



DEDICATION



Born and raised in the Iron Range town of Chisholm, Mr. Kealy left his home in 1950, when he accepted a teaching job in Mahtomedi. After four months, he entered the military service, where he spent the next four years. In 1954, it was back to college for a short time before accepting a teaching position in Morton. After two years, he moved on to Dassel (before it consolidated with Cokato). Monticello was the Kealys' next stop. After teaching for five years there, Mr. Kealy decided to take a break from the classroom and worked for a year as a salesman. Missing the school atmosphere, in 1966, he accepted a position in the parochial school in St. Michael. Little did he know that he would remain for the next twenty years.

Along with an extensive teaching career, Mr. Kealy has coached just about every boy's sport (his favorite being football!), acted as athletic director in several school districts, and spent the last six years as activities director for our district.

We here at STMA have known Mr. Kealy as a teacher, activities director and friend. He dedicated more than thirty years of his life to the education of youth. Although small, in comparison to all of the years he gave to us, we would like to dedicate our time and energies to the memories that we have of him. "Thank you, Mr. Kealy, for the years of your life that you have shared with us!"





The National Honor Society was established in 1921, to recognize excellence outside of athletics. It is a national organization which acknowledges and fosters academic achievements, while developing other characteristics essential to citizens in a democracy. It has a reputation for excellence among school administrators, faculty, students, parents and residents of the school

High schools desiring a charter in the NHS, must apply and be accepted. Schools in the NHS have a responsibility to uphold the national requirements as well as establishing their own by-

laws, including criteria for evaluation and acceptance.

Membership at STMA is open to sophomores, juniors, and seniors, each Spring, who have attended school for the equivalent of one semester and have a cummulative scholastic average of 3.0 (B). All students who meet the scholastic requirement are notified and asked to inform the school of their intentions to be considered a candidate for acceptance. They are then evaluated by the entire faculty on the basis of leadership, service, and character. The final selection is done by a committee of teachers called the Faculty Council.

Once selected, students must maintain these standards. Membership is an honor as well as an obligation. For seniors, the opportunity is available to be nominated and compete in the NHS


Scholarship Awards Program, which annually provides numerous scholarships.

Here at STMA, the NHS plans and carrys out various school and community activities. Meeting on a regular basis, they not only plan, but also discuss any problems which may arise

with student activities, and act as a student government.

While the NHS may not be for everyone, it is a concrete way to promote high academic standards, a means of ensuring the continuation of democracy in our country, and an instrument for the betterment of the individual and school.


Dateline: 1984 Winterfest



Marching Knights









The 9th graders also improved greatly throughout the season due to the superior coaching of Mr. Oliphant.





STMA will lose 7 seniors but should return a semi-experienced


