Dear Family and Friends of the Eden Central School District:

I hope that you were able to have a safe, restful and enjoyable holiday season and a good start to the New Year. The Eden Central School District continues to work to provide the best educational opportunity that it can for all students. Our 2008-2009 School Report Card just released and posted on our web-site is again very good. We all should be proud of the work our students do each and every day. The vast majority are working to the best of their ability.

I encourage every member of the community to visit our schools and attend student and community functions. You are always welcome.

It is at this time of the year that we begin our planning for next year. The Board of Education, Administration, Faculty and Staff began working on next year's school budget. As you are all aware, the state of the economy is not good, which will mean another year or two filled with large challenges. The Governor has already withheld aid payments this year, tapped into Federal Stimulus Money that was to be used next year, and has proposed a major reduction in education funding for next year. This reduction for the Eden Central School District equates to \$662,854. This reduction is very large for a district our size. It will take teamwork, hard work and trust on the part of the Board of Education, Administrators, Faculty and Staff, as well as the community, to effectively meet this steep challenge, while balancing what is best for our students and what is best for the taxpayers. The Board has asked that we prepare the best budget that we can while maintaining all of our existing programs. We will, however, continue to look at every aspect of the District, looking at new ways to operate the business of education saving as many dollars as possible. You have our commitment to continue to work to achieve this balance.

I am often asked by faculty, staff, parents and community members, "What can I do to help?" I always encourage people to communicate with their State and Federal elected representatives. This proposed reduction is large and could have an adverse effect on our community. At the very least, we need a State plan, not another one-time fix. We must encourage them to look at the impact such a reduction could have on the students of New York State. Encouraging them to develop a plan to deal with the need to reduce aid over time would/could minimize the impact on students. Secondly, I would ask you to trust and to be open to changes as the Board of Education, Administration, Faculty, and Staff work together to develop the best possible budget that truly balances what is good for students with what is right for the taxpayers, as well as, plan for the future.

If you have questions, please do not hesitate to ask. If you have ideas, don't hesitate to propose them. Working together, we will be able to maintain the philosophy, mission and high standards of one of the best school districts in Western New York - Eden.

I wish you all the best as winter comes to a close, and we look forward to the sunshine and warmth of the Spring.

# TECHNOLOGY SAFETY ADDRESSED AT EDEN CENTRAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

Technology safety issues were the topic addressed at Eden Central School District on Tuesday, October 21st. Students today need to know not just about Internet safety with on-line predators staking chat rooms and social networking sites such as MySpace and Facebook, but also the issues with texting and "sexting" on cell phones that are occurring nationwide. To help students tackle these issues, Eden brought in speaker Patti McClain with the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children for two presentations to students and teachers. The first session was for high school students in grades ninth through twelve. High School Principal Marc Graff stated, "The assembly should have been an eye-opener for all of the students. Hearing that their Facebook or MySpace pages may cost them scholarships or college admission should be a wake-up call to everyone. It should go without saying that personal information should remain just that, "personal", but after seeing the reaction of our students today, I have a feeling many pages are being updated as we speak."

The second presentation was geared for middle school level with the sixth, seventh, and eighth grade students and their teachers. According to Ms. McClain, "These students are using cell phones and the social networking websites just as much as the older students, but their natural lack of maturity makes them more vulnerable to cyber bullying and on-line predators." After the assembly Mrs. Schnaufer, elementary computer lab teacher, set up a survey for the

sixth graders to get their feedback on what was presented and to continue the dialog about technology safety in the classroom. One of the sixth graders wrote, "I thought it was great; how we learned about how dangerous a computer can be by just having a certain screen name and how it made you realize how much a cell phone can get viruses and how much damage it can do--just little things!...It really made me think!" That was the main point of the middle school presentation to get students to "Think Before They Post".

This presentation to students was the second part of this fall's technology safety initiative in the school district. Parents were invited in September to attend Internet Safety presentations at both the Elementary School Open Houses. This is the second year these parent presentations have been held, and the response has been very positive. Principal Richard Schaefer plans to continue these Internet Safety presentations next fall. In addition, as a resource for parents there is an Internet Safety webpage on the District website under the computer lab section. Mr. Buggs, Superintendent stated, "This was an outstanding opportunity for our students to learn more about protecting themselves."



## MUCH NEWS FROM THE EDEN ART DEPARTMENT

Chosen from hundreds of entries, Mrs. Nicastro's lesson plan submission received an \$800 grant award from the Target Field Trip Grant program. Students will be taken to The Western New York Book Arts Collaborative to explore the art of book making, papers, materials, and traditional book construction techniques. Students will connect personal expression, literature, and the written word to produce a work of fine art upon returning to the school art studio. The trip and project will be completed by April 2010. Look for work on display at the high school.

Thank you to Erin and "Grandma" Gen from Embraceable Ewe for spending some time in Mrs. Nicastro's Crafts Studio and teaching "Learn to Knit." The crafts students not only learned to knit but also went off on an incredible tangent making sweaters, mittens, scarves, and hats on their own.

Thanks to Mr. Mike Wlodarczyk of Creative Network for visiting the advertising studio to discuss the profession and offer his knowledge and assistance in the Ad Craft Project.

Once again this year, Eden High School advertising students participated in the annual Ad Craft Competition, which was sponsored by Metro Group. Ad Craft is a locally sponsored contest, which appears in all area news publications such as the Hamburg Sun. This program is an exciting and useful way for students to gain experience in print advertising as well as gain recognition for their design ideas and craftsmanship. Ten students worked to create ads for more than twenty local businesses. The first printing of the ads appeared in January. Watch the Hamburg Sun for print of the winning ads in February.

Thank you to the PTA for financial support and Mr. Wlordarcyzk for lending his time and computer expertise to Mrs. Nicastro's Advertising and Design skateboard project. Students designed skateboards by first drawing thumbnail sketches of their ideas, scanned those hand drawings into Adobe Illustrator and Photoshop and created finished board designs using the drawings as a template. The students learned how to manipulate the Adobe programs and created amazing results. The design files were taken to a digital printer, and were adhered to the premade skateboard decks using a non-skid vinyl laminate, so the boards will be road worthy if the students choose to use them. Watch for display of finished skateboards in the weeks to come.

Congratulations to Morgan Cole, as her design for Eden's upcoming "Bicentennial" has been chosen to represent the 2012 celebration. Mrs. Nicastro was both proud and honored as the committee commented, numerous times, regarding the impressiveness all of her advertising class submissions and made mention of the fact that they will be trying to employ all of the designs in some way. The student's work was judged amongst professional artist entries in this competition.

Congratulations to Rachel Shoemaker for her first place win in the WNY United First Night painting competition. Rachel's watercolor depicting her idea of a drug free celebration was chosen from all area high schools to be on display during "First Night" and win a \$100 prize and first place ribbon.

Keep your eyes open in the high school art, music, and technology wing for a mural being created by Haley Sovereign. Haley is an independent study student with Mrs. Nicastro who has designed a Peter Max inspired mural dedicated to the fine arts and technology. Completion is estimated to be within the month of March.

Mrs. Bossert at the GLP and Mrs. Nicastro at the High School will be participating once again this year in the "Empty Bowls" project. Empty Bowls is a program begun years ago by an out of state art teacher in search of a way to raise funds for his local food banks, as well as, bring about an awareness of hunger in the US and around the world. Students can create functional or non-functional bowls, which are offered in exchange for donation with the proceeds going toward hunger fighting organizations. This year, Mrs. Nicastro's Ceramics I and II students are creating more than 50 wheel thrown bowls and Mrs. Bossert's GLP artists will

take a field trip to the high school ceramics studio to work with their "high school buddies" on glazing the bowls. Second grade students will be given a demonstration in wheel throwing and will be invited to give it a try.


