From the Superintendent

Dear Eden Families:



It is that time of year which we call "bittersweet". A time of goodbyes- to our students, faculty and staff for the summer, but most importantly, to our graduating seniors and our retiring faculty and staff. Most notable this year, are the parents to whom we will also say goodbye- because their youngest is graduating. Eden is a special place because of all of you, and we thank you for being a part of something special.

In this issue of the District Newsletter, you will see many accounts of that "something special" – P-Tech, the Arts, PTA, Diversity, FBLA, Amvets. Eden Central School District certainly has been busy making the difference in our town and local communities.

As the 2014-2015 school year draws to a close, it is important to take a moment to reflect on our own headlines- athletic championships, Kindergarten graduation, scholarship winners, musicals, tying our shoes, character awards, writing our first story, concerts, building a playground, reciting the Pledge of Allegiance...so much celebration! Take a moment to reflect. Celebrate with your children.

Onward.

This summer we will be busy moving forward on a few of our initiatives. One such project is planning the next phase of our proposed capital project- EDEN CSD 2020. Our goal is to put out a voter referendum for Tuesday, December 15, 2015. Mark the date on your calendars, and come out and vote.

It has been an intensive process beginning last summer with the hiring of Campus Construction Management Group, our construction manager, and Young & Wright, our architects. During the months of January through May, three (3) community/school committees, totaling approximately 100 participants, met to analyze information, discuss options and make recommendations. The research, time and commitment that these committees devoted to this project are invaluable and have made all the difference. The Facilities Advisory Committee then consolidated this information and presented a proposal to the Board of Education at the May 20th and June 3rd Board meetings.

To recap, the focus throughout has been both long and short term. Long-term to create a vision of what Eden Central School District could/should offer our students 10-15 years from now; short-term to break that vision down for this current project and the smaller capital projects that can be accomplished in the next 5,10 and 15 years. In other words, what do we focus on right now and what can wait 5 years or even 10-15 years. In addition, we agreed early on that our focus had to include improvements and repairs at all buildings- academic, health, safety, security, building conditions, and site, so as to impact all of our students PK-12. This was a huge list, in that Eden Central School District has not really engaged in a capital project in over ten years, and well over \$54 million worth of work was put on the table at some point during these discussions.

The first two decisions the Board addressed were "What to do with GLP?" and "Should we commit to a middle school model?" These were tough decisions that have been discussed for many years. While our enrollment is seeing a decline at the primary level, Eden Central




Contributing to AMVETS By Margaret Cuddihy

School District's current overall population is too large to close any one building. In addition, there is a strong belief (and hope) that the population of the Town of Eden will increase in the next 10-15 years- this has happened in the past. As a result of these two factors, the Board of Education approved a motion on March 18th to keep GLP open, educating our primary students, while using its space more efficiently. Their second topic, a middle school model, was also approved at the same meeting. Because of these decisions, the current Jr./Sr. High School will be renovated to house a Middle School (grades 6-8) and a High School (grades 9-12). This will not be a school within a school; rather, it will be two schools within one building- each with its own principal and each operating under a model appropriate to the age of the students.

Once these decisions were made, the challenge was to take the recommendation of the three committees and create a project that was affordable and matched our vision. Here is the exciting news- we did it! At the June Board of Education meeting, the Board agreed to move ahead in the next planning phase with a proposed \$20.1 million project. Proposition 1, with a preliminary \$12.25 million cap, would be tax neutral to our residents over the 15 year pay-back period. Proposition 2, with a preliminary \$9.9 million amount, would have an approximate tax impact of \$34 per \$100,000 assessed property value, before STAR. About 95% of the work proposed is eligible at a building aid ratio of around 78%, allowing us to do more with each dollar we spend. Please note that these are preliminary figures. Major impact work would include:

- •Secure entries for academic buildings •Renovation of cafeteria and auditorium spaces
- •Technology infrastructure upgrades

•Exterior masonry improvements

- •Mechanical, electrical and plumbing (MEP) improvements
- •Site improvements (outside work)
- •Moving District Offices to EES to create additional PE space at the MS/HS
- •Other interior upgrades (ceilings, classrooms, toilet rooms, main offices)
- •Athletic improvements- turf field, lights, concession stand, storage, handicap accessibility
- •Art, Music, Gymnasium and Technology room upgrades

I am so excited and proud to share this news with you since so many of you have been involved in the planning committees. Thank you for all your time and effort so far. Eden Central School District is fortunate to have you as part of our team.

Today, module work does not allow for that kind of collaboration or immersion. and unfortunately, the school climate is such that no one would be asked to bring a gun to school for a demonstration. Throughout her career, Mrs. O'Brien has received many awards from the Eden Teachers' Association for her years of service, being a representative, and for working as secretary and being on the negotiations team. Her greatest joy in teaching was developing students' talents in layout and design by teaching professional programs such as Adobe, InDesign, and Photoshop.

Mrs. Nowicki and her husband plan on boating and retiring in the Bahamas.

Mrs. Kern drove a bus for the district for 36 years. She mainly drove

students to outside placements. When she was not driving, she looked after her mother, which she still continues to do. Mrs. Kern is an animal lover, and you can often see her driving around town with her pets.

Into the Killing Seas by Michael Spradlin This survival tale highlights one of the worst sea disasters of


