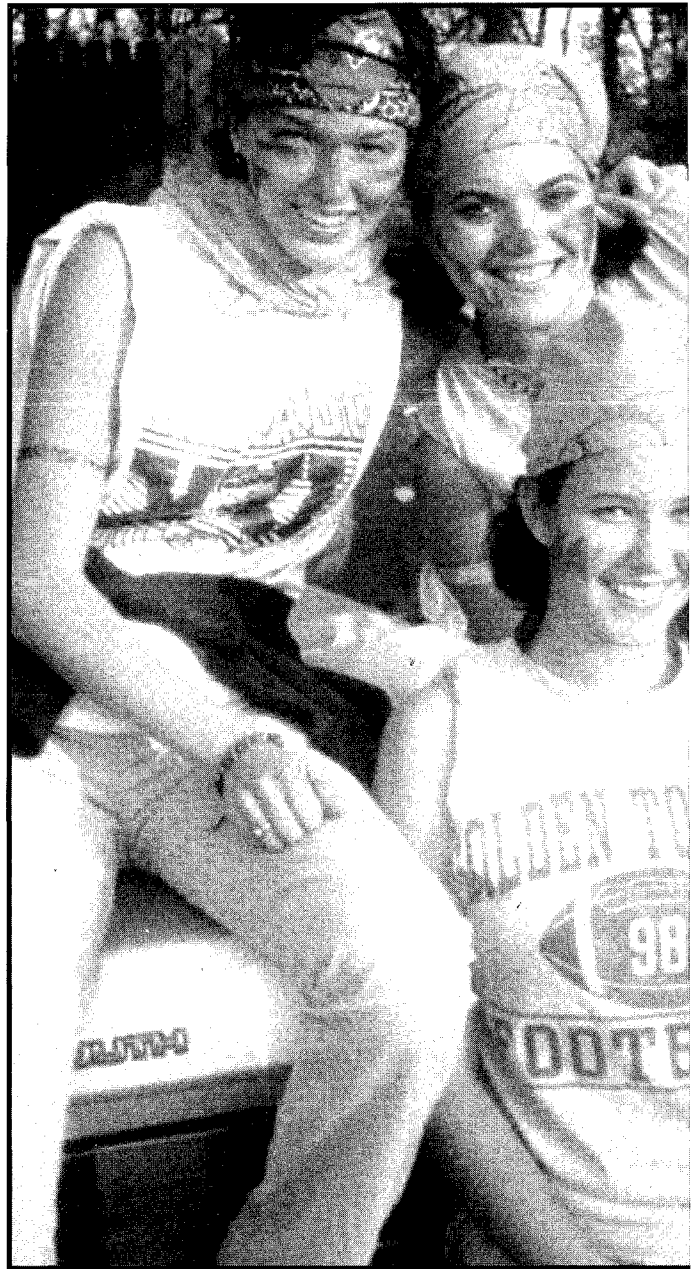

The play began as dull as my grandmother's thimble collection, as most plays do for me, but I was rolling on the floor when the younger Sycamore daughter, Essie Carmichael (sophomore Jenny Hutchins), came twirling in like she was Disney on Ice across the stage. Not only then, but through the entire play her character keeps this up, never stopping or falling through all the scenes. It seems that next to her man Ed (freshman Josh Shald), whom she married after only knowing a day, her basic life-long goal is dancing in the living room and making candy. The Kirbys believe that hard work with a practical job builds character and is life.

The Sycamore's belief

was that life should be spent full of surprises and in fun, not tied behind a desk. Grandfather, Martin Vanderhof (senior Kyle Morris), had never paid taxes since they began in 1914, and stopped working after stepping onto an elevator to go to his job, turned around, stepped out, went home and did whatever he felt like for the rest of his life.

Mrs. Sycamore's (senior Sarah Thomas) job began when an old typewriter was accidentally sent to their home, and she had been typing unsuccessful plays ever since. This is where the drunk, Gayle Wellington (junior Abby Brookover), came in to be a star for Mrs. Sycamore's play. Wellington doesn't say much, but does stumble around a lot, pass out and hit on the butler, Donald (junior Jeremy Wood).

Definitely a plus for the cast was that I never once noticed if they messed up through the entire play. Their hard work over the past two months really showed, and they all really came through after all the bad things that go with the good.

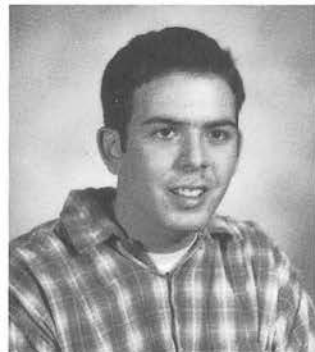
Lowrance had sprained her ankle in the dark on the second night of dress re-

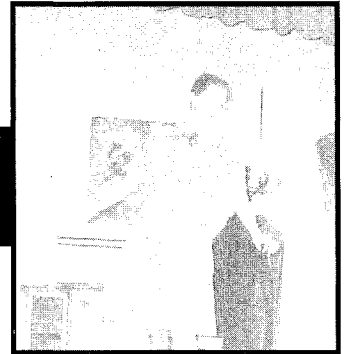

If the closing night of *Once Upon a Mattress* was any indication, the musical presented by FKHS students this year was a major success. The humorous retelling of a classic fable was given on three consecutive nights, Feb. 10-12.

I set out to review the musical with no idea what to expect, but stuck between a basketball player, a cheerleader and two teachers I knew something interesting would happen. Armed with only my CD player and Nirvana CD, a harmonica and my rosary, I watched.

Plot

In a generic kingdom sometime in the 15th century, a young prince named Dauntless the Drab (junior Donnie Hoggatt) awaits the arrival of the perfect princess for him to marry. Meanwhile, his mother Queen Aggravarian (senior Rachel Wiggins) works to ensure that her son remains a bachelor indefinitely by sabotaging each prospective princess with a test to determine whether or not she is good enough. With the coming of Princess Winnifred (senior Holly Rauch), Dauntless is excited that he may soon wed, but his mother is already plotting to get rid of the

quirky Winnifred.

Eventually, the Queen comes up with a trial for Winnifred. Her test is one of sensitivity. She must sleep atop 20 mattresses stacked on top of a pea. The rationale being that a true princess would not be able to sleep because of her "royal sensitivity."

In the end, Princess Winnifred does not sleep and is allowed to marry Prince Dauntless. This, however, is inconsequential as she only passed the test with help from others, who were helping her cheat. Therefore, there really is no heart-warming moral.

Performances

As the rosy-cheeked, dimwitted Prince Dauntless, Hoggatt gave a very good performance. Both he and junior Craig Powell (the minstrel) pulled off their parts without a hitch.

Even though the jester (freshman Josh Shald) didn't jest or even smile, this character was presented extremely well and Shald deserves a lot of accolades for his work. Another notable player was senior Steven Gillham, who was cast in the role of the Wizard. The part was done correctly and everything, but as the Queen's

henchman, Gillham was neither creepy nor evil enough. Also, did I see him snort magic dust?

The musical's "b-story" was apparently supposed to be the relationship between Lady Larkin and Sir Harry (junior Joseph Bobek). While Oyler and Bobek's performances were good, their lack of chemistry showed and thus their little part of the plot was boring. Even though it did give us another chance to hear Oyler's beautiful folk singing voice, I don't think all that singing and dancing was really conducive to good prenatal care.

Presenting a surprisingly well-rounded performance, Rauch breathed new life into the character of Princess Winnifred. While not as stellar as Oyler, Rauch's voice proved to the crowd that she is not just a good dancer, but a fine singer as well.

Rounding out the cast, senior Kyle Morris (King Sextimus) and Wiggins (the Queen) represented the royalty of this little generic kingdom. At first, Morris's antics were merely amusing but as the musical continued, his ill-fated pursuit of Emily (senior Shawna Payden)

was actually laughable. The anti-chemistry between the two royals was presented well, and both did a very good job of playing off the other's dispositions. Wiggins was the embodiment of the Queen, as she came across with an air of royalty in everything she did and played the part of the beautiful, demanding monarch just as well.

When the musical was over and the crowd began to disperse, I leaves dropped on several conversations to see who was the crowd's favorite performer. It was clear from what I heard that Shald and Morris had stolen the show. Shald seemed to give something of himself onstage, and the crowd really appreciated it. Morris was just really funny.

For my money (although I got in free), the highlight of the entire musical was the performance of Rachel Wiggins as Queen Aggravarian, and the best moment was the improvised ending after King Sextimus regains his lost speech.

I really enjoyed the musical. It was truly one of the only things I have witnessed in the past four years that makes me proud to go to school at FKHS.

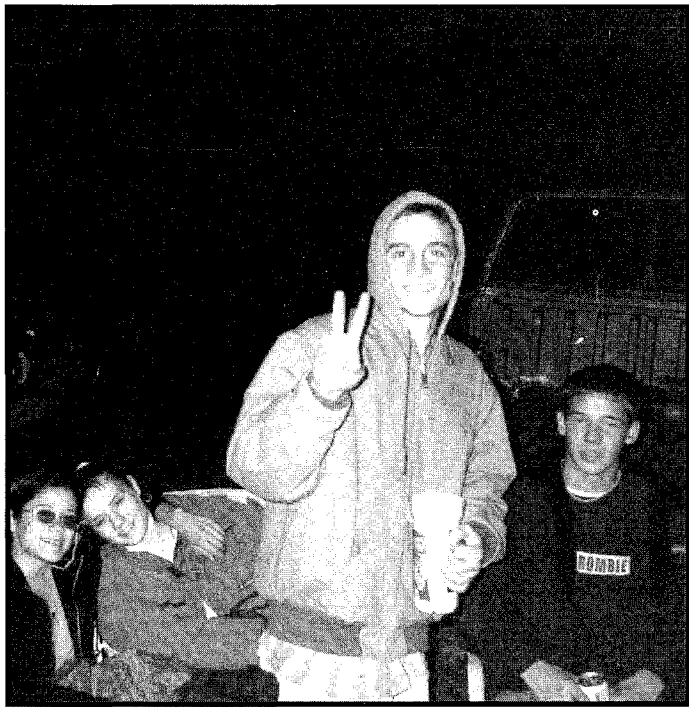
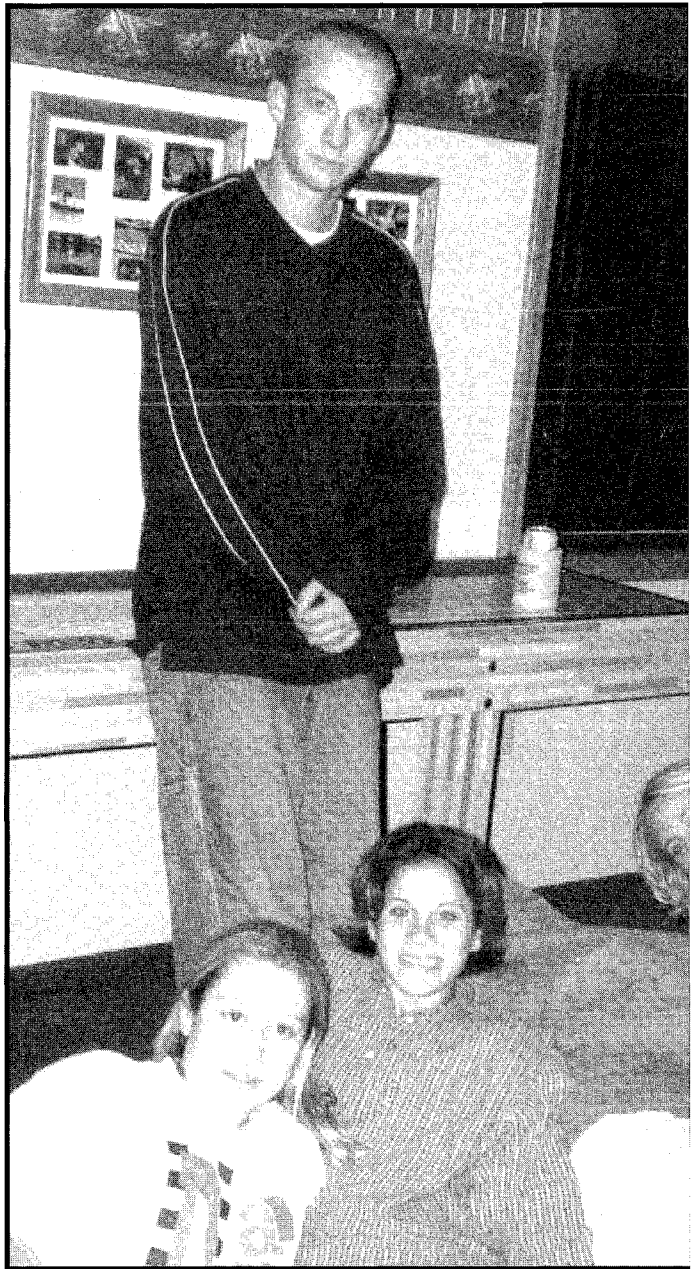

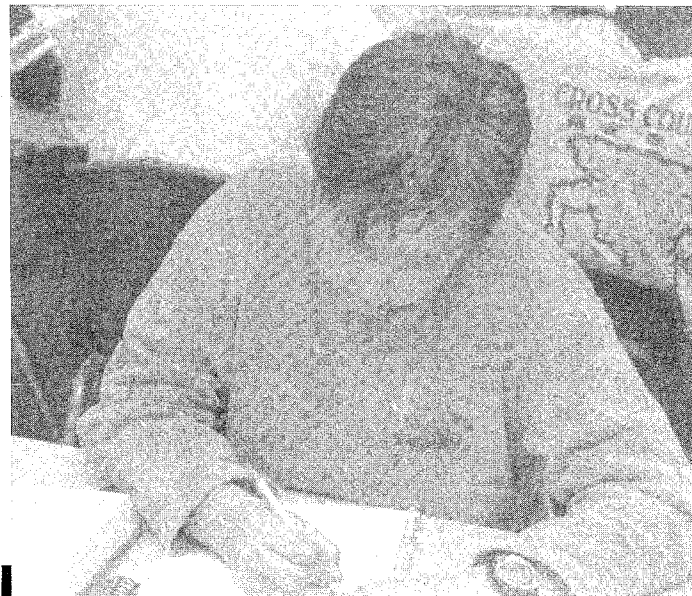

Due to cutbacks in oil shipments by the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC), gas prices rise to historic levels. In late February and early March, prices

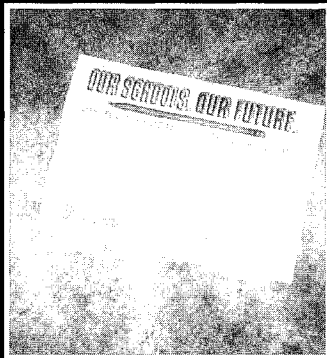

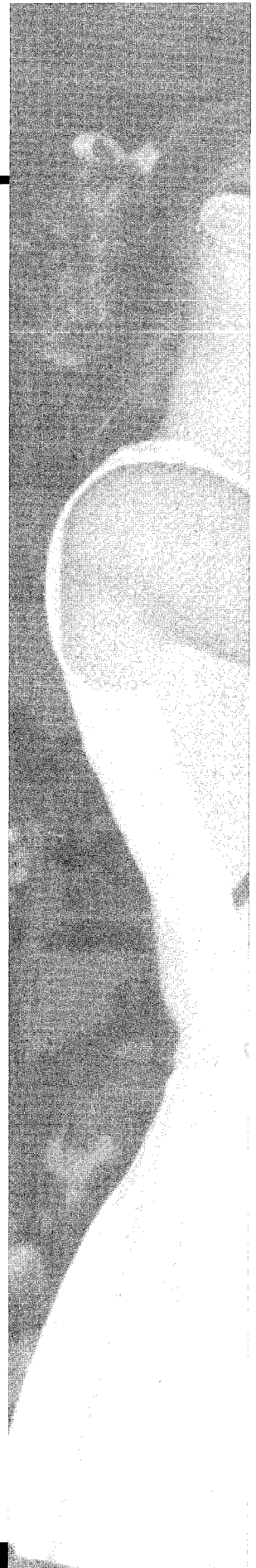

Warming up his arm, senior Ben Neely practices his pitching. "We didn't win as much as we wanted, but we improved as a team," Neely said.

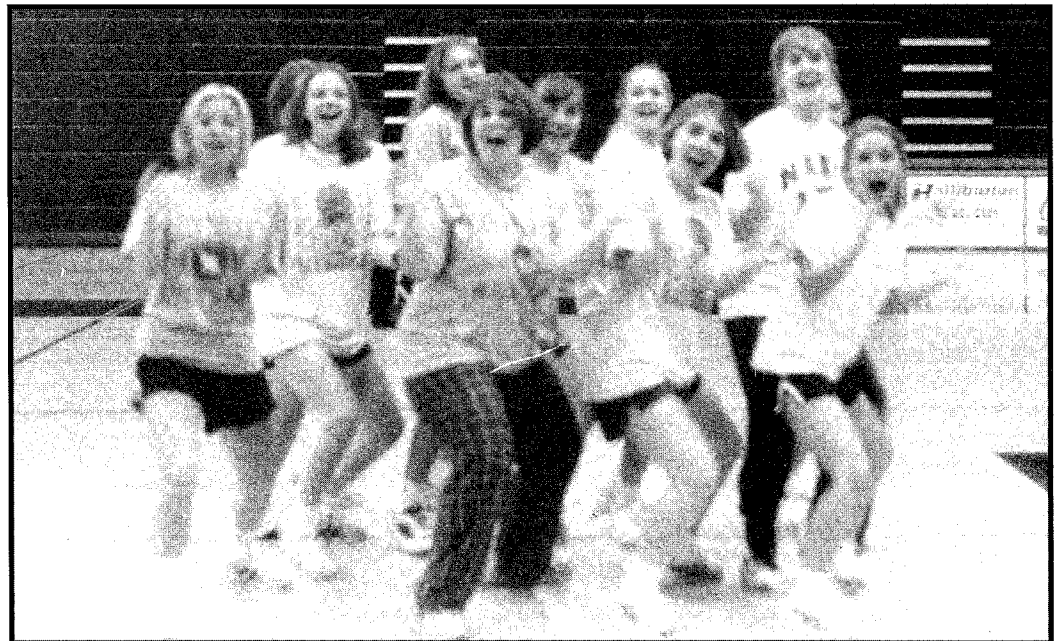

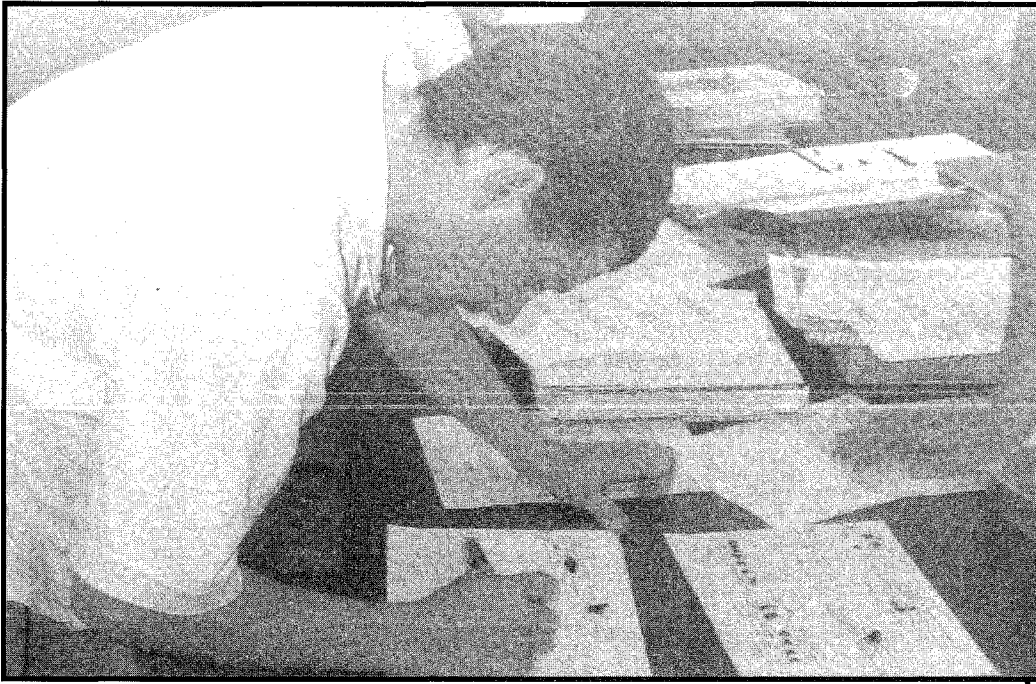
Renaissance Rally

"My Renaissance prize was so great that I had to give it to my friend," senior Amber Foster said.

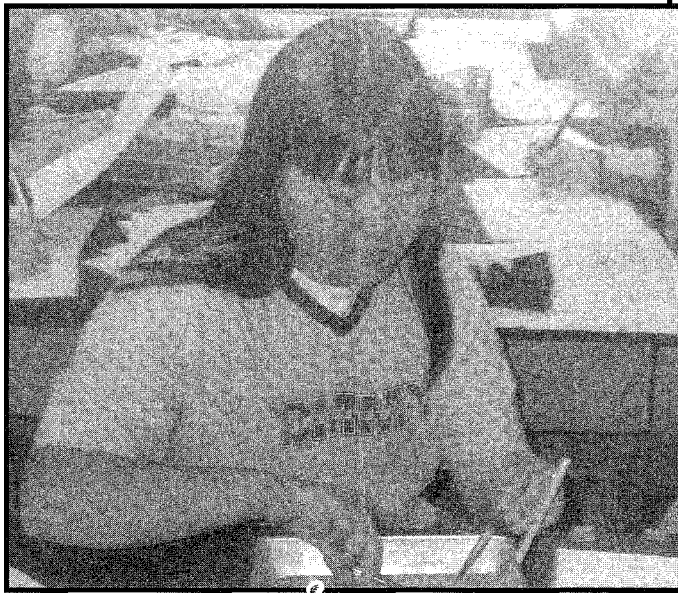

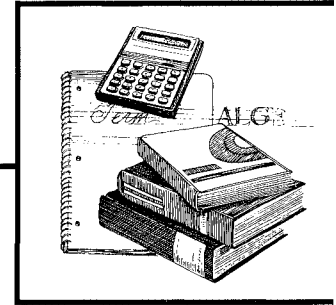
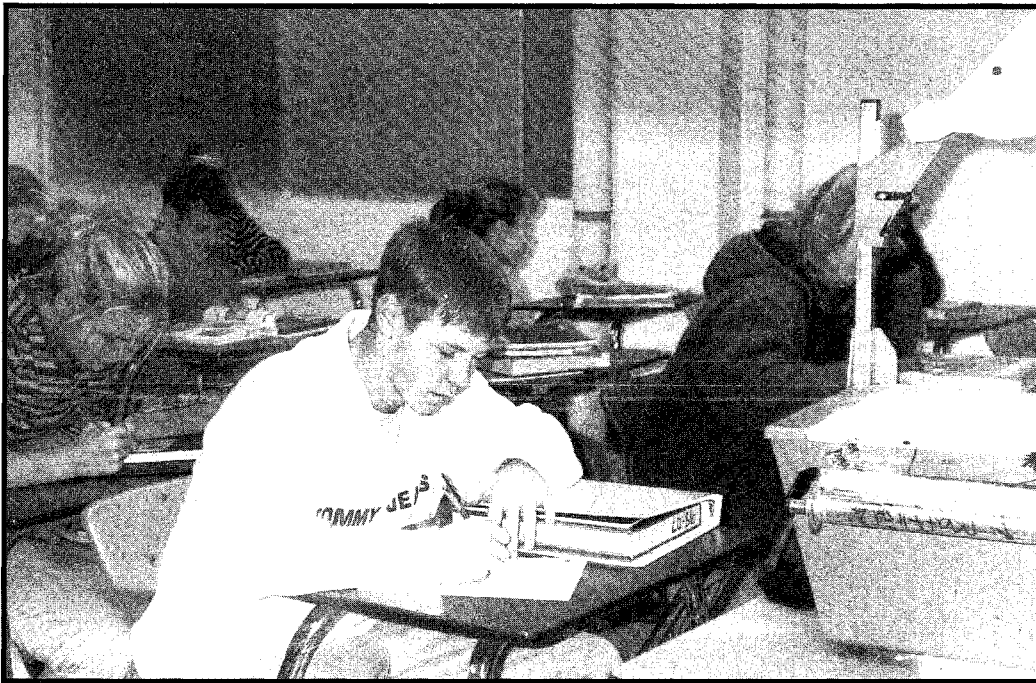
Humanities

To finish their assignments the students presented their procedures to the rest of the class.

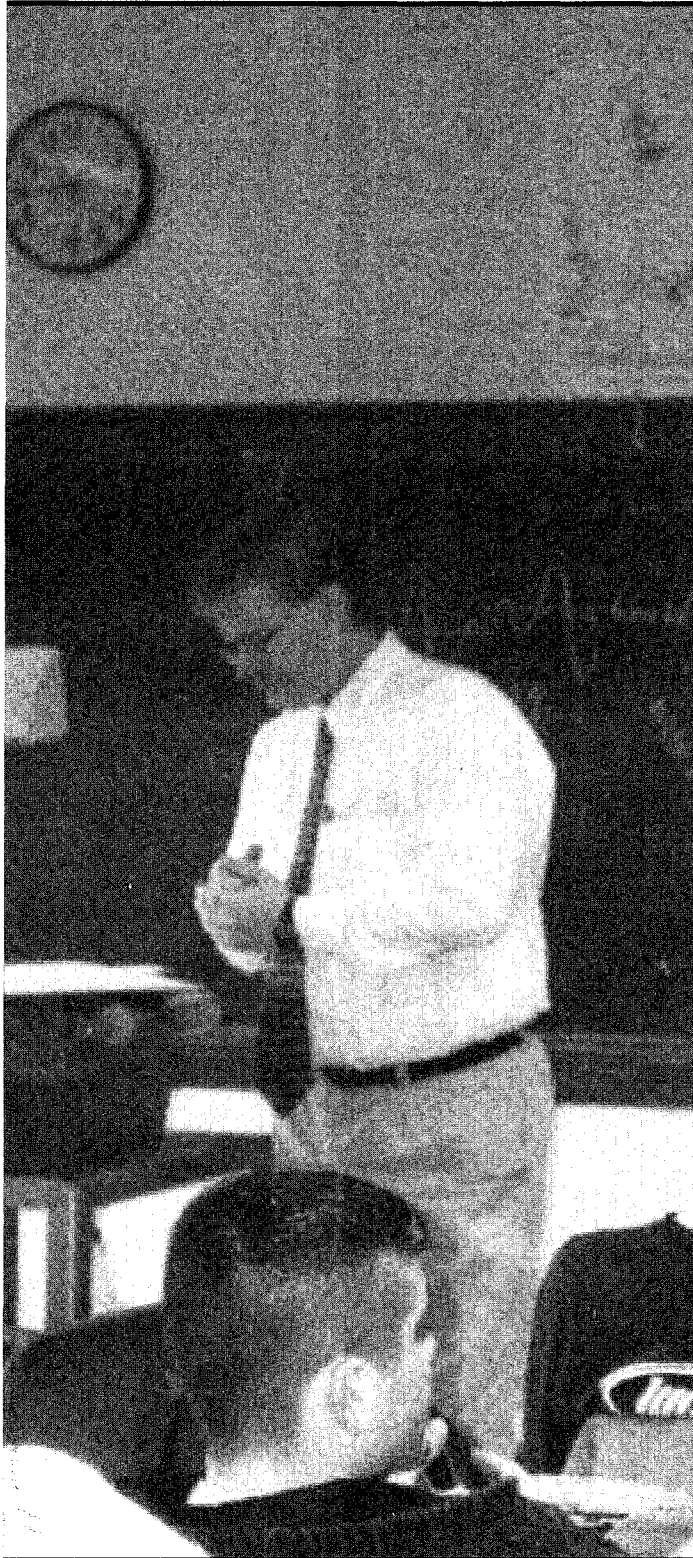

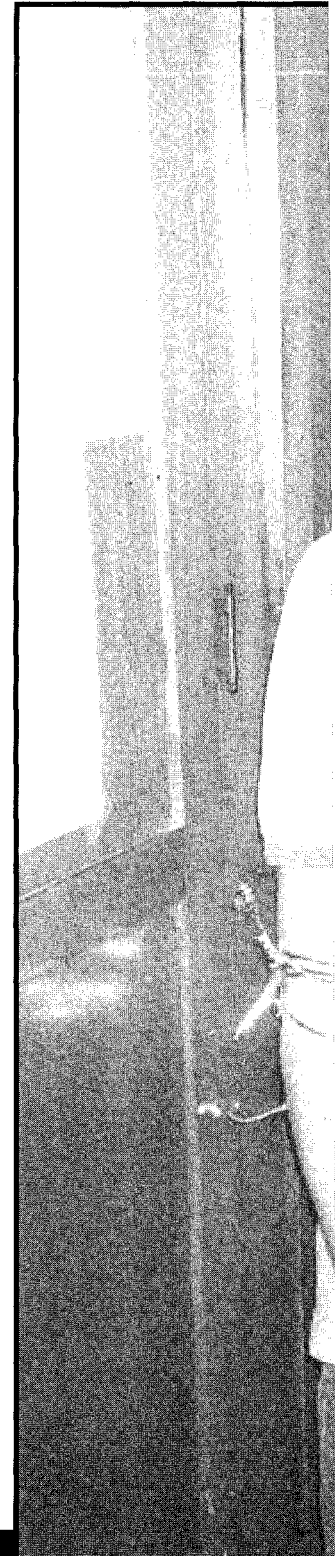
THE PROCESS EXPLAINED

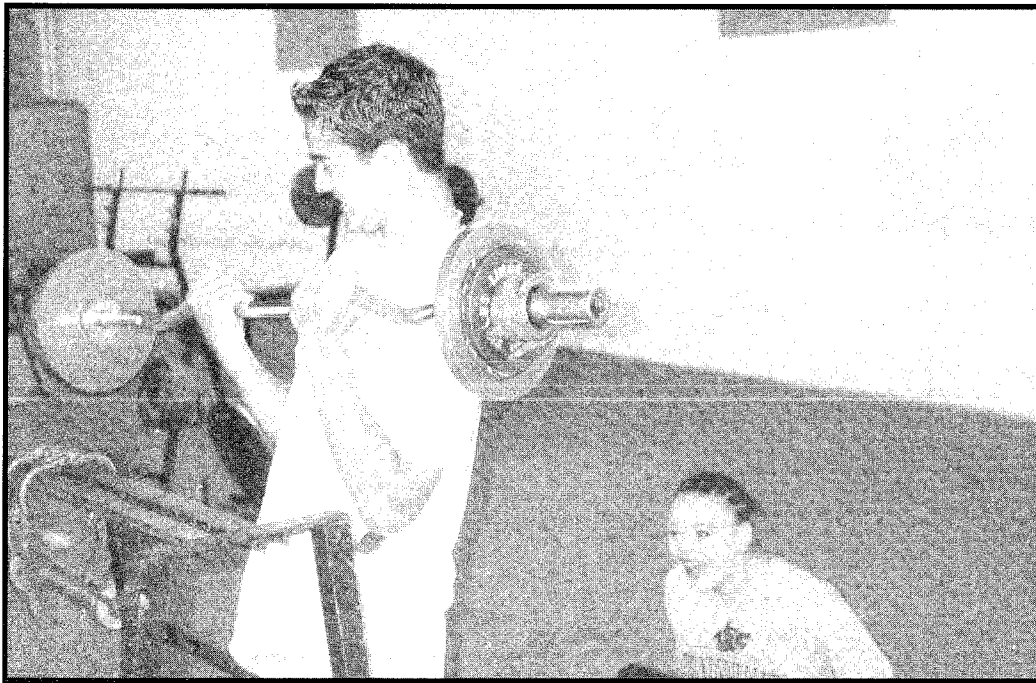


IMPORTANT CLASSES FOR CAREERS

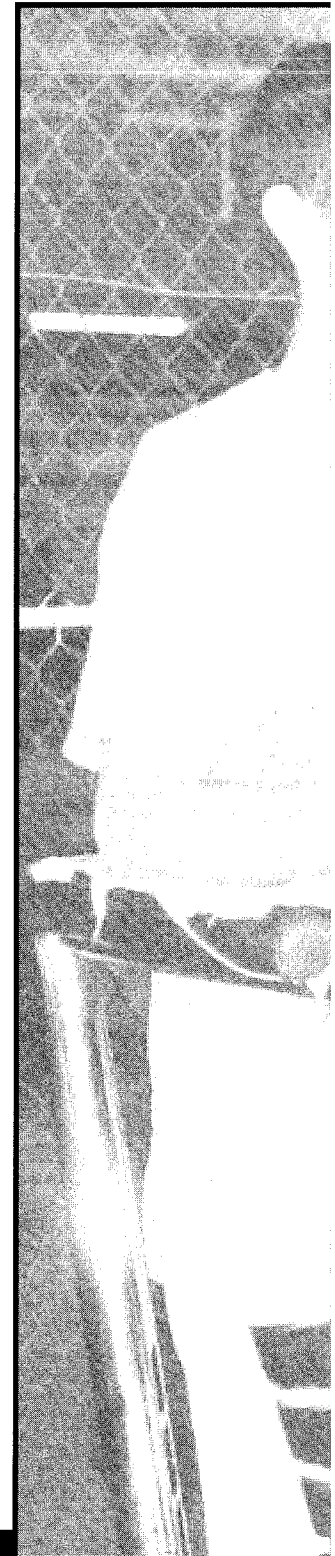
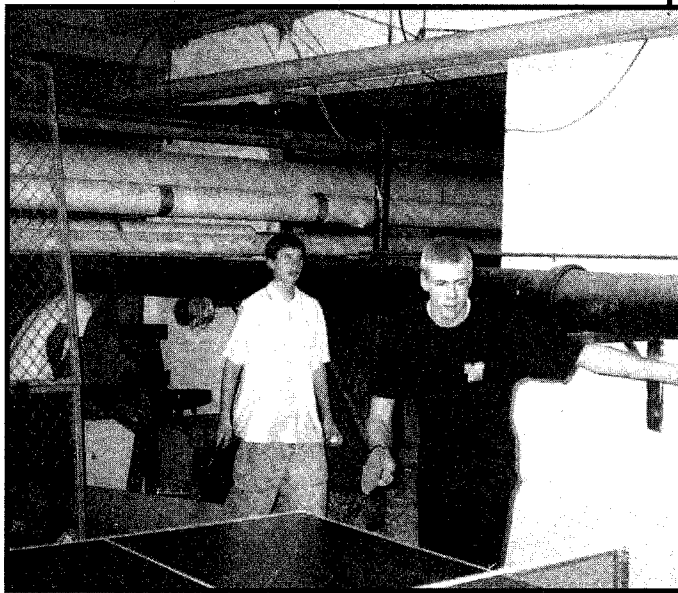

Swimming was also offered.

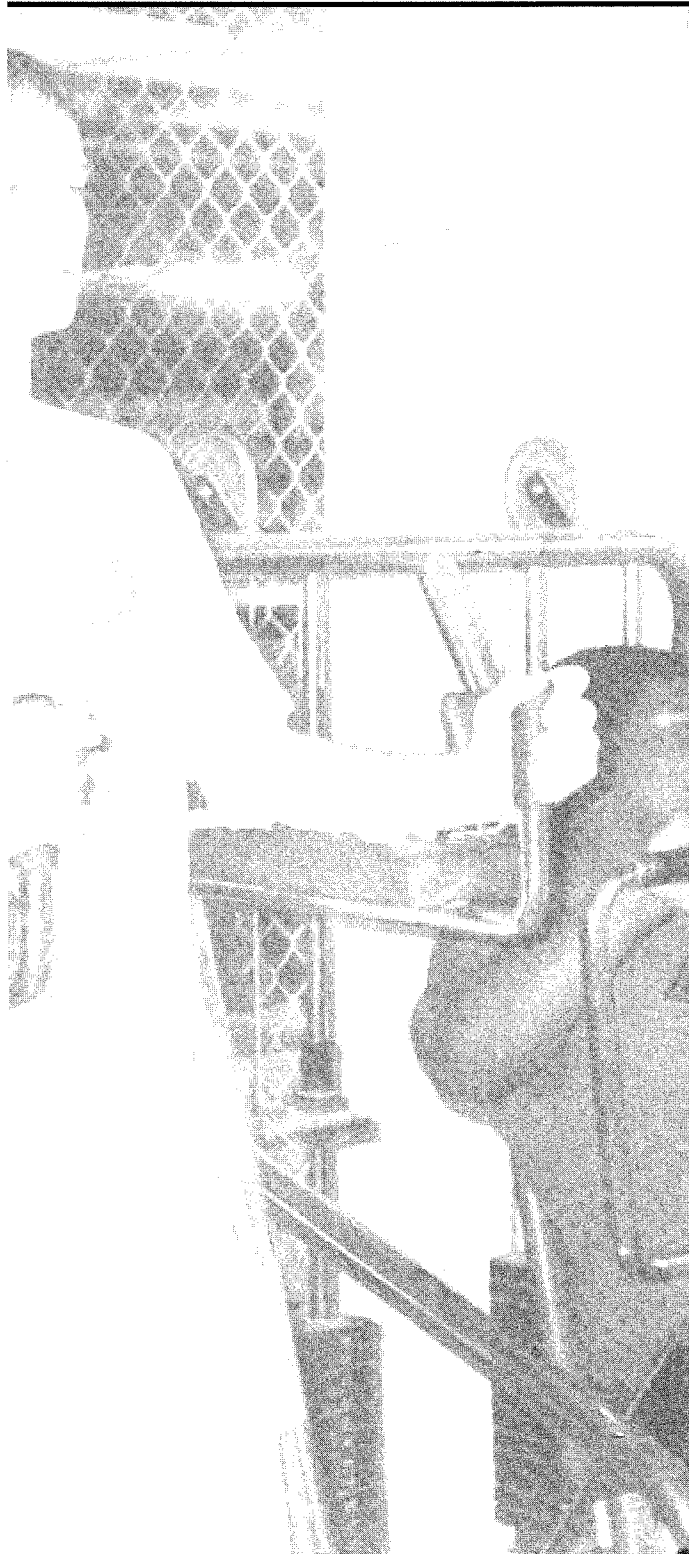

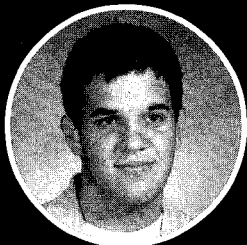

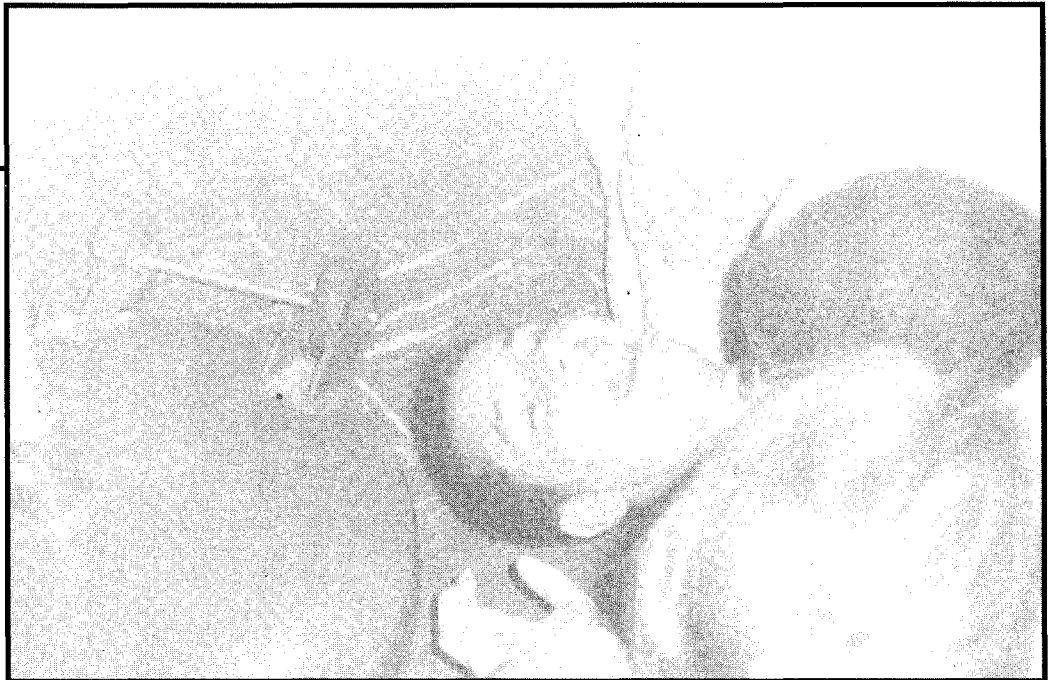

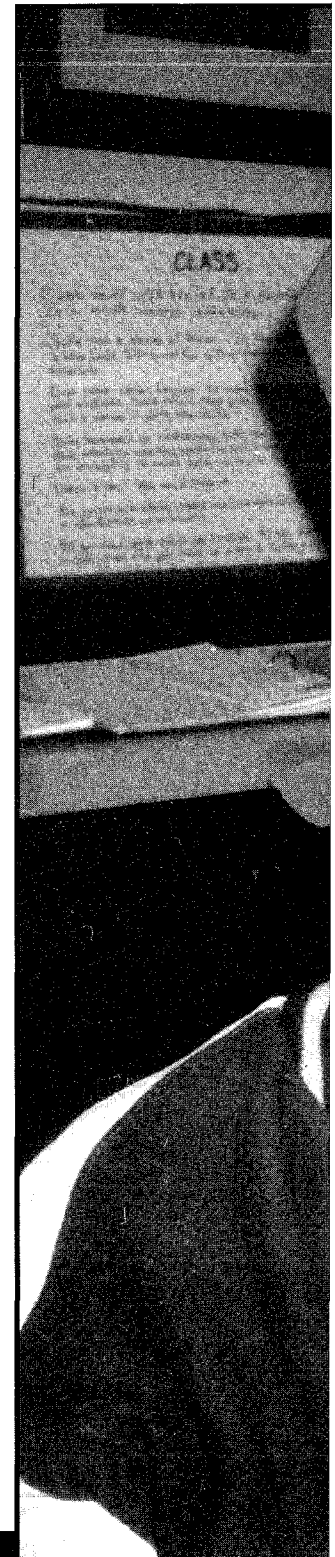

ior year of high school.

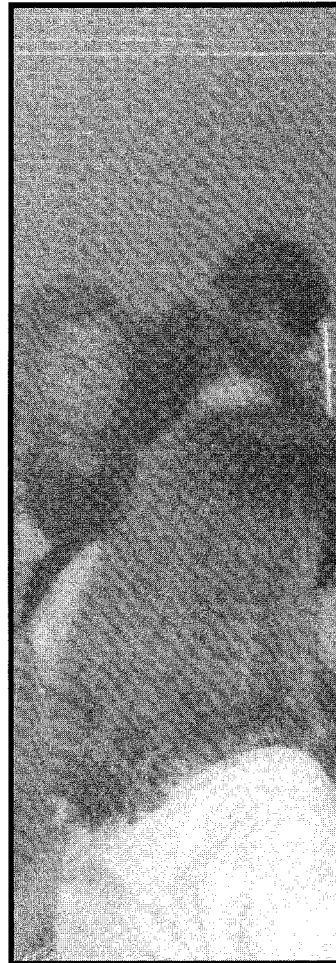

This year, the band traveled to Orlando, Fla. They performed as official cast members, part of Disney's Magic Music Days, and spent the rest of the week at the various theme parks.

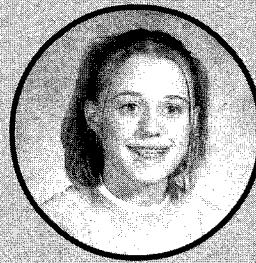

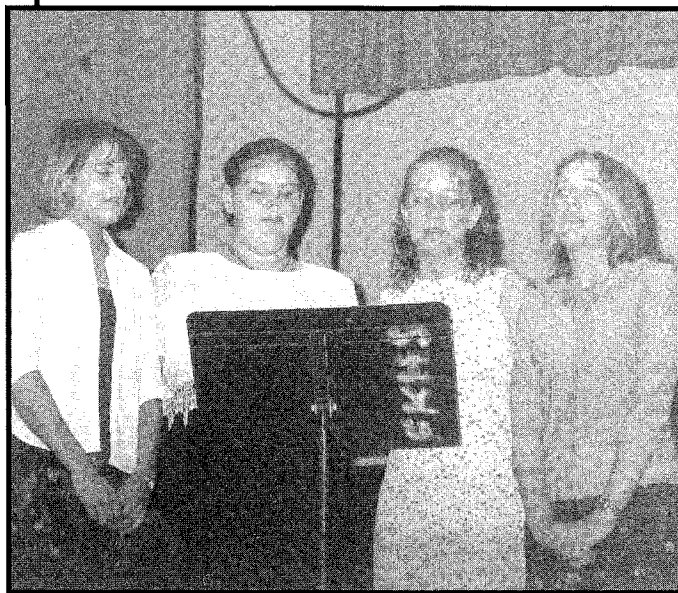

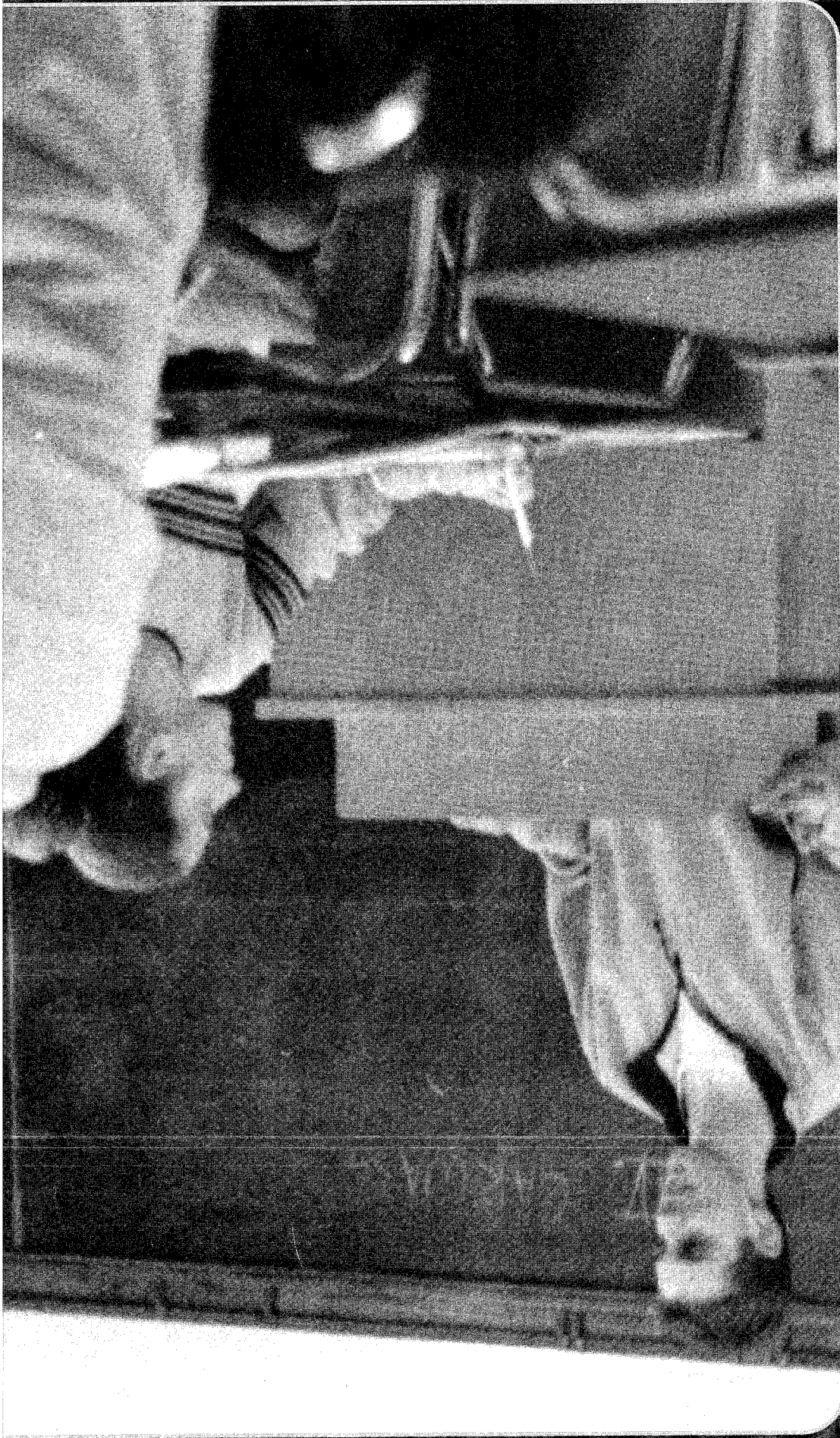
MUSIC PROGRAM GAINS NOTORIETY

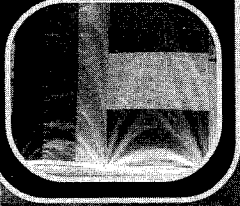
At the state contest, more honors were picked up as Soundwave again earned a "I" Rating along

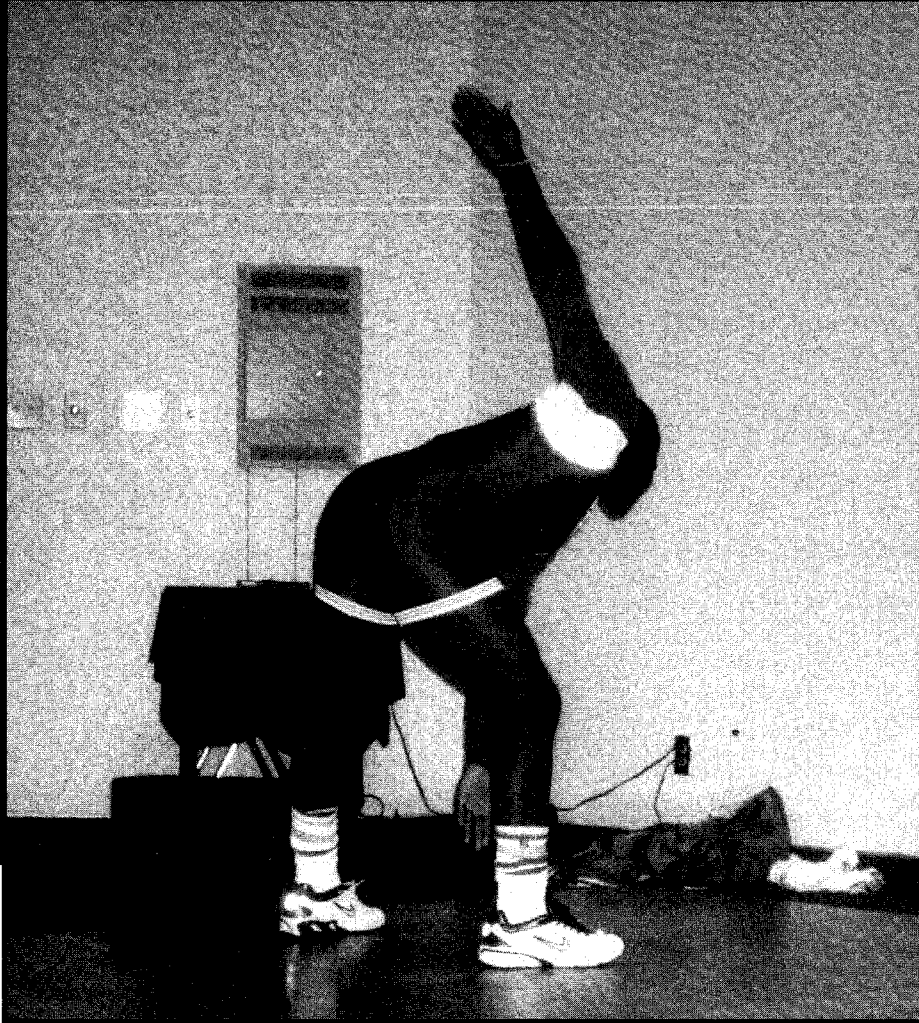

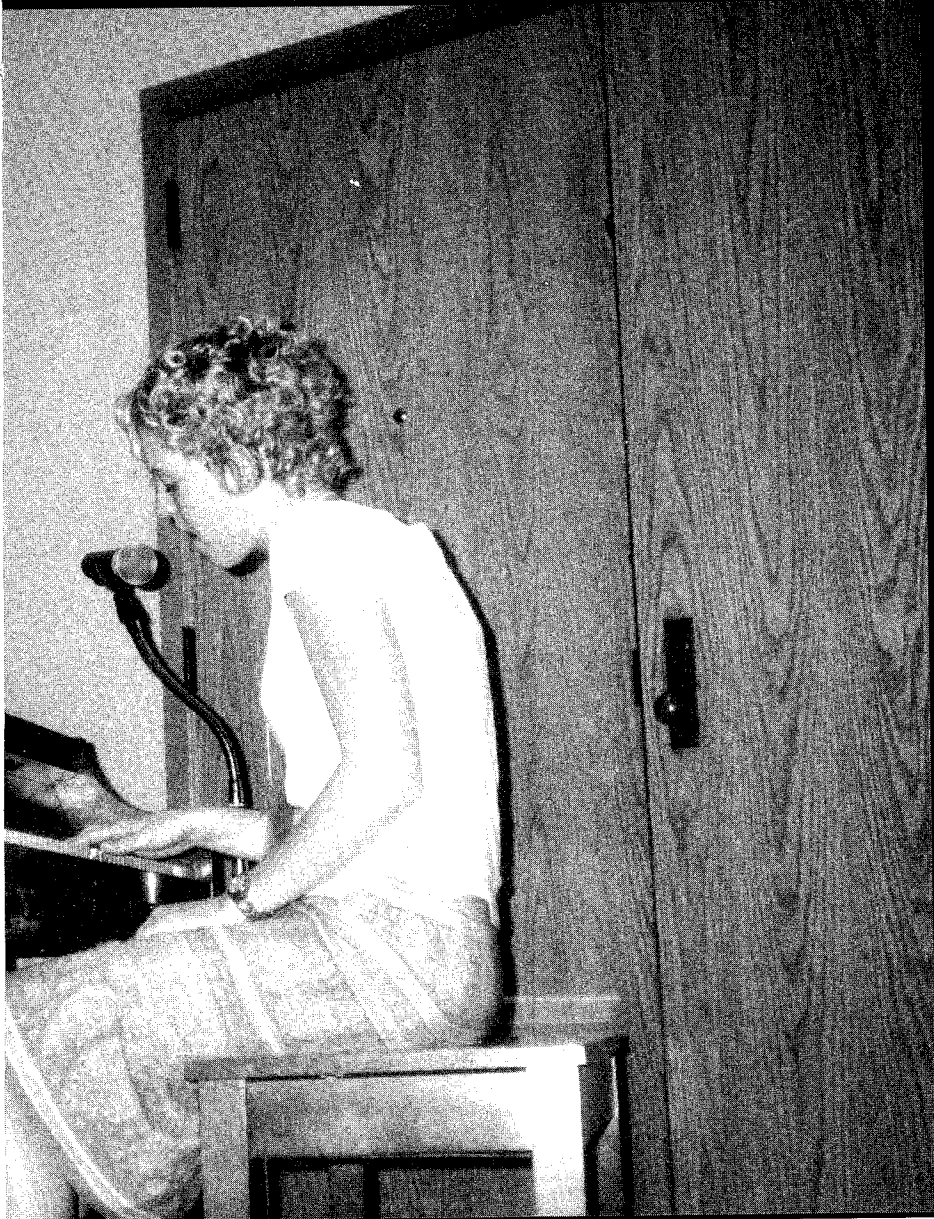

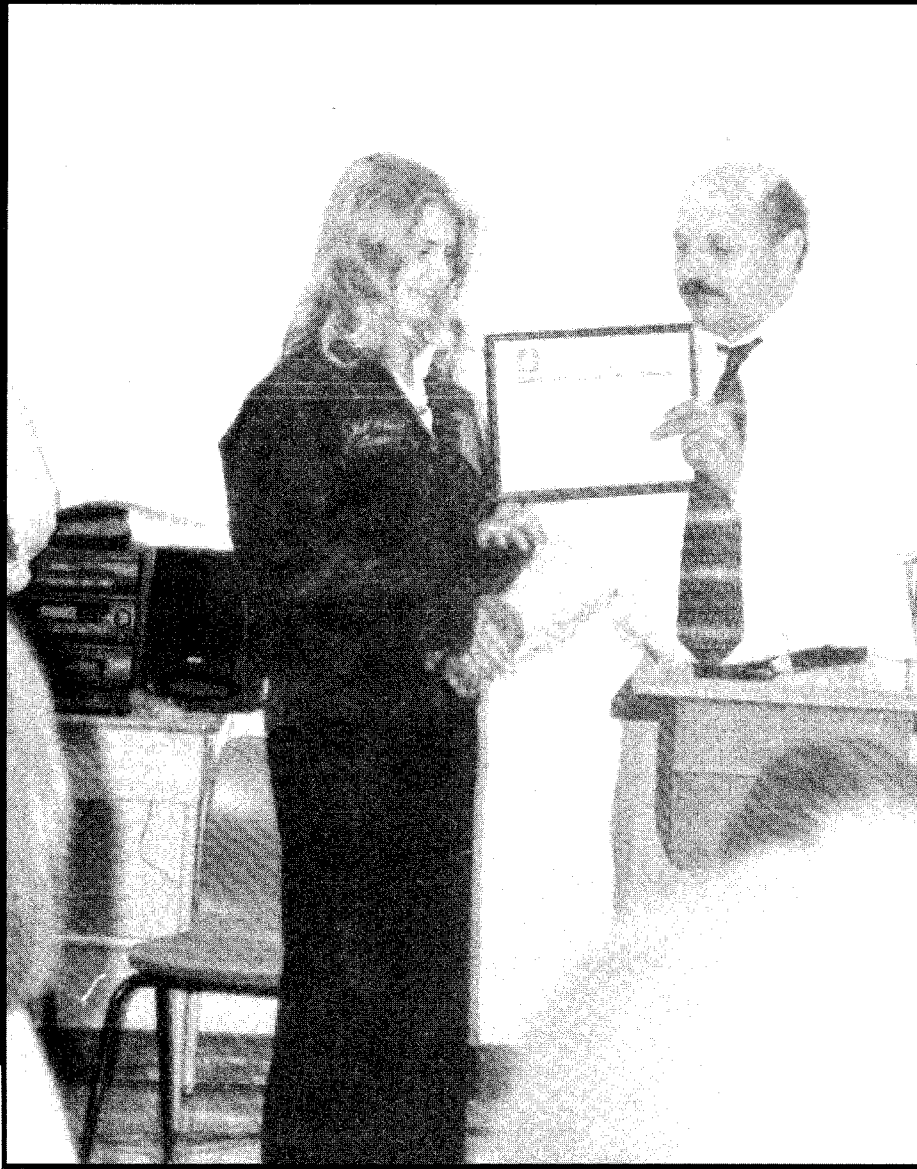

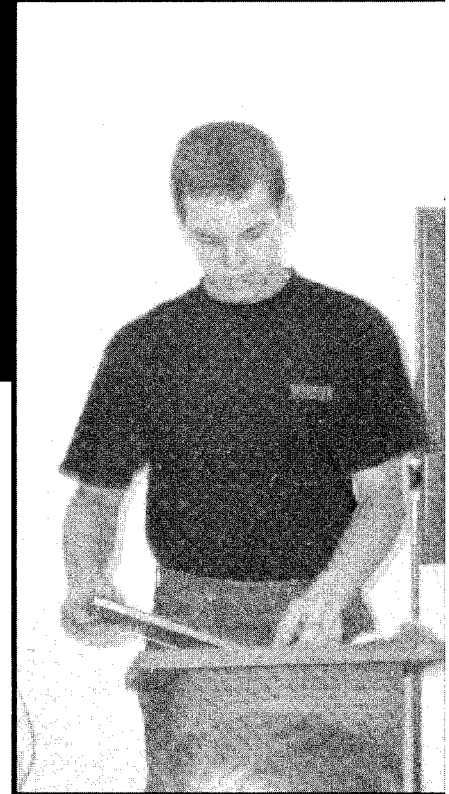

With the money they raised from the pow-wow and other fundraisers, 20 club members will be traveling to Santa Fe, New Mexico for a fun-filled week.

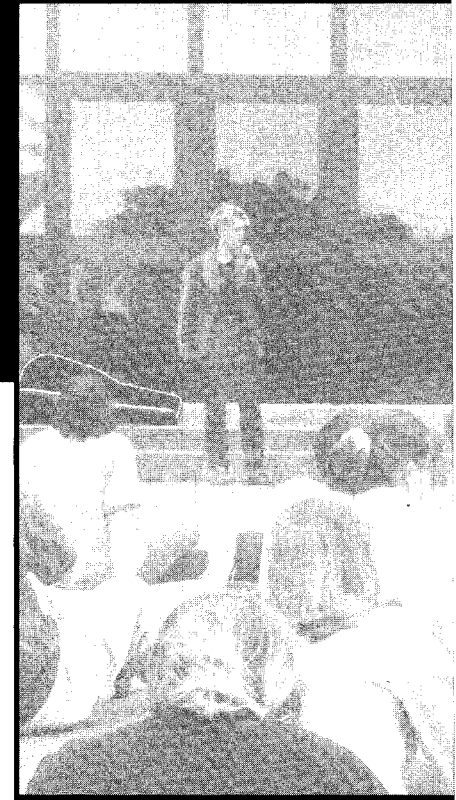
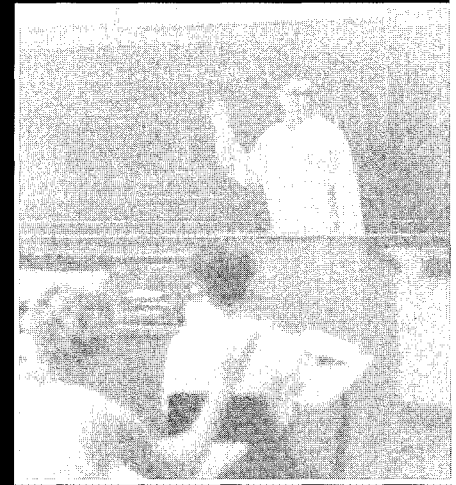

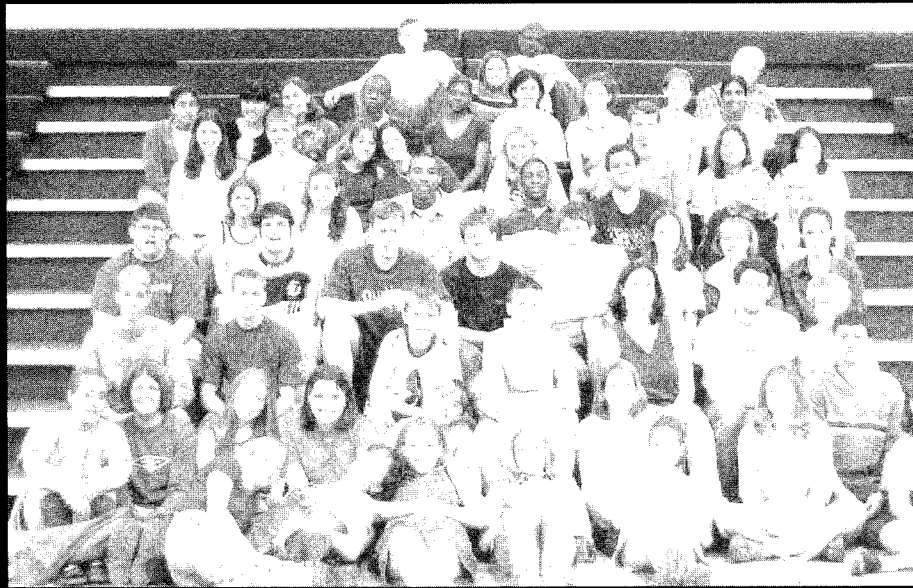
"The cookout was fun but we didn't have as many people out there as we had hoped. I think that was because it was kind of cold outside that day," freshman Teresa Lo said.

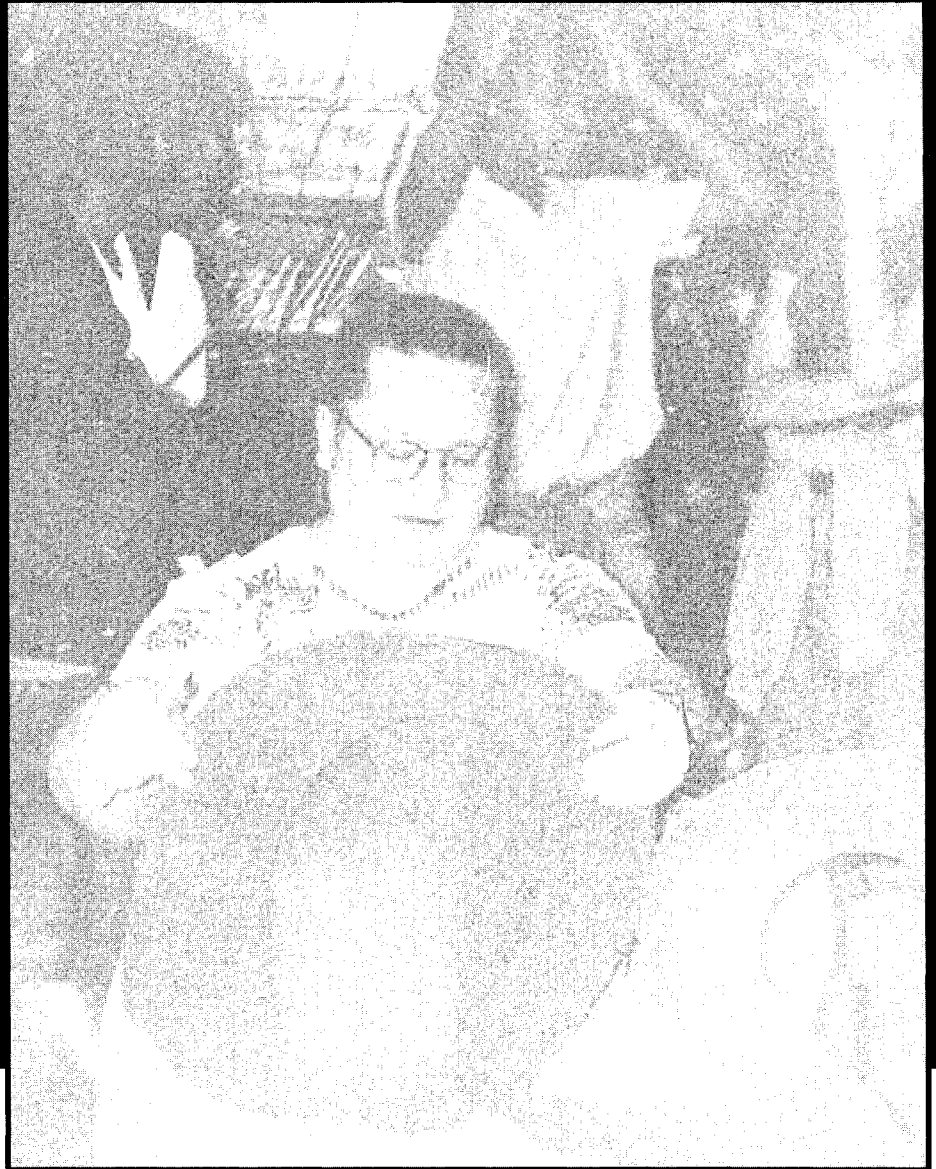

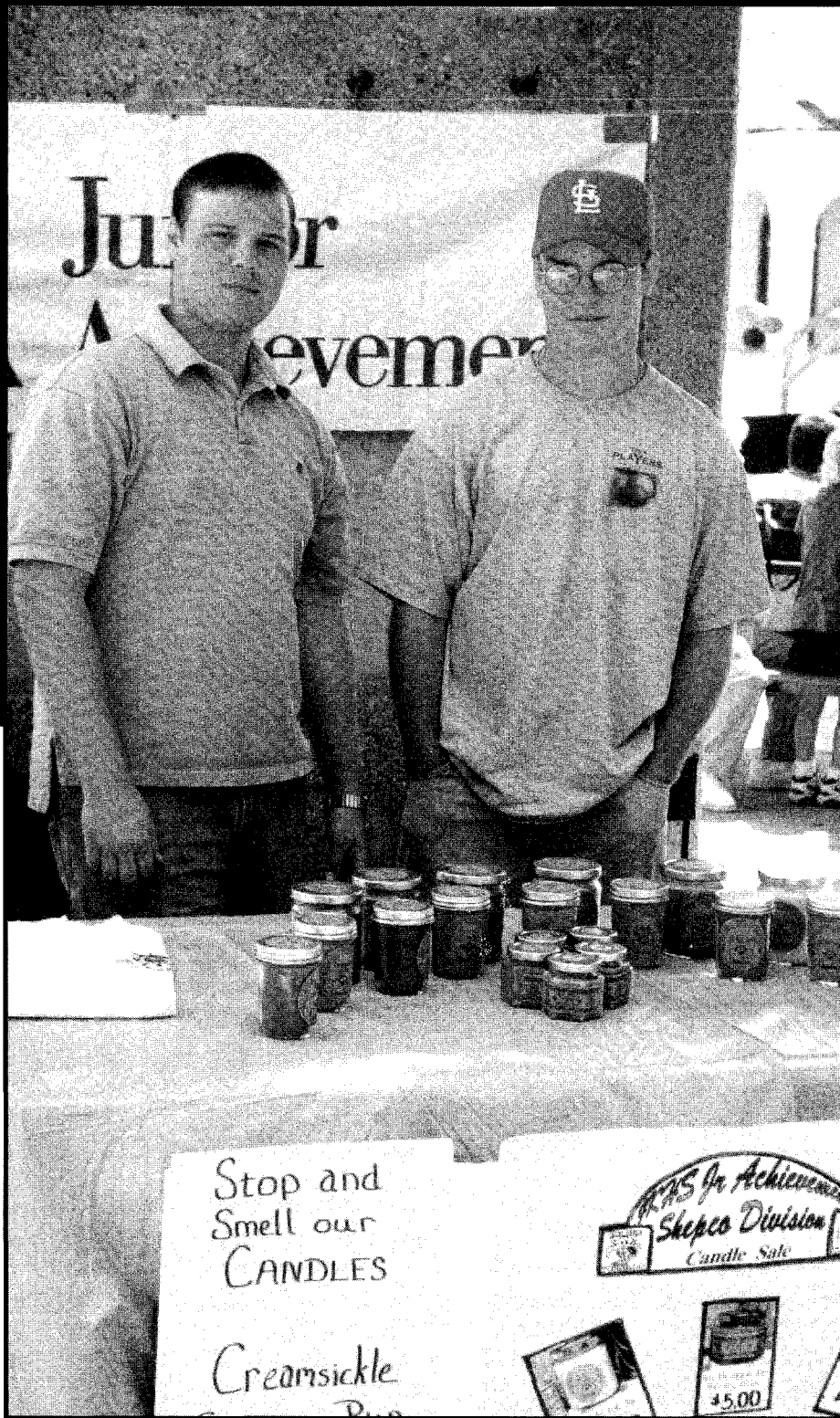
"I was really surprised on how well the decorations looked, when we had to do a big area like the gym," sponsor Dianne Humphrey said

Details
The 63rd volume of Field Kindley High School's Twist yearbook was printed by Jostens Publishing and Printing Divisions in Topeka, Kan. The non-theme was chosen by the staff. The litho cover was designed by Rene Hensley. Body copy and headlines varied with each section, while all captions were eight point Palatino with caption titles in ten point Palatino. The 1999-2000 Twist was designed and created by the staff in the FKHS Writing Lab using PageMaker 5.0. Photographs were taken by staff photographers and developed in the school's darkroom. Group photos were taken by Kate Mayo, team photos were taken by Doyal's Studio, and mugshots were provided by LifeTouch. The press run by the Twist was 325 and sold for \$30. The cost of the book was paid for by book sales and advertising.
