District Will Be Seeking Your Input



It is clear that Mrs. Burnison's impact stretched far beyond the classroom as she taught us lessons about strength, courage, determination, and faith. Mrs. Burnison's legacy will live on through those who have been touched by her life.

For our first feature, I would like to introduce Heath and Lee Burkholder. Heath graduated from Hillsdale in 2011, and Lee graduated in 2013. Since graduation, these two brothers have given of themselves by joining the armed forces.

Heath joined the Marines in 2011. After completing his basic training in Parris Island, South Carolina, Heath was deployed to Afghanistan in 2012, and again in 2014 to Iraq, Jordan, Libya, and Africa. After serving his country for four years, Heath decided to go back to college. Heath is now a proud Falcon for Notre Dame in South Euclid, Ohio. He is a member of the football team, but most importantly, Heath is working on his Bachelor and Master's degrees in Criminal Intelligence of Science. After graduation, Heath plans to have a career with either the ATF, FBI or US Marshalls.

Lee joined the Marines in 2014. Since completing his basic training in Parris Island, South Carolina, Lee has been actively training at Camp Pendleton, California. Lee was deployed to Japan in 2015, although he also did some training exercises in Australia and Humanitarian relief in Guam, Saipan and trained Philippine Marines in the Philippines. Lee was just deployed this November to Japan until May of 2017. After the military, Lee is keeping his options open to what he will do. In the meantime, Lee will serve our country with pride. FFA Member Auction



High School Scheduling Underway for 2017-2018

Parent and student meetings have begun for scheduling students for the upcoming school year! Students and their parents have many course opportunities when completing scheduling forms for next school year. Also at each meeting will be discussed requirements for graduation, state testing requirements and course options for students at each grade level.

New courses for 2017-2018 include a full year pre-engineering and design technology course. This class is a hands on learning lab for students to have exposure to research and design of various products. Also, students will have a full year manufacturing operations course and a full year machine tools course. These classes are open to students in grades 9-12, with an emphasis upon 9th and 10th graders to be introduced to the manufacturing process and the use of hand and electric tools to create projects in the areas of woods, metals and/or plastics.

Following a successful return to HHS, Family and Consumer Science courses will include an additional offering of Child Development, in addition to the current courses of Career & College Readiness, Personal Financial Management, Transitions & Careers and Culinary Fundamentals courses.

In addition, qualified students will have the opportunity again in 2017-2018 to take College Credit Plus courses, receiving both high school and college credit, through North Central State College, at no cost to parents. The following courses will be taught by HHS faculty at the high school: English Composition I & II (new in 2017); College Algebra & Trigonometry; Introduction to Sociology & Psychology and Livestock Production.

Student schedules will be completed and returned to the office within a week of each parent meeting. Student schedules will be finalized in May for the 2017-2018 school year.


