

work with the other board members to make STMA a happier and more efficient institution of learning.







With a record of five wins, four loses, the STMA Knights completed their second season.


The year was highlighted when the Knights won the final game of the season handing Rockford their first defeat of the











Three STMA Knights take first place at the Junior High Invationals. They are Joe Dahlheimer, Tom Roden, and Keith Kilian.



Of the twelve varsity grapplers, six seniors will be leaving, Mr. Pullen feels that his squad will suffer some what but he already has a few good prospects for next year.












