ENERGY DRINKS DID YOU KNOW...

There are sports drinks, energy drinks and energy drinks which contain anywhere from 6 - 12% alcohol and are infused with caffeine, ginseng and guarana.

Red Bull, Venom, Adrenaline Rush, 180, ISO, Sprint and Whoopass contain caffeine and other stimulants. Tilt, Joose, Sparks, 3 Sum, Four, Rockstar 21, 24/ Seven, Liquid Charge and Torque contain alcohol. Do you know if your children drink any of these beverages?

Reports indicate that hospital emergency rooms have seen cases involving children because of the consumption of these beverages. Increased heart rate and blood pressure can be difficult for young people. These drinks can also cause dehydration and disrupt sleep.

Energy drinks should not be used during exercise. The loss of fluid from perspiration combined with the diuretic property of caffeine can cause severe dehydration. When these drinks are combined with alcohol, the potential dangers increase significantly. Alcohol is a depressant. The term "alcoholic energy drink" is an oxymoron. Research shows that a drunk person plus caffeine still equals a drunk person.

Brewers are targeting youth with their marketing strategies by:

- * Creating brand confusion with nonalcoholic versions;
- * Providing a cheap alternative to mixing energy drinks with alcohol; and
 - * Deploying youth-friendly grassroots marketing.

Five hundred new energy drink products were introduced worldwide in 2006. Energy drink sales were \$3.2 billion. Thirty-one percent of 12-17 year olds are regular consumers vs. twenty two percent of 25-34 year olds.

Know what your children are drinking, and know what the associated health risks are. Read the labels - get the facts!

SPECIAL EDUCATION UPDATE

I am writing to inform you of new Federal and State requirements regarding special education services for parentally placed nonpublic school children. These changes may affect how your child receives special education services. The most important change is that the school district where the nonpublic school is located will now be responsible for individual evaluations and development of individualized education programs (IEPs) for students with disabilities, including conducting the Committee on Special Education (CSE) meetings, and for providing special education services to students with disabilities who are parentally placed in nonpublic schools. The following information is important for you to know:

- * Beginning with the 2007-08 school year, if you have placed your child in a nonpublic school and while the child is enrolled in that school, you suspect that the student has a disability, you must contact the school district where the nonpublic school is located to request an evaluation to determine your child's eligibility for special education services.
- * We must have your written consent in order for us to provide information (such as your child's IEP) to the school district where the nonpublic school is located.
- * If you place your child in a nonpublic school and wish your child to receive special education services while enrolled in that school, you must request those services in writing no later than June 1 before the school year in which services are to be provided. This year, you should request services from us and with your written consent, we will forward that request to the school district responsible to provide the special education services to your child. (We will not require you to have requested services by June 1 if your child is first identified as needing special education services or if you moved into the district between June 1 of this year and April 1 of next year.)
- * If the nonpublic school where you place your child is located within the geographic boundaries of another public school district, the public school district in which the nonpublic school is located will arrange for and provide the recommended services for your child. The personnel and locations for the delivery of those services will be determined by that school district. Federal and State law require this.
- * If the nonpublic school where you place your child is located in another state, your child may not be entitled to all of his/her IEP services.
- * Transportation requests from your child's home to the nonpublic school should continue to be submitted to the school district where your child legally resides by April 1 of the school year before transportation is to be provided.

ROLL UP YOUR SLEEVES--IT'S TIME FOR ART!

My 2nd grade artists are busy creating Kachina Doll Sculptures inspired by the Hopi Indians of the South West. The construction of these sculptures starts with recycled materials such as coffee creamer containers and cardboard tubes that the artists and families have donated over the years. The forms are taped together with a tin foil covering and then Papier Mache is applied. One day in December, parent volunteers rolled up their sleeves and happily joined in on this messy, fun filled process. The dolls will dry and then be painted with Hopi Indian designs. Each sculpture was created with a specific solution to a world crisis or social issue. For example, one doll might have its arms raised to hold a tree to symbolize the importance of planting trees to help air pollution. Another might be positioned with arms on its hips to represent bullying and the affects it has on others.

As I was introducing the concept of having their dolls represent a wish or solution, Samantha Mason from Mrs. King's class suggested that each doll hold a wish inside of them. So we wrote our wishes on small pieces of paper, and they were placed inside the openings of the containers that served as the doll's body before they were Papier Mached closed. When the dolls are shaken, you can hear their wish!

These Kachina Doll Sculptures are just one of the many ways in which my Disciplined Based Art Education program here at the G.L.P. can create real life connections and enhance cultural awareness (not to mention... create excitement!)
