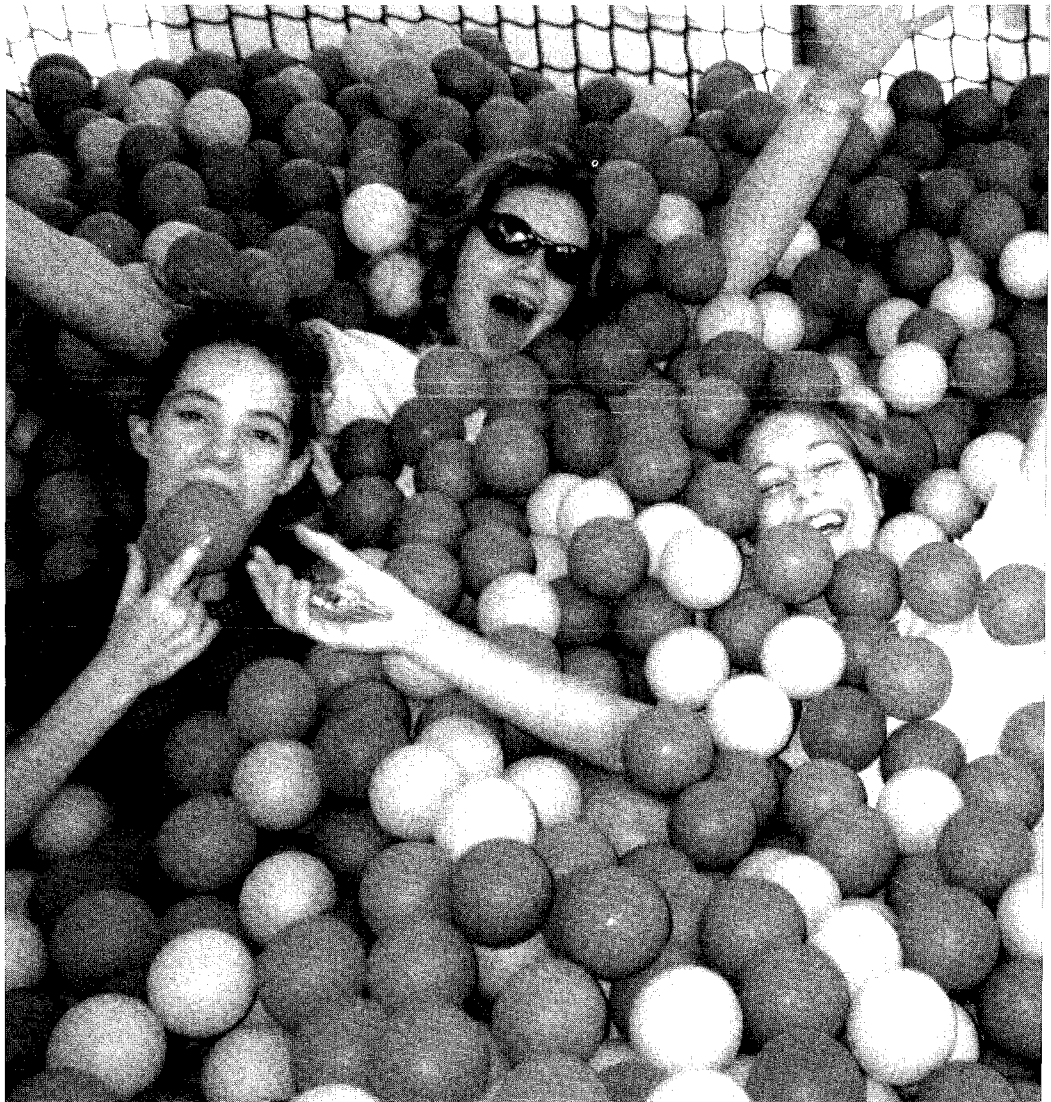

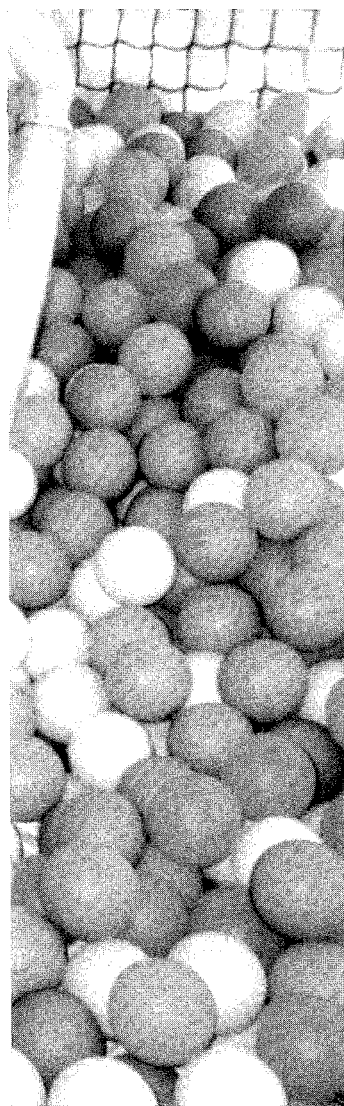

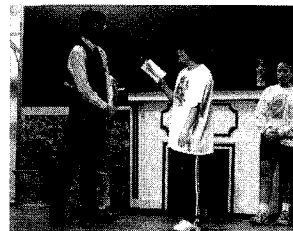

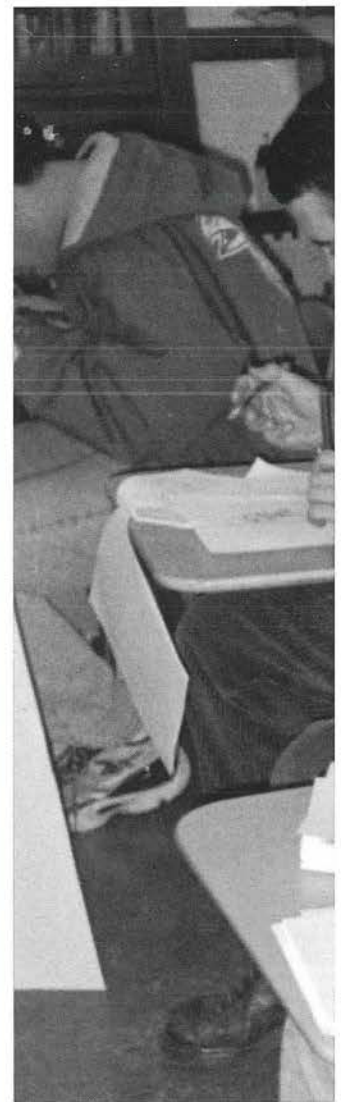

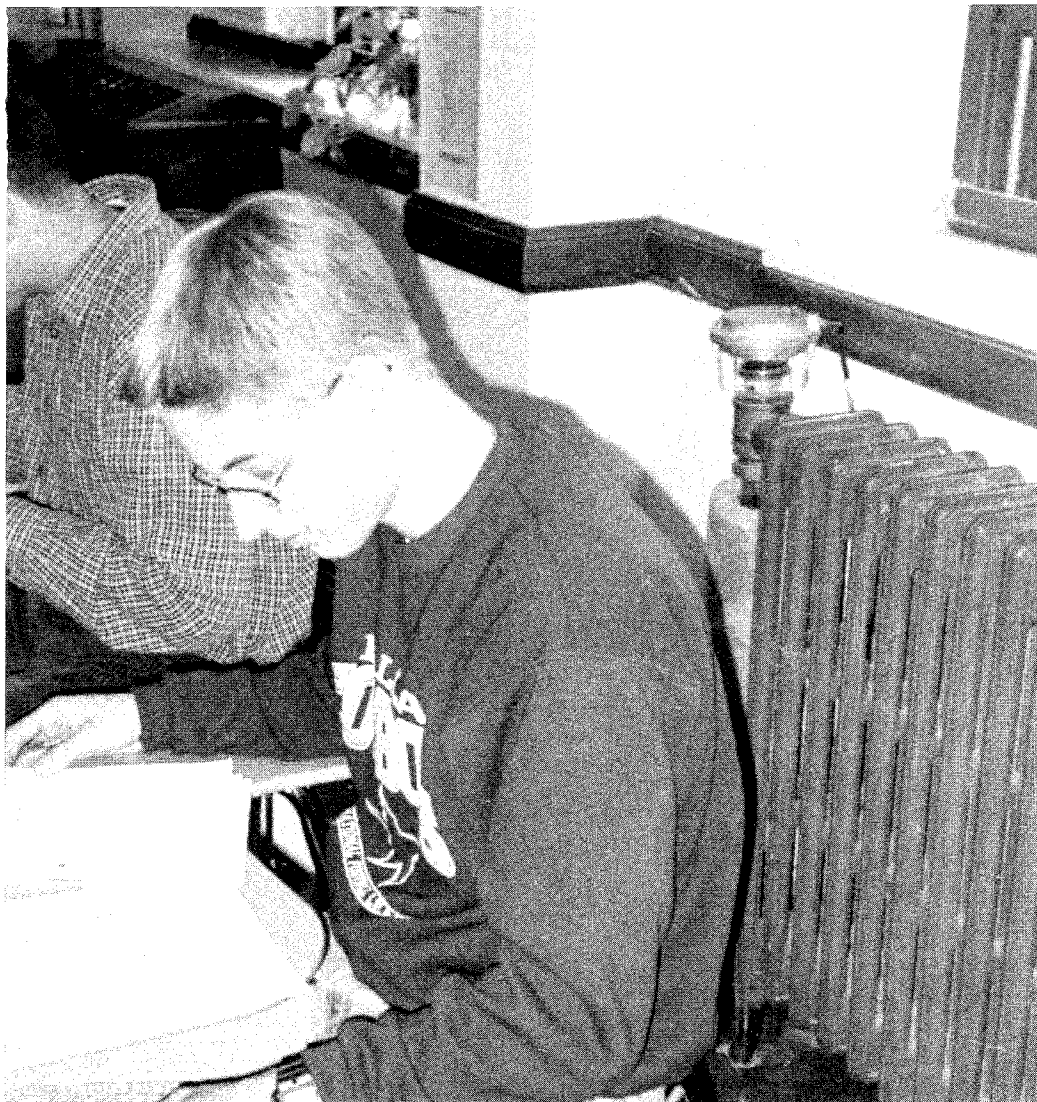

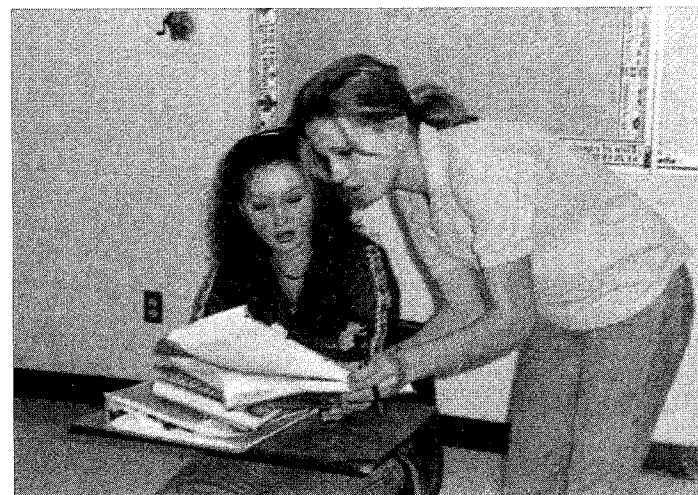

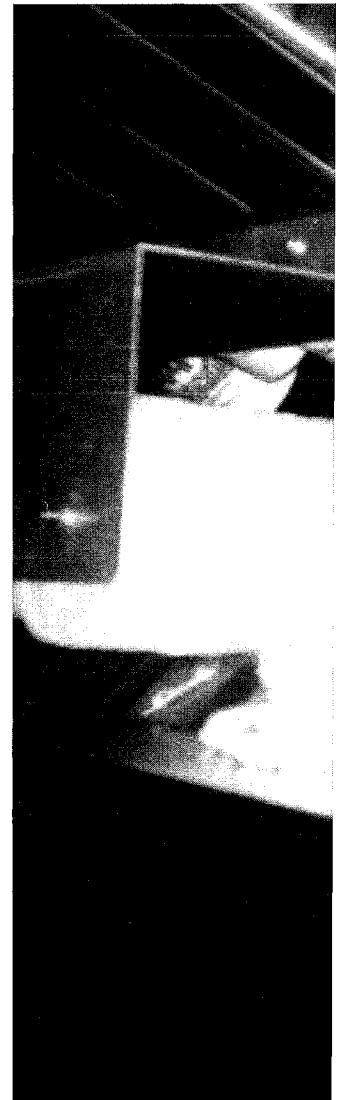

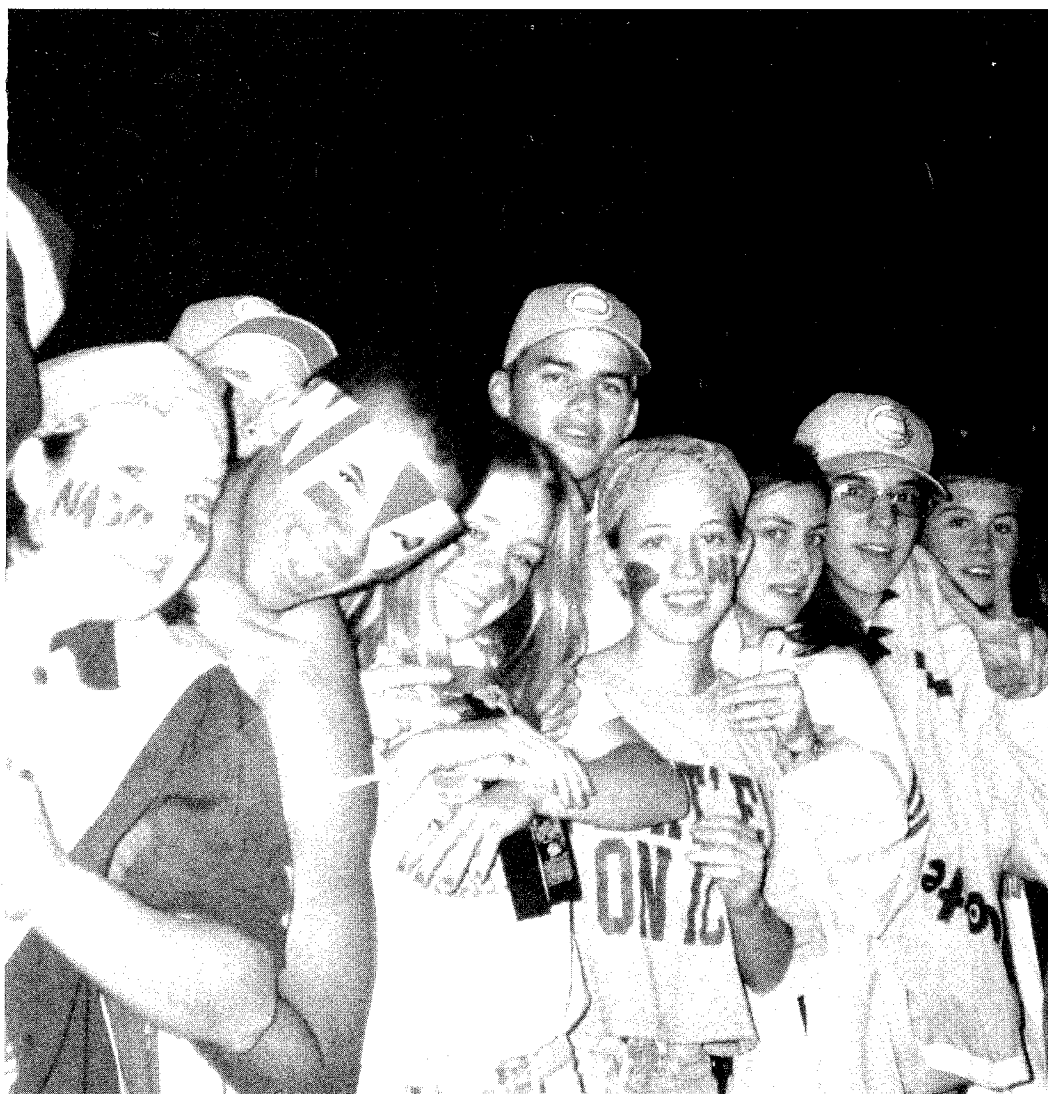

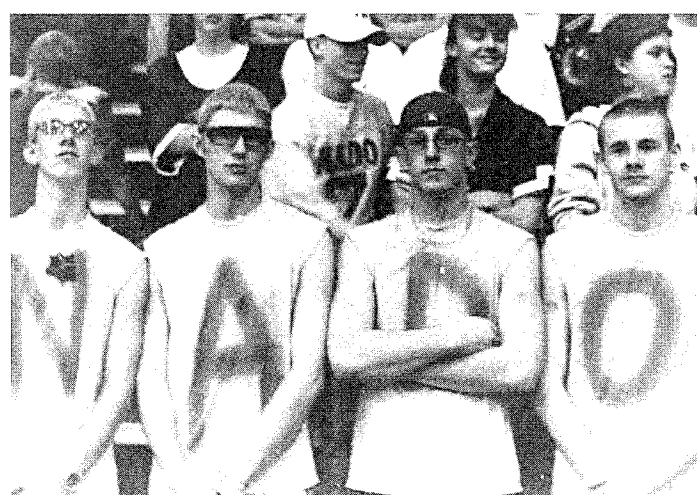
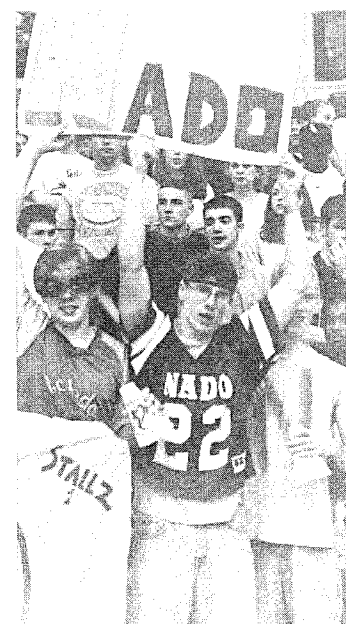

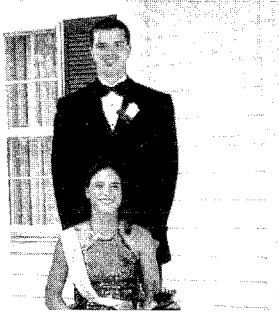

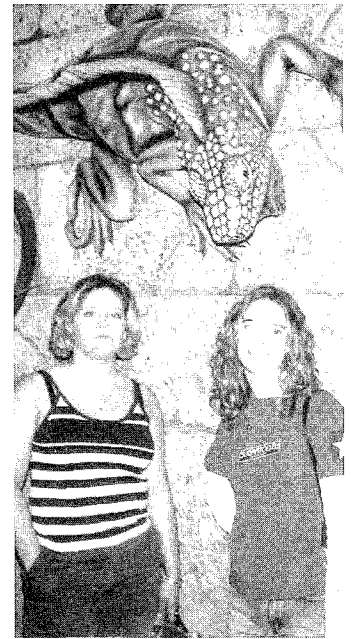

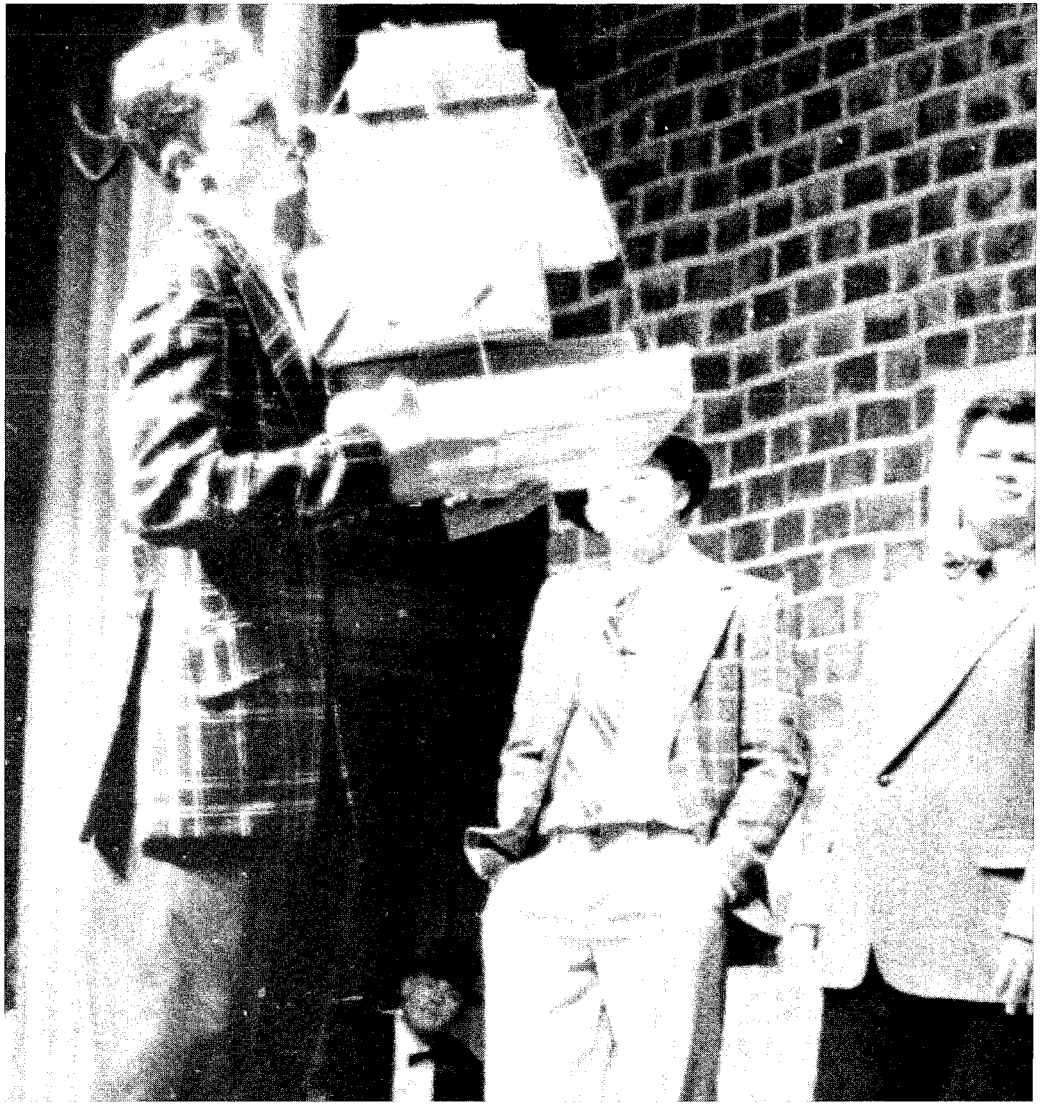

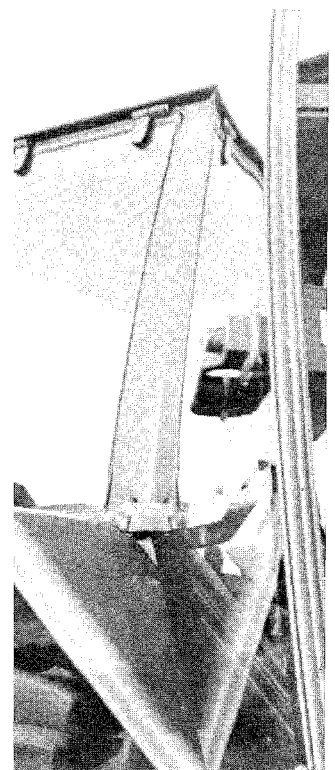

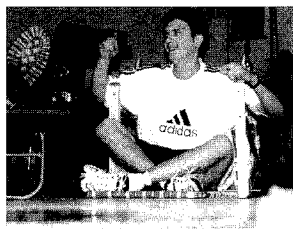

Exciting and tragic, two words that can be used to describe the events occurring this year. From August to May, news stories dealing with both local and global happenings piled up.

The world continued to fret over the Y2K computer meltdown theory and tensions between the US and Iraq rose after airstrikes began in mid-December. Locally, a pipeline from the Farmland Refinery spilled over 1,000 barrels of crude oil into the Verdigris River, Coffeyville's water supply.

During the winter, legal charges mounted against President William Jefferson Clinton including Obstruction of Justice and Perjury. On Dec. 19, 1998, Clinton was impeached by the House of Representatives. The charges were eventually dropped by the Senate and the President stayed in office. Later in the year, another massive airstrike began involving the Serbs in Yugoslavia. In early May, NATO forces accidentally bombed a Chinese embassy in the strikes.

On April 22, in suburban Littleton, Colorado, two students, armed with bombs, booby traps, and an arsenal of firearms, massacred students in their school leaving a death toll of 15. The incident in Colorado was the deadliest school shooting in US history. Also in late April, tornadoes ripped through Oklahoma and Kansas leaving 45 dead. It was classified as one of the worst to date.

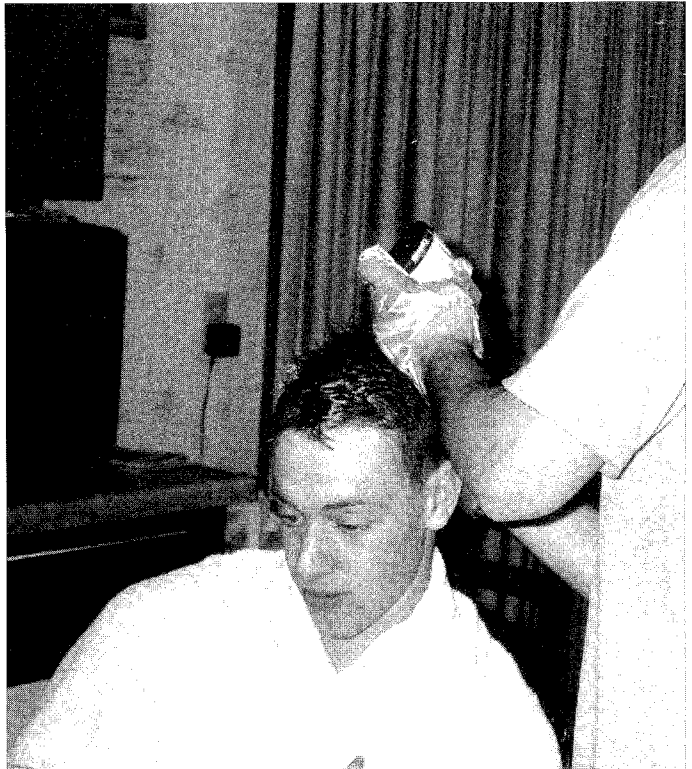

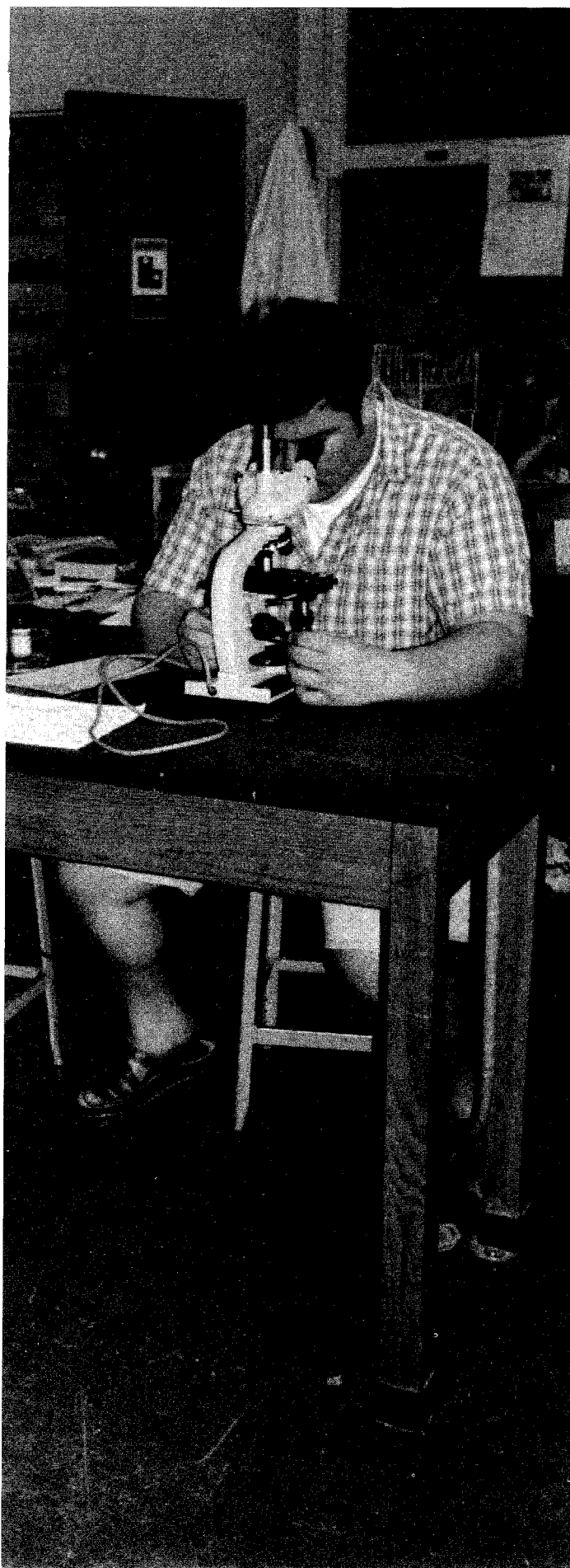
"I think it's good to leave the advanced classes for upperclassmen because it gives them a chance to get the classes in their schedule," freshman Jenny Hutchins said.

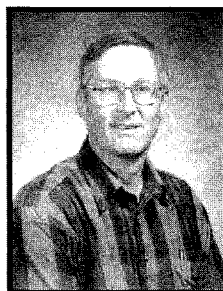
We've all had our share of broken beakers, butchered dissections, and busted testtubes. But it wouldn't be science if there wasn't a little bit of danger involved.

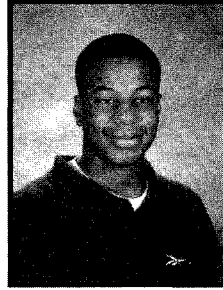

"Economics has helped me learn more about how the world makes money. What kind of economy we are, and how much people demand, and how much the world supplies," senior Crystal Marion said.

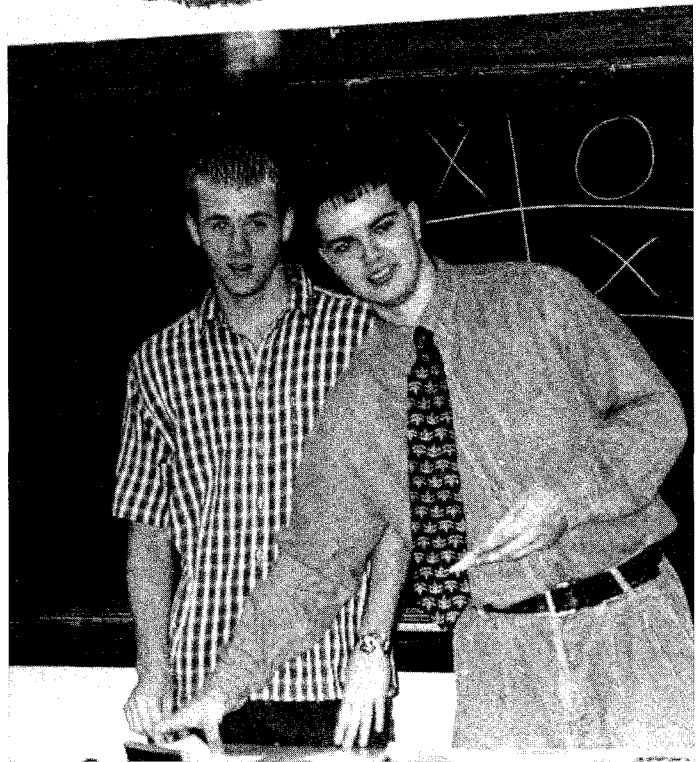
Students can take classes dealing from early world history to early United States and Military History.

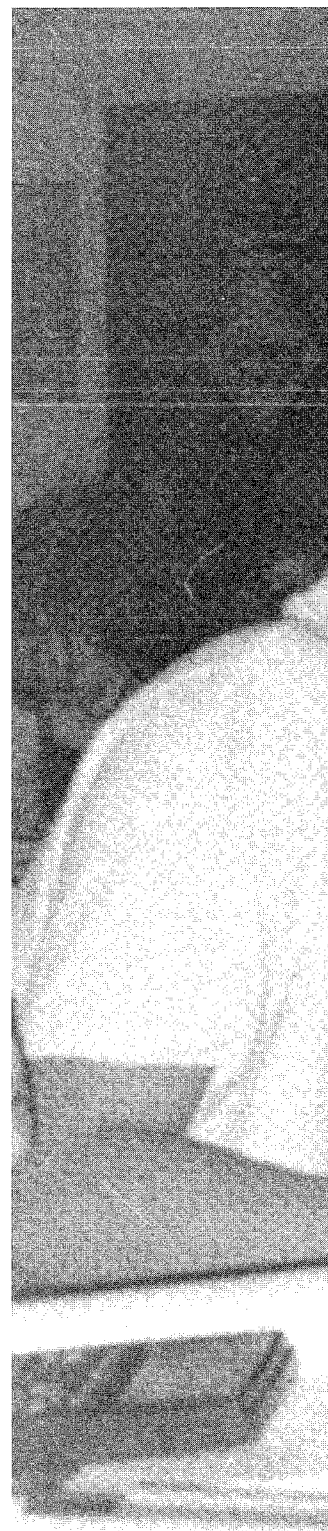

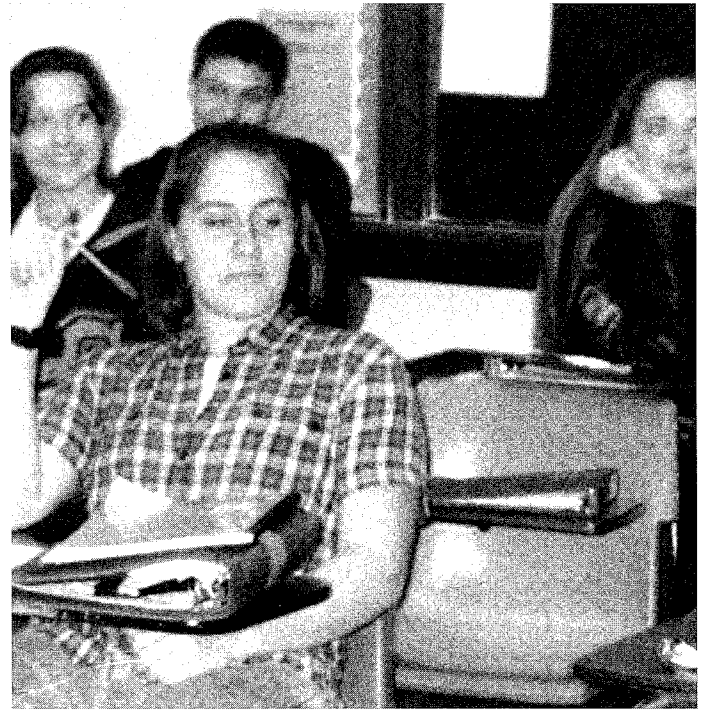

Learning THE Language

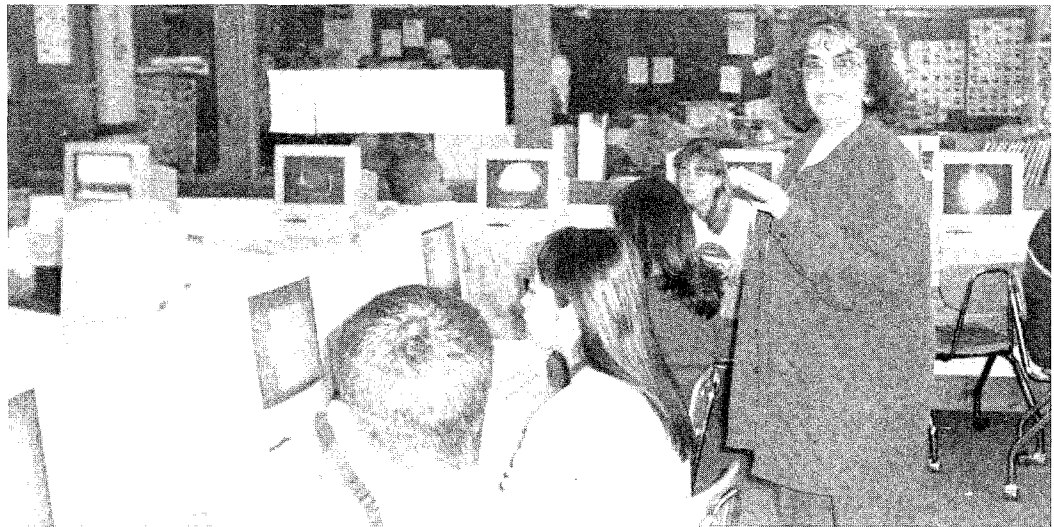
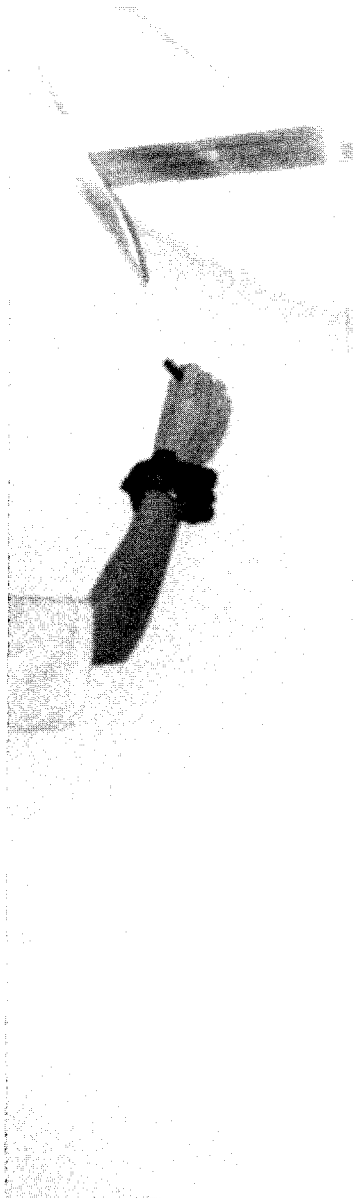
From learning comma rules to studying Thoreau, students experience many facets of the English language. Students are required to complete four years of English to graduate.

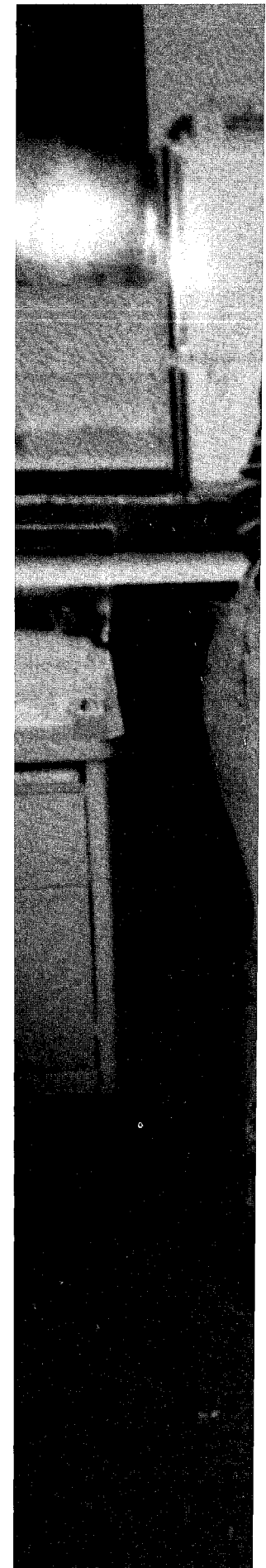
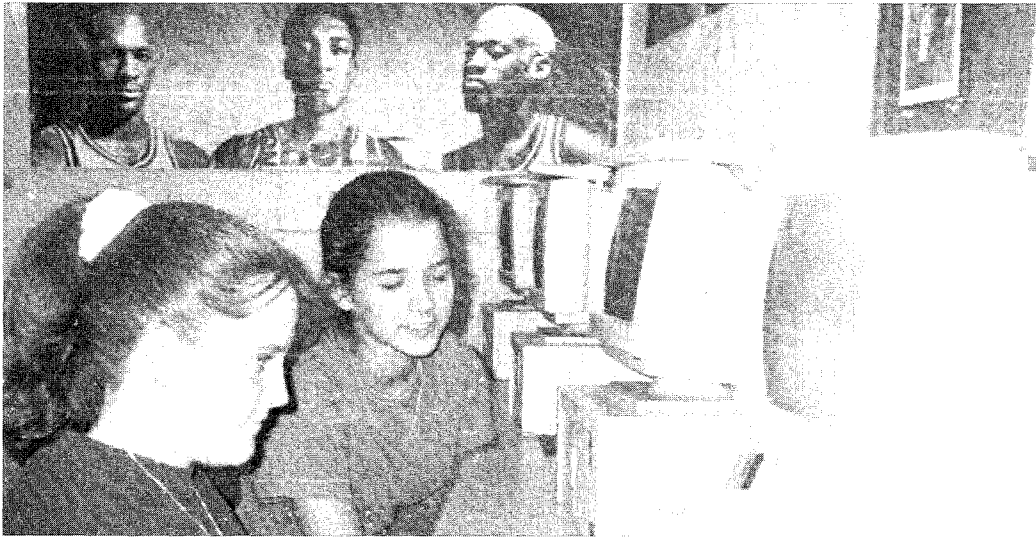
Many students enjoy food and clothing classes because of the final product they get to enjoy.

Battling THE Virus

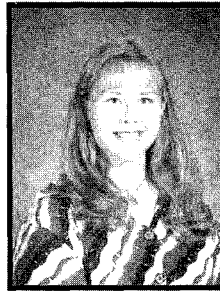
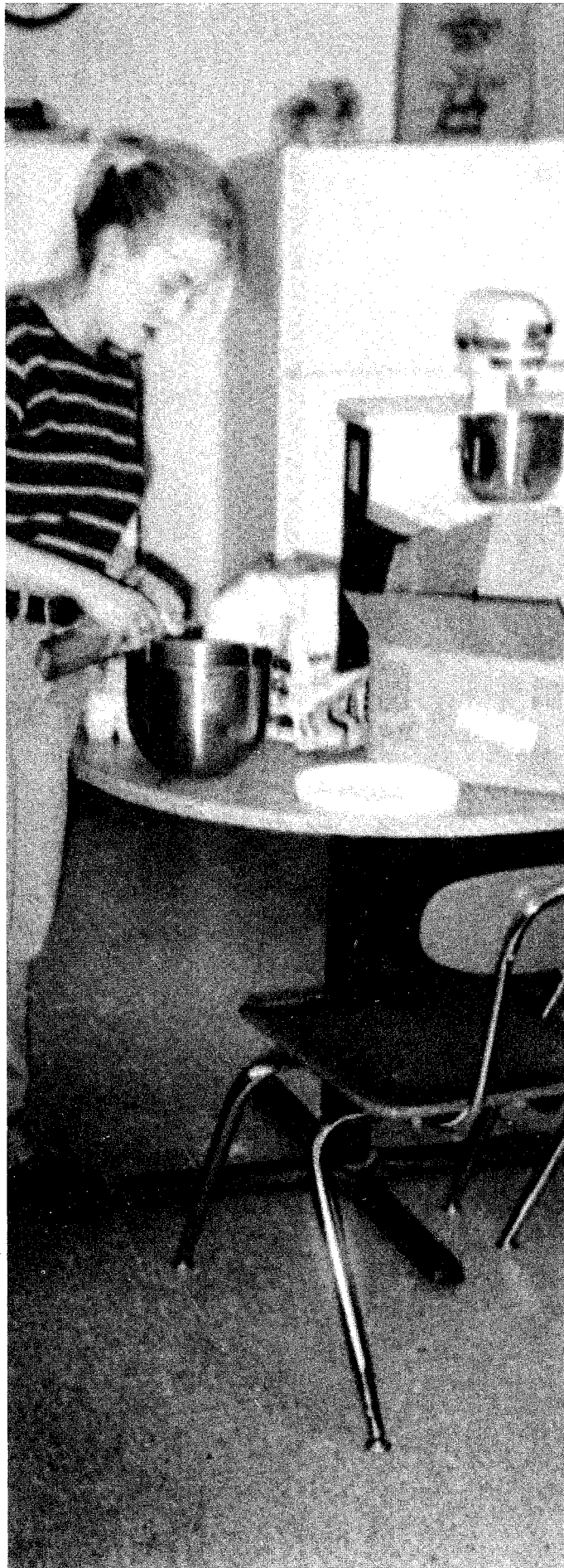

"It's a lot different than being in the photography class because you have all kinds of deadlines to meet," senior Tricia Powell said.

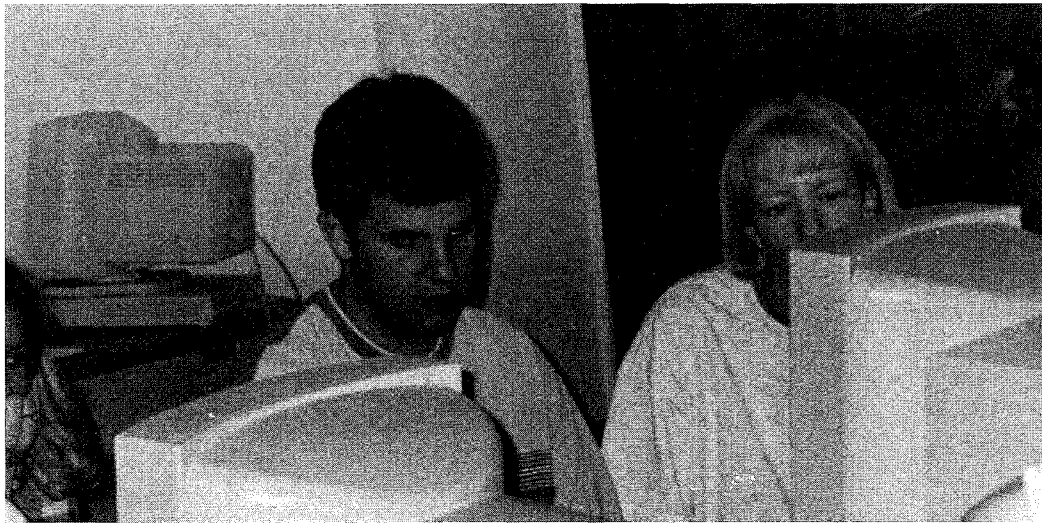

"Regionals really put my mind to the test and I enjoyed it," junior Rachel Parker said.

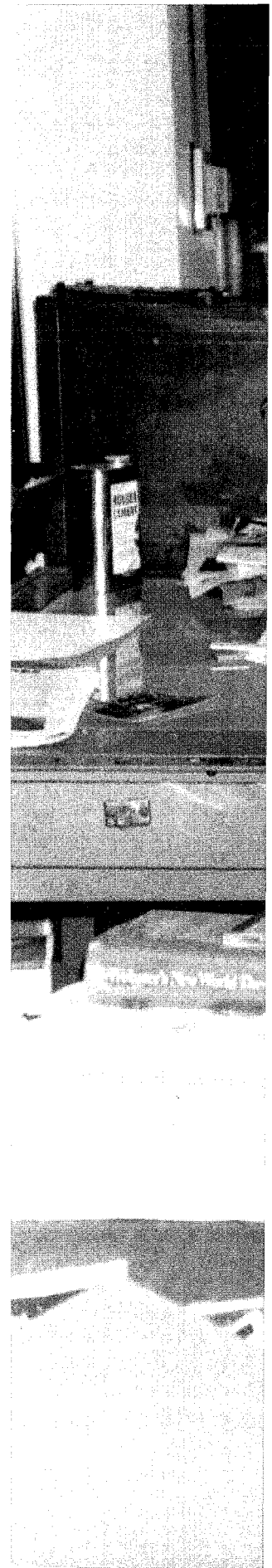

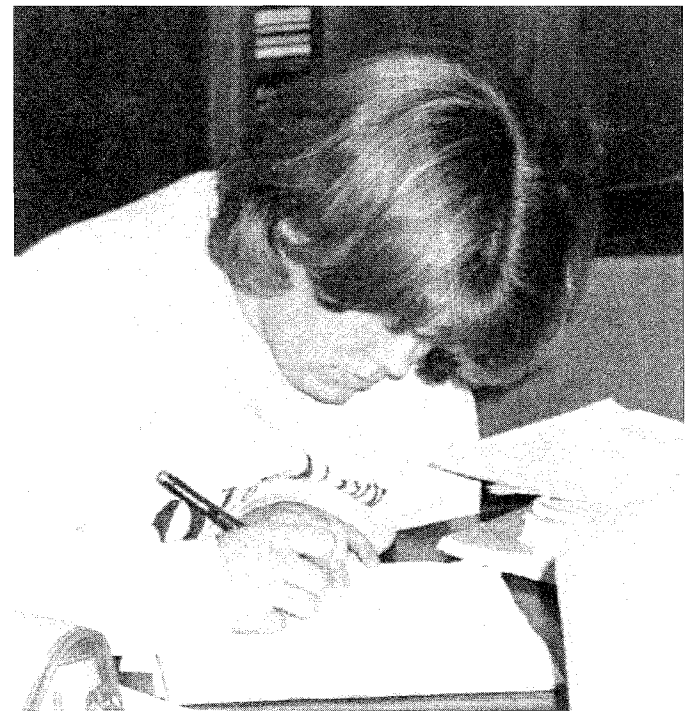

For these people to be able to qualify for state they had to place in the top six in their category at regionals which took place at Pittsburg State University in February.

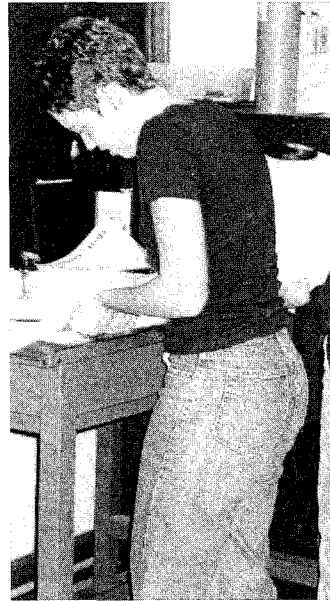
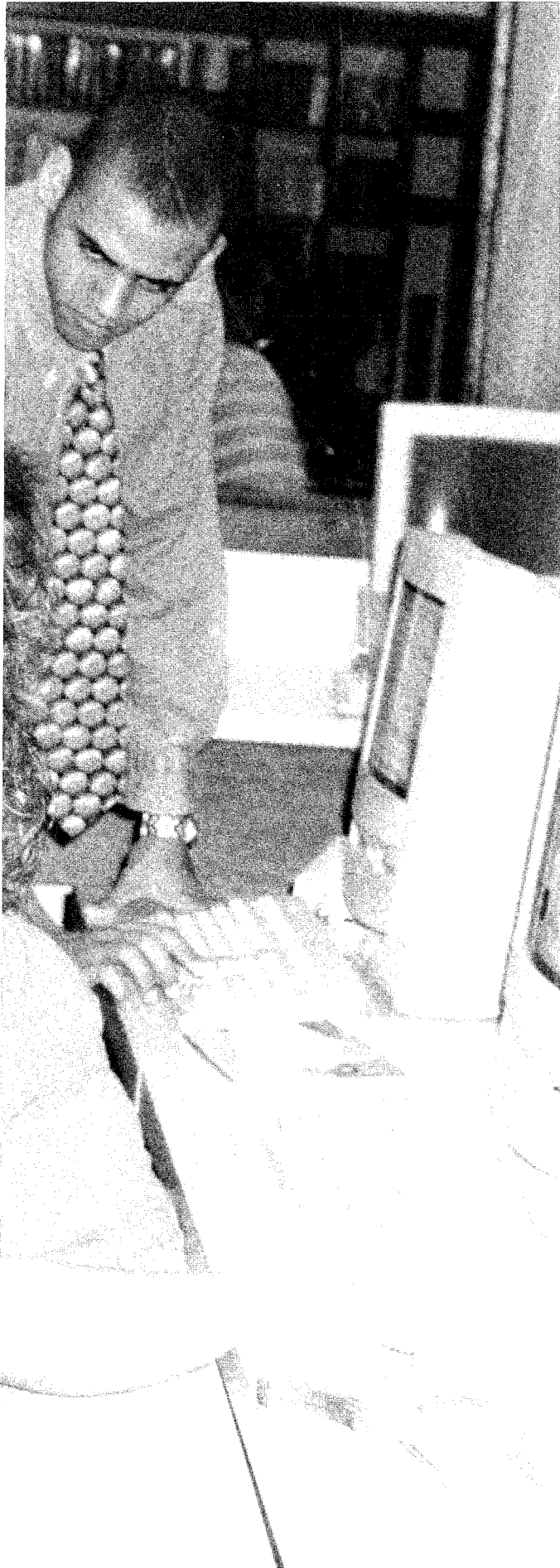
"The best thing about journalism this year is that we went to state and it is was a blast since it was Mrs. Warren's last year," Allison Smith said.

Expanding **MINDS** Creatively

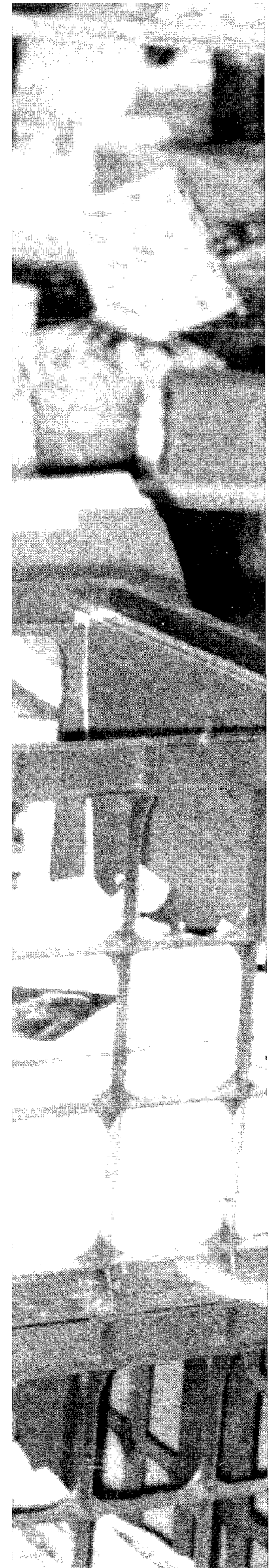

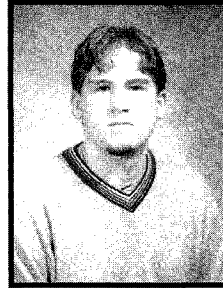

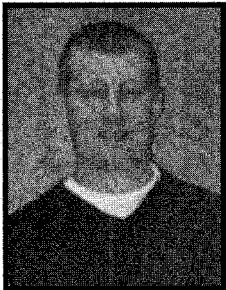

"I like my class at the vo-tech because we get to go on field trips and do a lot of things with the animals," sophomore Meredith Hatridge said.

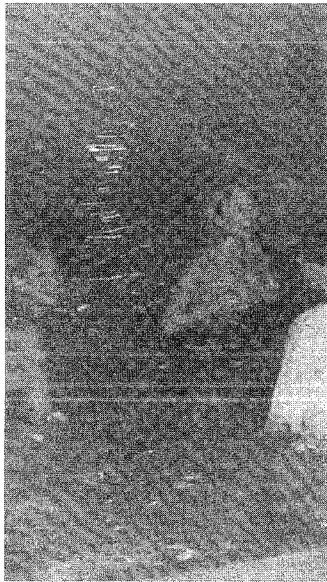

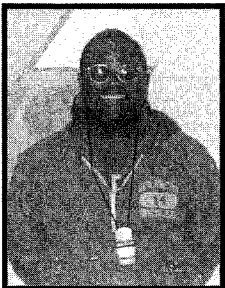
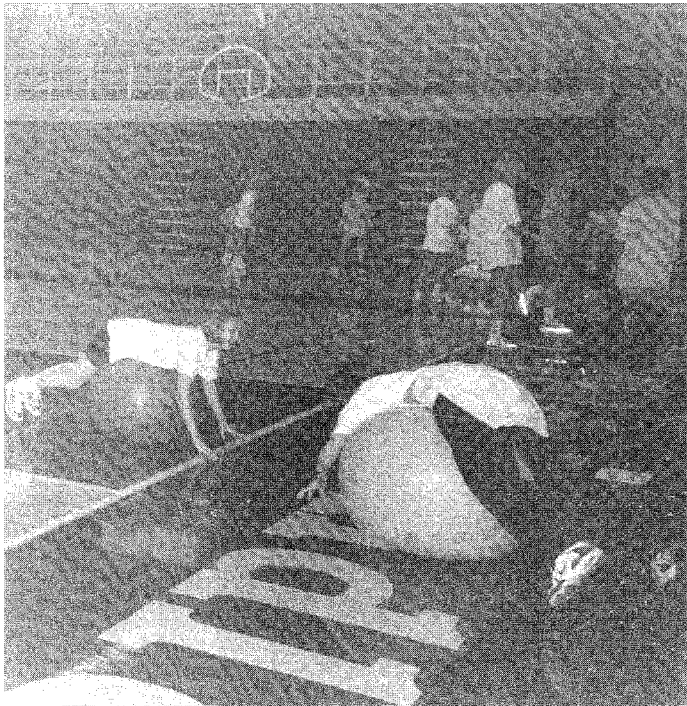

Buffin' **IT** Up

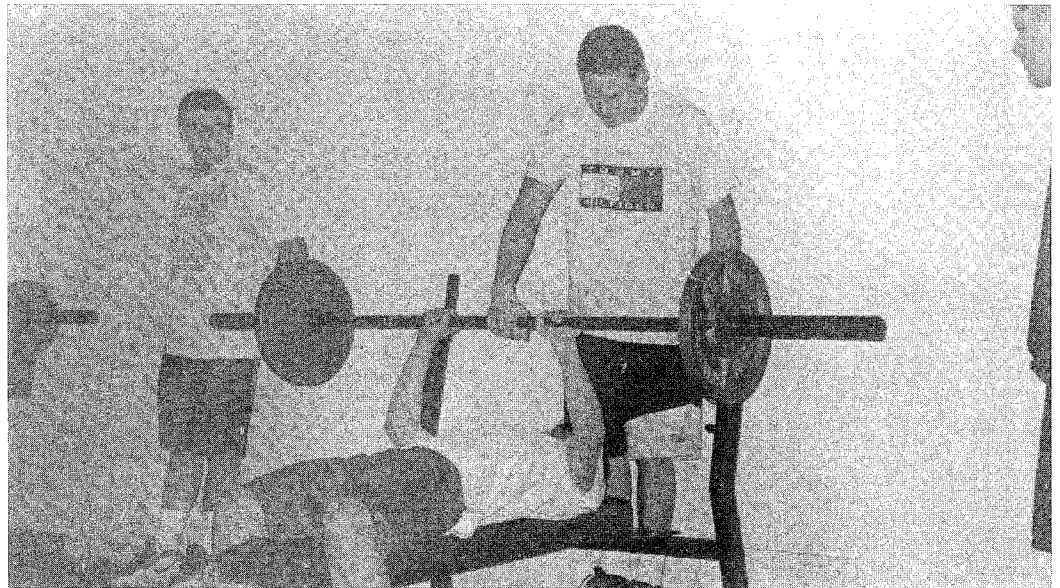
Physical Education is not just a required class to many students. Some take physical education to stay in shape for their sports during the school year. Others take it because they don't play sports and want to keep fit.

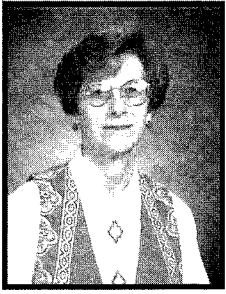
Freshmen Matt Hurlbutt and Dirk Andrews agreed that jogging around the top of the gym was their favorite thing about gym class.

To some, P.E. is just a fun class, but to others they take it because it is a required class.



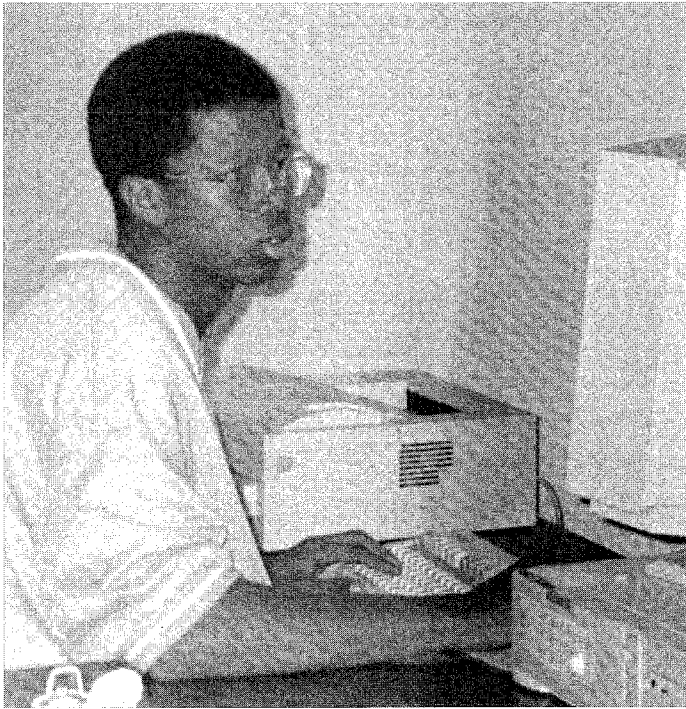

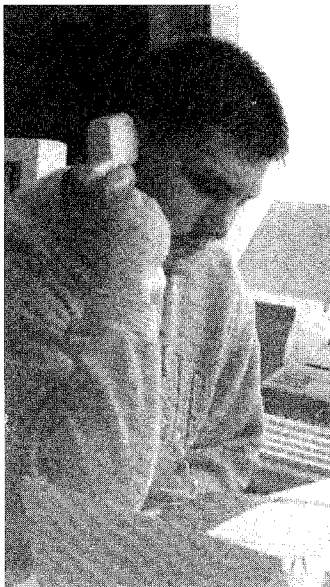

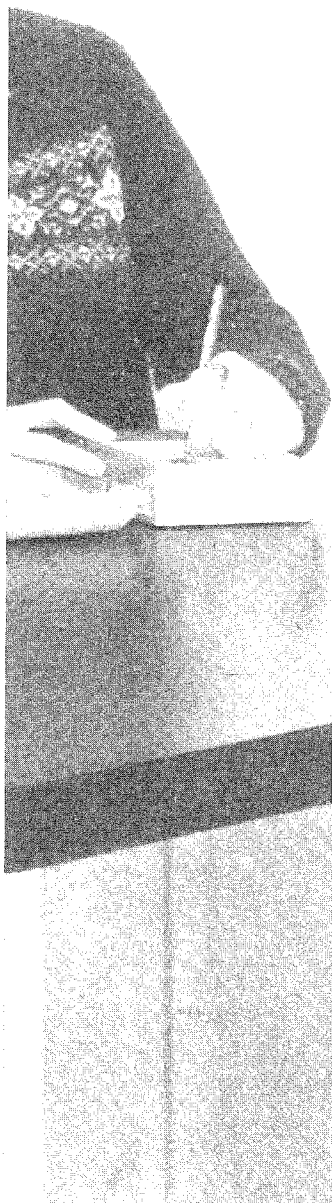

For all of those seniors who plan on entering a professional career after their education, PPCE and OJT serve as a great learning experience for them. The Pre-Professional Career Exploration (PPCE) course involves a minimum class time combined with training at the work site under the supervision of a professional sponsor.

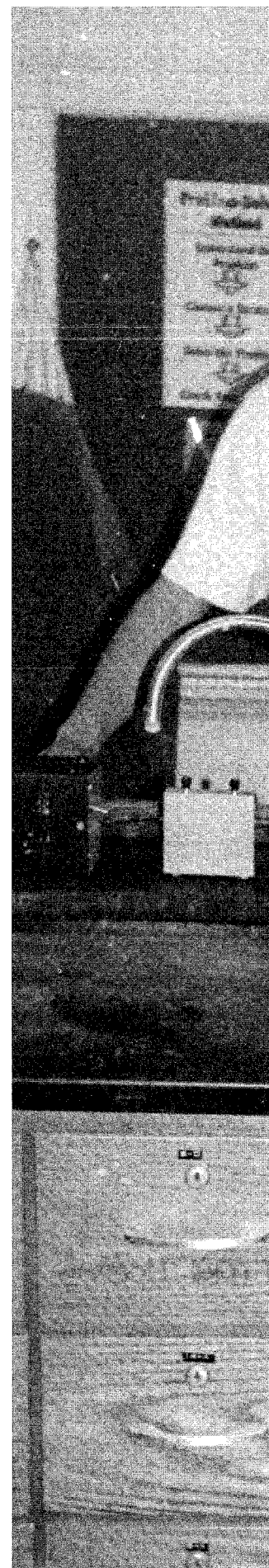
The students have a list of 21 different careers to choose from. Once they have selected their career they begin the course by a one week orientation course that covers college information, job attire, work habits, budget, resume, employment taxes, and work ethics. The objective of PPCE/OJT is to give students the opportunity to explore a profession relatively early in the educational process. Also, PPCE provides insight for decisions regarding future educational plans and occupational goals for the students.

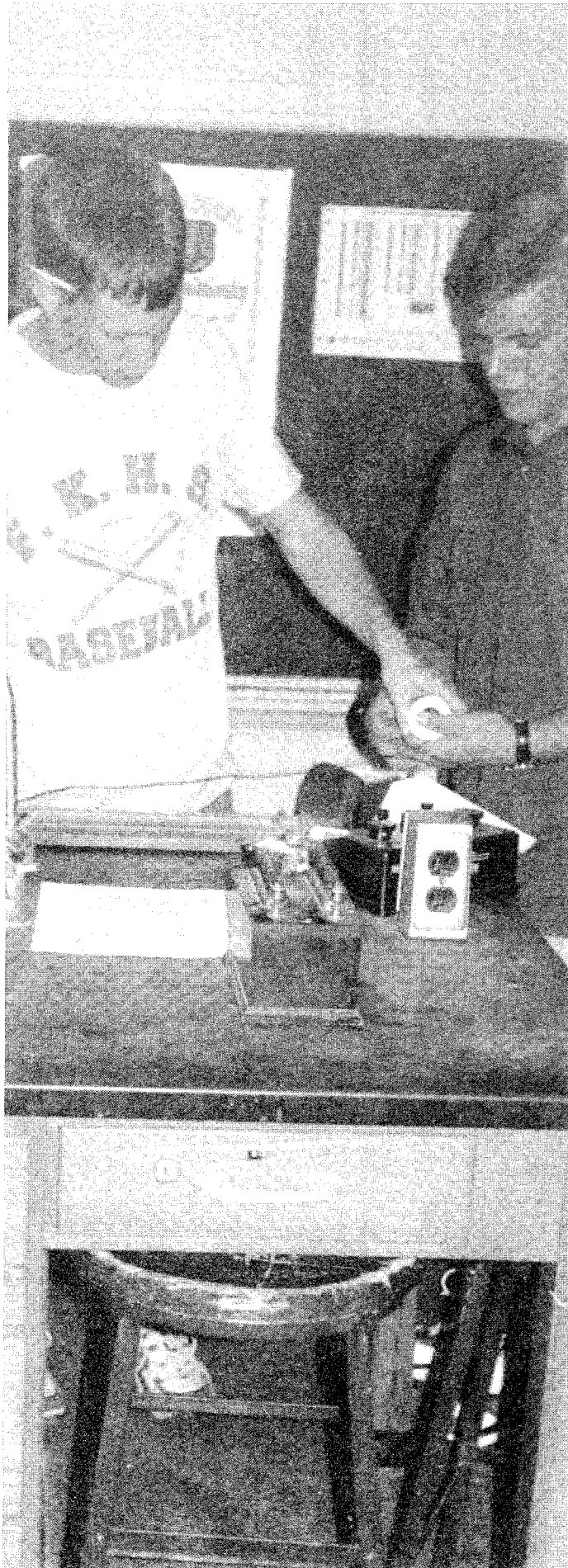
"It's pretty easy because we've already learned it, it's just an extended review," freshman Anastasia Lowrance said.

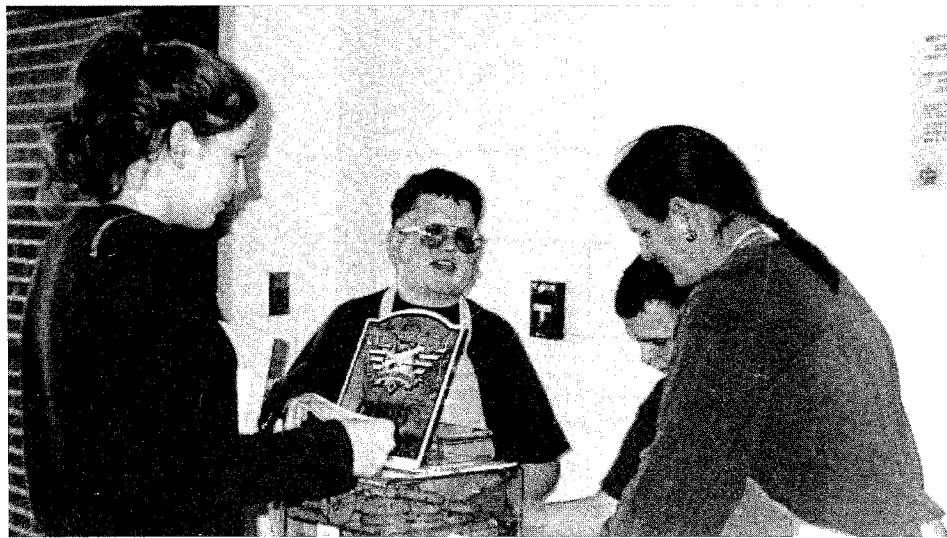


Going **ALL** Out

"Band is really fun but when it comes to practicing there are no fun and games," sophomore Cory Marshall said

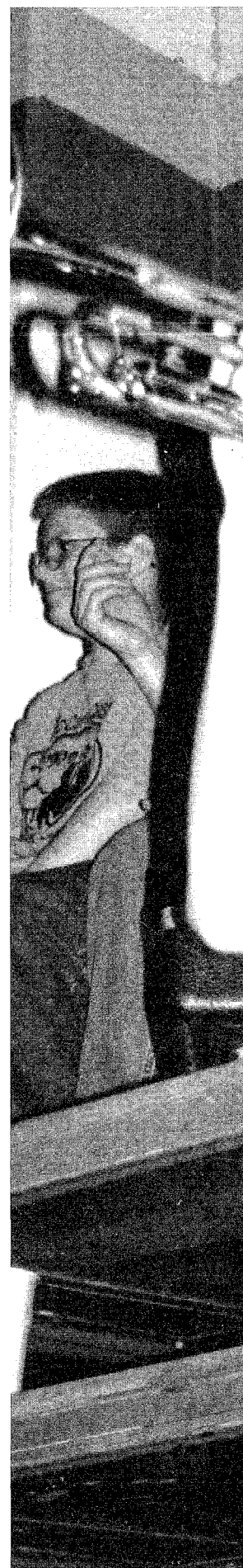

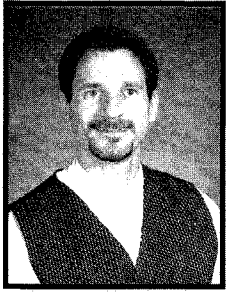

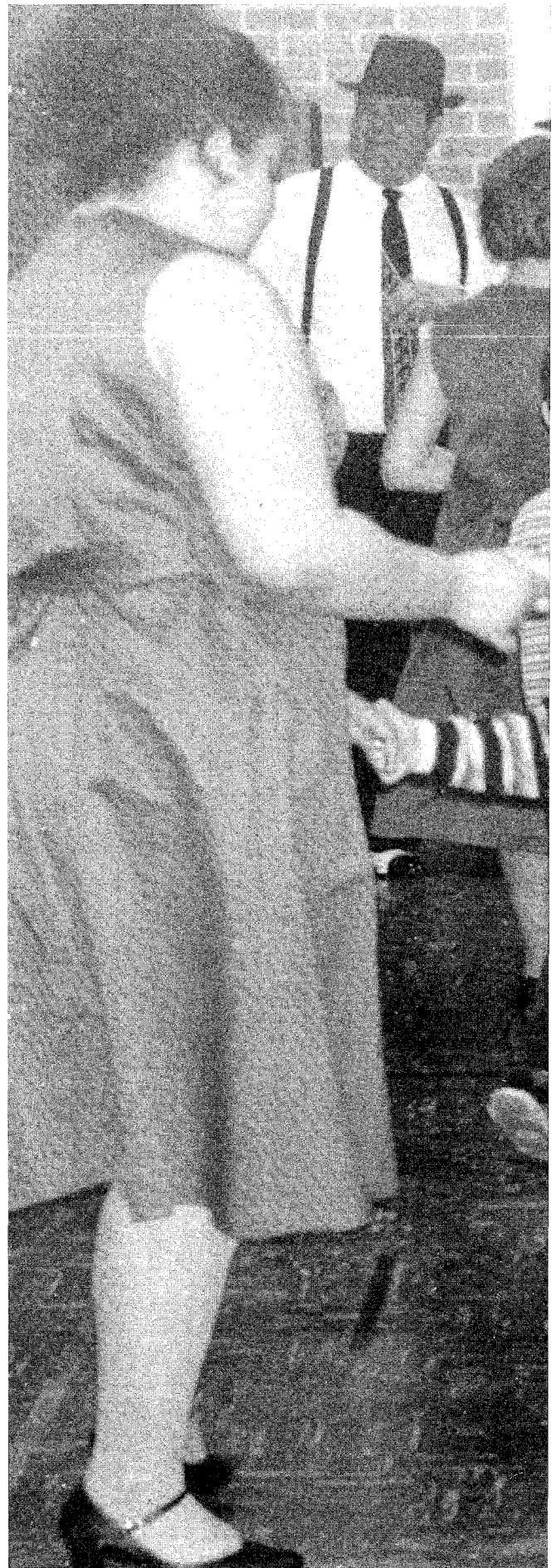

Even the Field Kindley Chorus strutted their stuff this year singing at schools and at concerts.

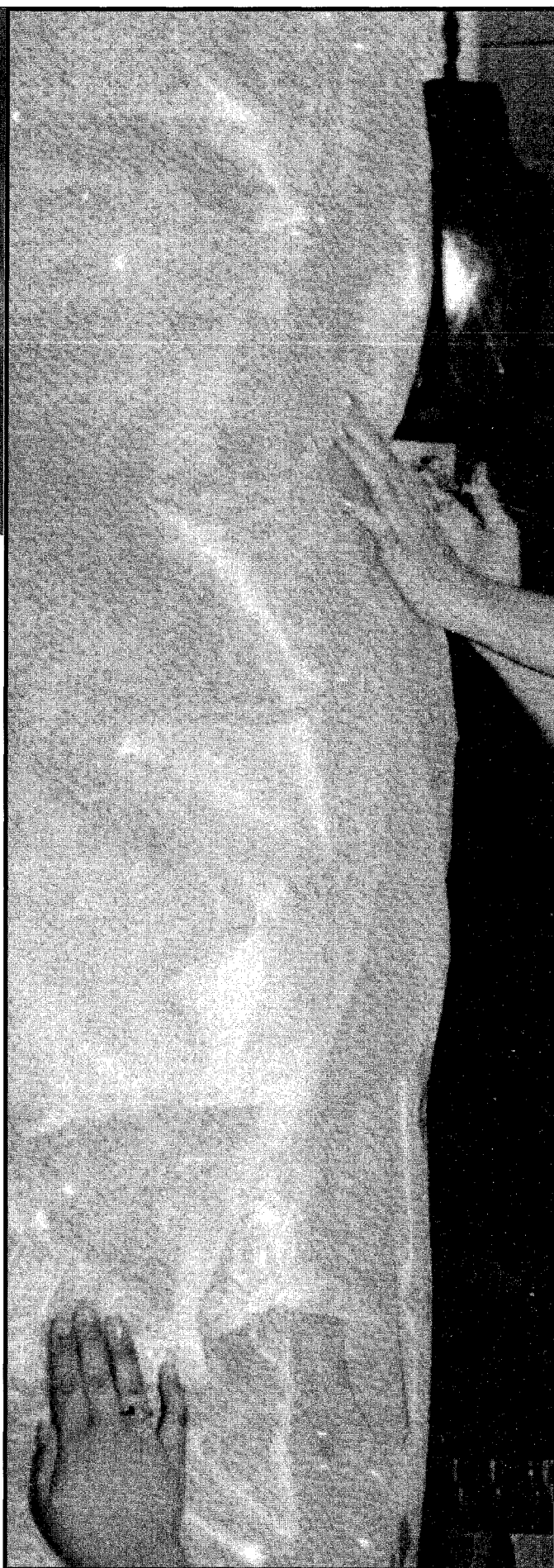

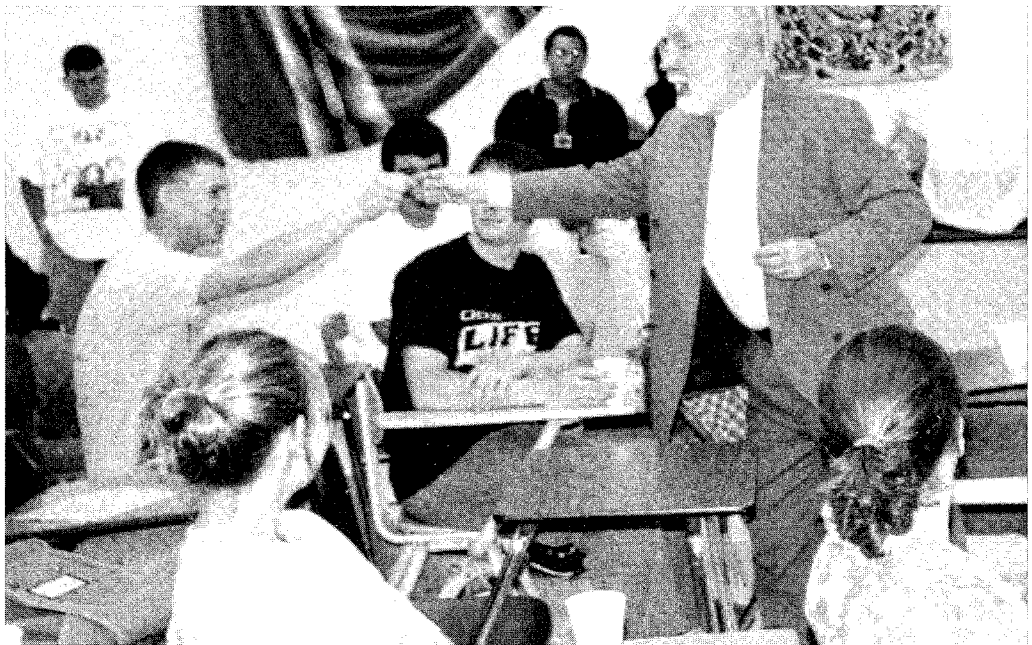
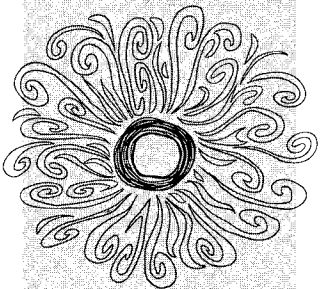
Culture

Learning about foreign cultures is one of the reasons many students join the Spanish and French/German clubs. Club members enjoy guest speakers and foods of the different countries during their meetings.

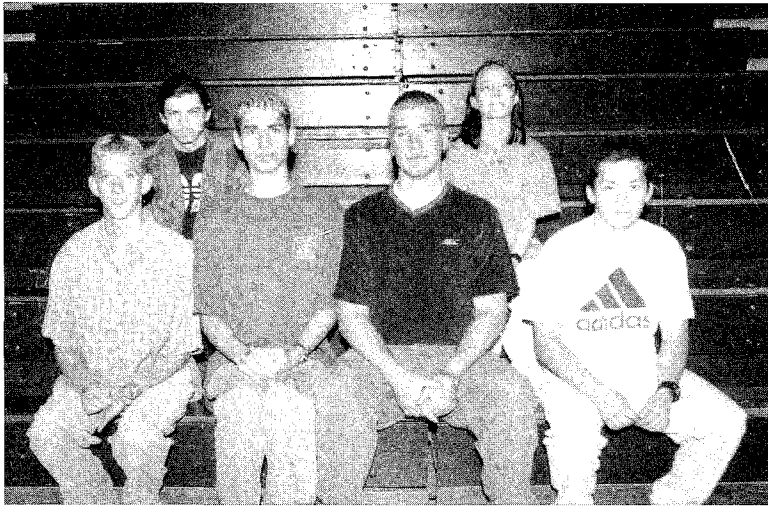
The French/German Club also sponsors the Snowball Dance in December. The highlight of the year for many members is the trip to World of Fun in May.

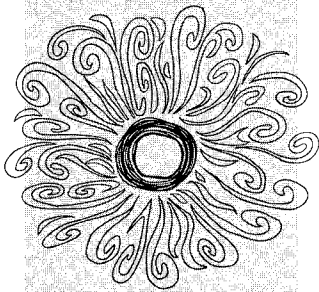
When you look at the organizations in this school, Scholar Bowl and NHS rank at the top. These are both invitation-only clubs.

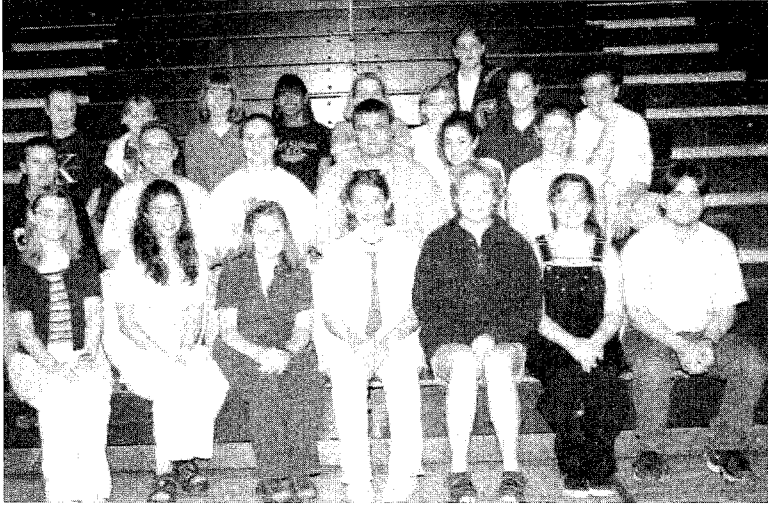
"The best part of the season was moving to 4A because we got to compete against different schools," junior Brian Shephard said.

"NHS is a good experience because it shows how to care for people that can't care for themselves," senior Doc Shobe said.



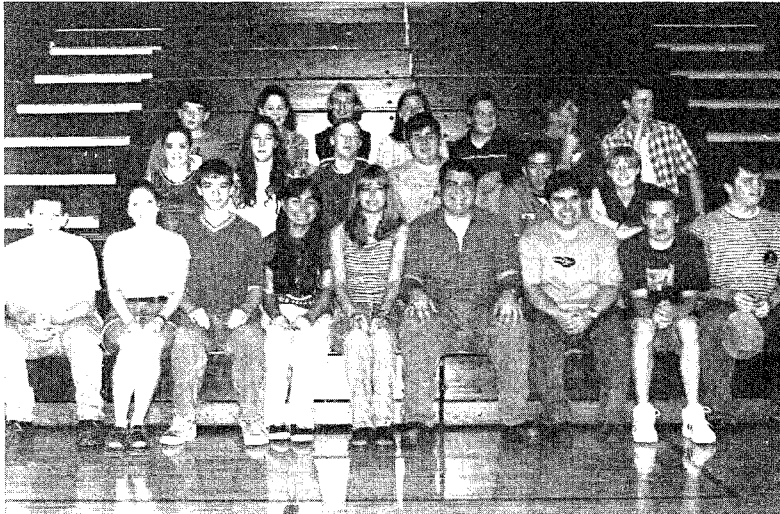

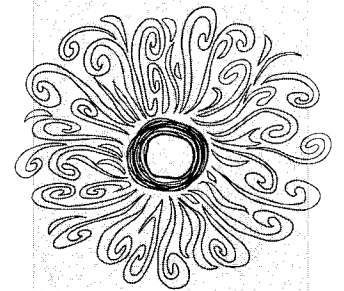
When you think of FFA you might not think of what goes into the projects they take part in. For the kiddie barnyard, which is like a traveling zoo, it takes it to local elementary schools.

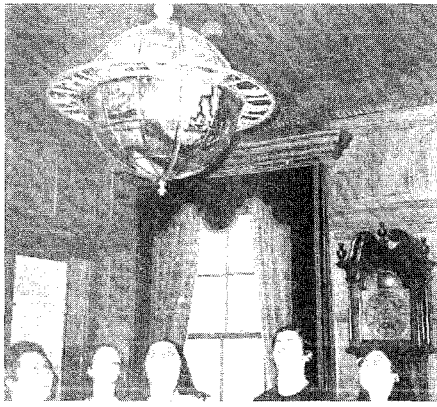
At the end of the year the FFA holds a banquet to recognize hard working members and to elect officers for the next year.

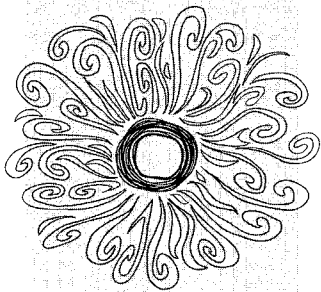

Other events for the club included pizza lunches, trips to museums and a trip to Haskell University in Lawrence.



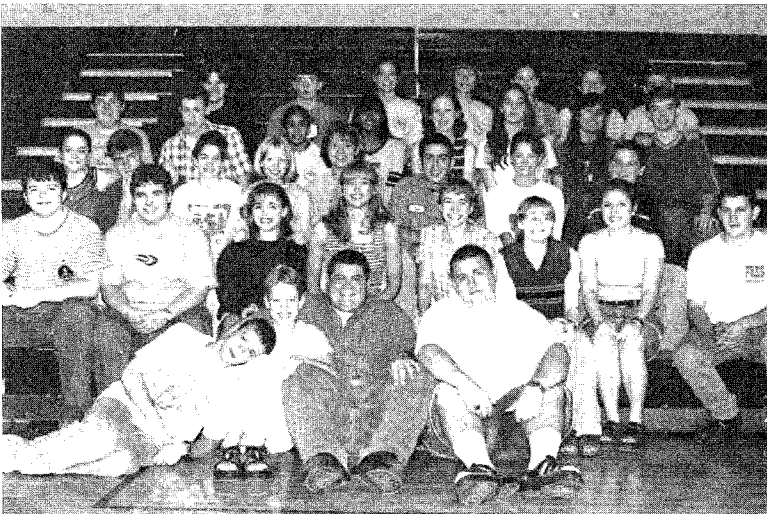

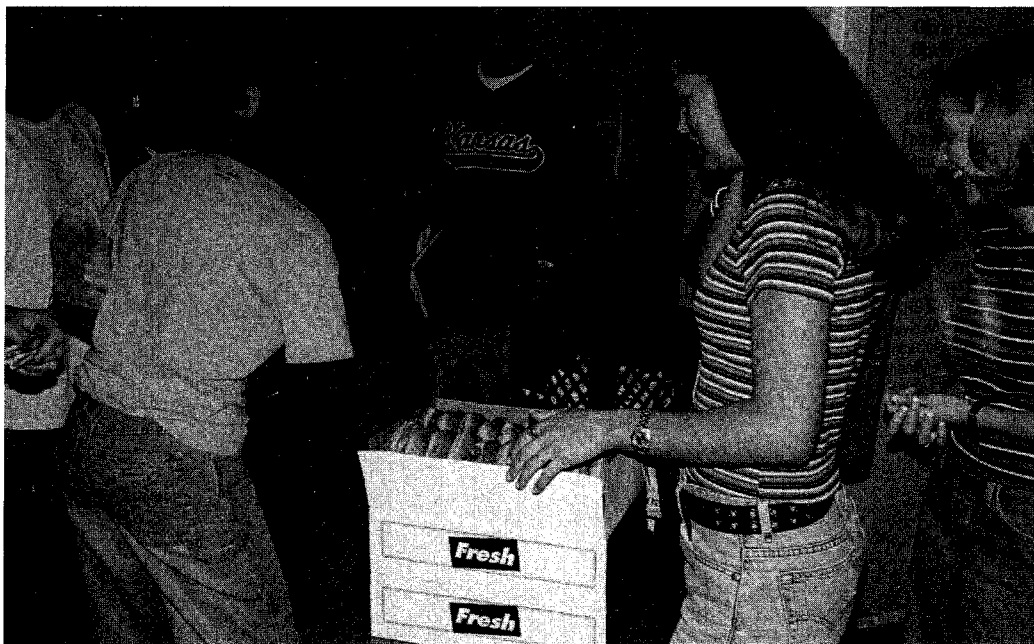
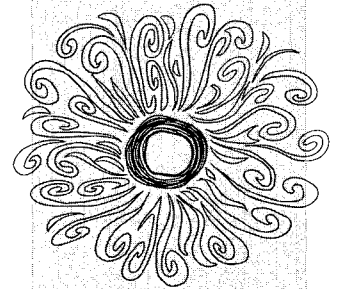
One thing Stuco did last year was sponsor the SADD Club. This year SADD is on its own and doing well.

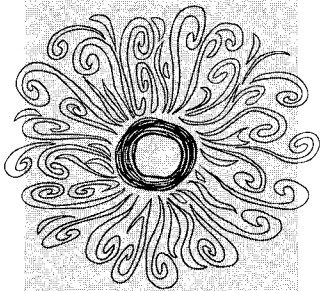

This year the prom committee chose "Save the Last Dance For Me" as the theme for prom. The reason they chose that theme was because this is the last prom of this century.

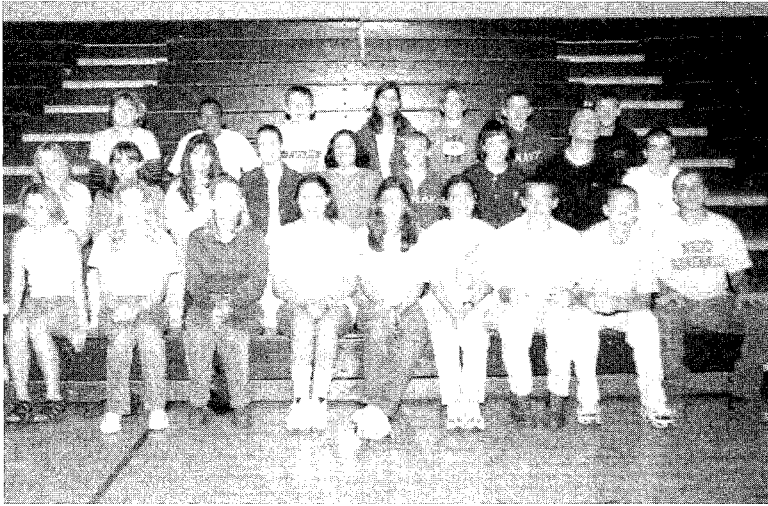
"Our sponsor this year did a lot for us. She really let the members have control and she put in a lot of extra time since she made most of our decorations," junior president Stacy Bell said.

Even before the charter meeting, the newly formed Key Club members were performing community service projects. The club was sponsored by Kim Warren.

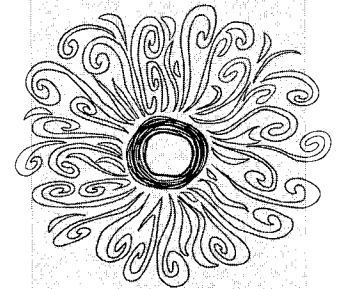

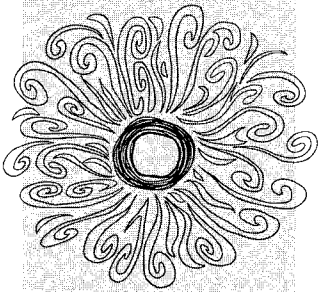

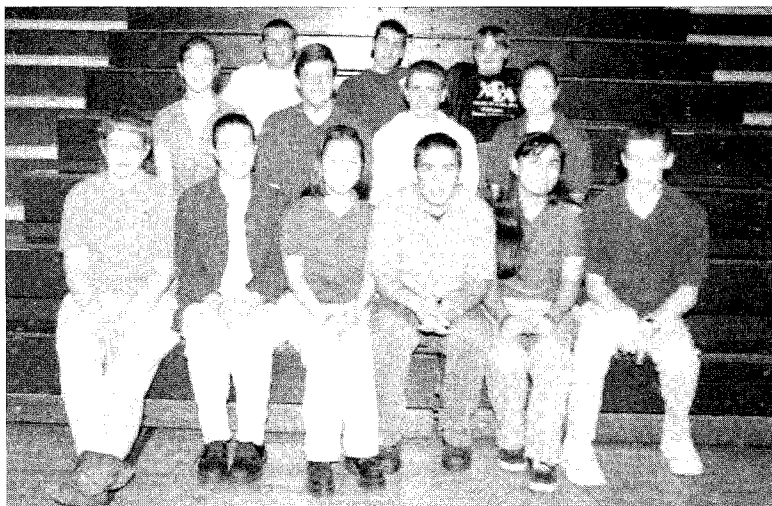
Talented

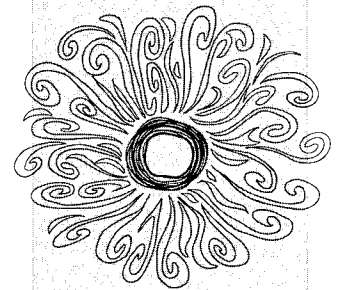
Aside from the morning prayer meetings, the club serves as a place for the students to share their faith and grow closer ever year.

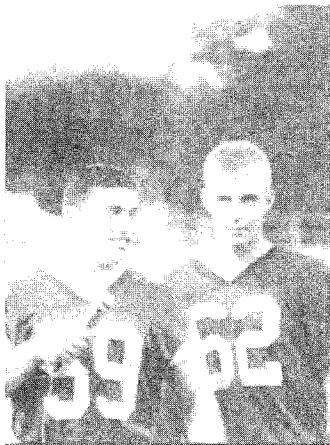
The Golden Tornado football team did better this year than last year. Even though it wasn't a huge improvement, it showed we could actually win.

"I played better this year than last because I made it through the whole season," senior Thomas Dougan said.

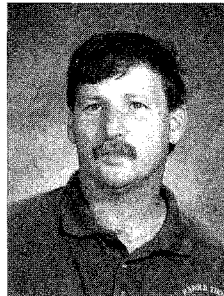
The scoring record this year for the Varsity ended up being 2-7. The record for the freshmen was 3-4.

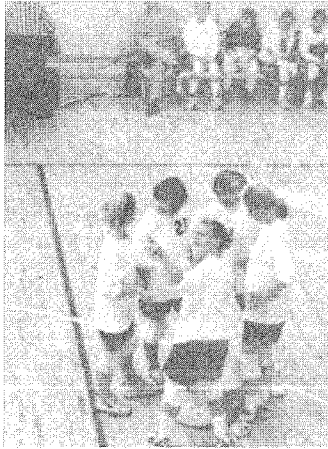

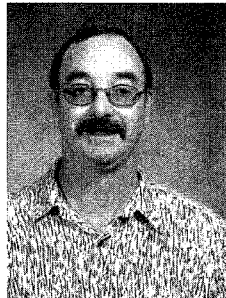

Though their record didn't show it, the volleyball team thought that they put forth a lot of effort and managed to have fun at the same time.

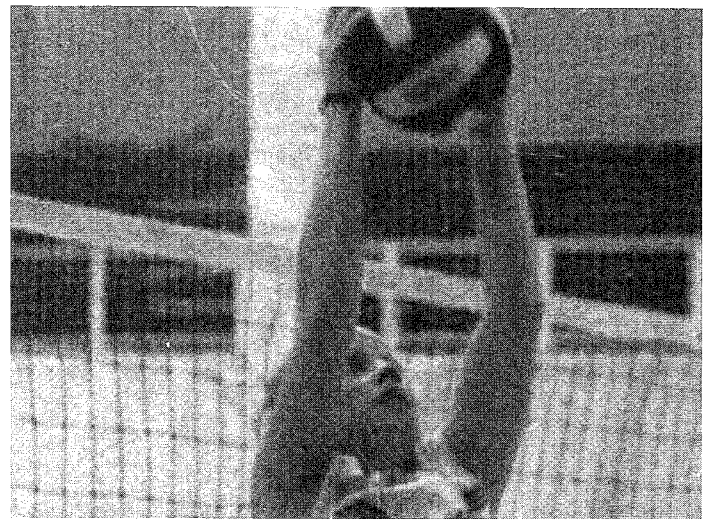

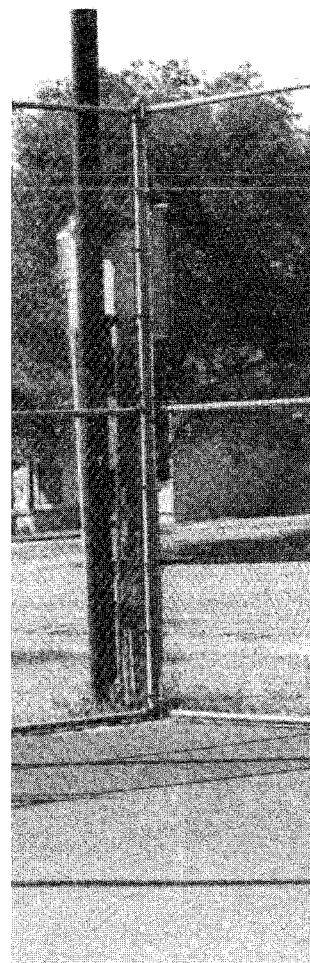

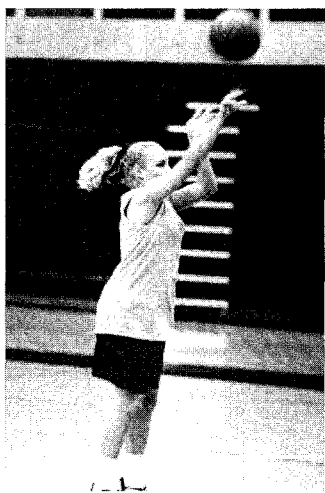

"The season was okay. I didn't really get to play that much, but next year hopefully it will be a good year," freshman Mya Johnson said.

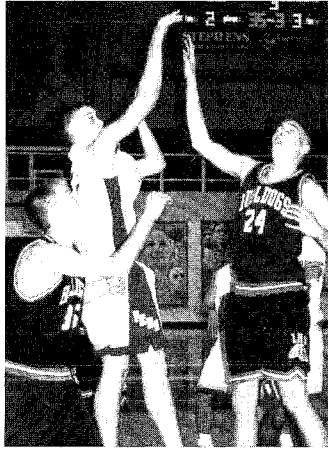
Not only will they be losing their coach, but also are graduating all five of their starting lineup.

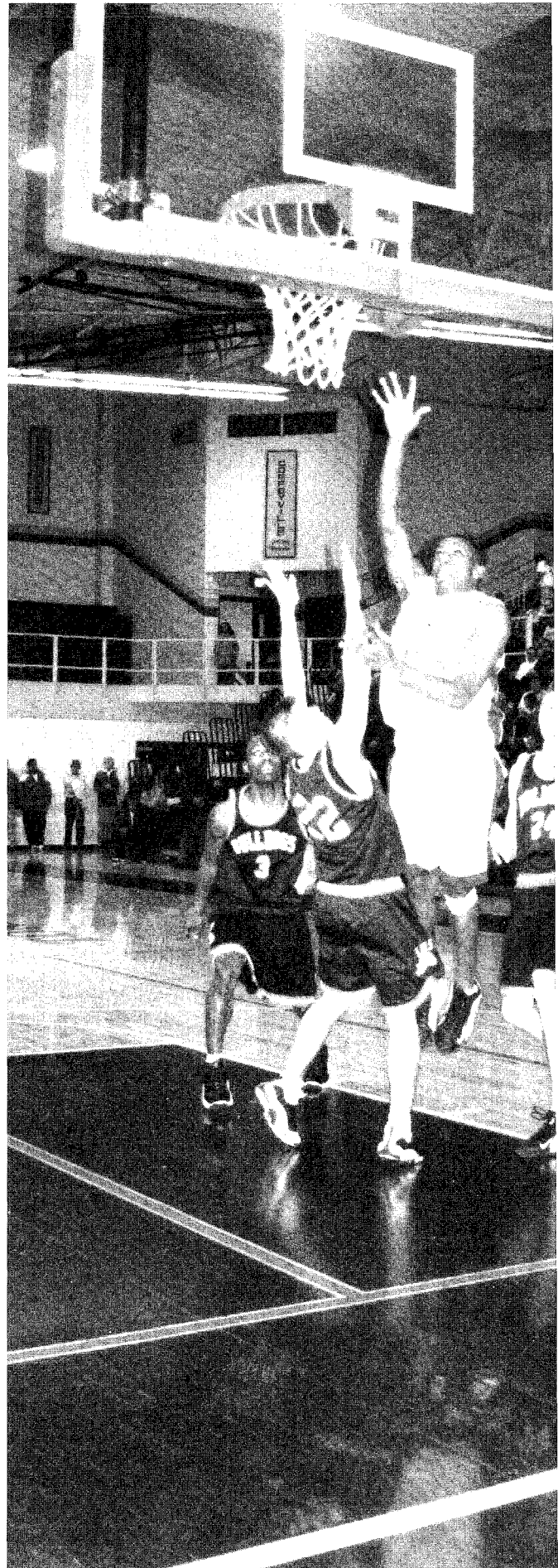


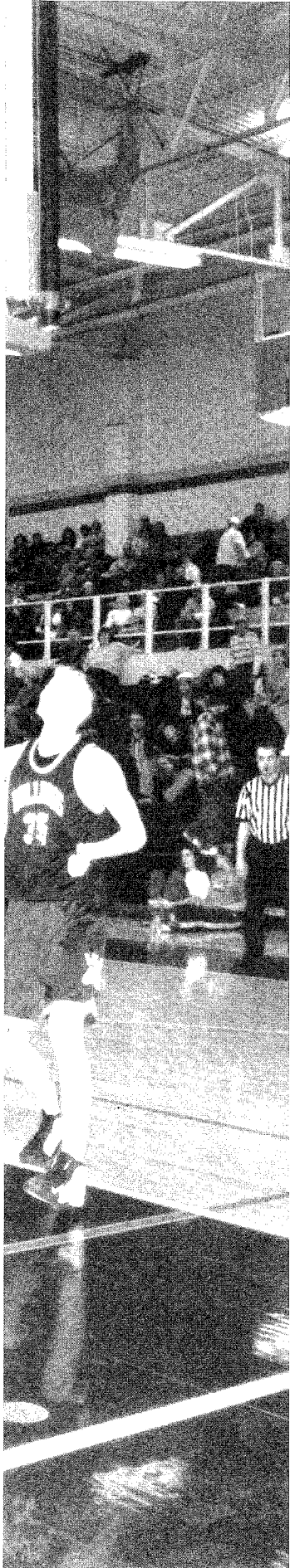

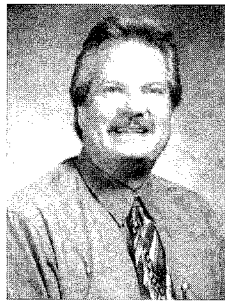

The Nado went into the State tournament as the eighth seeded team, which put them up against the number one seeded team, Colby. The game was close but the 52-63 loss ended their season.

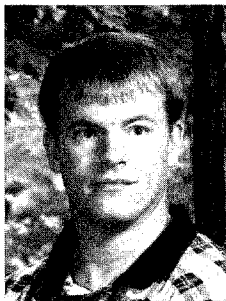

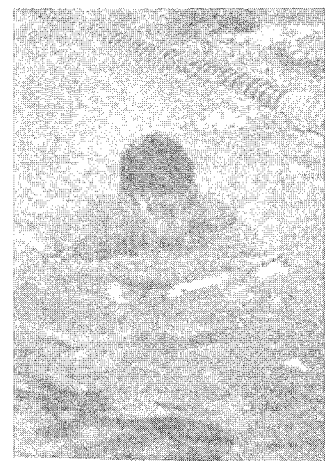
Overall the boys finished 32nd place at state.

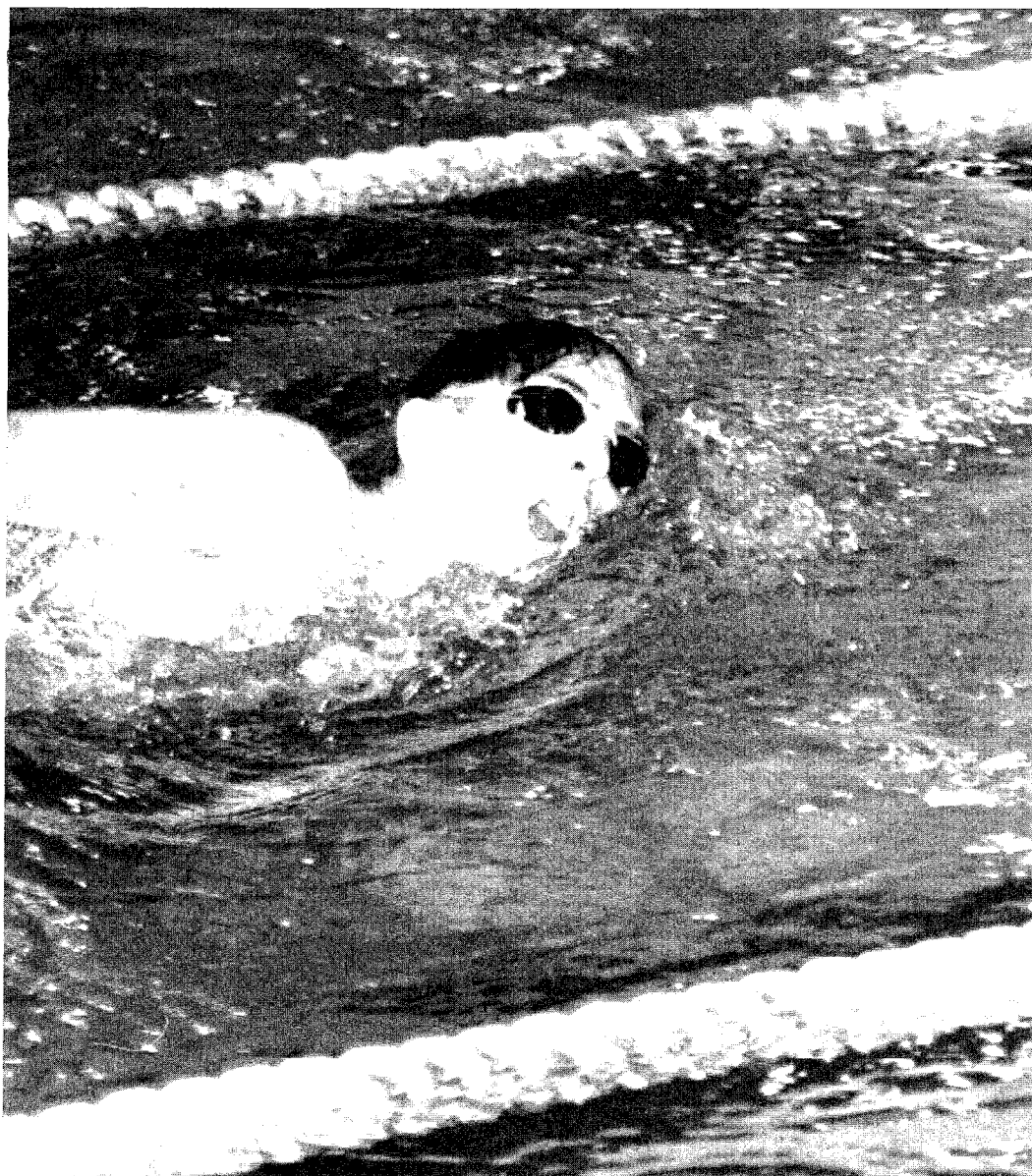

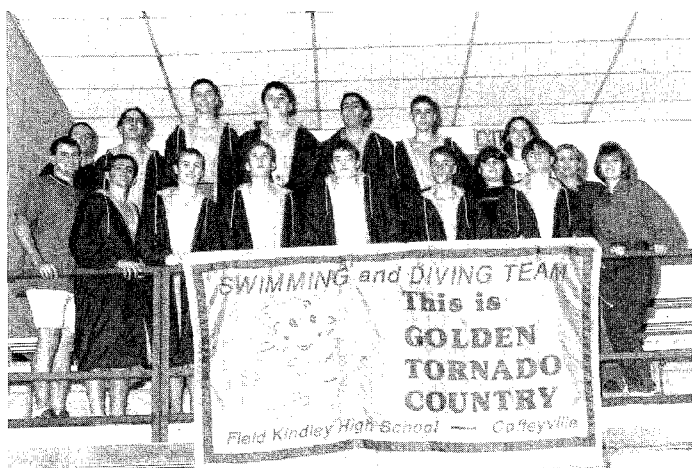

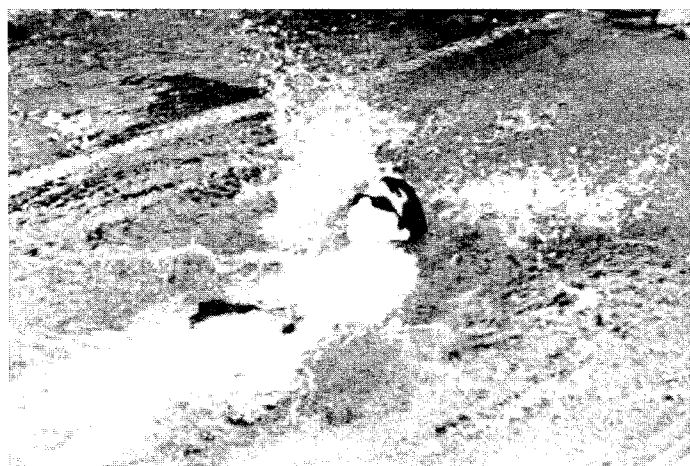

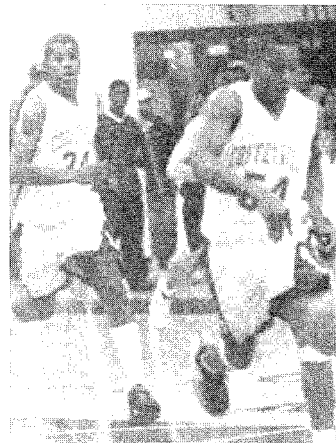

The overall tournament was a good experience for the players, teams, cheerleaders and everyone else involved.

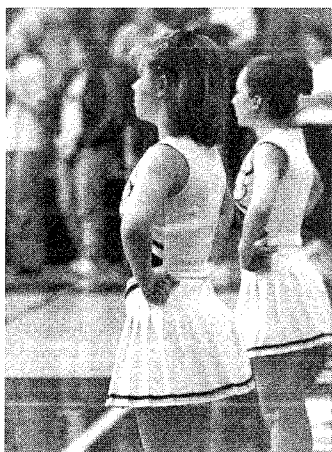

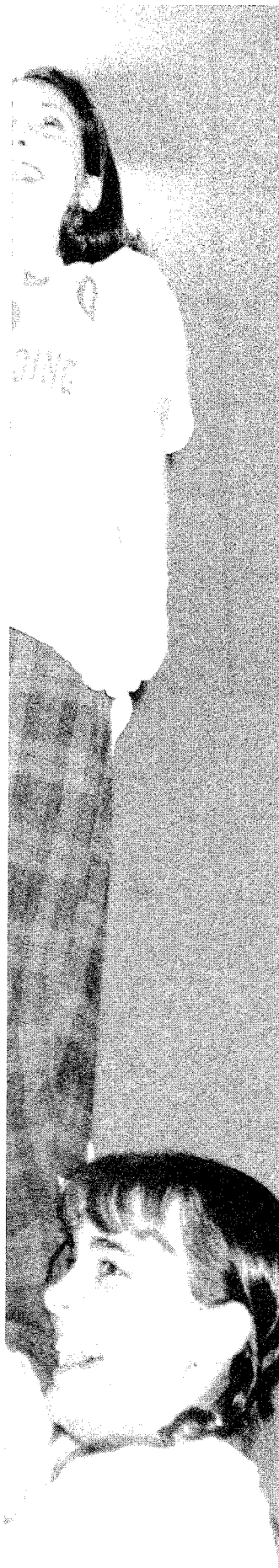

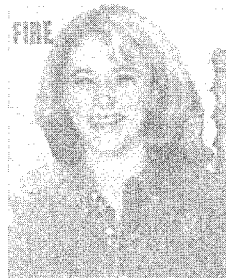

"We had fun doing a lot of stuff for other teams during Interstate and along with our team. We spent lots of time and money doing it," senior Stephanie Segura said.

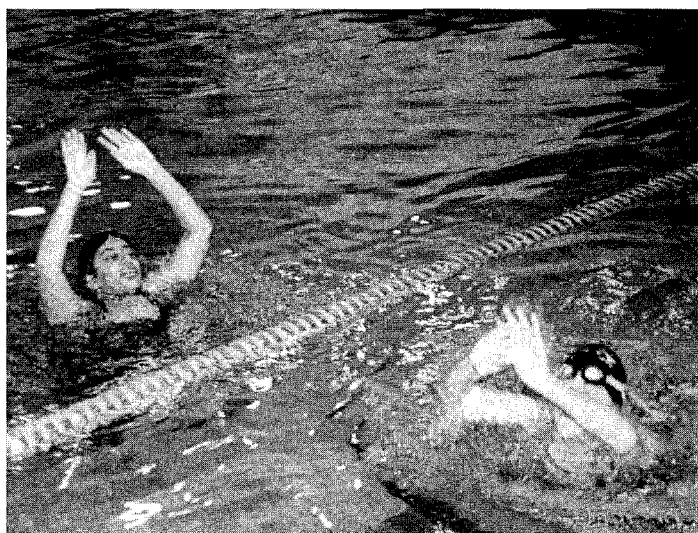

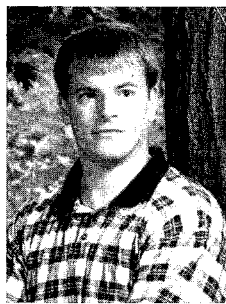

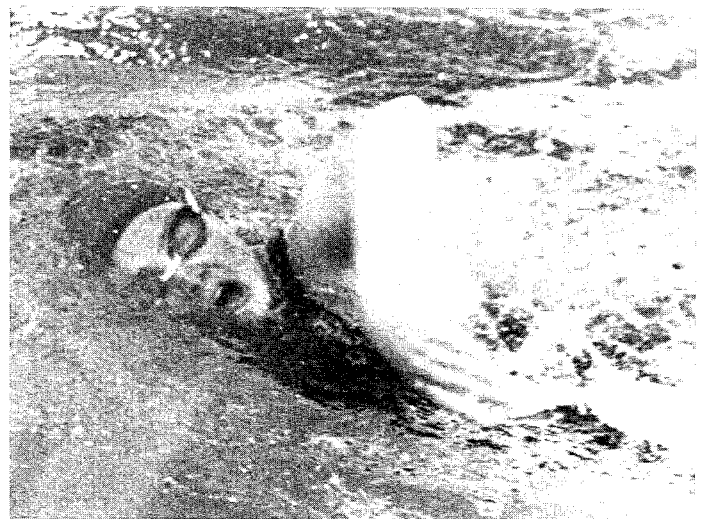
After a successful regular season, six members of the girls swimming and diving team qualified for the state meet in Manhattan.

The team had a 7-10 record which is not as well as they hoped. Every game that they played against Fort Scott they won and they only lost one game against Parsons.

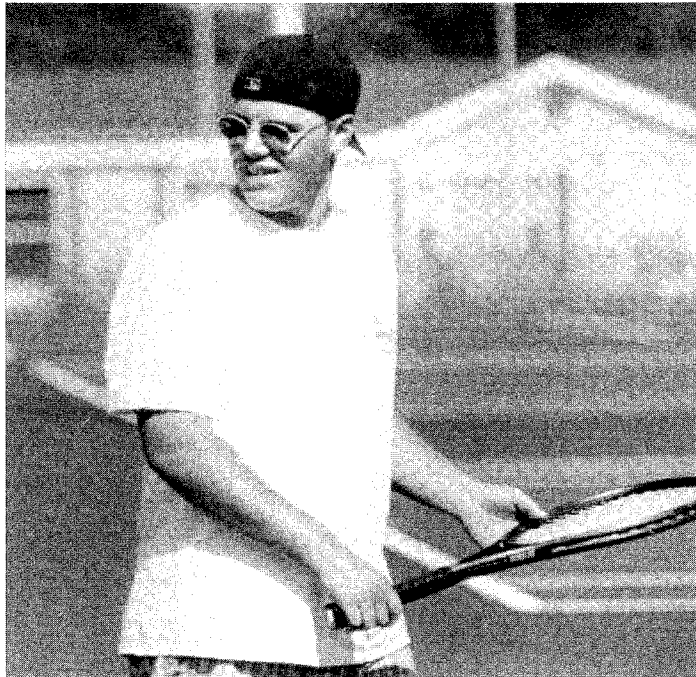

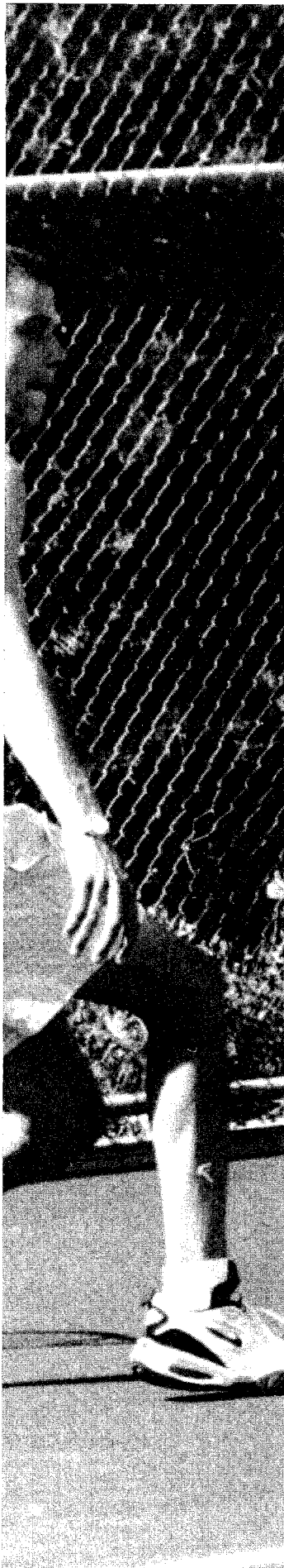

Rainy weather played havoc with the schedule, but the season did come to an end with regionals hosted by El Dorado. No golfers advanced to state.

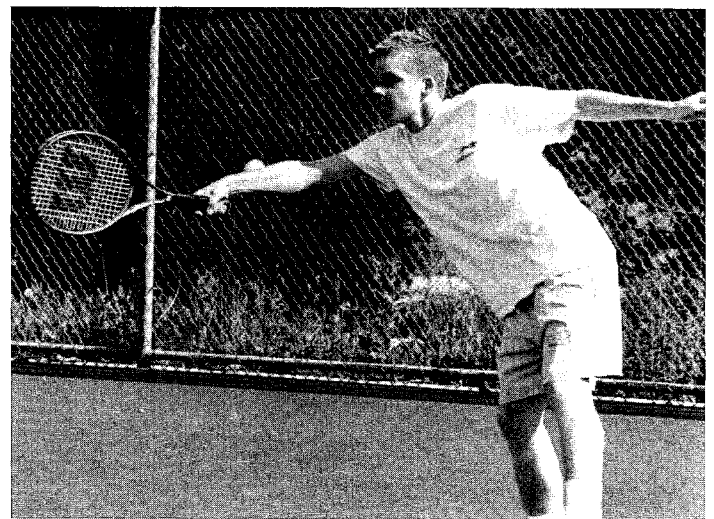

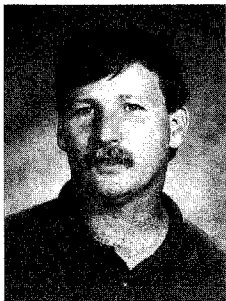

The team was young this year, with only three seniors returning. But they worked as a team, even on the individual events.

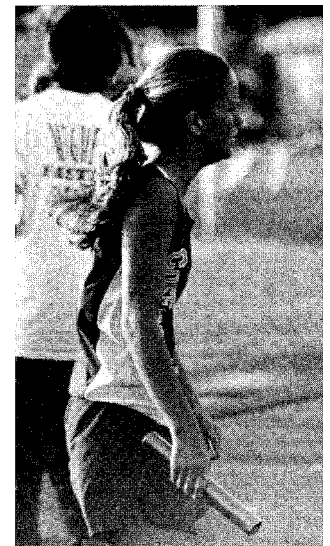
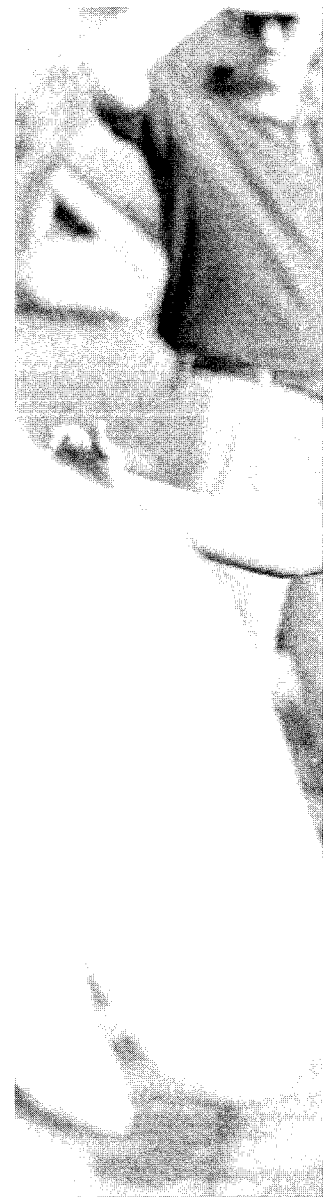

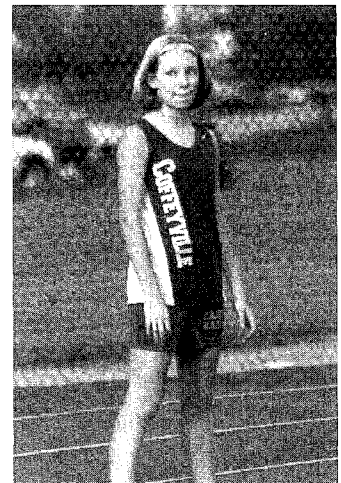

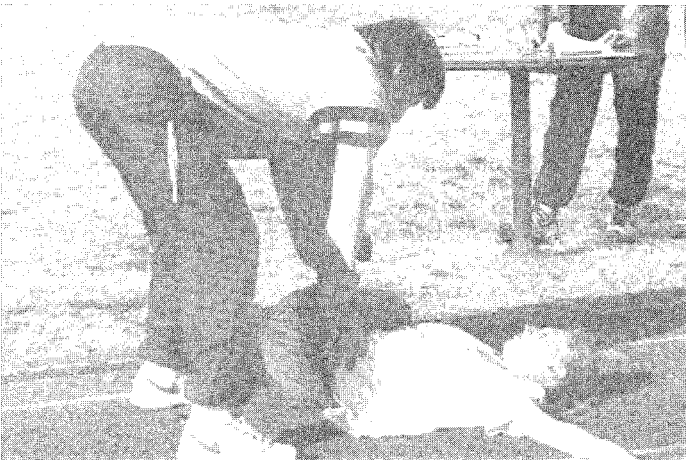

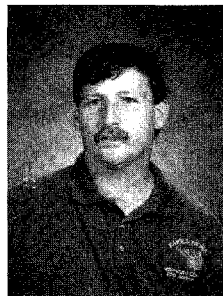

Some of the teams practice for 30 minutes and some practice for three to four hours, depending on the sport.

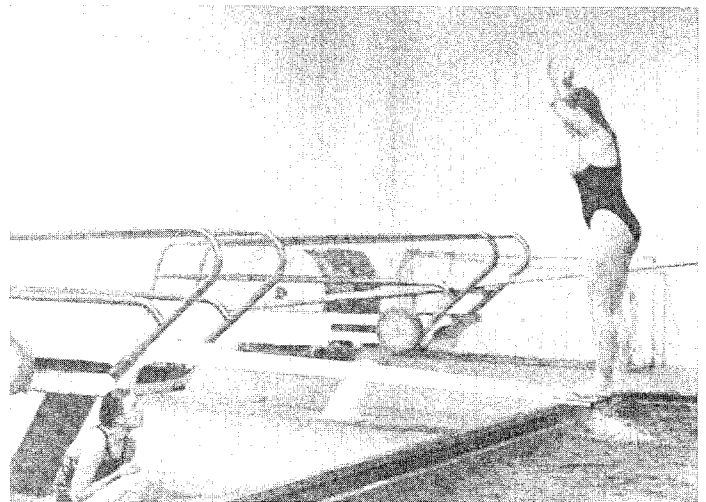
"Cheerleading practice was hard because people didn't show up sometimes so we couldn't get what we wanted done," sophomore Abby Brookover said.

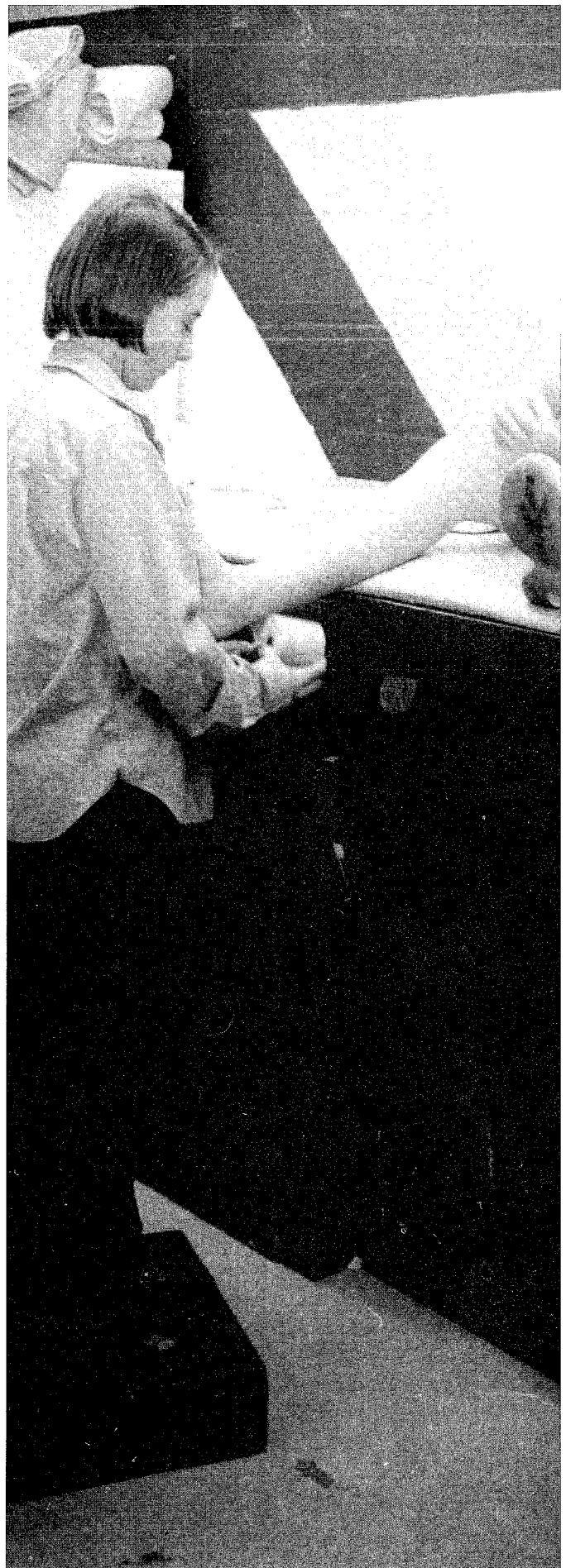

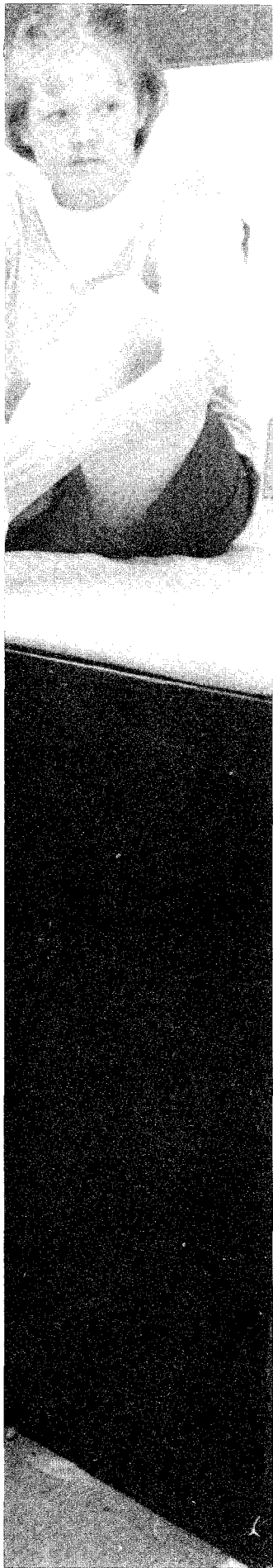

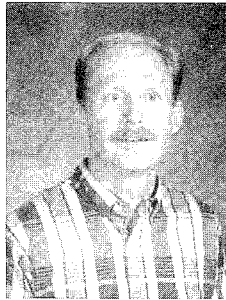

"It was hard making sure that we kept on task, during class. We didn't have someone there to keep reminding us of things, but we made it through," junior Holly Rauch said.

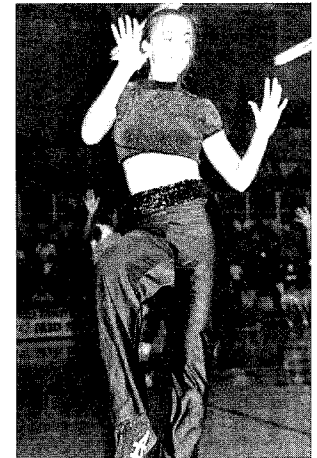

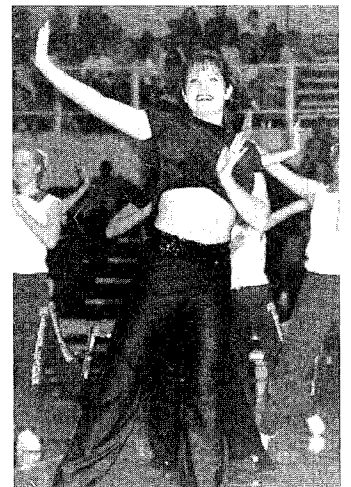

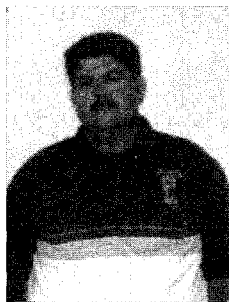

Most teams have a trainer assigned to them and the trainers are expected to be at practices as well as games, both home and away.

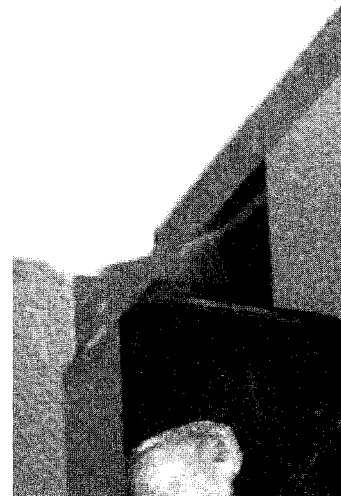
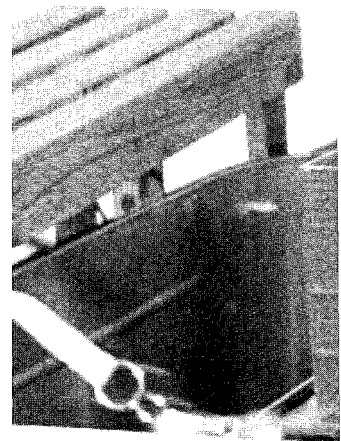

“We didn’t play together most of the year, but we came together at regionals and played well. Hopefully we can play good and place at state,” sophomore Craig Males said.

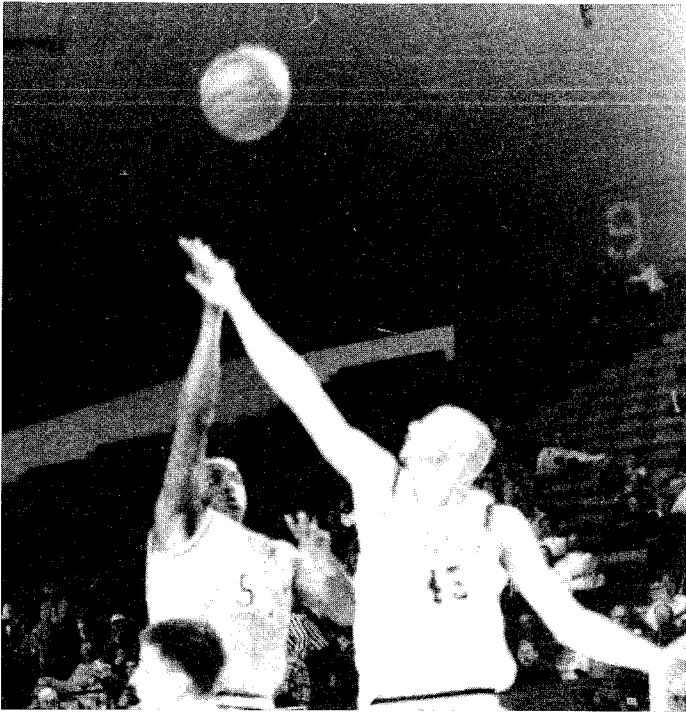
“It feels excellent to come back from last year. We have a good chance at placing with the Yellow Boys leading the way. It’s simply crazy,” Scott Tatman said.

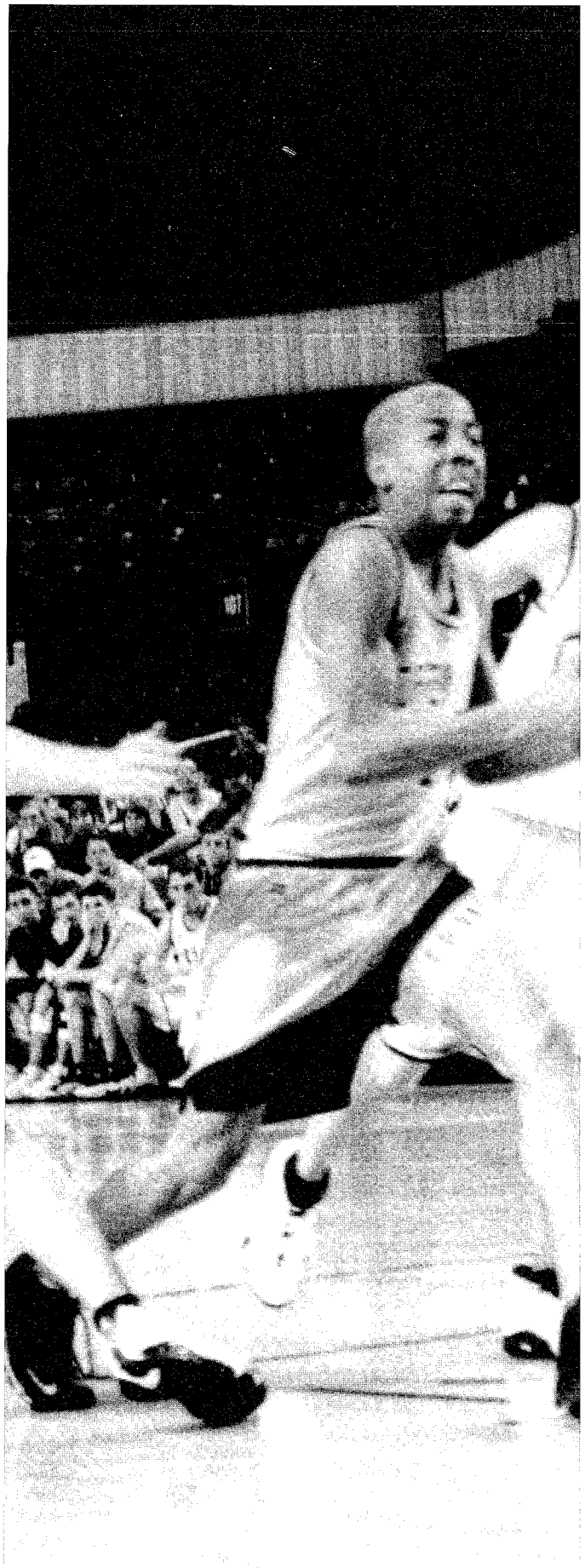

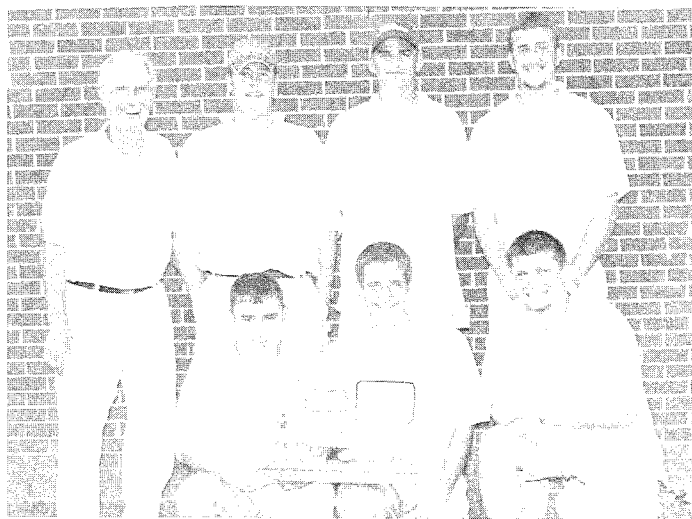
Competing at the state level is often what many athletes work all season to accomplish and many achieve this high honor. This year 21 individual athletes plus two teams qualified for state.
