






- 10. Eight scientists emerge from Biosphere 2 after two years in this sealed, self-contained experimental environment.







Alissa Haller gave a reminiscent and moving Commencement Address, which was followed by a musical treat from the Senior Choir Members as they sang "Dreams to Dream."






Although a total of six students attended school this year, only four were able to attend and participate in Graduating ceremonies.






Making a "Fresh" Freshmen share their





After Years of Service, LaVerne "Retires"


After dedicating many, many years of hard work and special service toward the betterment of the St. Michael-Albertville school district, LaVerne Beaudry has retired.



Last fall we began the year in a new school, this fall the trend continued; we began the year with a new principal.





Its' Looks May Be Deceiving

Contrary to popular belief, Halloween does not have its' origins in student rituals of dressing up as strange creatures. According to historical research, Halloween originated from ancient Druids reactions to fear and death.

The first accounts of Halloween festivities can be traced back to an ancient druid festival called Samhoin. 








As a result of the members many awards and spectacular wins, the 1993-1994 season speech was "The Best" many of members ever remember, but there is always next year and who knows what the that will hold?






YearBook

Some may think that working on the yearbook is not fun or intriguing, but little do they know! According to several members, the Yearbook is a great way to get to know everyone in the school either by face or name.










The cast of this show did an excellent job with their characters and earned a well deserved second place at sub-section and went on to compete in section competition. Congratulations!








Tennis




This year's football team had one of their best seasons and looks forward to a new and different team next year.


working as a team. (Obviously his advice and the members hard work paid of because the team finished the season with a 25-04 record.)








Girl's Basketball

Senior Lisa Klaers was voted Best Hustle and Senior Katie Shueller was voted Most Improved, by their teamates.




Although none of the team or its' individual members advanced to compete at the State level, many of the team's members believe





Thrills, chills and spills... No this isn't an introduction for an amusement park, but rather a description of this year's Boys Basketball team.



During the last few seconds of a game against St. Anthony, Tom Wines shot a winning basket. Another memorable


moment in the season was the teams' last season game against Milaca.


All in all, it was a tremendous season for both team members and fans. The team pulled together and exerted a tremendous amout of effort right to the end... there were no quitters on this years team!













Following the trend for this years' sport teams, the Baseball team had an action packed season that included thirteen wins and four losses.


