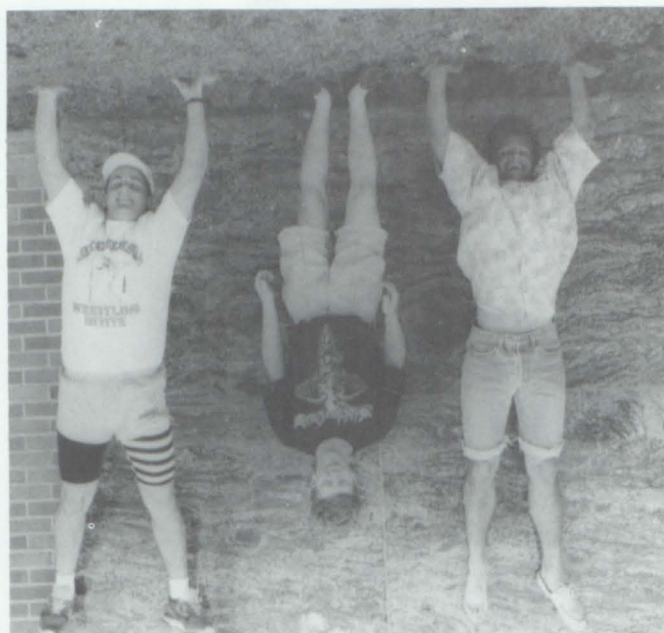
Class Of 90's Special Memories

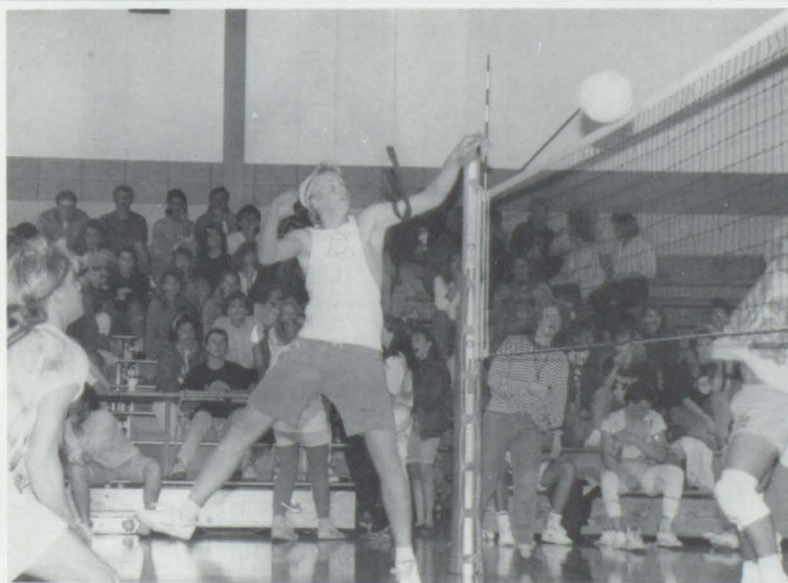

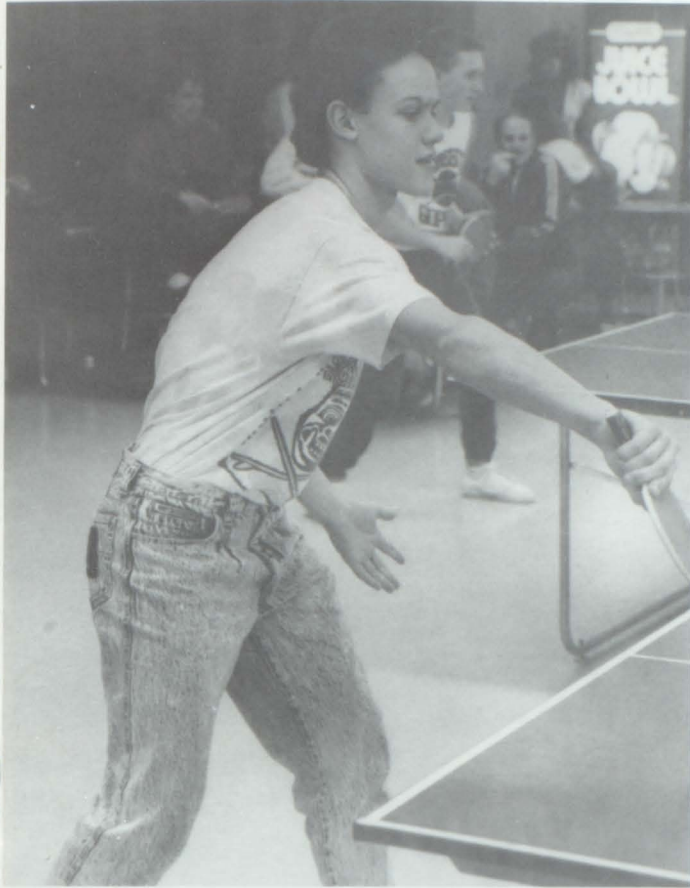






Winterfest

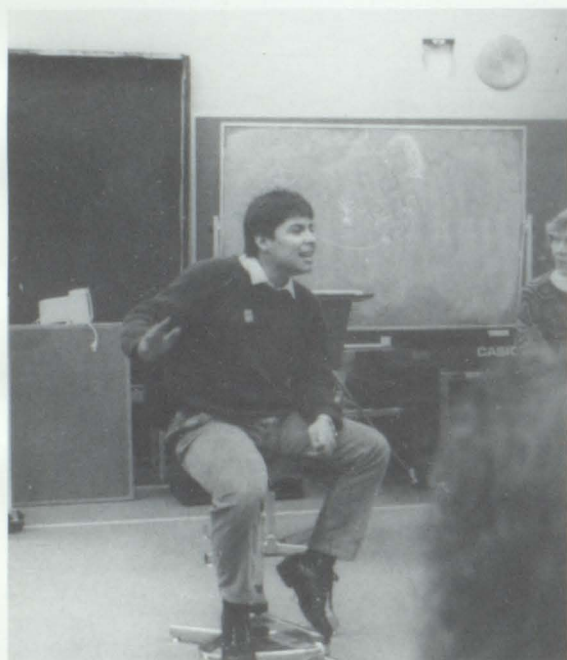

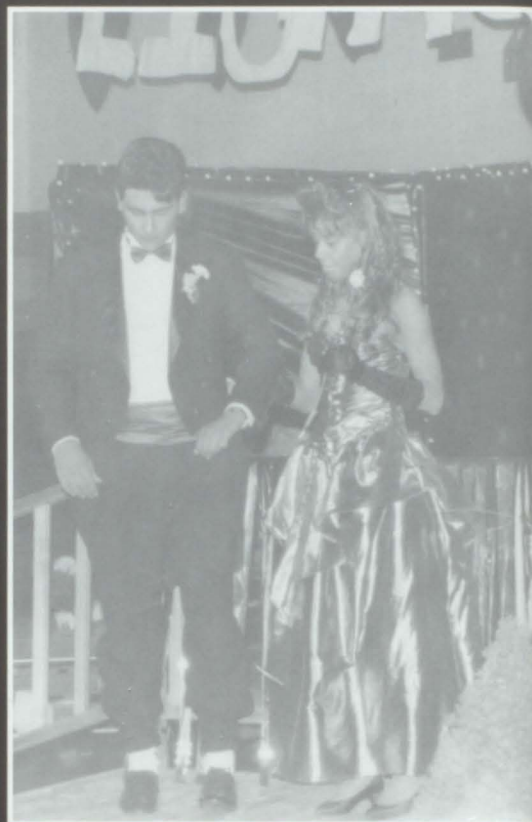

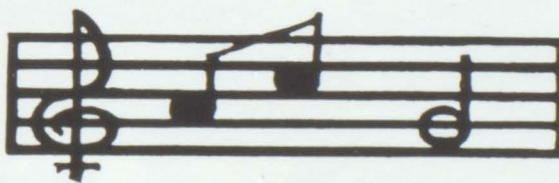

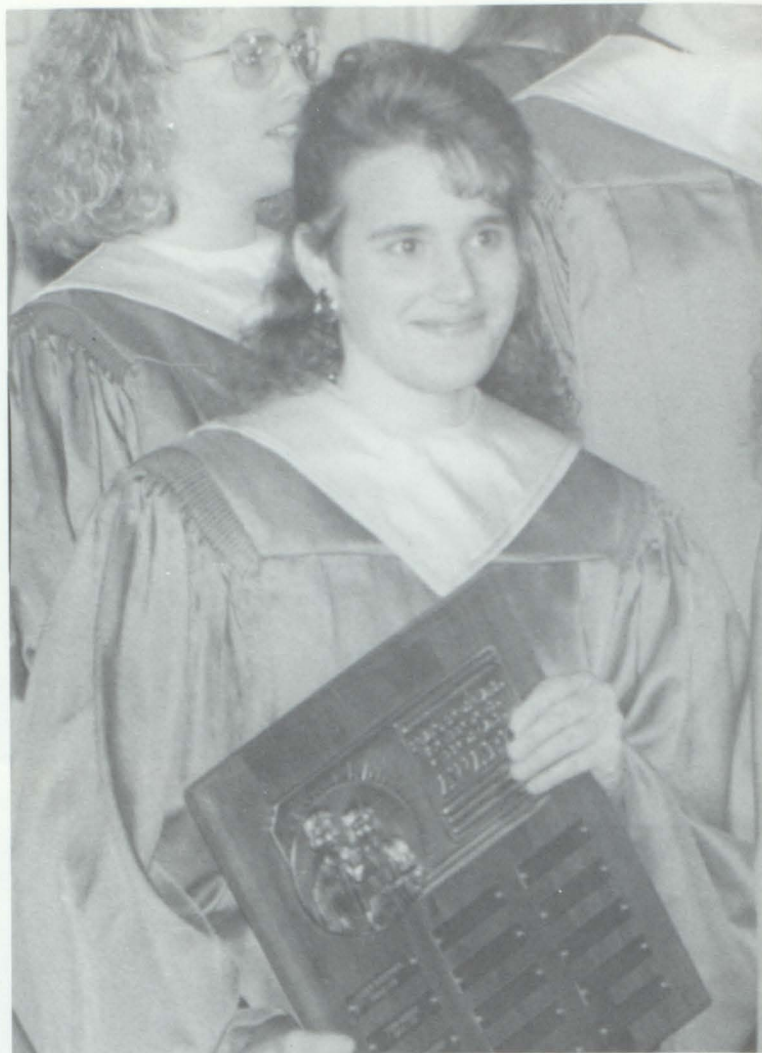


Choir

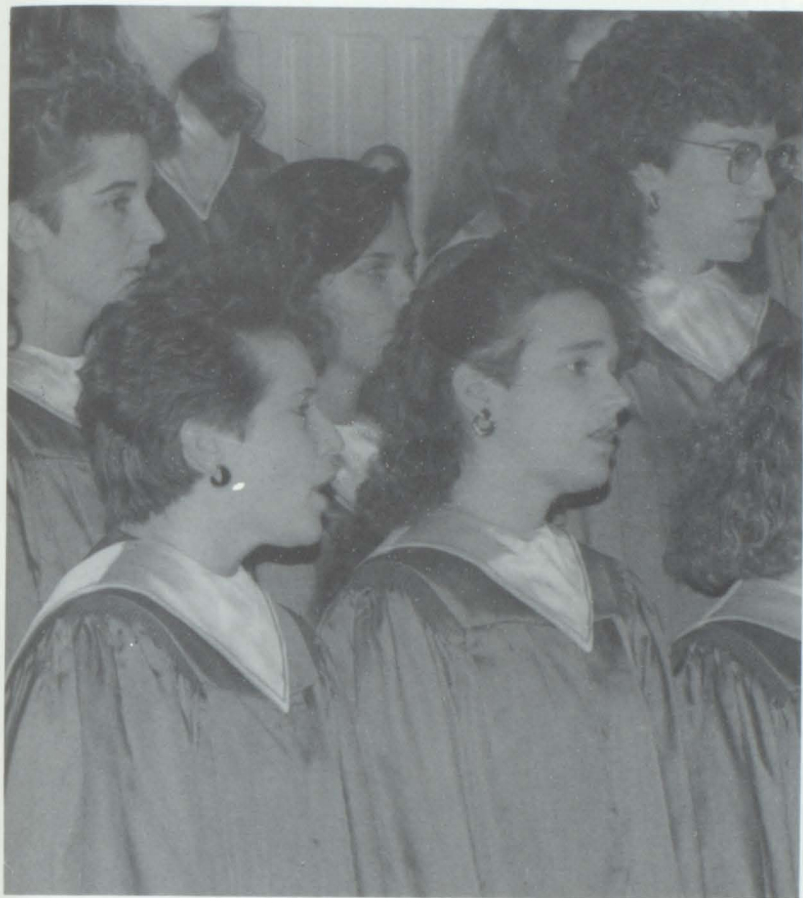

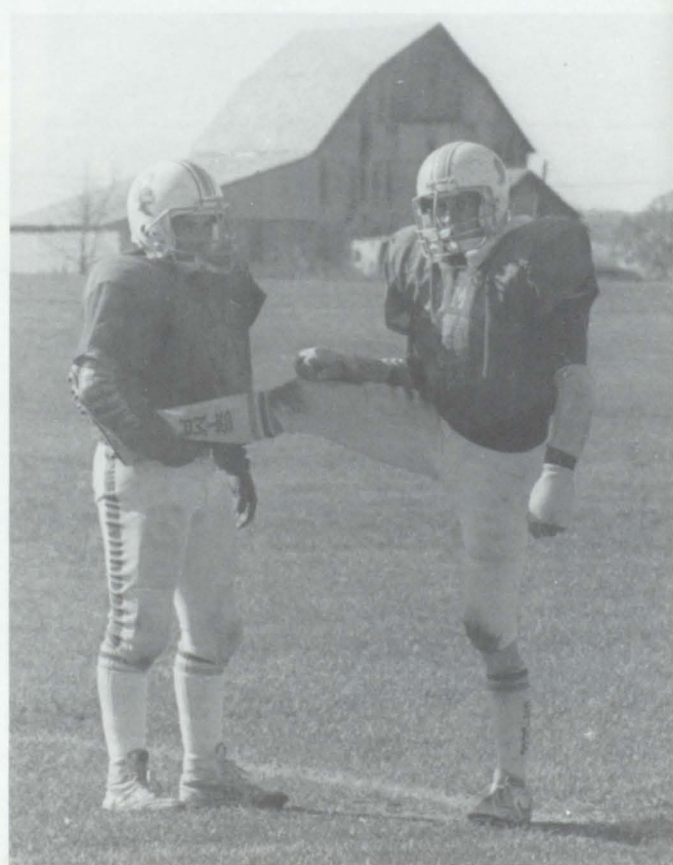
"Good Things Happened"

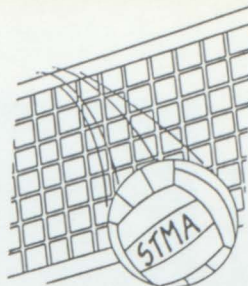

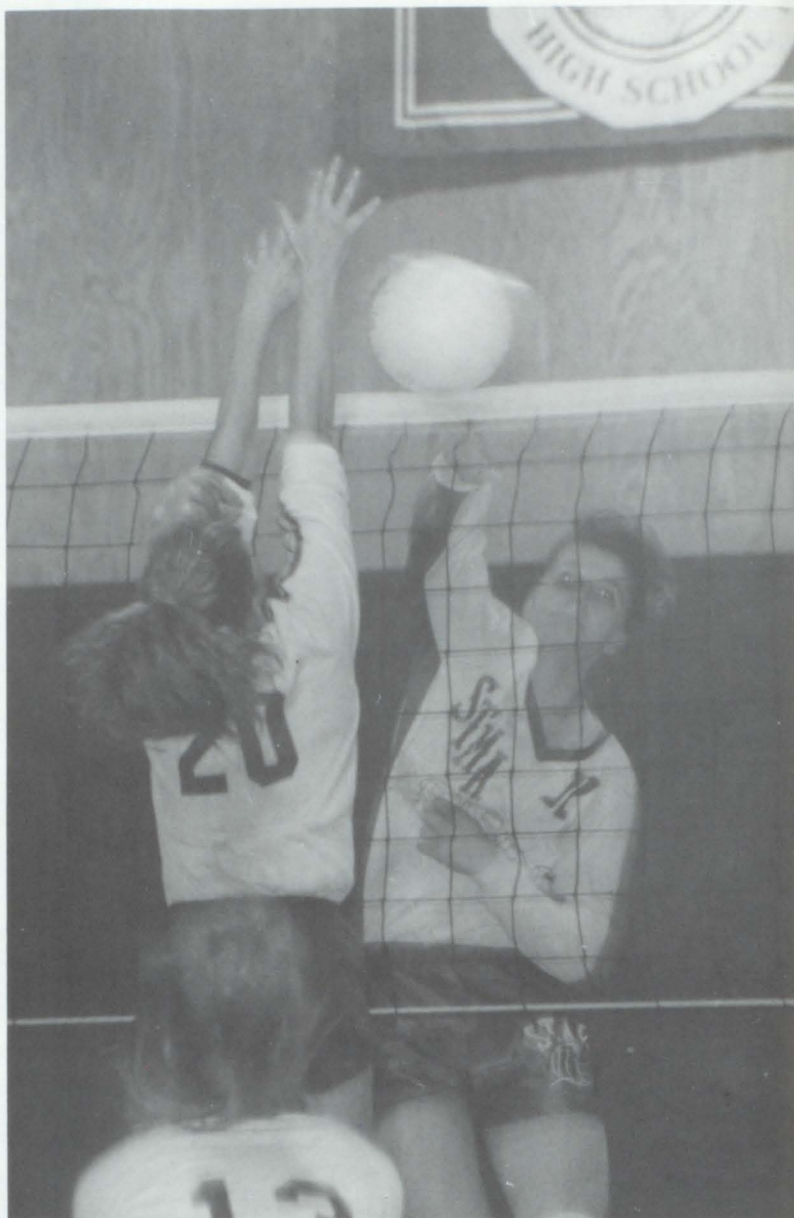
Winning Tradition Continues Under New Head Coach

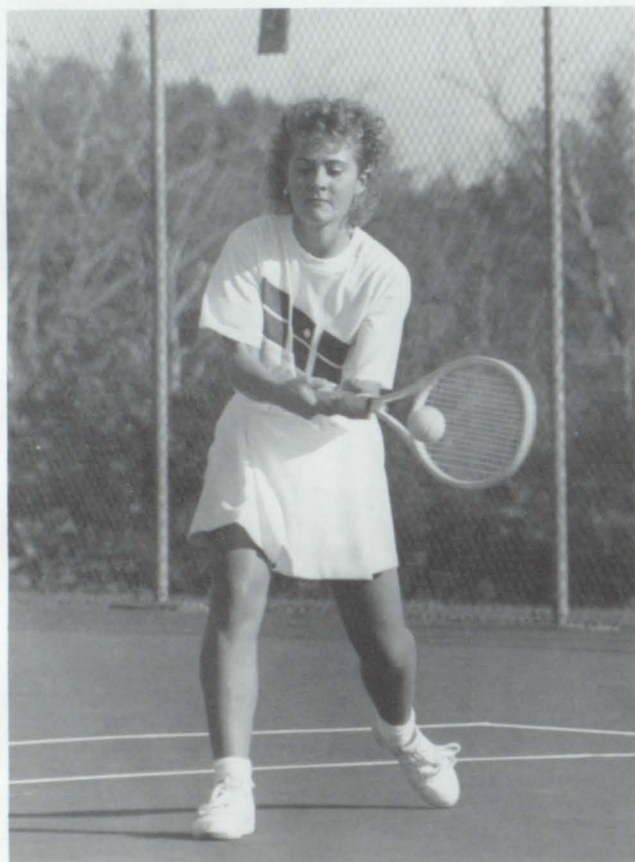

The Knights ended their season with a dual meet record of 14-3-0, were Wright County Conference Champions for the fourth year in a row and were the sub-region champs for the fourth year.

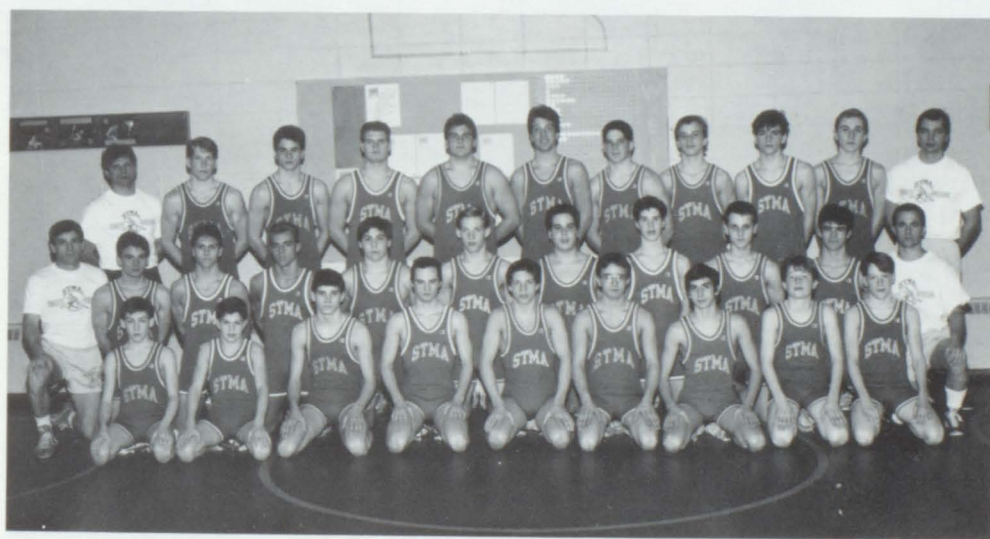
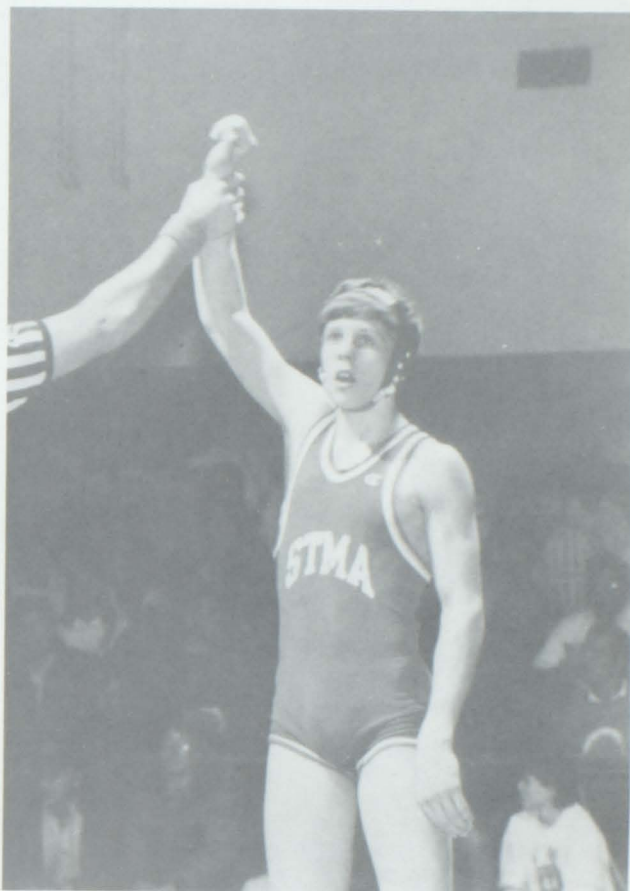
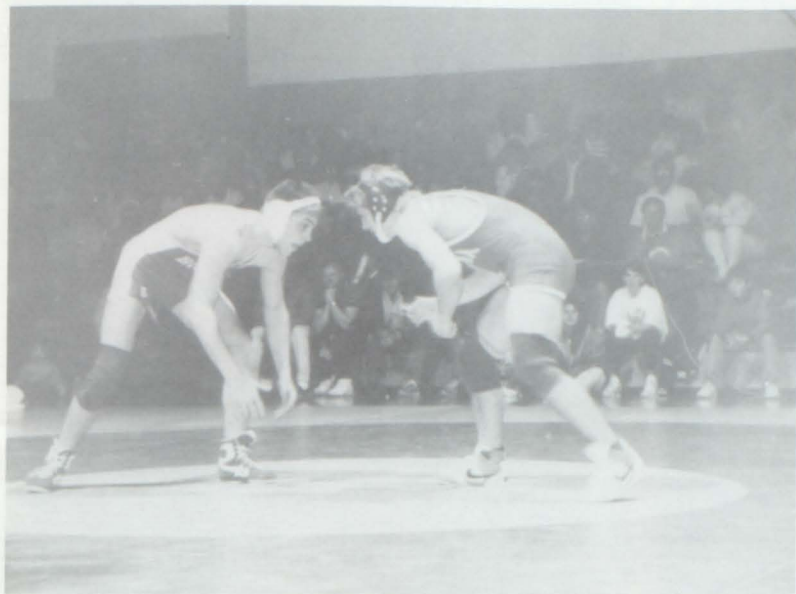

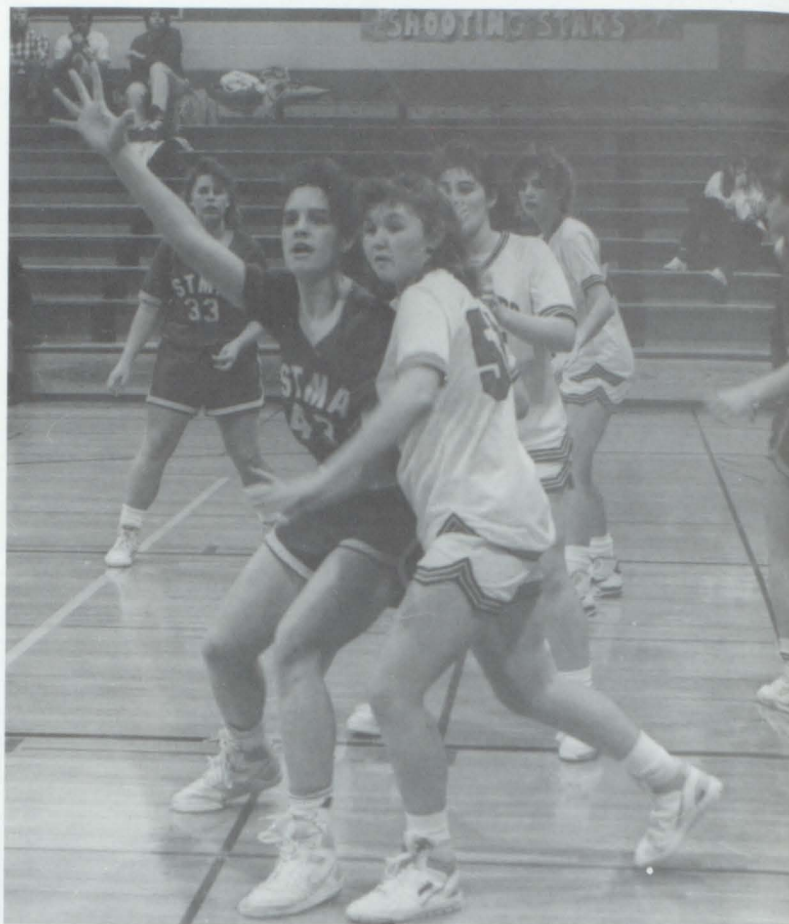

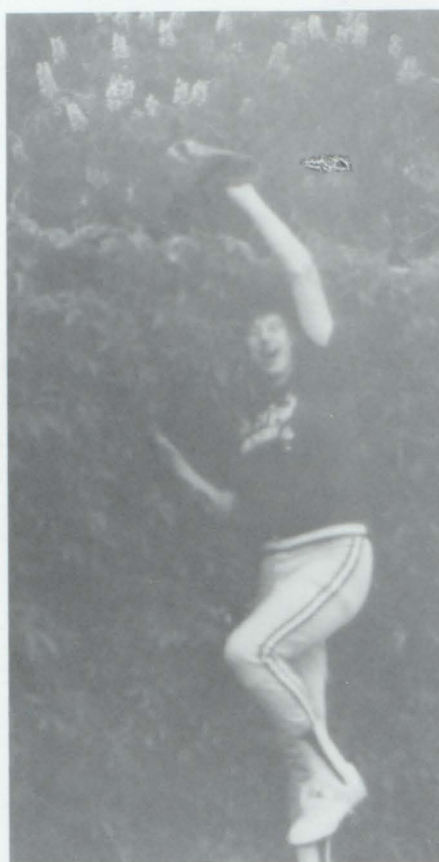

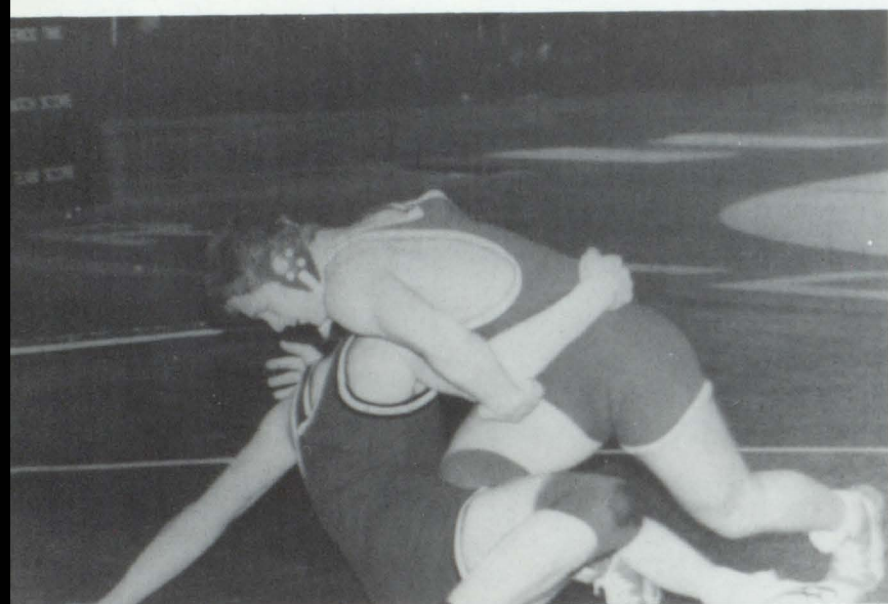
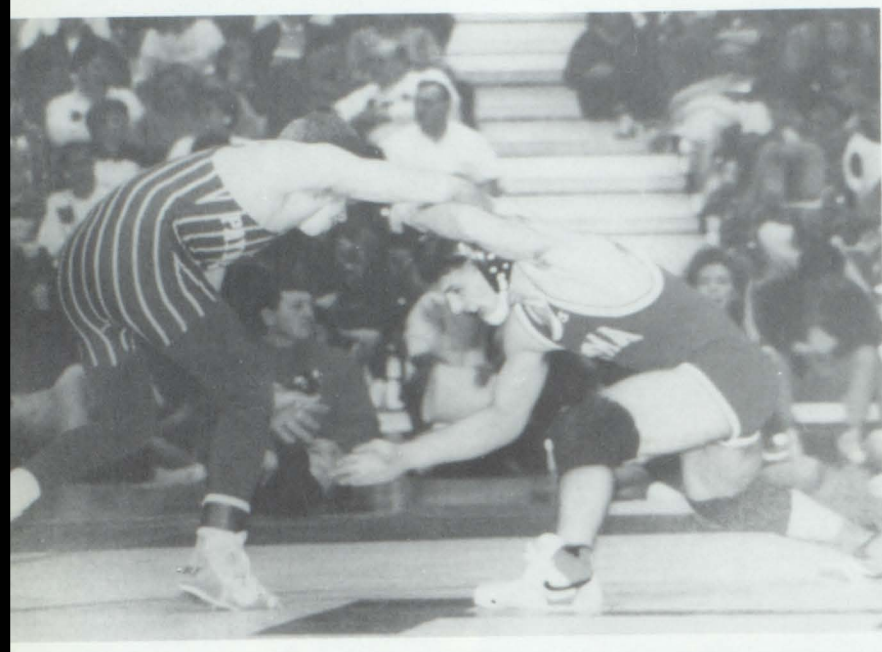

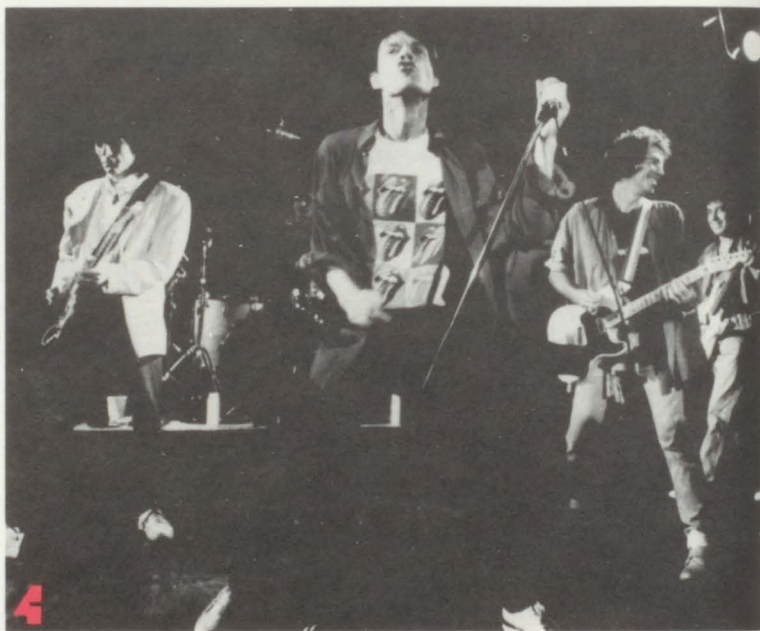
