

















The Library/Media Resource Center is vital for students doing research. Pat Stenglein and Jan Peterson keep track of all these resources and help students find the information they need.




A common happening in the musical was group action with songs and dances. Student choreographer Angie Johnson (12) organized the dancing throughout the score which involved time and hard work for everyone.





















speech team entered a different, larger section for the '99-'00 season, creating more competition. Head speech coach Mr. Frickstad spent evenings after school preparing the team, and Saturdays accompanying them to meets. To prepare for speech, students must pick the category they wish to compete in. Categories range from Creative Expression, where they write their own speeches, to Discussion, where by good arguments and persuasion they earn points. Other categories include: Dramatic Duo, Poetry, Prose, Exempt Reading, Story Telling, Drama, Humorous, and Exempt Speaking. This wide range of categories allows students to determine what area of speaking suits them best. In competition, students go against people from other schools in three rounds. There are about seven people (or

speeches in) in each round. According to the number of people in a group, they receive a rating of one (the best) through five (lowest). After three rounds, the top seven speakers with the lowest total enter the final round, and then finally receive first through seventh place. So, as individuals, speakers can recieve awards as well as the team. Many students put lots of effort into their speeches. On an average they usually last about eight minutes. Although they are not required to memorize them, they usually do. Most speakers practice with Mr. Frickstad after school on the weekdays. Saturdays, they wake up at about 6:30 to spend their entire day at a speech meet. Later in the season, speakers have a chace to go to subsections and then to state. All of the effort is worthwhile and the chance to express themselves makes memories for them all.

teenage pregnancy prevention program


