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Capital Project 2022 December 15, 2020 Referendum

Back in 2014 a large group of stakeholders came together to examine the district's infrastructure in order to put together a timeline for capital project improvements. The stakeholder group included community members, teachers, support staff, students, administrators, board members, and architects. This group's work has been integral to the improvements in the district and are the roots of **Capital Project 2022.**

Capital Project 2022 continues with the district's vision to improve the health and safety of district buildings and grounds while also enhancing the learning experiences for students and the community.

The project is divided into two propositions:

Proposition 1

Proposition 1 addresses deficiencies at Eden Elementary, the Middle/ High School, the Bus Garage and the CoGen plant.

The Elementary School is slated for new windows, updates to the exterior masonry, parking lot repairs and continuation of sidewalk replacement. In addition, renovations to classrooms and the Music rooms are part of this proposition.

The Middle/High School auditorium will benefit from new sound and light systems, a much needed remodeling of the Nurse's office and new air handling units in the cafeteria.

The bus garage is slated for a new roof.

A critical component of the project is the repurposing of the Co-gen plant. The work in this area includes putting the Middle/High School on the regular electrical grid. This is critically important as the grid will provide the consistent electrical power that is needed in that building. This is also a continuation of work that was done previously when the Elementary and GLP were transferred over to the electrical grid.

Once this work is completed, the Co-Gen Building will be modified for much needed buildings and grounds storage.

Proposition 1 will be for a maximum of \$12,596,132, and is considered a tax neutral proposition. This means that no additional tax burden will be needed to fund the project. The district, through proper fiscal management and the use of the \$3.3 million in Capital Reserve funds, would be able to complete the work outlined at no additional taxpayer expense.

Proposition 2

Proposition 2 continues the emphasis on health, safety and community use and impacts all of the district's buildings.

Eden Elementary School: improvements in the Library lighting system, main office renovations and installation of exterior LED lighting top the list of needed work. The Elementary tennis courts are due for a new surface as well.

Grover L. Priess: installation of exterior LED lighting, door replacements and HVAC work.

Middle/High School: Library renovations, installation of exterior LED lighting, tennis court relocation and replacement, and additions to the rear parking lot.

Bus Garage: exterior LED lighting.

Proposition 2 will be for a maximum of \$3,283,990. This would result in a tax increase of \$13 per \$100,000 of assessed value.

Eden community members will have the opportunity to vote on Capital Project 2022 on Tuesday, December 15, 2020 from 9 am – 9 pm in the Middle & High School Auditorium Foyer.

It is important to note that Proposition 2 can only pass if Proposition 1 passes.

The community is invited to either of two public meetings that will be held prior to the vote: Wednesday, November 18, 2020 at 6 pm and Wednesday, December 9, 2020 at 6 pm, both in the Eden Elementary School Auditorium. If approved, the estimated start of the project would be February 2022 with a completion in December 2024.

The 2020-2021 school year is off to a great start, and Eden Middle School is ready to begin this year's Reading Raiders program. The Reading Raiders program was started in 2018, when Mrs. Doctor, English teacher, thought it would be a great idea to unify us as a middle school while also emphasizing the importance of reading for pleasure across all core classes.

Each week, a ½ hour of reading is incorporated into the core classes on a rotation schedule. <u>Teaching and Learning Through the Hybrid Model at the PreK-5 Elementary Levels</u> <u>"highs and lows"</u>

Highs:

- Daily Zooms available to set the tone for the day and an opportunity for sharing, asking questions for the day's work, social-emotional check ins, etc.
- Grade level collaboration with consistent planning and programming. This allows for students and families to network and partner/support each other.
- Varied and flexible models that support all types of family/at-home environments to access student learning.
- Students are very successful in safety protocols.
- Most intensive needs are being supported daily.
- Telepractice has been successful.
- Creating as normal and positive, fun environment as possible; ie- Halloween celebrations-COVID safe, Red Ribbon Week, Fire Safety Week, School Resource Officer Visits, IRLA Awards.
- Continuation of Character Education program and Social Emotional Learning program with School Counselor and Social Worker.

Lows:

- Remote work difficult for some families to complete.
- Technology still a work in progress.
- Not all school programs, especially the one that have included families and community, can happen this year.

Eden Middle and High School Teaching and learning through the hybrid model "highs and lows"

Hybrid Model

Highs:

- Students are connected in ways, like never before, to teachers, technology and curriculum.
- Online ability to access lessons, zooms recordings, and other asynchronous materials. This has never really been available before.
- Allowed building social distance safely while affording students normalcy when coming to school.
- Allowed teachers to continue instruction, be it Synchronous or Asynchronous, & curriculum in a more normal pace.
- Forced us to fine tune and problem solve Technology.
- Teachers collaborate much more regularly within PLCs & Departments.
- Share ideas about what technology is working & how to adjust within the technology to work more effectively.
- Google Classroom- stream vs classwork, To Do list.
- Share ideas about content & pacing.
- Share information about student needs & what is effective with lower performing students.
- Huge increase in collegiality.
- A feeling of rhythm within the staff that what we are doing is working effectively & safely.
- Allows us to have limited extracurricular activities (some sports & tractor day) for more normalcy for students.
- <u>Incredible feedback</u> from full remote students & parents how effective instruction has been for them.
- Openness by staff to adjust to the new normal of teaching.
- Communication by staff with students & parents has been a strength based on parent feedback.
- Much lower amount of discipline issues.

Lows:

- Mental health issues (depression) by small percentage of students.
- Stress & anxiety caused by new way of learning.
- Amount of work seems sometimes overwhelming to students.
- Easy for students to disengage.
- Educational gaps.
- Reduced instructional pace.
- Small percentage of students still becoming disengaged.
- Teacher stress.
- Feel the necessity to teach same pacing & amount of activities- do not want to let students down.
- Challenge to only teach to the power standards & core curriculum.
- Difficult to "shut down" with the virtual clock.
- Lower performance by student body as a whole.
- Consistent with all other High Schools in Erie County.
- Postponed sports activities.
- Volleyball, chopper club, Cheerleading, Football, Homecoming, Dances, etc.

NOTICE TO ALL SENIORS AND THEIR PARENTS:

Scholarships for Academic Excellence will be awarded to four seniors at Eden High School pending appropriation of State funds. Eden qualifies for one scholarship at \$1,500 and three scholarships at \$500 each. These awards are renewable for up to four academic years of undergraduate study.

The eligibility requirements include:

- 1. Each scholarship recipient must graduate from a New York State high school by the end of the 2020-2021 school year.
- 2. Each scholarship recipient must be a legal resident of New York State for at least one year prior to September 30, 2020.
- 3. In order to use the benefits of this scholarship the recipient must be in attendance as a full-time matriculated student at an approved New York State post-secondary institution by the fall 2021 semester. **Students who enroll in an out-of-state institution in Fall 2021 are not eligible and must forfeit the award**.

The selection criteria that will be used must be in accordance with the following State requirements: The high school shall select their nominees by computing a weighted average of the scores on the Regents examinations taken prior to the students' senior year in the subjects listed below.

The weighting of the scores shall be:

English Language Arts - weight of three
Algebra II - weight of three
Global Studies - weight of one
US History & Government - weight of one
Any 3 Science courses - weight of one for each course

Counselors will contact qualified candidates no later than November 15, 2020.

Important Reminders from the Transportation Department

Eden Central adheres to the following guidelines when dropping students off in the afternoon:

Pre-K - 2nd Grade: The driver must see a parent, guardian, babysitter, or highschool age sibling before dropping off.

Grades 3 and 4: The driver must have reasonable assurance that someone is home for the student.

Grades 5 – 12: There are no drop-off limitations, except at the request of a parent.

Pesticides

Education Law Section 409-H, requires schools to provide written notification to all persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff regarding the potential of use pesticides throughout periodically the school year. Written notification must be provided at the following intervals throughout the school year: at the beginning of the school year; within two school days of the end of winter recess; within two school days of the end of spring recess; and within ten days of the end of the school year.
