



4 Madonna dominated the media promoting a movie, a book and an album. The Material Girl managed a record \$60 million deal with Time Warner to form her own multimedia company.

New Building Dedication













tournament, beating Becker. They lost to Sartell in the second round of that tournament. This was the most success they've seen in post-season play.




Team advances to the state tournament





Junior Joe Seifert set two new records for the indoor high jump (6'2 3/4") and the outdoor high jump (6'2").




It has been said that when playoffs start, it's the beginning of a brand new season. It doesn't really matter how you've done previously, it's what you do now that counts. The Knights were no exception- in what can be considered a disappointing regular season (6-12), the team put together an amazing play-off series, winning six straight games and getting a berth in the state tournament. (More on the road to state on page 104.)

The team's year began quite ordinary, never having a long string of losses or wins. After six games they were 3-3. Then came two big losses to Mound Westonka and Annandale, but they came back winning three of their next four. But the Knights did not have much pitching depth and had a six game losing skid at the end of the season, giving them a losing season, including a 2-6 conference record.

Despite the win/loss record of the regular season, several individual school records were set. Myles Marquette had the most at bats (88), Rod Litzau had the most hits batting (32), the most complete games pitching (8) and Rod also threw a no-hitter against Dassel-Cokato. Rod's outstanding year on the field, gave him All-Conference honors and honorable mentions in the All-Metro and All-State selections. Senior Jeremy Paulsen and Junior Tom Wines received honorable mention for the WCC team. Jeremy had the most putouts for the Knights (130) at first base. Rod Litzau also was honored with the John Wilkens MVP award. The winner of the Dave Lenz Top Defensive Player award was Myles Marquette, while Mike Cassidy won the coveted Roger Ketel Team Spirit Award.






They wrestled Badger/Greenbush/Middle River for fifth place, but lost 22-35, giving them a sixth place finish.

Forgetting what happened in the past, the Knights beat the Cardinals in two straight, giving them the Sub-section 5A Championship. The Knights first round game was against Delano and they defeated the Tigers 7-4 pitting them against St. Cloud Cathedral (who defeated Dassel-Cokato) for the right to the state tournament. The Knights played tough and held on to win 10-8. Even after winning six games, we only had an even win/loss record. St. Cloud was again the sight for the Class A tournament and STMA had to face the perennial tough team, Greenway/Coleraine. After five good innings, the Knights weakened and lost 3-11. They met Sibley East the next day in the first round of consolation play and it was the same story; playing tough for five innings and then faltering, losing 3-10.
