If you are able to stay after the public comment session, you will notice another change. We are now displaying on an overhead projector the detailed agenda that the board members are following. This should help all of the attendees better follow the motions and discussions.

In addition to attending in person and asking questions or making comments, Board policy also provides a way for you to submit discussion points for meetings. Any individual or group that wishes to bring a matter to the attention of the Board may make a request through the Superintendent's office. The Superintendent then brings the matter to the attention of the Board.

We are looking at additional ways to open the lines of communications so that all thoughts and ideas are heard. We must work together to continue to improve our schools and the more feedback we receive, the better we can become. After all, the Board and administration are ultimately accountable to the residents of the District.

Lastly, on the note of communication, I encourage all of you to contact your school board members with any suggestions or concerns that you may have.



WHEN SHOULD MY CHILD STAY HOME WITH THE FLU?

H1N1 Influenza A Recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control

When should my child stay home with the flu?

Students with "Influenza-Like Illness" should stay home when they are sick. Your child may have the flu and should stay home if they have the following signs and symptoms:

> Fever of 100°F (37.8° C) or greater Cough Runny Nose Sore Throat

New York Statewide School Health Services Center

When should my child return to school?

It is recommended that students stay home until at least 24 hours after they are free of fever [100°F (37.8° C) or greater] or signs of a fever, without the use of fever reducing medications.



What can we do to reduce the chances of spreading or "catching" H1N1 Influenza?

*Wash hands often with soap and water, especially after coughing or sneezing *Use alcohol based hand sanitizers to clean hands if soap and water are not available *Cover your nose and

*Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when coughing or sneezing and throw the tissue in the trash after use (if no tissue is available, cough or sneeze into your arm or sleeve-not your hand)

ART CLASSES MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Our 7th Grade and Studio in Art Classes are making money - literally! But don't contact law enforcement, read on. Ms. Morgan's art classes are participating in a nation-wide program creating "Fundred Dollar Bills," the world's largest art/science project uniting scientists and 3 million children against the lead polluted soils in New Orleans. Effective clean-up efforts have been estimated at \$300,000,000.

The Fundred Dollar Bill Project asks school children around the country to create their own, original one hundred dollar bills. These will be delivered to Congress in April by an Operation Paydirt armored truck specially equipped to run on recycled cafeteria grease beginning in November. These miniature works of art will represent the voices of school children throughout the USA, asking for a dollar for dollar exchange to fund this critical clean-up effort.

The project promises not only to resolve the problem of the lead-polluted soils in New Orleans, but it will also provide jobs in this area, still recovering from the devastation of Hurricane Katrina. Our art students are being provided a rich opportunity for classroom discussion and cross-curricular exploration.

PROOF OF CITIZENSHIP CROSSING INTO CANADA VIA MOTORCOACH

All passengers going into Canada will now be required to present proof of citizenship before boarding the coach. It is our responsibility to check that each person has this proof with them. In order to protect the other passengers from a delay, anyone who cannot show proper ID to the tour escort, will be denied entry onto the coach. Furthermore, there will be no refund given for the missed tour.

All U.S. & Canadian citizens who are 16 and older traveling between the U.S. and Canada, will be required to present one of the following forms of ID:

Passport

Passport Card

Enhanced NYS Driver's License – or any other authorized enhanced license

Nexus Card

U.S. and Canadian citizens who are 15 years old & under will still be allowed to travel with their birth certificate, as will teens between the age of 16-18 if they are part of an adult supervised group. Children who are not traveling with a parent, must have a notarized permission note signed by the parent.
