



Current Thinking for a Proposed 2024 Bond: Areas of Investment

A Citizen's Facilities Advisory Committee (CFAC) started meeting in the summer of 2021 to identify facilities with the highest needs, as well as review projected growth within our district boundaries. They recommended several projects as identified in the 2023 school bond put before the voters. While the school bond did not pass, the growing needs in our district remain.

Over spring and summer, we conducted two community surveys to solicit feedback on the bond proposal. The most important issues from the community perspective included addressing overcrowding, improving safety/health/security, and supporting Career and Technical Education. Minimizing the tax increase and limiting portable classrooms surfaced as the most important factors respondents wanted the board to consider.

Using community input, the board identified three core priorities and is reducing the scope of the previous bond. While these projects do not remedy all of our urgent needs in the system identified by the CFAC committee, it does put a big dent in the issues respondents want addressed at a more affordable price point. The board will vote on placing a bond on the February ballot at the November board meeting. You can view board meetings and agendas on our website at *OrtingSchools.org/SchoolBoard*

1. EXPAND ELEMENTARY CAPACITY

Rebuild Orting Elementary School for 600 students. A new gym for Ptarmigan Ridge Elementary to allow for consistent P.E./ Health instruction and cafeteria expansion.

2. HIGH SCHOOL ADDITION FOR CTE AND STEM PROGRAMS

Build a new 200 student addition to Orting High School focusing on Career and Technical Education (CTE) and STEM programs. Remodel the existing culinary and STEM lab for agricultural sciences.

3. SAFETY, HEALTH, AND SECURITY UPGRADES

Upgrade to keyless control/lockdown systems and make significant improvements to the heating and cooling systems at Orting Middle School and Ptarmigan Ridge Elementary.

Cardinal Stadium gets a new look



Teacher Oliver Chadwick says that the stakes are low at this level, but building Lego robotics helps build "confidence in their ability to creatively solve smaller examples of challenges that exist in every industry."

Partnership with Local Colleges and Universities Leads to Increased Rigor Students can earn college credit and even their Associates Degree while attending Orting High School

Orting High School provides access to 144 possible college credits. Through partnerships with institutions such as Pierce College, Clover Park College, and Bates Technical College, students can earn up to 55 credits. Through our 4-year university partnerships including the University of Washington, Central Washington University, and Eastern Washington University, students can earn up to 89 possible credits.

These courses are taught by our dedicated high school teachers, trained and approved as adjunct professors. These courses allow our students to kick-start their educational journey right here in Orting.

Through our partnership with Green River College and Pierce College, students can use these combined credits to pursue an Associate of Arts (AA) degree from either college. This means our students could potentially earn a college degree without ever leaving Orting High School! All college credits are entirely free for our families. We are committed to ensuring that every student has access to top-notch education and a bright future.

Academic Growth and Success is Climbing

A strong academic foundation paired with life ready skills are key to long-term success. We are proud to say a majority of state tested areas improved over the previous year! Our staff have been working tirelessly to accelerate learning and close learning gaps. We are proud to share some of our recent successes with you.

Elementary Math Marvels

Every elementary student has one hour of math instruction daily as well as an additional 30 minutes for intervention and support. When students require additional support, we employ small group sessions, consisting of four to six students. In these focused settings, teachers address the specific needs of students who may

face challenges in mastering grade level concepts.

One remarkable success story recently emerged from our intervention efforts. A 3rd grade student who initially grappled with place value and regrouping has transformed into a peer mentor! They now skillfully guide fellow classmates in mastering the intricacies of adding three-digit numbers.

Elementary Students Thrive with New Literacy Curriculum

A crucial component of a well-rounded education is literacy, and the choice of reading curriculum can significantly impact a student's journey towards becoming a proficient and confident reader. Last year, the Orting School District

adopted Bookworms as our new reading curriculum. This curriculum is providing strong research-based elements of teaching reading in a developmental approach that builds from Kindergarten through 5th grade. Over the last school year and throughout the start of this school year, we have seen remarkable gains that students are making in their reading abilities and confidence in themselves as readers.



Math Teachers are Building a "Falcon Mindset" in Students at Orting Middle School

Last May, several members of the Orting Middle School math team attended a two-day training at Stanford University to prepare them for teaching a "YouCubed" math summer camp curriculum aimed at building students' self-confidence and

skills in math. Our math team is committed to instilling what we call a "Falcon Mindset" in students, where students see mistakes as an important part of the learning process, where they see themselves as learners, and they believe in their ability to learn. The math team is continuing to integrate the methods learned at the YouCubed training and we are excited to see the positive impact it is having on our students' learning and their experience in math classrooms!


