This whirlwind of festivities made our school come together and made the holiday season a little brighter for all.






Lunch... Eating and Socializing

Although the Speech team at our school isn't a large one, the students involved make it quite exceptional. Speech may seem confusing, however, to one that is not





their task with hard work and perseverance.












Basketball Team Offers Many Fun and Exciting Games This Winter Season






Knights Clinch Second Consecutive State Title!
