A message from the Superintendent

Dear District Residents:

After several months of work, the Board of Education adopted the 2011-2012 school budget in the amount of \$26,160,572, which represents a decrease of .14% over the current year budget. The administrators, faculty and staff worked hard to present a budget with no increases. In preparing the 2011-2012 budget, there were again unique sets of circumstances. These included a reduction in aid to Eden by over one million dollars, and legal, contractual and mandated expenses rose approximately 1.8 million dollars. If it had not been for the foresight of the Board of Education over the past several years, there would have to be a serious reduction in programs and personnel.

The proposed budget maintains all current programs for our students. Reductions include one elementary teacher, one teaching assistant, one Jr./ Sr. High School teacher, one bus driver and a .5 FTE in the Buildings and Grounds Department. Most of these are due to our declining enrollment.

The total budget decreases slightly from last year. We believe that the proposed budget meets the needs of our students and is conservative in its approach. The next two years will continue to be difficult and will bring The Board of Education and the District staff are new challenges. committed to our mission of doing what is best for our students. Working together now and in the future will hopefully allow us to minimize the impact of budget challenges on our students and families.

Since we rely on the state to fund approximately 44% of our budget, predicting the impact on the local tax levy is difficult. Our best estimate at this time is no increase in the tax levy. The final tax levy/tax rate will not be adopted until August 2011, after we have all of our information from the state and the assessor's office. If you have any questions concerning the proposed budget, please contact any board member or the Business Office.

PROPOSITION NO. 1 (ANNUAL BUDGET)

Shall the following resolution be adopted, to wit:

RESOLVED, that the budget for the Eden Central School District, Erie County, New York, for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2011 and ending June 30, 2012, as proposed by the Board of Education, in the total sum of \$26,160,572 is hereby approved and adopted, and the required funds therefor are hereby appropriated and the necessary real property taxes required shall be raised by a tax on the taxable property in the District to be levied and collected as required by law.

PROPOSITION NO. 2 (PURCHASE OF SCHOOL BUSES)

Shall the following resolution be adopted, to wit:

RESOLVED, that the Board of Education (the "Board") of the Eden Central School District (the "District") is hereby authorized to purchase: (1) school buses and similar vehicles, including equipment, machinery and apparatus used in connection therewith, for use in the transportation program of the District, at a maximum estimated cost of \$159,475 and that the sum of \$159,475, being the total of the aforesaid maximum estimated cost figures, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be raised by the levy of a tax upon the taxable property of the District and collected in annual installments as provided by Section 416 of the Education Law, and, in anticipation of such tax, bonds or other obligations (including, without limitation, obligations arising under leases, lease/purchase contracts or installment purchase contracts having a term of not more than five years) of the District shall be issued or entered into in accordance with applicable provisions of New York State law.



Eden Central School District provides for the use of absentee ballots at all district votes and elections. Applications and ballots for this vote will be available beginning Monday, April 18, 2011. You may request an application by calling 992-3613 or writing the District Clerk at 3150 Schoolview Road, Eden, New York 14057 no later than Tuesday, May 10, 2011.

The completed application must be returned and received by the District Clerk. If approved, an official ballot will be mailed to the applicant.

If desired, an application may be completed in the office of the District Clerk no later than 4:00 p.m., Monday, May 16, 2011. The application will be reviewed for eligibility and, if approved, an official ballot will be provided to the voter at that time. It is recommended that the Clerk's office be called at 992-3613 to assure that the Clerk is available at the time of the anticipated visit.

A ballot may only be counted if received by the Clerk no later than 5:00 p.m. on the day of the vote, Tuesday, May 17, 2011.

Mrs. Bossert Sent Mrs. La Verdi's 1st Grade Artists on an Art Mission! Who is Grover L. Priess?

There is a portrait hanging in the GLP School, can you find it? Mrs. La Verdi's first grade class found the painting in the school's foyer and reported back to the art Now the art mission studio. became more complicated as they were asked to look at the painting and try to figure out who the man was and why it was hanging in the foyer of the school. Utilizing Art Criticism as an art tool, we uncovered some facts from the painting and its contents. The plaque on the painting was inscribed with the name Grover L. Priess, M.D., yet the name written on the lower right hand corner of the painting was Ben Swan. This meant that the artist's name was Swan, and he painted Grover L. Priess, but why? Why was this man so important that he had his portrait painted, and why was it hanging in our school? The name Grover L. Priess had the same initials as the G.L.P. Could this be a coincidence? It was our mission to find out

The first graders could decipher that the man was older: perhaps in his late 50's, and his job could have been an important indoor one due to the fact he was wearing a suit and tie and that his face was not tan. What did M.D. stand for? As we discussed the portrait, the artists drew their own rendition by observing the details in the portrait. They drew a man wearing eye glasses standing in a grey suit in front of a solid color background.

Their job was to ask teachers and community members if they

knew anything about Grover L. Priess and report back at the next art class with any new information. We started a K-W-L chart, which let us organize what we Knew, what we Wanted to know, and then later what we Learned. some facts were uncovered through conversations, stories and an article in the History of Eden Vol. III by Doris Anderson. All the information helped us determine that yes, indeed this was an important man. M.D. stands for medical doctor and his commitment to the town of Eden was honored by naming the primary/elementary school after him. More facts revealed: he was born in 1888 and died in 1966, the G.L.P. was named after him in 1954 at a dedication ceremony where the portrait painted by Ben Swan was unveiled and that he delivered over 4,000 babies in The new information town. revealed in this lesson was then visually expressed through drawing the details into their portraits. They added stethoscope around his neck, babies in his arms, drew the house that doubled as a hospital in the background and some even added his wife. The art details increased with each piece of information we found. As artists, we can document a person's life and the time in history they lived. first grade artists not only found out why their school is called the G.L.P., but they strengthened their understanding for how powerful and useful art can be.

As a culminating lesson, I had

Grover LeePriess was married for only 2 years because his wife passed way. They had one son named Richard. In 1954 the GLP school in Eden, NY was named after Grover Lee Priess. There is a portrait of him next to the office in our school. He was an amazing doctor who delivered over 4,000 babies. The hospital was in his house at 8625 Main Street, right here in the town of Eden. When patients were ready to have their baby, they would ring a bell. He would help them. He passed away in 1966. Stephen Pierce Named PrepVolleyball.com's 2010 Co-Coach of the Year

Girls' Varsity Volleyball head coach for 21 years, Stephen Pierce has turned the team into the state's premier program. Eden has won three New York state titles in the past four years and has suffered defeat just five times during that span. Senior setter, Heather Feldman, had this to say:

"Mr. Pierce has been coaching at Eden for a very long time. In that span, he has made Eden the premier girls' volleyball program in the state. His teams have been ranked first in the state for countless years, and he has won seven state titles as a head coach, the most of any coach in New York State girls' volleyball history. With his seventh title as a head coach this past season, he passed the legendary coach Sally Kus of Sweet Home as the winningest head coach in the state.

This past August, when looking towards the fall season, I was worried. As a program, we lost the best senior class in Eden's history, with four fantastic players graduating: Hannah Herc (Kent State), Hailee Herc (Stonybrook), Stacey Smith (Georgia), and Katie Eschner (Roberts Wesleyan). These All-Western New York players were the cream of the crop. They not only brought high-level play to the team, they brought leadership and big game experience that was hard to match. All four had played in extremely highpressure situations, from a Game 5 in the state finals to a match with an Open bid on the line. You can't teach that; it comes with playing a long time. And in a school like Eden, which graduates approximately 140 students per grade level, we don't have the biggest talent pool to pull from.

I was the only one returning from last year's team, which had been talked about by many as being the best team New York has ever seen. I was a little apprehensive going into preseason. We would be young and inexperienced, with two freshmen and a sophomore middle, who had only played on JV up to this point, starting. Let's just say that after the first two-a-day practice, I was still worried. The team was rough around the edges. The chemistry wasn't there, and the skill level necessary to compete at a high level wasn't there either. That's where Mr. Pierce comes in. He has coached so many teams: ones that are great, ones that don't have the best work ethic, ones that are old and experienced,

ones that are young. No matter what he has to work with any given year, he makes a state power out of them. Mr. Pierce's teams have been ranked by Prepvolleyball since who knows when. I've been a member of four of them, with one even being ranked as high as 16 in the rankings. We play the toughest schedule in the state, and also consistently host the best tournament in the state at Eden. You can't have the best tournament in the state without having a program people respect, and Mr. Pierce has created that. He is the greatest coach I've ever had, and I've had quite a few throughout my club years. He is the perfect blend of toughness and fun. He really pushes you on the court. Heck, there are some days after a practice that you hate the man, but he makes you a better player, no question. I'd rather have him yelling at me any day of the week, than have someone else be my coach. But the yelling he does is constructive. He actively coaches in every match or practice we have, always pushing us to strive for our best, and he lets us know when we're not giving 100 percent. He instills in his teams that will to win that some teams don't quite have. That heart and determination is what puts Eden teams into the upper echelon in New York.

This year, with young inexperienced team that no one thought would do any damage in the state, Mr. Pierce made us state champions. Prepvolleyball didn't even have our team on the "Teams to Watch" state by state list at the beginning of the year, but by the end of the year, Mr. Pierce had us once again the highest ranked team in New York State and the only one in the top 100. That's impressive. We won not just a state title; we won one in the hardest class in New York State by far. Class B was a dogfight: between us, Hendrick Hudson, and John Glenn, teams that during the season had each been the top team in the state. In fact, we lost to both Hen Hud and John Glenn during tournaments in the regular season. Yet, Mr. Pierce has always said that what matters is how you finish. And boy, did we go out with a bang! A great coach prepares you to play your absolute best when it really matters, and that's what we did. We took those losses, used them as motivation, and played our best game of the season in the state finals. Most teams would be nervous

in a high-pressure situation like states, but Mr. Pierce prepared us so well that you couldn't feel nervous. Adrenaline, sure, but never real nerves. We knew if we played our game we would win, even if no one thought we would. We believed in ourselves, and more importantly, Mr. Pierce believed in us, and no one else mattered.

Mr. Pierce has meant more to me than just another high school coach; he's my mentor and almost like a second dad to me. He really helped me with my recruiting process in more ways than could be expected. He would make calls and send emails to coaches, trying to get my name out there, and I am forever grateful for that. I am also grateful that he made my senior season the best it could be. I came home from Glens Falls a state champion for the fourth time in five years. I became the NYS Gatorade POY. None of that could have been possible without Mr. Pierce; I owe him so much.

Honestly, I cannot imagine a better candidate than Mr. Pierce. He is an amazing coach who can take just about anyone and make her an amazing volleyball player. He did that to me, and I am forever grateful. He's the reason that I love the sport as much as I do. He's the reason why our program is so well respected. He's the reason I can call myself a state champion."

with the Sabres and Bandits. The trip was both informative and enjoyable for all those who attended. Pictured below: Mr. Mesi's Sports Marketing Class.




High School Art News

Eden Central School Named to AP® Achievement List by the College Board for Significant Gains in Advanced Placement® Access and Student Performance

Eden Central School is one of fewer than 400 school districts in the nation, one of 28 schools in New York State and one of two schools in Western New York being honored by the College Board with a place on its AP Achievement List for opening AP classroom doors to a significantly broader pool of students, while maintaining or improving the percentage of students earning scores of 3 or higher. From 2008 to 2010, Eden Central School has increased the number of students participating in AP by 56% while maintaining the percentage of students earning AP Exam scores of 3 or higher, the score typically needed to earn college credit, at 90% or above.

"The Board of Education and the community have been very supportive in our efforts to expand our AP course offerings, as well as other college courses. The Administration and faculty do an excellent job at promoting the value of those courses that involve extra rigor. Our students should be commended for their dedication to those courses," stated Mr. Buggs, School Superintendent.

The AP Achievement List is made up of all school districts that are simultaneously expanding opportunity and improving performance, so even low-performing districts are included if they have been able to maintain or improve scores while expanding access. The list includes 388 school districts representing 43 states, with California's 37 districts on the list representing the largest number of districts from a single state, followed by Michigan with 29 districts and Pennsylvania with 28 districts.

"Participation in college-level AP courses can level the playing field for underserved students, give them the confidence needed to succeed in college, and raise standards and performance in key subjects like science and math," said College Board President Gaston Caperton. "The AP Achievement List districts are defying expectations by expanding access while enabling their students to maintain or improve their AP Exam scores."

Many U.S. school districts have focused on expanding access to AP courses as part of a strategy for fostering college readiness. While these efforts have resulted in more students earning scores of 3 or better — the score typically cited as a "qualifying" or "successful" score, because the majority of U.S. colleges and universities provide college credit or advanced placement for this score — these efforts have also resulted in more students now earning scores of 1 or 2. Accordingly, there has been a slight decline since 2001 in the percentage of AP students scoring a 3 or better, a decline that is to be expected in any program attracting a broader cross-section of students.

That said, helping more students learn at a higher level *and* earn higher AP scores is an objective of all members of the AP community, from AP teachers to district and school administrators to college professors. Many are experimenting with a variety of initiatives and strategies to determine how to expand access and improve student performance simultaneously.

"These districts are living proof that when access to AP is provided for the range and breadth of prepared and motivated students, districts can achieve even higher learning outcomes for their students — and the opportunity for so many more to earn college credit and placement — than when AP opportunities were restricted to a smaller segment of the high school population," said Trevor Packer, vice president of the College Board's Advanced Placement Program.

Inclusion on the list is based on the following criteria:

- Examination of three years of AP data, from 2008 to 2010;
- ◆ Increase in participation in/access to AP by at least 4 percent in large districts, at least 7 percent in medium districts and at least 11 percent in small districts;
- ♦ A steady or increasing percentage of exams taken by African American, Hispanic/Latino and American Indian/Alaska Native students; and
- Performance levels maintained or improved when comparing the percentage of exams in 2010 scoring a 3 or higher to those in 2008, *or* the school has already attained a performance level in which more than 70 percent of the AP students are scoring a 3 or higher.

Additionally, school districts with an AP student population composed of 50 percent or more traditionally underrepresented minority students (African American, Hispanic/Latino, American Indian/Alaska Native) and/or low-income students have been noted on the Achievement List to highlight significant improvements in equity and quality among the nation's historically underserved student populations.
