In October, the Boys and Girls Club of Eden dedicated a donor board created by Rebecca Smith, under the direction of Mrs. Nicastro in June. The installation is a gorgeous multi level mural with space for donor plaques.

Once again this year, Eden High School advertising students participated in the annual Ad Craft Competition, which was sponsored by Metro Group. Ad Craft is a locally sponsored contest, which appears in all area news publications, such as the Hamburg Sun. This program is an exciting and useful way for students to gain experience in print advertising, as well as gain recognition for their design ideas and craftsmanship. Ten students worked to create ads for more than twenty local businesses. Watch the Hamburg Sun for prints of the ads in January and once again for announcement of winners in February.

The Musical Logo contest sponsored by the Music Department is also underway amongst both studio and advertising students. The winner will be announced in late December and a \$100 prize will be issued.

Mrs. Bossert at the GLP and Mrs. Nicastro at the High School have participated in the first phase of their "Empty Bowls" project. Empty Bowls is a program that began years ago by an out of state art teacher in search of a way to raise funds for his local food banks, as well as bring about an awareness of hunger in the US and around the world. Students can create functional or non-functional bowls, which are offered in exchange for a donation, with the proceeds going toward hunger fighting organizations. This year, Mrs. Nicastro's Ceramics I students learned wheel throwing and created more than 30 bowls. Mrs. Bossert's GLP artists then took a field trip to the high school ceramics studio and were greeted by their "high school buddies." Together the students glazed the bowls with inspiration coming from the art of Ancient Egypt, and the artistic use of symbols to express a thought or an idea. The bowls were decorated in symbols and patterns representing life, rejuvenation, purity, eternity, love, and harvest to name a few. The sense of camaraderie among the students was absolutely fantastic. Second grade students were given a demonstration in wheel throwing and were able to give it a try! High school buddies showed the young ones how to "wedge" and prepare the clay for work, as well as how to do some hand building techniques. The experience was fulfilling for all involved. Mrs. Bossert would like to let everyone know how proud she is of her artists, and Mrs. Nicastro was overwhelmed and touched by the kind, compassionate, mature, gentle, and knowledgeable way her students performed. These bowls were truly created in a spirit of brotherhood, generosity, and fulfillment. The bowls will be available to view on February 28th during second semester Open House, at a reception in the High School, which will feature the work of advanced drawing and painting students, and some live music provided by Miss Alexander's students. The second phase of the project will begin in February when the bowls will travel to Buffalo State for display and sale.

There is a crosswalk from the Weller subdivision to the Junior/Senior High School on Schoolview Road. Vehicles must stop for pedestrians in this crosswalk. The town highway department recently replaced the yellow crosswalk signs with bright green signs, so they are better seen in the dark. The law is stated as follows: §1151 Pedestrians' right of way in crosswalks. (a) When traffic-control signals are not in place or not in operation, the driver of a vehicle shall yield the right of way, slowing down or stopping if need be to so yield, to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within a crosswalk on the roadway upon which the vehicle is traveling, except that any pedestrian crossing a roadway at a point where a pedestrian tunnel or overpass has been provided shall yield the right of way to all vehicles.

Please be extremely cautious at all crosswalks!

This comprehensive course prepares participants for employment as lifeguards. Included in the course are Lifeguard Training, First Aid, CPR, Automated External Defibrillation (AED) Essentials, Oxygen Administration, Preventing Disease Transmission, and Waterpark and Waterfront Lifeguarding. Participants must attend all of the following Saturday classes: March 29th, April 5th, April 26th from 9 am - 5 pm and on May 3rd from 9 am - 3 pm. There is a \$10 discount for Independent Health members. Participants must be at least 15 years old. 
