Tear Along the Dotted Line

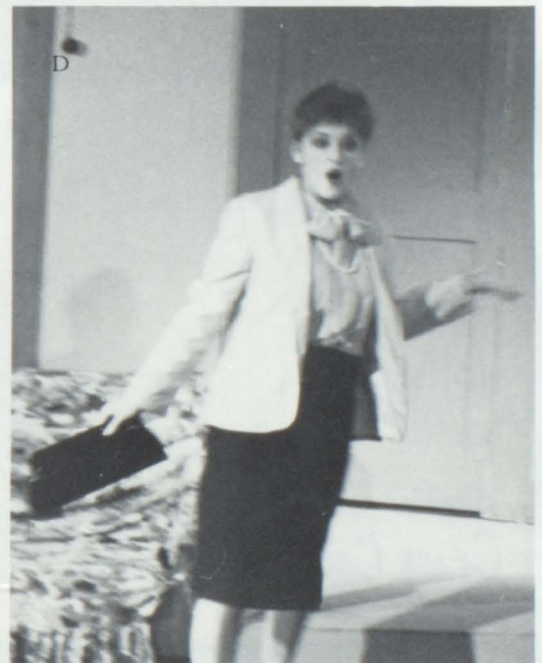

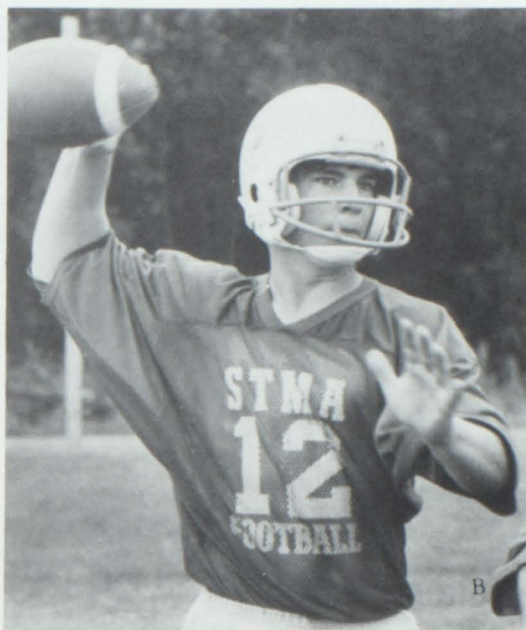

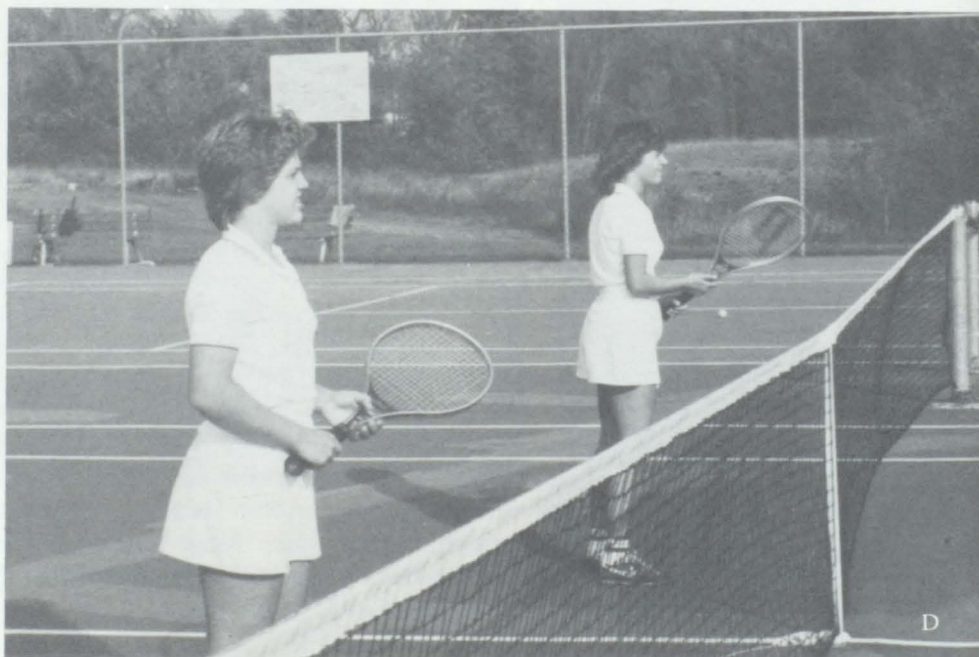
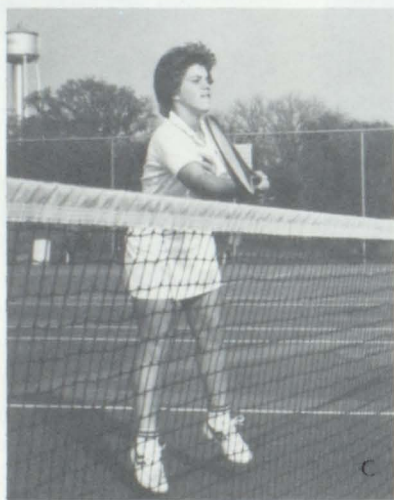
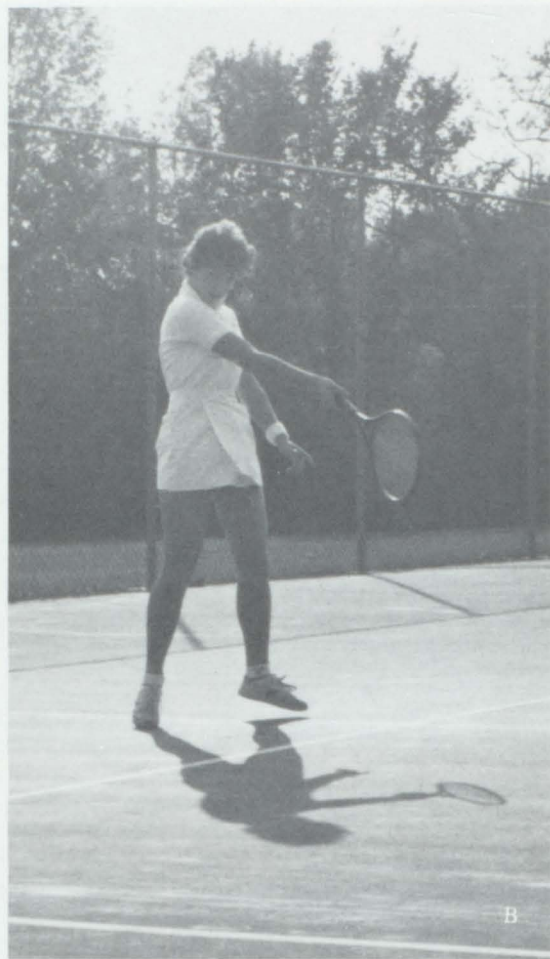

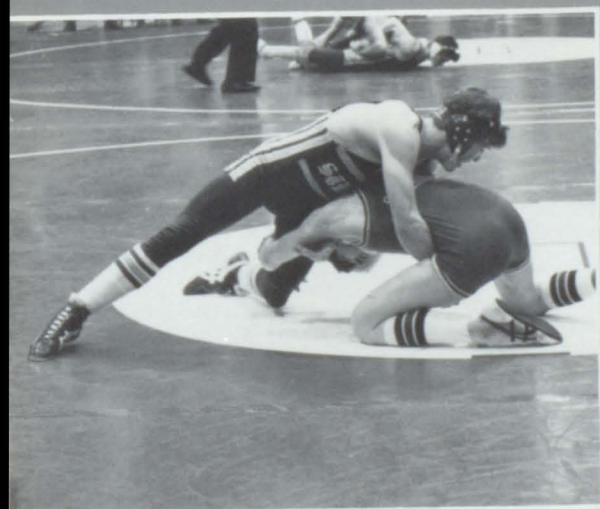
JV Basketball Puts In Long Hours

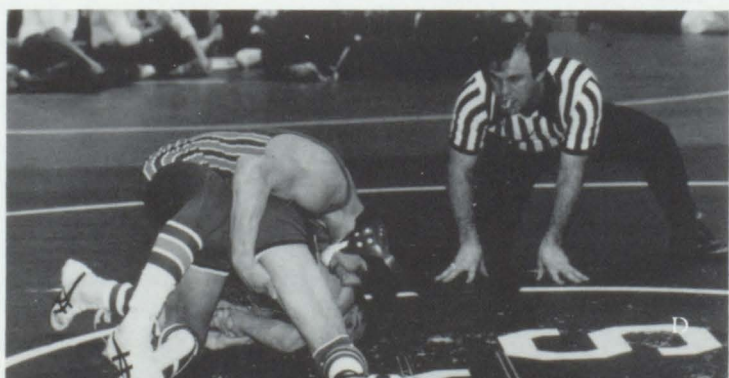

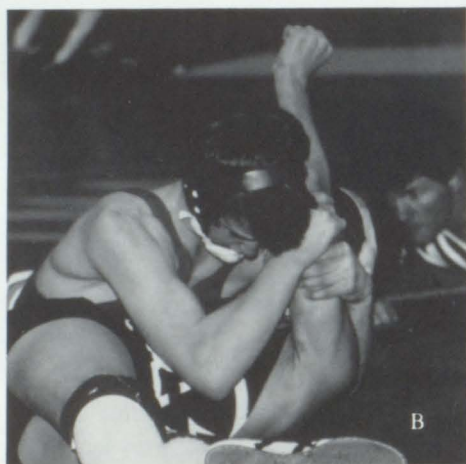
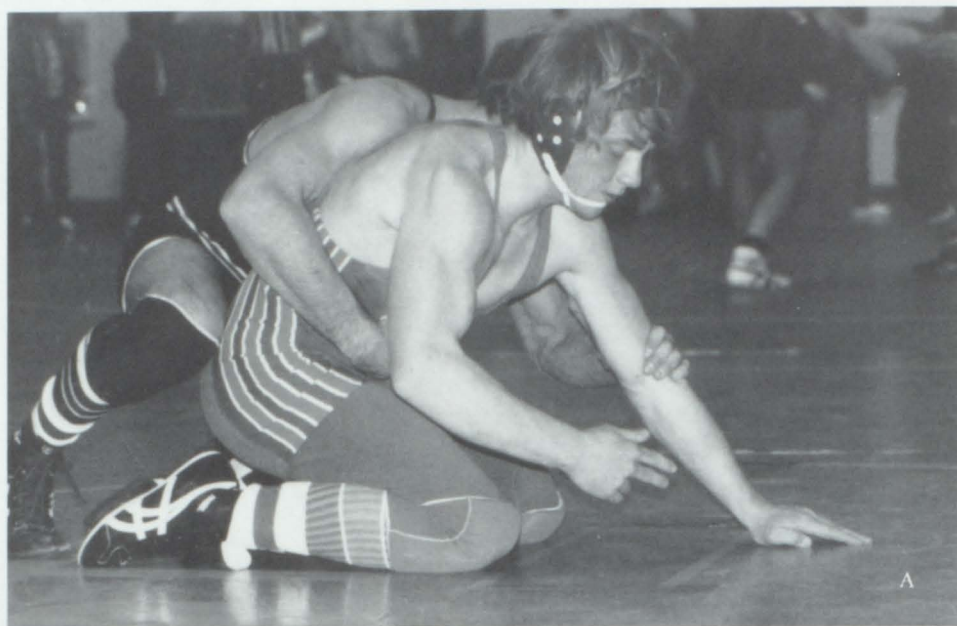
1st-STMA Invitational

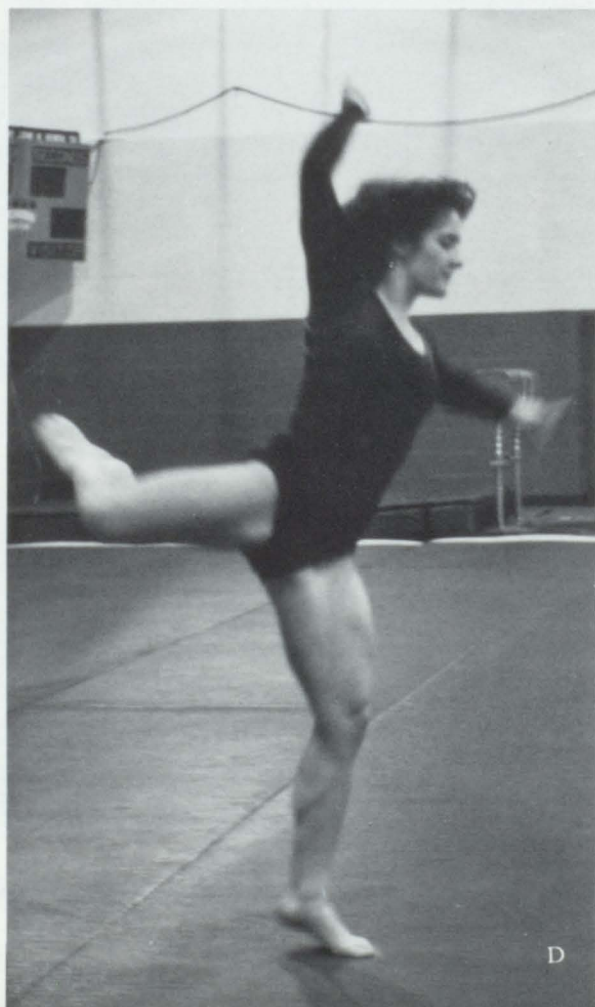

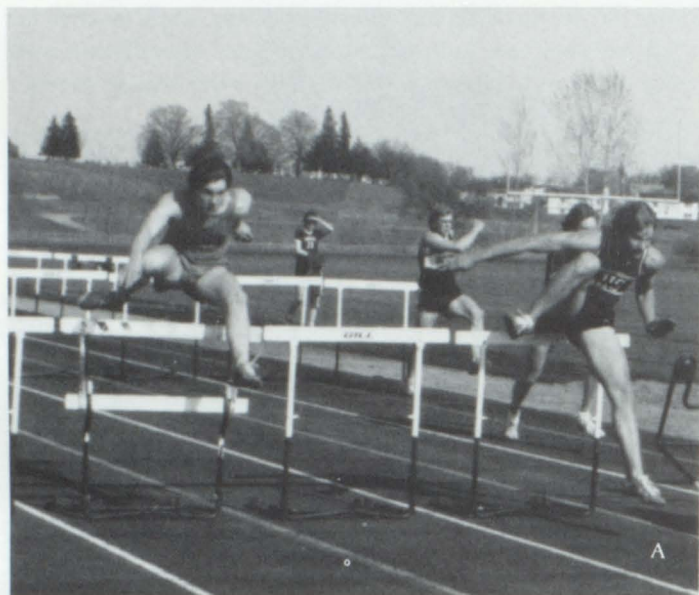

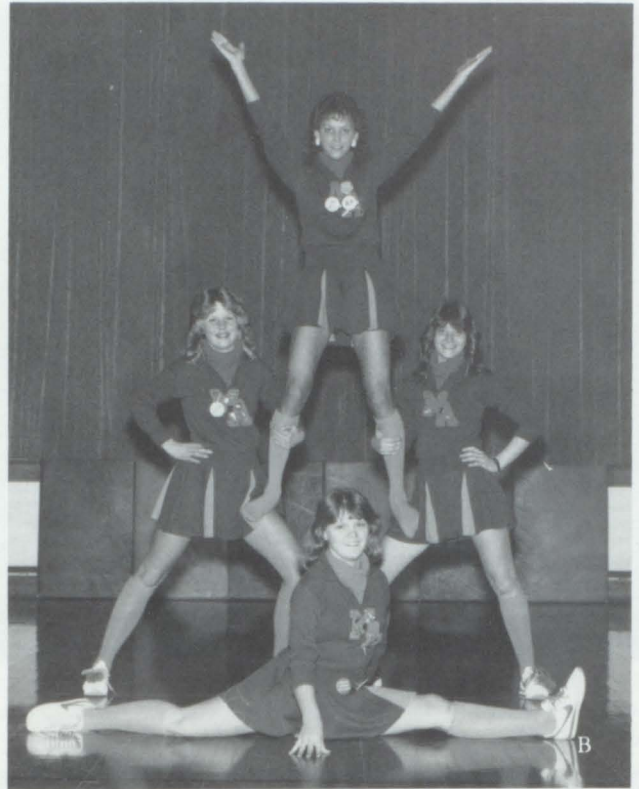

My Turn: An Editor's Parting Comments

Some people have asked me throughout the year what yearbook is all about. In this corner I'd like to describe just that.

First, we decide everything that should go into the book and plan what is called a ladder diagram. This tells where every activity will go in the book, and how many pages each activity will have.

After this, we take pictures and try to remember to get all of the events taken, which in itself is a major task and which doesn't always happen. After getting the film developed, we put the pictures into each activity's envelope. Then whoever works on that activity will have the pictures needed for a particular page. The person who completes any activity's page is usually pretty knowledgeable about what a particular activity is all about.

We start by first choosing the pictures we want to go on a page by looking for pictures with good contrast and a good story behind them. After this is done, we sometimes have twenty pictures chosen and sometimes only three or four!

Then, we do something called cropping. Cropping means taking a picture and cutting it down or blowing it up so that it will fit in a particular space. After this we position these cropped pictures on the page. We try to lay our pictures out in a brick pattern in which everything fits neatly together; this is called a mosaic style layout. The layout, by the way, is what we call putting everything together on a page.

After we get the pictures positioned on the page, we try to think of a headline that best describes the activity and what it has done that year. This is hard because a headline has to be a complete sentence and can't exceed a certain amount of words.

After the headline is the hardest part of doing layout. COPY!!! Copy means the captions that describe the pictures, and a paragraph or two about what the activity has done that year and what has made it part of the STMA spirit. This is difficult because we have to be imaginative and write something that is going to keep the reader interested enough to read all about each activity. It seems that our yearbook staff likes to put off writing copy until we have to practically threaten them, but I can understand this because I don't like to write copy either!!

It is a lot of hard work to make a layout turn out right and make it look great so that the people who look at it will think it's a pretty good book.

After the layout is done, Ms. Lytle or I looks it over to be sure the page is layed out in the correct form, that the copy is interesting and in correct form, and that everything looks like it will fit on the page. And then, we check to see that the copy is written correctly and that they have covered what should be covered for each activity.

Copy is painstakingly written by every yearbook staff member. We deliberate on how to say things and what to say. The old "who, when, where, why, how, and what" are the basics we go by. We also have rules that must be followed by every member in writing copy and doing layout. These are numerous and it usually takes a year in Yearbook before you understand every one of them.

I should also mention all the time and effort that goes into selling ads so that we can afford to keep the yearbook going. This takes a lot of after school hours and weekends. We also have to sell yearbooks to all the students and teachers who might want them. This is usually done during lunch and before school.

The yearbook is something that I do because I enjoy putting things together and seeing just how they come out, trying new things, and making sure that everything is given equal coverage. I loved working on the yearbook, and it was a lot of hard, busy work, but it gave me something constructive and interesting to do. Besides that, it was a challenge that gave pleasure to conquer it.

This year with a new advisor, Ms. Lytle, and I (a supposedly experienced editor) we did make a few mistakes, but we did okay. Yearbook is a lot of work, and to be on the staff takes dedication and devotion to this hard work. And, most importantly, staff members have to be willing to give up some Saturdays and Sundays to work on yearbook. This is especially difficult when we would rather be out in the sun in the spring running around and having fun!! But we have a few devoted staff members who have given up a great many of their Saturdays and Sundays just about every week. I would like to thank them, and also I would like to thank our even more devoted and dedicated advisor who put up with a lot of tedious work, and waited the staff through the storm of learning how to do the yearbook and do it right. She has put in many more hours than any of the staff has and has worked hard trying to do it right. And, she has put up with me and my trying to make everything just so. I would like to thank Ms. Lytle for everything she's done for the yearbook; without her we wouldn't have had a yearbook this year. She is one heck of an advisor.

If you are at all wondering just what goes into the making of a good yearbook, come to a yearbook meeting and join the staff. We are small, but we have one heck of a good time when we work together, and there is usually enough food to keep us going for a few hours. It may take a while to learn how to do the yearbook, but try. Take it from me-it is exciting and enjoyable. And memorable!!!!!!

If you ask yearbook members what the word "yearbook" means, they might say, "M&Ms, Doritos, and pizza," or that they gained 30 pounds, or that they went bankrupt **paying** for all those Doritos, M&Ms and pizza. But there's more to yearbook than just pigging out and its side effects. The staff meets every Saturday and some Sundays. Each member goes through stacks of pictures looking for just the right ones. These pictures must then be cropped. This can be very stressful because if they don't fit in the allotted space, you have to pretend they do and hope the yearbook doesn't come out with an entire team's heads cut off. The next step is to write copy. This is next to impossible because the copy must correspond with the pictures, the headline, **and** the activity; it also has to fit in a certain spot and can only have so many words. Members have been known to write copy as many as ten times to get it right. And then there are all those rules to remember: headlines **must** be complete sentences, a team picture cannot under any circumstances be dominant, and most important, each member must bring ½ dozen doughnuts to layout sessions. Yearbook is a year-long project. Most people would fold under such pressure, and not many stick it out, but those who do are the ones who really feel great when the yearbook finally comes out.
