I speak for all of us in the district when I say thank you for the support and work you have all done on behalf of the children in the school community. We hope you will take the time that you dedicated to your board responsibilities and use it to enjoy your families. To Mrs. Gardner: Congratulations on your re-election, and I look forward to our continued working relationship. To Mr. Burgstahler, Mr. Brier and Mr. Cerne: I know the current board members are looking forward to working with you and doing our best as a group to incorporate the visions and ideas you are bringing that will maintain and strengthen the educational experience of every child that passes through the Eden Schools. I would also like to extend my thanks to the residents for supporting the budget and also to all the candidates who participated in this year's election.

At a recent board meeting, a constituent from the community, in addition to identifying himself as a parent and taxpayer, also said he considered himself a stockholder. In recent years there has been a growing movement to make schools and governments operate more like businesses, and I began thinking how would a school district measure the return it gives to stockholders? Unlike businesses, the return that schools give cannot be stated in terms of monetary yields on shares of stock, but in many ways can only be measured by the contributions of those educated within its environs. Some of these contributions are seen at the local level by those students who remain in the community to work and one day raise their own families; but many of the students end up in places that may be far from the Eden Central Schools, and their contributions benefit people in ways that give no direct accountability to our stockholder mentioned above.

Last year, our graduates received over \$30,000.00 in scholarship aid and grants from local sources, and in addition, were awarded almost \$2,000,000.00 in scholarships from Universities and Colleges to help prepare them for their careers. But again, our stockholder may not see a direct benefit of this additional investment.

Perhaps the only way our stockholder can measure the return for his investment in his local community school comes not from some standard of monetary return, but instead can be judged by how well our students do in their contribution to the betterment of the world in which they and their children will live.

The President of the Board of Education has the honor to place his signature on the shares of stock (otherwise known as diplomas) that are issued yearly as the dividend returned to our stockholders. The value of each of those shares will fluctuate depending on the willingness of the holder to use what he has learned and incorporate the values that surround him to achieve his or her success in life. Mr. Stockholder, I know I speak for all the staff of the district when I say thank you for your investment in us. Your return cannot be measured in a trip to Disney World or vacation at the beach but may be realized the next time you are in need of a health care professional, a business professional or a member of our armed forces.

May everyone have an enjoyable and peace filled summer season.

The annual budget vote was held on Tuesday, May 20th. Ten candidates ran for four seats on the Board of Education. Beginning their terms the day after the Budget Vote were new Board of Education members Brian Burgstahler and Andy Breier. Brian will serve a three year and six week term, and Andy will serve a one year and six week term. In addition, Steven Cerne will begin a three year term on July 1, 2008. All three newly elected members have children attending District schools. We would also like to welcome back Deborah Gardner for her third term. Proposition #1 - the budget - was passed 719 to 458. Proposition #2 - purchase of vehicles and related equipment was passed 708 to 451.

## From the Health Office

#### IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS FOR SCHOOL ENTRANCE/ATTENDANCE K-12

3 doses of Diphtheria toxoid containing vaccine (DTP, DTaP, DT) - New York City requires 4 doses for Kindergarten only.

3 doses of Tetanus toxoid containing vaccine and Pertussis vaccine for children born on or after 1/1/05 (DTaP, DTP)

3 doses of Polio vaccine (OPV and/or IPV)

2 doses of Measles vaccine and one dose each of Mumps and Rubella vaccines.

- The first dose of Measles, Mumps and Rubella vaccines (MMR) must be administered no more than 4 days prior to the first birthday.

3 doses of Hepatitis B Vaccine (HBV)

1 dose of Diphtheria and Tetanus toxoid containing vaccine and acellular Pertussis vaccine for all children born on or after 1/1/94 who are enrolling in 6th grade.

1 dose of Varicella vaccine.

- Administered no more than 4 days before the first birthday.

- Applies to all children born on or after 1/1/98 or children born on or after 1/1/94 who are enrolling in the 6th grade.

## **REQUIRED GRADE LEVEL PHYSICALS** By Karen Meller

New York State Education Law requires a physical exam on all children upon **entrance into school** and upon entering **second**, **fourth**, **seventh** and **tenth** grades. Either your family physician or the school physician may complete the physical examination. Physical forms are available in the Health Offices.

## DISPENSING MEDICINE IN SCHOOL By Darlene Smith

If a child needs to take medication during school hours, the school nurse will dispense it. Both parent and family physician must submit a written request indicating the prescribed medication, name, frequency, dosage and duration of the order. The school nurse will then assist in administering medication during school hours. This includes any over the counter medications.

#### IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS FOR PRE-K

3 doses of Diphtheria toxoid containing vaccine (DTP, DTaP, DT) - New York City requires 4 doses.

3 doses of Tetanus toxoid containing vaccine and Pertussis vaccine for children born on or after 1/1/05 (DTaP, DTP)

3 doses of Polio vaccine ((OPV or IPV)

1 dose of Measles, Mumps, and Rubella vaccines (MMR)

- Administered no more than 4 days prior to the first birthday.

Hib (haemophilus Influenzae Type b) vaccine

- 3 doses before 15 months of age or

- 1 dose on or after 15 months of age

3 doses of Hepatitis B vaccine (HBV)

Pneumococcal vaccine for children born on or after 1/1/08

- 3 doses before 15 months of age or

-1 dose on or after 15 months of age

1 dose of Varicella vaccine

- Administered no more than 4 days before the first birthday.

Physical exams for student entering 7th grade and for those unable to make physicals on May 29th, will be done on Thursday, June 19, 2008 at 1 pm in the Elementary Health office. Transportation will not be available for physicals on June 19th. Dr. Ghate, the school physician, will conduct the physical exams.
