From the Superintendent

Last March I hosted a community meeting regarding potential revenue from the Rover Pipeline project. During this meeting I mentioned a date of October 1 for figures to be released by the Department of Taxation (DOT). The DOT sent the figures to the county auditors on that date, however, upon review by the auditors in Wayne and Ashland County, they noticed some inaccurate information concerning revenue to entities that did not have the pipeline in their districts. They have notified the DOT and we are currently waiting for corrected figures. Based on information I have sought from other schools, I believe we will still be having conversations concerning new facilities. I want to thank the 233 people who participated in the "New Facility Survey." 91% of respondents believe we need new school buildings. The results from the question concerning when to start a project were as follows: 62% are ready to go immediately (if projections show being able to pay for it), 13% want to wait a year, 6.5% want to see 25% of the cost of the project in the bank, 8% want to see 50% in the bank, and the rest wanted all 100%. 85% of those surveyed were fine with spending funds up front for research and design. These are exciting times for the Hillsdale community!



8th grade middle school students have had the opportunity to explore lessons in financial education as they prepare for the world beyond high school. Included in the nine weeks elective is the chance to set up a budget and to understand the expenses of the realworld. Students gain an understanding of how debt affects an individual's finances over a period of time. We have also explored strategies for saving money and responsibly managing loan payments. Mr. Hostetler also showed students how to use math concepts such as using percentages to estimate tips, taxes, and interest.

Over the summer, seventh and eighth grade students had the opportunity to tour Washington, D.C. While in Washington, D.C., the students saw Arlington Cemetery, various monuments, Mount Vernon, and other sights. Seventh graders got to see the Martin Luther King, Jr. monument after studying Civil Rights. Eighth graders got to see the Holocaust Museum after studying the Holocaust and World War II.





The Family & Consumer Science classes at HHS are off to a fast start! Students have been busy exploring many topics related to nutrition, colleges, careers, and finance. In the month of September, 30 Personal Finance students kept track of all of their expenses. (Students were also instructed to keep track of items purchased for them by their parents.) After one month, the total amount spent on gasoline was \$2,092 and food-related expenses equaled \$2,934. Students were surprised at how quickly daily expenses add up over time. Other topics have included comparing bank features along with recognizing the benefits and dangers of credit cards. Many students decided they may continue keeping track of their expenses in order to save more money for the future. Culinary students are learning about nutrition and making safe, sanitary choices in the kitchen while enjoying various cooking labs related to the units of study. Career & College Readiness students have researched educational options and career fields to pursue following high school graduation. A recent field trip included students touring Ashland University, OSU-Mansfield, & North Central State College.
