READING & NOTE TAKING:

Closely read the novel and take notes *for yourself* on setting, basic plot, characters, conflicts, and themes. You decide how to best format your notes for each chapter, for these notes will help you locate specific parts of the text after classes begin and we start working with the text in great detail. List any questions you personally may have regarding the chapter. You can expect a 50-60 question multiple-choice test on the novel.
