The Art in the Christian Tradition (ACT) database is a regularly updated visual image internet resource. Designed for scholars, students, pastors, and religious educators, all of the images may be used for non-commercial purposes, with attribution.

High-resolution access to over 50,000 images from the collection at the Art Institute, all made available under the Creative Commons Zero license, which allows free use of the images without copyright. Easy to use search tool for access.

Artstor Public Collections: <https://www.jstor.org/site/artstor/>

Images, documents, audio, and video files made open access for use by the public from JSTOR institutions. Organized by type.

Artvee: <https://artvee.com/>

Browse and download high-resolution, public domain artworks.

Includes over 1,500 high-resolution public domain digital images of works of art in the Barnes Foundation's collections that are available for free download and use.
