<u>Paul Volponi</u>: Black and White, Rikers High, Rooftop, Rucker Park Setup, etc.

<u>Amy Tan:</u> Joy Luck Club, The Bonesetter's Daughter, The Valley of Amazement

<u>Bill Bryson</u>: At Home, I'm a Stranger Here Myself, etc. (humorous essays)

<u>Carlos Eire</u>: Waiting for Snow in Havana, Learning to Die in Miami (memoirs of a Cuban immigrant)

<u>Erik Larson</u>: The Devil in the White City, In the Garden of Beasts (non-fiction, great writing and incident)

The Particulars

Regents Level:

Read one book of your choosing and be prepared to complete an assignment upon return to school in September.

Choosing a Book

- Please do not select previously read works.
- Select titles that are on or above your reading level.
- You can find any appropriate books at your local library. There is no need to purchase the book you read.

Honors/AP Level:

Assignments were distributed in class. They are also available on the district website.

Late Enrollment

Students who enroll after the semester begins will have 3 weeks to submit all assignments.

ASSIGNMENT

The culminating activity will be assigned by your teacher once school begins.

We recommend you actively read in some of the following ways to make sure you are prepared for the assignment:

- Use post-it notes to record any thoughts, ideas, questions, etc. you have while reading or to mark any important passages.
- Journal and reflect after every chapter or every few chapters (this can be very informal).
- Talk about your book with friends and family.

What are some things you should consider while reading?

- Who are the main characters? What are some of their driving character traits? Flaws? Do the characters remind you of characters from any other texts/TV shows/ films?
- What are some conflicts present throughout? Can these conflicts relate to real life events?
- What are some of the most important passages or lines of the story? These might be major events of the story, beautiful descriptions, character development, etc.
- If the text you chose is nonfiction, consider what message the author seeks to convey, the choices the author makes to convey that message, the author's purpose for writing the story, and any background/contextual information to the topic someone who reads it must know.
