





REBUILDING...BLOCK BY BLOCK

This year students had to adjust to many new changes. The biggest change was eighty minutes per class. This allows teachers time for more in-depth projects, and to give students more time! Although blocks were used in the past at STMA, they were limited to certain classes and had five minute breaks in the middle.

Along with block scheduling, many new classes are being offered

this year. Some of the most obvious new classes are French; students now have two choices for a second language, the Learning Lab; which helps this year's Juniors, Sophomores, and Freshmen pass the Minnesota Basic Standards tests they need to graduate, and Class 2002. This class is specifically for the Freshmen to help them develop study and research skills. They also take typing and are taught by

different teachers from various subject areas. Other new classes include Algebra 1.5, Career Investigations, Weird Science, Women's Studies, Discrete Math, and Literature Through War.

Changes at school also include a Wright County Deputy's presence and parking permits. Both teachers and students are now required to park in the appropriate lot and display their permits.












JUNIORS


This year STMA kept up the holiday spirit. Student Council once again held the elf-auction where seniors were sold to friends and foes to be


REJOICING SNOW DAYJ




BUSINESS AND COMPUTERS


The Business and Computers department offers many classes to the students at STMA. The computer classes include Computer Applications One through Four. This offers students the

but also Accounting and Marketing and Sales. Students benefit from these classes through their ability to work in the business world.







FOREIGN LANGUAGE




The growing population of the student body is bringing more and more musically talented students to STMA. This year the program was as strong as ever with a total




SCIENCE

everything about it. Also, it teaches good problem solving skills that allow each student to try and test many theories throughout life. Physical Science, Biology, Chemistry,


Physics, Environmental Science, and Anatomy and Physiology are the science classes offered this year. Life is much more complicated if science isn't a part of it.

















THE SOUND OF MUSIC





THE ONE ACT








RETURNING TO VICTORY BOYS CROSS COUNTRY




BLOCKING THE OPPONENT FOOTBALL


















