### NOTICE TO SENIORS AND THEIR PARENTS

Scholarships for Academic Excellence will be awarded to several seniors at Eden Junior Senior High School pending appropriation of State funds. Eden qualifies for one scholarship at \$1,500 and four scholarships at \$500 each. These awards are renewable for up to four academic years of undergraduate study.

The eligibility requirements include:

- 1. Each scholarship recipient must graduate from a New York State high school by the end of the 2008-2009 school year.
- 2. Each scholarship recipient must be a legal resident of New York State for at least one year prior to September 30, 2008.
- 3. In order to use the benefits of this scholarship, the recipient must be in attendance as a full-time matriculated student at an approved New York State post-secondary institution by the Fall 2009 semester. Students who enroll in an out-of-state institution in Fall 2009 are not eligible and must forfeit the award.

The selection criteria that will be used must be in accordance with the following State requirements. The high school shall select their nominees by computing a weighted average of the scores on the Regents examinations taken prior to the students' senior year in the subjects listed below. The weighting of the scores shall be:

Comprehensive English - weight of three
Mathematics B - weight of three
Global Studies - weight of one
US History & Gov't. - weight of one

Any 3 Science courses - weight of one for each course

### SUNY CORTLAND STUDENT AND PROFESSOR OF GEOLOGY DIG UP HISTORY IN ITALY

Mr. Raymond Zabron forwarded the following success story to Mr. Buggs and said "Thank you for the quality education you gave Jon by the Eden Central School staff."

CORTLAND, NY (02/19/2008; 1628)(readMedia)-- This past summer, SUNY Cortland senior Jonathon Zabron of Eden, N.Y., and Christopher A. McRoberts, Professor of Geology at SUNY Cortland, traveled to Northern Italy to research the end-Triassic period mass extinction of clams and mollusks.

During their research, Zabron, a Geology major, and McRoberts, whose research specialties are in Paleobiology and Sedimentology, worked with colleagues and students from the University of Perugia. They also visited geological sites in the mountainous villages of Menaggio and Bellagio along Lake Como, Cofino in the Apennines Mountains, and Portovenere in the region of Liguria. Each of these villages were rich with clam and mollusk fossils that were needed to research the extinction.

While Zabron learned how to improve his skills for the future, he enjoyed the experience.

"Two of the most important skills that I learned during the trip were learning the correct way of collecting and labeling specimens," said Zabron. "I loved the culture and the learning experience related to my major, getting the chance to see what a professor in my major does in the field."

McRoberts hopes that this trip will advance Zabron into the Geology field.

"Although he is fairly young, he learned a lot and enjoyed his experience in Italy," McRoberts stated. "Jon gained valuable first-hand experience in conducting field-based Paleontological research overseas. He gained skills in field techniques and observation, he experienced the thrill of discovery of fossils, and he was able to interact with international collaborating scientists."

According to McRoberts, the most important discovery of the trip was learning that the extinction of the clams and mollusks was very abrupt instead of a gradual dying out.

The trip was funded through a grant given to McRoberts by the National Science Foundation.

Zabron will graduate during the spring of 2009 and plans on attending graduate school in the future.

"I'm not sure about furthering my studies in Paleontology, but I am positive that I will continue my career path in the Geology field," said Zabron.

The son of Raymond and Maureen Zabron of Jennings Road, Zabron graduated in 2004 from Eden Junior-Senior High School and enrolled at SUNY Cortland thereafter.

### WINTER PREPAREDNESS

As in the past, we expect snow and ice to arrive soon. Thus, it is important that we all be prepared for the conditions associated with this type of weather. Minimally, you should do the following:

- 1. Wear appropriate clothing for the conditions. Warm jacket, hat, gloves and scarf are recommended.
- 2. Your footwear should be both waterproof and provide good traction. Socks provide additional insulation from the cold.
- 3. Listen to the radio if you're not sure of school closure or conditions.
- 4. SLOW DOWN Not only should you drive prudently based upon conditions, but also be sure of your footing when there is a chance of slipping and falling. Your safety needs to be your highest priority.
- 5. Have your vehicle ready BEFORE winter arrives. Snow tires, anti-freeze and wiper blades should be checked. Having a blanket, shovel, portable radio, water, flashlight, road flares, crackers or candy bars, and possibly a cell phone can make an uncomfortable situation bearable. A bucket of sand or salt can assist in freeing a stuck vehicle.
- 6. Is your home prepared for winter? Don't forget to change those batteries in the smoke detectors and get a carbon monoxide detector if you don't already have one! The new wind up radios and flashlights are wonderful to have if the power is out for extended periods of time. Do you have a generator or gas pump for your sump? If you didn't drain the gas or it isn't fresh fuel, don't expect it to start when you need it. Service it now!

We will use salt to melt the ice and snow this winter. Please remember to brush or stomp off the snow outdoors and to wipe your feet on the walk off mats. This will help prevent slips and falls and eliminate the problem of salt attacking and destroying wax and terrazzo flooring. Thank you for planning ahead!

### SOPHOMORE RECYCLING PROGRAM





During this unit of self-portraiture, the GLP's school counselor, Ms. Finnerty, came into the art studio and introduced herself and explained the job that she performs at the school. She gave a presentation on how important it is to read other peoples' expressions and act accordingly to their needs. ### FREE AND REDUCED MEALS NON-DISCRIMINATORY AND CONFIDENTIAL

The State of New York mandates that there is no physical segregation of, or any other discrimination against, any child because of his/her inability to pay the full price of a meal. The names of children eligible to receive free or reduced meals are not published, posted, or announced in any manner, and there is no overt identification of any such children by use of special tokens or tickets, or by any other means. Children eligible for free and reduced meals do not eat meals differently from the meals sold to children paying full price, go through separate lunch lines, or eat at separate times.

The district can approve applications with "no income", for up to 45 days, for example, health related emergencies where you are unable to work, changes in employment, or any other temporary financial hardships.
