

Take a Look at the GLP MakerSpace

GLP MAKERSPACE VISION STATEMENT: The GLP MakerSpace will provide opportunities for the next generation of thinkers to collaboratively explore, create, and problem-solve through meaningful play.

The first thing people say when I talk about the MakerSpace Room is; "What is a MakerSpace?" A Makerspace is based on STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math). It offers students opportunities to challenge themselves, to work in teams, alone or with partners. It develops communication skills, analytical reasoning, problem-solving skills, and perseverance. It is a hands-on learning space that offers activities and problems to solve, without explicit directions on how to solve them.



The GLP MakerSpace has several stations, including a Science/Math Station, a Technology/Coding Station, an Arts/Music Station, and an Engineering Station. Each station has an activity for a team of children to work. For example, the Engineering Station has a challenge to build a snow fort, using KEVA planks, large enough to hold two lego men, and with a working door. The Math/Science Station has a challenge to create the tallest ramp for a penguin to slide down, using tagboard strips, legos for a base, and a measuring tape. There are other permanent stations throughout the room including a 3-D Virtual Reality Station, a green screen Presentation Station, Peg Place Pegboard Station, a Lego Wall Station, and a Magna Tile Building Station. Some station activities will change every 4-6 weeks, giving classrooms the chance to visit as often as they would like throughout the school year.

If you ask my students to explain the MakerSpace, their responses are similar. "The MakerSpace is a place to have fun and learn at the same time." explains Penny

Ford. "In the MakerSpace, I learned to do challenging things, and if they didn't work, I tried them again." says Gemma Max. "A MakerSpace is to challenge kids' minds, like a hard thing that they've never done before." Natalie explains. The overall excitement of the Riester MakerSpace is apparent when talking to the students at the GLP. They are learning to solve problems, to try challenging tasks, and try them again if it doesn't work using their own creativity, out. They are while Science, simultaneously Math, Coding, learning Engineering processes, and Art/Music skills. But if you ask a child, they will say they are just having fun.

The MakerSpace Team has spent many, many months creating this space and planning activities. This couldn't have been accomplished without the support of the staff of GLP and the administration, along with community member support. The students began working in the



MakerSpace in January, and a Grand Opening for the public was February 13th. It is definitely one more reason that the GLP is a Great Little Place to learn.

Driver Education

Students must be 16 years of age AND have a valid learner's permit by June 22, 2020 to be eligible to participate.

Participation in Driver Education is a privilege. Inappropriate behavior will not be tolerated and could dismiss a student from participation. The program will begin July 1st, 2020 and run every day, Monday through Friday (except July 3rd), through July 24th. The cost of this course is \$450.00 and must be paid in full at the time of registration. There are no refunds. Selection to participate is done on a first come first serve basis by grade. Registration is as follows:

Open registration begins April 20th. Registration form and payment is due in full.

Students will be expected to meet the following requirements:

24 hours of classroom instruction

24 hours of road instruction

All students are required to provide their own transportation to and from the school. No pickups and/or drop-offs will be made at home.

Please note: Attendance doesn't ensure the certificate of completion. Each student must successfully complete the program, participate in class, complete all assignments and pass the tests. Students must attend ALL (16) lecture classes. This is a requirement of the DMV, the State Education Department and may NOT be waived by the school district. Being late over 10 minutes will count as an absence. There is no make-up time available.
