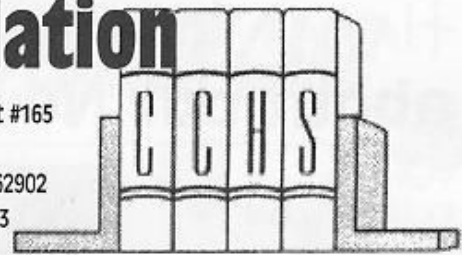




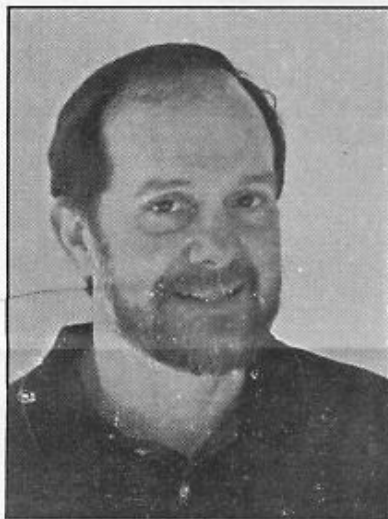

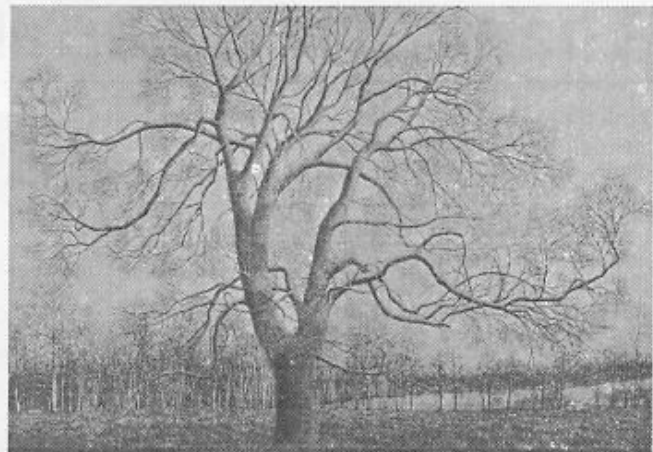
Livesay graduated from CCHS in 1974 where he was in the top ten of his class as well as co-captain of the Varsity Football team. Upon graduation he was awarded the Elks National Foundation Scholarship after which he enrolled in Auburn University. Switching majors from math to art led Bill to transfer to SIU

where he studied and worked as the master printer for SIU's Distinguished Professor of Art, Herbert L. Fink. He received the prestigious Rickert-Ziebold Art Trust Award from SIU and graduated in 1978. After earning a Master of Fine Arts from Yale University he moved to the Atlanta area and started working as an artist. In 1983 he began teaching at The Art Institute of Atlanta where he has received many awards including the Outstanding Faculty Member of the Year Award in 1999. His artwork is included in over 175 corporate and institutional collections including: AT&T, Blue Cross Blue Shield, Chicago Cubs, Ford Motor Company, GE, GM, Hallmark, IBM, Motorola, Westinghouse, Xerox, and Yale University Art Gallery.

Livesay believes "nature is the source of all art. The components of landscape images, like the elements of art, consist of infinite varieties of spaces, textures, forms, colors, values, and light." Known for his many landscapes, Bill's work is done in the medium of intaglio prints. "These are images that are incised into the surface of the plate, including engraving and etching.

Intaglio printmaking offers the possibility of infinite tonal range and a great capacity for detail. Each print must go through the individual inking, wiping, and printing stages. The plate can go through endless changes, both additions and/or corrections."

Livesay credits former CCHS teachers Tom Seward and Jane Renfro with exposing him to art and art history. Bill has generously donated a collection of his work to the CCHS Foundation. The collection will be housed in the new school along with a brief biography of William T. Livesay who makes an outstanding role model for our students.

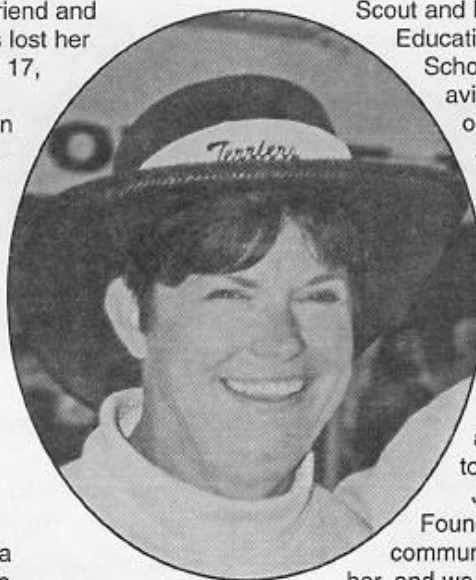
Thank You Jane Tally Phelps

Jane graduated from University High School in 1963 and from SIUC with a bachelor's degree in education in 1967. She married John Phelps in 1968. They have two children, Mary Jane and Jay, both graduates of CCHS.

Jane was a member of P.E.O., Beta Sigma Phi, and Alpha Gamma Delta. She was a member of First United Methodist Church where she served as a Stephen Minister. She delivered Meals-on-Wheels and was a volunteer van driver for senior citizens.

A committed community volunteer, Jane worked to improve the lives of all the children of Carbondale. She was a room mother at Giant City School, helped lead Girl



Scout and Boy Scout troops, worked with Arts in Education committees, and taught Sunday School and Bible School. Jane was also an avid sports fan, enthusiastically cheering on the Terriers and the Salukis as well as the St. Louis Cardinals and St. Louis Rams.

Jane was a true supporter of CCHS in every way. She and John served for nine years on the CCHS Athletic Booster Board, from 1984 to 1993. They were awarded the "Booster of the Year" award in 1984. about the Class of 1940

Frank Bridges, who taught at C.C.H.S. for several years and who was the coach of the 1937 football team that was unbeaten, untied, and not scored upon, often publicly stated that the class of 1940 was the "best" class, not the best athletically, that would be the Class of 1938, but the best intellectually.

The Class of 1940 was not large; its graduates numbered 85. It included many persons who made their marks in the world in education, law, medicine, business, the other professions, and homemaking. The latter is probably the most important of all. We choose not to mention the names of individuals, but will say that the graduates of the class include a judge, a physician, several professors, other teachers, a successful politician, a writer, several highly successful businessmen and other accomplished persons of both sexes. Considering its size we feel that Mr. Bridges' evaluation was correct. It is the "best" class.

In 1992 the Class of 1940, which has been meeting annually since 1985, decided to establish an endowed fund for providing scholarships each year to C.C.H.S. graduates. Members of the Class responded generously with contributions and have continued to do so. There was no C.C.H.S. Foundation then, to hold the fund, so the Class of 1940 urged the Administration to take the lead in forming such a foundation so that contributions could have tax deduction status. The Foundation was formed and now holds the Class of 1940 endowed scholarship fund. Each year its earnings provide two scholarships.

The fund is now in the \$25 to \$30 thousand dollar range.

As members of the Class of 1940 near the end of their lives we expect gifts and bequests to the fund to continue. It will go on providing scholarships indefinitely into the future. The Class has specified that when no known member of the Class is still living, the Fund can be used by the Foundation for any educational purpose, at its discretion.

Any class can do as much, and many larger classes can do much more. It is easy to gain contributions to a good cause. All any class needs to do is to state its intentions, define its goals, inform its members, and the money will follow.

Author Thomas Wolfe was wrong. You can go home again! Terriers from around the country came home to visit classmates, family and friends at a dozen class reunions held during 2004.

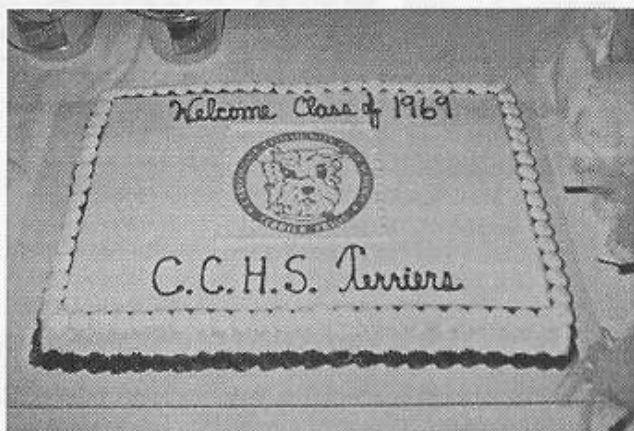
The Class of 1974 started off the reunion season in June when they gathered for their 30th reunion. Janet Price spearheaded the event.

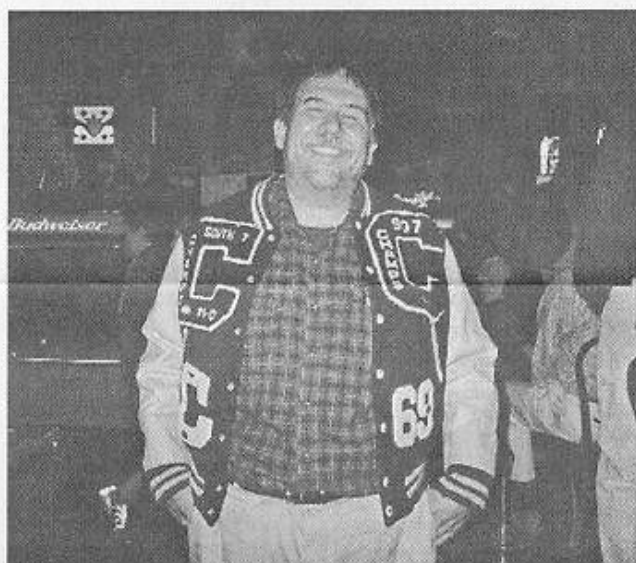

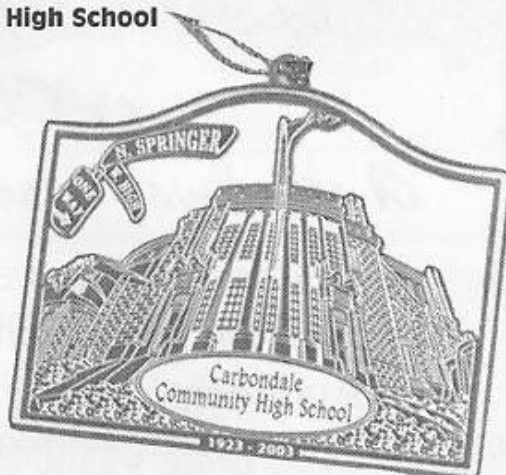
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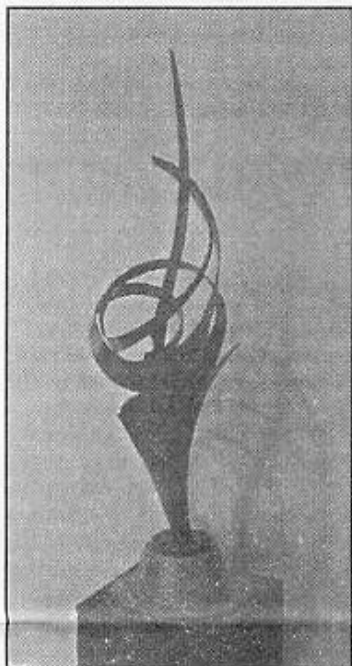

New sculpture to add interest



There will be a new sculpture on the CCHS Campus.

ArtWorks for Schools, a sub-committee of Carbondale Community Arts is pleased to announce that work has begun on the new sculpture to welcome students and visitors to the northeast entrance of CCHS. The sixteen-foot blue torch, to be constructed of forged and fabricated steel, was commissioned by ArtWorks to kick off its campaign to place fine art in the public educational spaces throughout Carbondale. Funds for this project are being raised primarily from private individuals but include generous

contributions from the CCHS Board and Foundation and other civic groups around the community.

CCHS was chosen as the "launch-site" for the campaign because it is the newest of the educational construction projects in the community and it attracts students from the broadest geographic area. Once the site was identified, the ArtWorks committee solicited proposals from twenty-five area sculptors. The final nod went to John Medwedeff, the popular favorite among students and community members alike. Mr. Medwedeff is a nationally known artist who completed his graduate studies at SIUC and whose studio is located in Murphysboro. He has created sculptures for major cities including Memphis and Minneapolis, and a recently completed work can be seen near the Engineering Building complex on the SIUC campus.

Installation of the CCHS sculpture is scheduled for spring of 2005, at which time a dedication and reception will be held to honor the artist and his work, as well as the many donors who will have made it possible. In the meantime ArtWorks is beginning the process to select a commission for our "superblock" neighbor, Carbondale Middle School.

provides on-site Healthcare

Carbondale Community High School is embarking on a new initiative to improve the health and well being of CCHS students. Often, adolescents face barriers in accessing health care services. There is growing recognition that addressing the complex problems youth face in society can contribute to improved health, social outcomes, and educational success.

Knowing this, CCHS provides an ideal location where a range of health services can be delivered to the adolescent population effectively and efficiently. Planning is underway to open a School Based Health Center in the spring of 2005. These expanded services will be provided through a partnership between the school district and local health care providers, including but not limited to, Shawnee Health Services and their Adolescent Health Center, Southern Illinois Regional Social Services, Jackson County Health Department, and Southern Illinois Healthcare's Community Benefits Department. Utilizing the existing Wellness Committee at CCHS, the district will formalize these collaborative relationships to plan, deliver, and evaluate the proposed services.

The School Based Health Center will operate in the existing space for the school nurse. A mid level practitioner from Shawnee Health Services, under the supervision of a physician, will staff the SBHC. The school nurse will work closely with SBHC staff and local health care providers.

The creation of a comprehensive School Based Health Center at CCHS will have many benefits to CCHS, the students, Faculty and Staff, and the Community. Among these will include reducing lost school time, increased accessibility of services, the promotion of healthy lifestyles, and a more comprehensive and coordinated delivery of services (medical, mental health, and health education) for CCHS students.

Community support of this new initiative will be important to its success.
