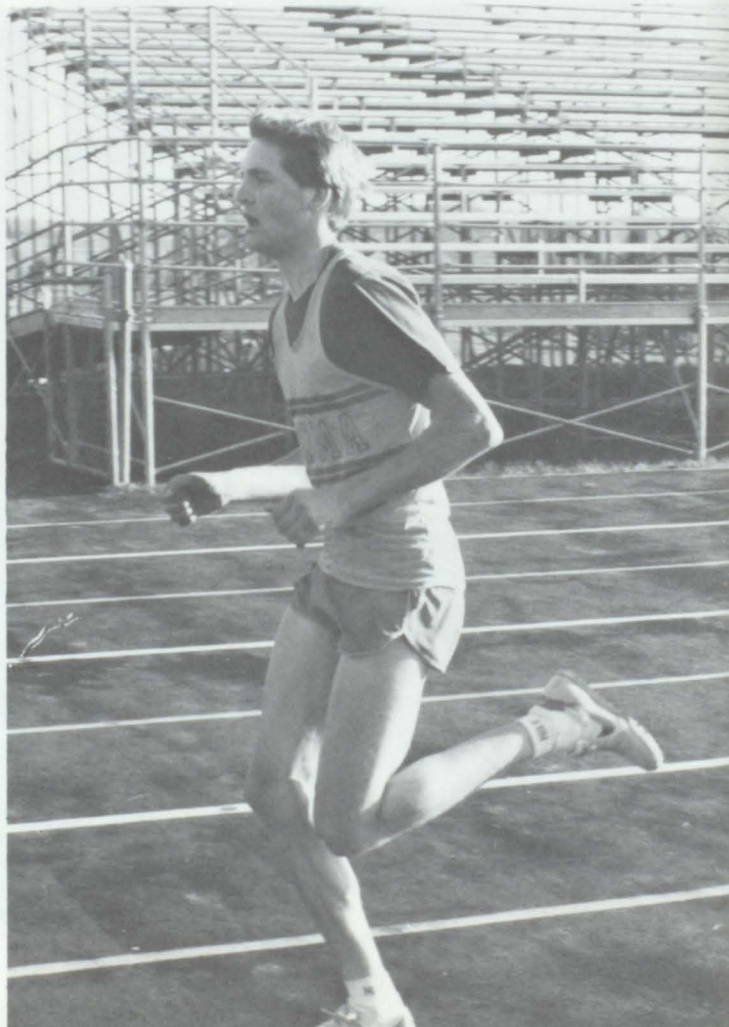

New indoor school records were set by the sprint medley team (Kerry, John, Bill, Pat) (3:57.3), Jeff Wood (55 m. high hurdles-8.2) and Pat in the 800 m. (2:04.3) who was also the season point leader.

It is the time to start thinking about what they will do after high school. PSAT tests are taken as well as a survey of interests to aid in that area.

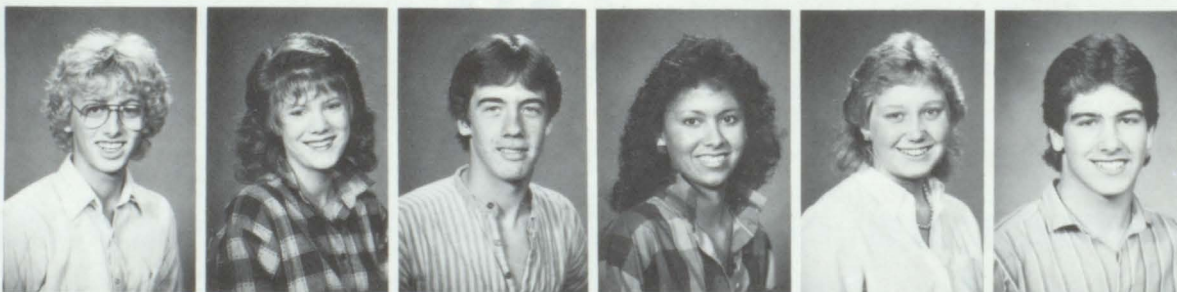
Constantly lurking at the back of their minds is the goal of being a senior and ultimately graduating.

The ultimate goal of every high school athlete is to qualify for the state competition in his or her sport. There are 387 Class A schools in Minnesota. When an individual or team qualifies, you know they are among the best. This Fall, STMA had qualifiers in 2 out of 4 sports.

In his 6-year x-country career, Francis Robeck represented Region 5A, District 17A and his school, in 3 state meets (1982, 1983, 1985). Francis was one of 40 to qualify out of 115 schools competing in the sport. 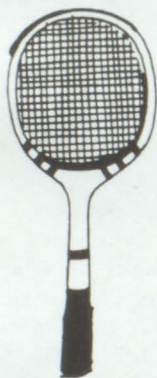
The girls also can be praised for their competitive spirit and devotion throughout the long practices and difficult season.

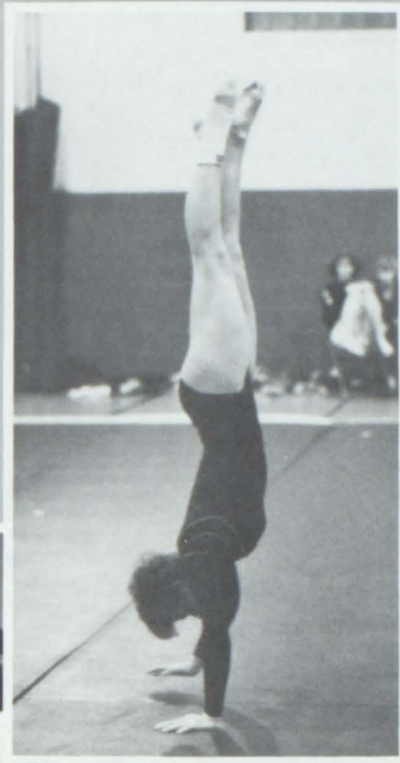

And win they did by placing first at the Subregion and STMA Invitational. In a close match, STMA lost to Rockford at the Subregion Dual.

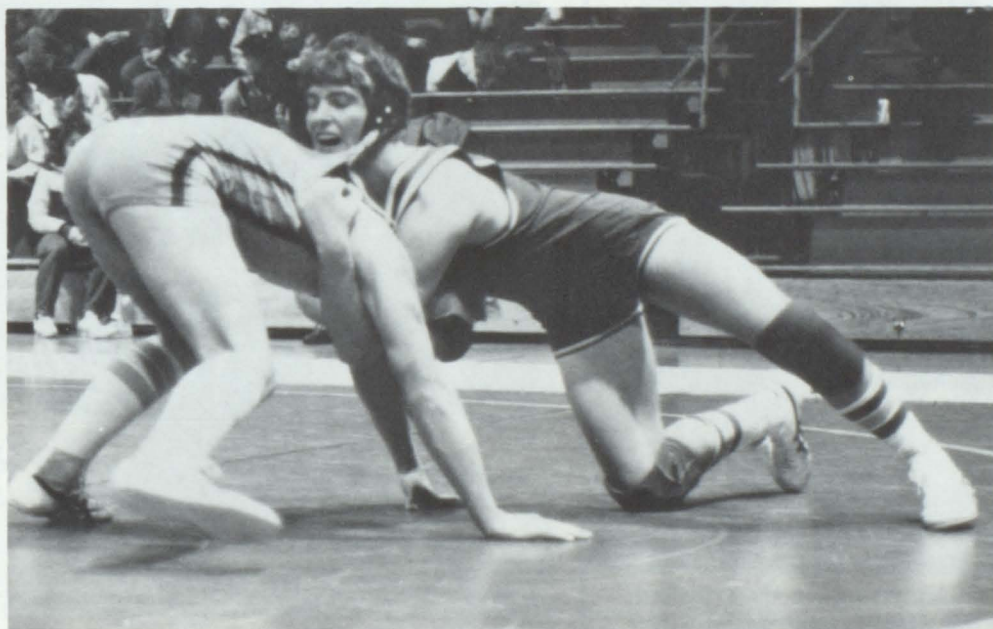

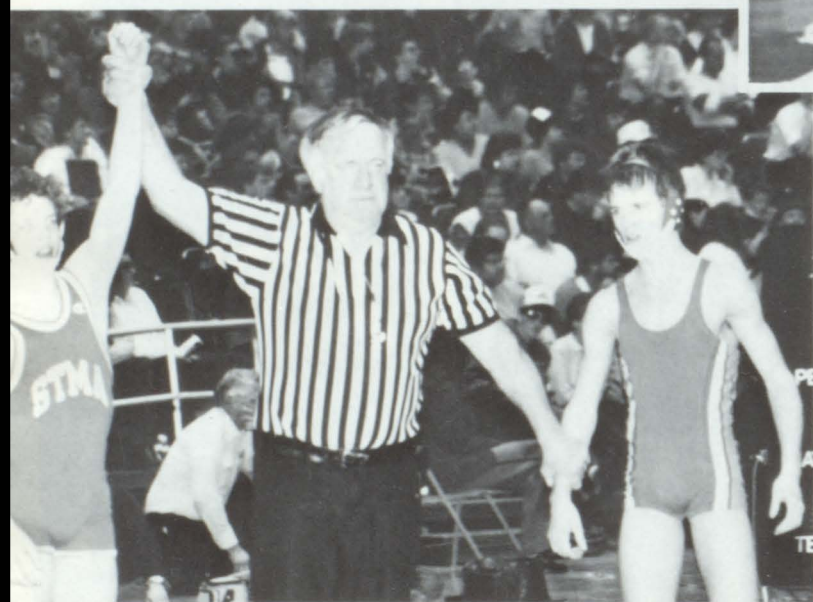

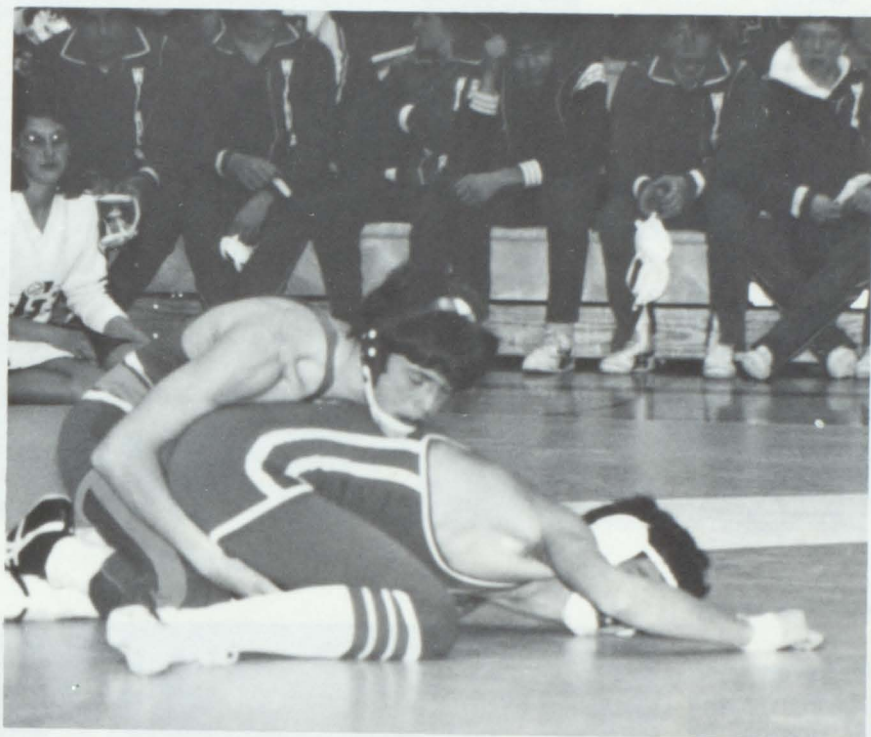

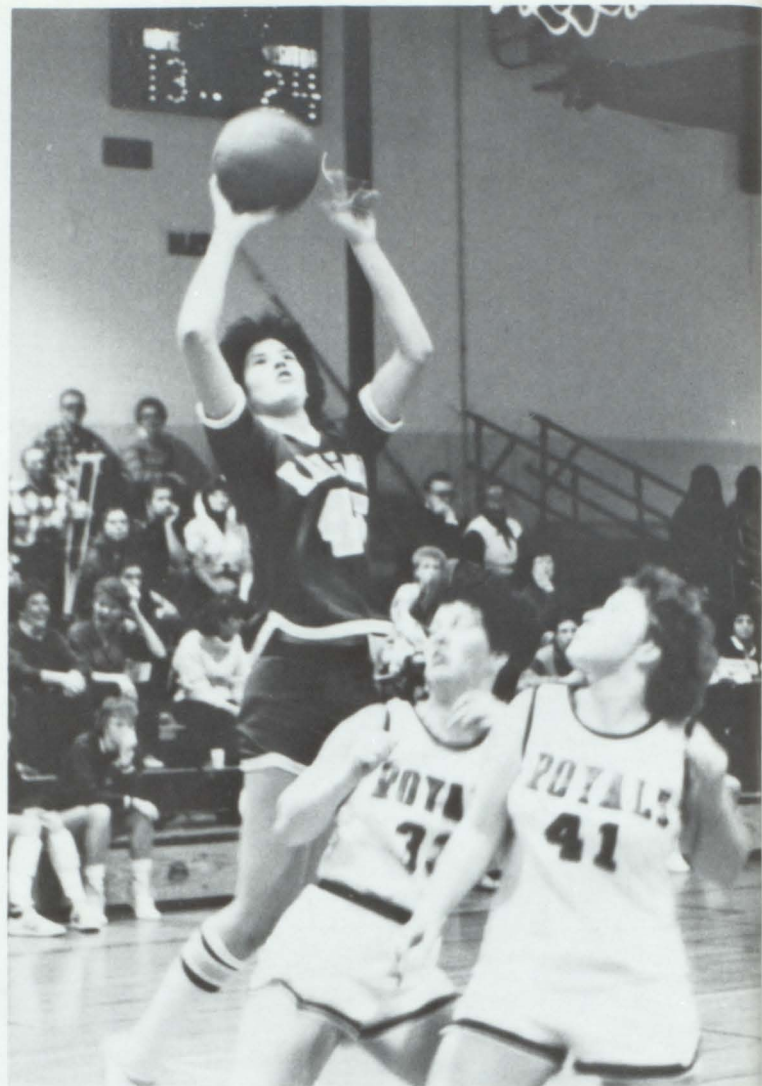
