Academics


INSTRUCTIONAL STRATEGIES

Through in-service sessions, building-level team meetings, grade-level meetings and professional learning community sessions, our educators analyzed classroom performance data in conjunction with state standards and written curriculum for each course in order to design effective lesson plans. Effectiveness is monitored through achievement levels and growth data over time. Principals engaged in the observation cycle and met with teachers prior to a lesson's delivery to collaborate on engagement strategies, differentiation and goals. Effective strategies have been shared among

building teams and included in newsletter updates to families. Teachers used benchmark assessment data points and common assessments to make instructional adjustments. PSSA and Keystone exam trigger courses used classroom diagnostic tools to provide students with learning experiences mirroring what they experienced during the actual exam. Each school remains focused on alignment (curriculum—lesson plans), maximizing time and providing specific feedback to all students.

IN-DEPTH PROGRAM REVIEW - SCIENCE MINI-REVIEW

Over the past seven years, all departments completed an in-depth program review. The district is now completing mini-reviews, and the Science Department was the first to complete the process. All secondary and some elementary science teachers participated. The first phase of the review evaluated the implementation of the 2016-2017 IDPR Science Department recommendations. Each grade span conducted an analysis of every goal to determine the depth of implementation. Phase two of the process included the review and analysis of data points connected to the district's K-12 science program. The third and fourth phases of the mini-review included conducting high-level research on K-12 science topics, reviewing the STEELS Standards and interviewing a few selected universities, businesses and local school districts to identify other emerging trends. Finally, the committee reviewed the findings from each phase to identify updated recommendations that will guide the department in making continuous refinements and improvements in the coming years.



Recommendations for all K-12 science courses include modifying unit-based curriculum and assessments to align with STEELS standards; increasing phenomenon/ inquiry-based learning activities; identifying physical space modifications needed; adding career education

and work standard learning activities; integrating reading into content area strategies to support and challenge all students; and revising course pathway options and sequencing of resources.

STRATEGIC PLAN 2023-2024



CURRICULUM

This key initiative has evolved significantly given the feedback and direction of the board, which has approved a curricular framework for all K-12 courses. The new curricular framework will mirror the language of board policy and be posted on the Pine-Richland School District website for each of our 300+ courses. Particular emphasis is being placed on district-level resources, which are approved to support the delivery of curriculum and are connected to each course. Specific resources that are only used within a given unit are highlighted. All unit titles, their approximate length of instruction and forms of assessment are depicted alongside representative learning goals. Links to standards for each course are embedded to connect the content back to the foundational frameworks to clarify the skills and knowledge that students should be able to demonstrate as an outcome of each course at each particular grade span.

Safety, Security and Positive School Culture

Establishing a safe and positive school environment sets the foundation for learning. As a district, we focus on actions that strengthen safety and security and promote a positive school culture. Building administrators continue to deliver developmentally appropriate messages to students to promote an inclusive school culture. These messages and actions are shared with parents throughout the year in the Friday Flash. We communicate to families about these messages so they can be understood and reinforced at home. We continue to foster resiliency (internal and external protective factors) in our students through a continuum of services such as pupil services meetings,

Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS), Student Assistance Teams, RAMS Way, suicide prevention and intervention and school-based mental health services. Information is provided to parents and students through our district website and messages to promote awareness of a continuum of resources and supports. In the realm of physical safety and security, we implement drills throughout the year to promote readiness to respond to emergencies. We continue to take actionable steps based on risk and vulnerability assessments conducted by the Pennsylvania State Police. We also regularly review and refine our reunification procedures in case a serious event requires building evacuation.

Recruitment and Staffing



While Pine-Richland School District continues to effectively attract deep pools of candidates for most of our vacant positions, paraprofessional and custodial openings have remained harder for us to fill. We have taken actionable steps this school year to more actively recruit for these openings. We ran a social media campaign highlighting individual stories about what makes it great to work in these roles at Pine-Richland as told by various support employees themselves. The Employment section of our district website was updated to include employee testimonials from current paraprofessional and custodial staff members. We also hosted three live engagement sessions to attract prospective hires for these roles, each of which has resulted in a small number of hires. We recognize that with candidates for these roles in short supply, it is important to engage them quickly upon receiving notice of their interest. We ensure that our hiring managers can provide direct outreach to applicants to quickly engage them in our interview process.

Finance and Operations

The district uses a 10-year capital funding plan to meet the needs of district facilities with a future-focused strategy. The goal is to maintain all facilities and technology in the district while analyzing costs annually with a department- and building-level approach. We analyze future costs and projects each year to determine the financial commitment and to plan for minimizing debt. Cost estimates for the next decade

are approximately \$50,000,000. The most significant projects of the capital plan are building HVAC and roofing with projected costs estimated at more than \$30,000,000. Planning for these major projects is a priority over the next five years. Significant projects planned for the 2024-2025 school year include HVAC at Richland and Wexford, natatorium improvements, high school planetarium and stadium scoreboard.

School-Based Action Plans

Our school leadership teams continually reflect on the progress made by their building and set goals to improve the learning experience and outcomes for students in direct connection to the strategic plan. Each of our schools has been focused on the impact of high-quality instruction and the professional development and systems which support it. At each grade span, common goals have been selected to enhance professional dialogue and learning among our educators.

At the K-3 and 4-6 grade spans, our educators are focused on improving differentiation and engaging in cycles of learning through lesson studies and grade-level/departmental professional learning communities. At the 4-6 level, Professional Learning Communities are increasingly facilitated by the Academic Leadership Council members in collaboration with building administration to review learning outcomes and identify instructional strategies to ensure

student growth over time, a key need within that grade span. At the middle level, teachers and administrators use current student results to develop specific actions between the second and third benchmark assessments. At the high school level, professional learning communities, focused on high-quality classroom instruction, lesson planning and differentiation based on student data are the focus for the four-year horizon.

Board Operations

The school board aims to refine and enhance the system of governance through school board training, evaluation, policy development and strengthening of key communities throughout 2023-2027, with a short-term goal to establish board operating norms and framework.

In October, the board approved a proposal to work with a third-party consultant on strategies and practices to strengthen this area. This work also supports an annual self-assessment process used by the board. New board members have been engaged in an onboarding program. In March, the board confirmed use of the DECIDE model framework.

Benchmarking

We maintain a comprehensive set of measures and metrics in our district in the areas of academic performance, attendance, discipline, program offerings, program participation, special education, gifted education, human resources, business, technology and more. Academic achievement and growth data were presented at the annual November school board meeting.

A finance and capital funding plan update was provided in November, December and January. The annual independent financial audit reinforces the strong fiscal practice of the district. Comprehensive stakeholder survey results are posted publicly. Benchmarking demonstrates a strong return on investment with educational programming.

DISTRICT / STAFF UPDATES

Chief Michael Gasparetto, Pine-Richland High School's recently retired Air Force JROTC instructor, was named the 2024 Educator of the Year by the Pennsylvania American Legion. Chief Gasparetto was nominated by Richland American Legion Post #548 and presented with the award at the 105th Department Convention in Harrisburg in July. Chief Gasparetto was also awarded the Community Patriots Award by Richland American Legion Post 548 on Memorial Day. He was selected in recognition and appreciation of his service to the Pine-Richland community and his advocacy for youth education and responsible citizenship.



Primary art teacher Jennifer Jankowski was selected as the March Teacher of the Month by WTAE-TV. Ms. Jankowski was celebrated by her colleagues and students at a school-wide assembly at Wexford Elementary on March 22. More than 2,500 teachers in the Pittsburgh area were nominated. Wexford librarian Andrea Clarkson was selected as a Spotlight Librarian by the Pennsylvania School Librarians Association in March. During the week of March 18, Mrs. Clarkson did a social media takeover for the association, spotlighting library programs at Wexford and throughout the district.

Sixth-grade teacher and former girls' soccer coach Jodi Chmielewski was inducted into the Pennsylvania Soccer Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January. Ms. Chmielewski became the first female coach inducted into the PSCA Hall of Fame. During her 21 years coaching Pine-Richland High School's girls' soccer team, she racked up more than 300 wins, two WPIAL championships and a PIAA championship.



Retired Pine-Richland teacher and 1972 graduate of Richland High School Ron Schmiedel was named the recipient of the Pennsylvania Association for Gifted Education's Neuber Pregler Award for 2023. This award is given to individuals who have dedicated years of service to gifted students in Pennsylvania. Mr. Schmiedel retired from Pine-Richland School District in 2020.

In honor of Dyslexia Awareness Month in October, the Student Services Department hosted a dyslexia simulation on October 25 presented by the International Dyslexia Association of Pennsylvania. Dyslexia is a learning impairment that causes problems with reading, writing and spelling. The intelligence of people with dyslexia is unaffected. To help create understanding and facilitate more awareness about this learning difficulty, stations were set up to learn more about how dyslexia can impact daily functioning when in school that included hands-on experiences to mimic what a student or person with dyslexia may endure when completing school-related tasks.



For the second year in a row, artwork created by Pine-Richland students in grades K-8 was displayed at Pine Community Center, part of the art department's goal to make community connections to showcase student art for the benefit of both students and the community. Displays were updated throughout the year, and for Pine Township's Earth Day event, the student artwork on display was made from recycled materials to promote sustainability.

Pine-Richland Middle School, Eden Hall Upper Elementary, and Hance, Richland and Wexford **Elementary Schools** were officially recognized by PAPBS as implementing PBIS with Fidelity at Tier 1 for the 2022-2023 school year at the PAPBS Implementers Forum in November. **All six district schools** were recognized by PAPBS as implementing PBIS with Fidelity at Tier 1 for the 2023-2024 school year.



Pine-Richland High **School** placed 13th out of 184 schools nationwide in the Sodexo Healthy High School Challenge, earning \$1,000 for the student government. Schools earned points for every meal combo and healthy a la carte items purchased.

Facility Improvements







Notable facility improvements during the 2023-2024 school year included:

- > Renovated gymnasium at Pine-Richland High School
- > New track at Pine-Richland Stadium
- > HVAC improvements at Pine-Richland Middle School

A ribbon-cutting ceremony for the new Pine-Richland High School gymnasium was held in October in conjunction with the Girls' Volleyball team's Spike Out Cancer event. The new gym now features four-sided seating for more than 1,500 and a new video scoreboard. In addition to the renovated main gym, the auxiliary gym was renovated to include dedicated space for wrestling practice and an observation balcony, the fitness center was relocated and moved, and a new athletics conference room was created.

Projects starting this summer include a new video scoreboard and fencing for Pine-Richland Stadium, a new planetarium for Pine-Richland High School, natatorium upgrades and continued HVAC improvements at Pine-Richland Middle School.

Pine-Richland added three electric buses to its fleet at the end of the 2022-2023 school year, and in October, the district celebrated this sustainability initiative with representatives from Student Transportation of America, Duquesne Light and the 6-School Sustainability Club. Nineteen members of the six-school sustainability club attended the event to learn more about the electric buses and take a brief ride in an electric bus to and from Pine-Richland High School. Club members, spanning 2nd through 12th grade, had an opportunity to look under the hood of one of the buses, learn about safety features and the charging process, and ask questions of drivers and of Kevin Barnhart, general manager of STA.

U.S. News & World Report ranked Pine-Richland High School 4th in the Pittsburgh metropolitan area, 12th in Pennsylvania, 404th in STEM nationally and 513th overall nationally in its 2024 rankings.

U.S. News & World Report ranked Wexford Elementary School 5th in Pennsylvania elementary schools and Pine-Richland Middle School 26th in Pennsylvania middle schools in its rankings published in November 2023.

The Pittsburgh Business Times ranked Pine-Richland School District 9th in southwestern Pennsylvania (Allegheny, Armstrong, Beaver, Butler, Fayette, Washington and Westmoreland counties) and 17th in the state in their 2024 report based on Keystone and PSSA exam results for 2021-2023.

S&P Global Ratings announced in April that Pine-Richland School District's general obligation bond rating has increased to AA Stable from AA- Stable. This upgrade reflects the district's positive financial performance, strong financial reserves, responsible management of debt, stable financial outlook and viability.

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT AND GROWTH REPORT

11th Annual Academic Achievement and Growth Report

The mission of the Pine-Richland School District is to focus on learning for every student every day. The district vision emphasizes that learning is reflected in both achievement and growth. We believe that learning happens differently for different people, requiring flexibility and variation in approach. Learning also requires effort, persistence and the support of everyone—students, staff and parents.

While data analysis is an ongoing process to drive improvements to our curriculum, instruction and assessments throughout the school year, we pause each fall to create a reflective, aggregate profile of the outcomes for the prior school year within the Academic Achievement and Growth Report. Teams consistently leverage real-time formative data to drive instruction within the classroom level and leverage lag data from standardized assessments at the classroom and building levels for course recommendations and intervention mapping. Over time, these concepts of using both real-time and lag data to ensure appropriate student learning opportunities to improve outcomes have been coined Data for Action within the district. We do not simply curate datasets to admire statically but rather view these sets of facts as criteria from which to launch measurable educational programming and hold ourselves accountable to successful outcomes.

Within the Baldrige Performance Excellence framework, LeTCI is used as an acronym to describe evaluation factors for reviewing results (Levels, Trends, Comparisons and Integration). We use those elements when gathering data for analysis to ensure appropriate benchmarking and the ability to assess performance levels and trends over time with the ability to segment that data by relevant grade levels, disciplines and subgroups.

This collaboratively-authored report includes the most densely detailed net results for the district, allowing individuals to quickly analyze the learning outcomes in the district at the highest level. We have included the following demographic subgroups in the companion document and in this report for the years since the pandemic: (a) gender; (b) IEP status; (c) economically disadvantaged; and (d) ethnicity. While segmentation can also be accomplished for English learners (EL), our count of students within this subgroup is very low and would jeopardize the confidentiality of these students' achievement and growth levels.

The aggregate, summative district standardized testing results, in addition to the ones we monitor throughout a given school year (e.g. universal screening results), provide us with direction as to the next areas of improvement we can target, as we prioritize our relative areas of strength and opportunity. Senior leaders, principals, Academic Leadership Council members and other teacher leaders own the analysis process together and assist with segmentation through their respective lenses. Concerted efforts have been made to include data reflective of the entire student development process, captured by our PR Graduate Portrait.


Student learning outcomes (measured through achievement and growth) are evidenced across several factors, not just the snapshot of one standardized assessment measure. Data reflective of these more holistic outcomes are included in the PR Graduate Portrait section. Those measures would ideally include a holistic look at our schools and students, including classroombased assessments, school climate, participation in extraand co-curricular activities, graduation rates, attendance, discipline, post-secondary readiness, social-emotional development, wellness and more.

Data contained in this report is also used as input to the internal findings citations by the data subcommittee during our In-Depth Program Review Process when we study K-12 programming within departments or support areas to prioritize recommended improvement actions for systematic implementation and integration with other aspects of our learning system. Additionally, it is used as an input to our Strategic Planning Process as we design impactful, high-leverage long-term goals and short-term strategy actions, particularly within the Teaching & Learning category. Resulting recommendations impact students directly through improvements in the general education classroom and through various levels of intervention. While general Continued on page 14

education teachers own the improvements in their classrooms, our interventionists implement and own improvements within the interventions embedded in the Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS). District and building-level MTSS teams continuously review the efficacy of interventions for individuals and groups of students alike to make recommendations for improvement.

Stakeholder surveys are conducted annually to assess satisfaction levels among students, parents, and staff members. A portion of the survey questions focuses on elements of learning (e.g., academic programming, support services, level of challenge and pacing, meaningful nature of homework

assignments, learning goals and feedback, teacher expectations and curricular consistency, etc.). Buildings review this data annually as they set goals for their collective focal areas.

Our focal question continues to be *how do we focus on academic learning for every student every day?* The learning system at Pine-Richland School District is illustrated by the Model for Teaching and Learning image, allowing us to focus on Data for Action.

PSSA and Keystone Information

The Pennsylvania System of School Assessments (PSSAs) test student skills in mathematics and English language arts in grades three through eight and in science in grades four and eight. The following performance levels are used: Advanced (Superior Academic Performance), Proficient (Satisfactory Academic Performance), Basic (Marginal Academic Performance), and Below Basic (Inadequate Academic Performance).

The Keystone Exams are end-of-course assessments designed to assess proficiency in the following subject areas:

- > Algebra I (PR grades 7-10)
- > Biology (PR grades 9-10)
- > Literature (PR grade 9)



- > For the 2023 SAT, Pine-Richland students outperformed global and state groups.

- > Scores for all students in ELA and mathematics fell slightly below the six year average:


Future Ready Index

The Pennsylvania Department of Education utilizes the Future Ready PA Index as a method of evaluating schools in a more holistic manner than the SPP alone, utilizing a "dashboard model to highlight how schools are performing and showing progress on multiple measures" (PDE, 2018).

The Future Ready PA Index:

- > Increases an emphasis on student growth measures, which incentivizes a focus on all learners and is less sensitive to demographic variables.
- > Measures English language acquisition among EL students, not simply performance on a test of grade-level ELA standards.
- > Incentivizes career awareness instruction beginning at the elementary level.
- > Addresses the issue of unequal weighting of content areas in the current School Performance Profile.
- > Provides indicators of student success after graduation.
- > Increases the emphasis on student access to course offerings such as Advanced Placement, International Baccalaureate, college credit, and Career Technical Education programs of study.

- > Allows LEAs to include locally-selected reading assessment (grade 3) and math assessments (grade 7) as additional snapshots of student progress.
- Incentivizes schools to offer career pathways that culminate in high value, industry-recognized credentials.

1960 Football Team

The 1960 Richland football team was the first athletic team in school history to challenge for a WPIAL playoff berth. Only the fourth football team in Rams history, they went 8-1 under coach Dick Dilts and assistant coaches Aylmer Girdwood and Ron lenkins.



MICHAEL BUTERBAUGH, Class of 1971



Michael Buterbaugh was a two-sport athlete at Richland High School, playing football and basketball. At quarterback, Mr. Buterbaugh was the starter for the 1969 and 1970 Hall of Fame teams and captain of the 1970 team. He never lost a game both teams won back-to-back WPIAL Class A

championships with a 20-0 record. Mr. Buterbaugh was named to the All-WPIAL Team in 1970, WKPA Player of the Week in 1969 and 1970, Sharpsburg Herald All-Star Offensive Team in 1969 and 1970, Pittsburgh Press Outstanding Player Class A in 1970 and All-Allegheny Conference in 1970. As a basketball player, Mr. Buterbaugh was captain his senior year, graduating as the leading career scorer at Richland High School with 614 points as well as having the most career field goals with 255.

BILL COLPO, Class of 1969



Bill Colpo graduated from Richland High School as a three-sport athlete. As a freshman, Mr. Colpo won the WPIAL Section 7 Championship in the 133 lb. weight class. That same year, he won Area 3 and the AMA-AAU Junior Olympics Championship in the 135 lb. weight class. As a senior, he was co-captain of the wrestling team (12-2) and was

undefeated (14-0) in regular season matches. That year, he won the Section 7 Championship in the 138 lb. weight class for the second time. As a senior football player, Mr. Colpo was the leading rusher for the first seven games while only playing two and a half games due to a season-ending knee injury.

MATTHEW CRUMMY, Class of 1999



Matthew Crummy was a three-sport athlete, participating in soccer, ice hockey and track and field, earning 11 varsity letters and the title of North Hills News Record Boys' Athlete of the Year in 1999 and North Hills News Record Boys' Soccer Player of the Year in 1998. In soccer, Mr. Crummy scored 83 career goals and 40

career assists, graduating with all-time PRHS career goals and points records. He was a four-time section all-star, two-time section MVP, two-time team MVP and two-time WPIAL all-star, and led the team to two PIAA tournaments. In hockey, he led the varsity team to a PIHL AA Championship in 1999. He was named a WPIHL and TAHA all-star, team captain and MVP. He was a two-time Penguins Cup finalist. In track and field, he earned 555 career points in track and field, the school's then third-highest of all-time. He was a two-time team MVP and six-time WPIAL finalist.

KEVIN MCCABE, Class of 2003



Kevin McCabe was a three-sport athlete at Pine-Richland, lettering in football, basketball and baseball. Football is where he excelled, and in his senior year, he led his team to a then-school-record 12 wins and to the WPIAL title game. As a senior, Mr. McCabe was selected to the AP First Team All-State and was named a Super Prep All-American.

He was a two-time member of the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette Fabulous 22 and graduated as Pine-Richland's all-time leader in touchdown passes, yards and completions. Mr. McCabe played in the National Football League with the Pittsburgh Steelers and in the Arena Football League with the Cleveland Gladiators and Pittsburgh Power.

KRISTEN MURSLACK, Class of 2013







Board Approves Budget for 2024-2025 with No Tax Increase


2024-2025 Budgeted Revenue




2024-2025 Budgeted Expenditures

The Pine-Richland School Board approved the general fund budget for the 2024-2025 school year with total expenditures of \$113,134,994 and total revenues of \$105,755,644 with utilization of fund balance for capital improvements in the amount of \$7,379,350. The board maintained the following tax rates for the fiscal year 2024-2025 with no increase:

- > Real Estate Tax rate of 19.5867 mills (no increase)
- > Earned Income Tax of 0.5 percent
- > Act 511 Per Capita Tax of \$5 for individuals age 18 and older
- > Pennsylvania School Code Per Capita Tax of \$5 for individuals age 18 & older

COST-SAVING MEASURES

The district has addressed the financial climate and has looked at several alternative revenue sources and cost-saving measures for the past several years. Some of them included:

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During the 2023-2024 fiscal year, the district was unable to capitalize on any bond refunding opportunities due to the high interest rates. The district will continue to monitor each debt instrument for additional refunding opportunities to achieve savings and lower interest costs, if possible. Due to the high interest rates, the District investments outperformed expectations by over a million dollars.

INDIVIDUAL TAXPAYER SAVINGS OPPORTUNITIES

- > The board approved the Homestead and Farmstead Exclusion Resolution for the upcoming tax year. The resolution provides for property tax reduction through a "homestead or farmstead exclusion," which is provided by the state gaming industry/casinos. Residents should have an application on file with Allegheny County indicating the house they live in is their homestead. They will also receive a reduction in assessed value for their school tax. Each approved homestead will receive a real estate tax reduction in the amount of \$217.35.
- In February 2024, the board approved a property tax rebate program for all qualifying senior citizens, widows and widowers for the 2023 calendar year. The application reflected a due date of June 30, 2024. If the filer meets the criteria, he or she could see anywhere from \$380 -\$1,000 in tax rebates.

BUDGET BALANCING ACT IMPACTED BY VARIABLES

As you know, balancing the budget can be extremely difficult. Some of the variables that factor into the district's budget include:

Salaries & Wages – Personnel costs for administration, faculty and support staff represent 64.24% of total annual budgeted expenditures. These expenditures are established by collective bargaining agreements and compensation plans.

Employer Benefit Costs – The district's employer contribution rate for the Public School Employees' Retirement System (PSERS) will decrease to 33.9% of salary costs from 34% in 2023-2024. This rate is set by the PSERS Board of Trustees and mandated by state legislation. Although a drop in rate, expenditures for retirement contributions are budgeted to increase \$713,581 in 2024-2025. State funding reimburses the district fifty percent of these costs.

Premium Costs – Allegheny County Schools Health Insurance Consortium medical premium costs will increase by 9% for covered employees. Dental and vision insurance premiums will increase by 5% and 3% respectively. Overall group health insurance expenditures for the District are budgeted to increase by \$1,433,814 in 2024–2025.

Tuition Expenditures – The district is required by law to pay tuition costs which are projected at \$1,100,915 for 2024-2025 for students who reside in Pine-Richland to attend cyber/charter schools. None of these costs are reimbursed by the state.

Pennsylvania school boards are governed by nine elected directors. Four newly elected school directors and one incumbent school director were sworn into office on December 4, 2023, Solicitor Donald Palmer administered the oath of office to Mrs. Ashley Fortier (Region 1), Mrs. Leslie Miller (Region 2), Mr. Philip Morrissette (Region 3), Mr. Michael Wiethorn (Region 3), and incumbent Mr. Marc Casciani (Region 1). The directors will serve a four-year term ending in 2027. The board elected **Mr. Morrissette** as president and re-elected Mrs. Amy Terchick as vice president. Mr. Casciani was re-elected in May 2024 to continue serving as board treasurer.

The board also appointed:

- > Mrs. Lisa Hillman as legislative representative to the Pennsylvania School Boards Association for a one-year term through November 2024.
- > Mr. Joseph Cassidy as a representative to the A.W. Beattie Career Center Joint Committee for a two-year term expiring December 2025. Mrs. Miller was appointed to a one-year term expiring December 2024.
- > Mrs. Amy Terchick as a representative to the Pine Township Parks and Recreation Board for 2024.
- > Mrs. Fortier as a Food Service Advisory and Wellness Committee representative.
- > Mr. Christopher Juzwick, director of financial and operational services, as a delegate to the Allegheny North Tax Collection Committee with Mr. Casciani as an alternate.
- > Mrs. Barbara Williams serves as board secretary.

At the May 20, 2024, meeting, Mrs. Hillman and Mrs. Christina Brussalis were elected as voting delegates for the Pennsylvania School Board Association's 2024 Delegate Assembly.

In April, members of the school board toured Pine-Richland High School and Wexford Elementary to see learning in action. The tour included a visit to the high school PAES Lab, designed to prepare students for post-graduation employment opportunities, and to the high school planetarium. While at the high school, board members spoke with GATE students and members of the Principal's Advisory Committee. At Wexford, the board saw phonics learning in action in first and second-grade classrooms and a school counselor-guided lesson in a third-grade classroom. They visited the English as a Second Language classroom to learn how the district is meeting the needs of students with language barriers. Board members also spoke with third-grade teachers to learn about RAM Time and how students use it to reach their highest potential through differentiation.

Attendance

The board requires that school age students enrolled in district schools attend school regularly, in accordance with state laws. The educational program offered by the district is predicated upon the presence of the student and requires continuity of instruction and classroom participation in order for

students to achieve academic standards and consistent educational progress. You can visit pinerichland.org/attendance for more about Policy 204. The district revised this policy in 2021.

Discipline Code

The purpose of the PRSD Discipline Code is to present standard behavioral expectations based on school board policy for all students in the district. Parents are encouraged to become familiar with the PRSD Discipline Code and to review these documents with their children. Parents, guardians, and students are also referred to Board Policy 218 of the board policy manual for additional information regarding the discipline code, student conduct, and consequences of inappropriate or proscribed behaviors and conduct. In the event of any conflict between the terms of the discipline code and any board policy, the applicable board policy will control and take precedence. Public Outreach & Awareness System (Child Find)

PRSD uses a public outreach awareness system to locate and identify children thought to be eligible for special education within the school district's jurisdiction. The district provides details of where to find out more information about the district's special education and early intervention programs through announcements on PR-TV (broadcasted throughout the community), in the annual report (distributed to residents, township buildings, and libraries) and via electronic communications (e-notices and website).

Discrimination and Harassment

The board declares it to be the policy of this district to provide an equal opportunity for all students to achieve their maximum potential through the programs and activities offered in the schools without discrimination on the basis of race, color, age, creed, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender or gender identity, ancestry, national origin, marital status, pregnancy or handicap/disability.

The district shall provide to all students, without discrimination, course offerings, counseling, assistance, employment, athletics, and extracurricular activities. The equitable distribution of district resources is one means

the district shall use to ensure all students receive a quality education. The district shall make reasonable accommodations for identified physical and mental impairments that constitute handicaps and disabilities, consistent with the requirements of federal and state laws and regulations.

Discrimination is inconsistent with the rights of students and the educational and programmatic goals of the district and is prohibited at or, in the course of, districtsponsored programs or activities, including transportation to or from school or schoolsponsored activities.

Pine-Richland School District does not discriminate on the basis of sex and prohibits sex discrimination in any education program or activity that it operates, as required by Title IX and its regulations, including in employment. Such discrimination shall be referred to throughout this notice as Title IX sexual harassment. Inquiries regarding the application of Title IX to the district may be referred to the district's Title IX Coordinator (contact information below), to the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Civil Rights (https://ocrcas. ed.gov/contact-ocr), or both.

Annual notices are required for the PRSD website and related publications. Violations of this policy, including acts of retaliation as described in this policy, or knowingly providing false information, may result in disciplinary consequences under applicable Board policy and procedures.

Complaint & Investigative Processes

The school board encourages students and parents/guardians who believe they have been subjected to discrimination or harassment to promptly report such incidents to designated employees in accordance with PR School Board Policy 103: Nondiscrimination/Title IX Sexual Harassment Affecting Students and 103.1: Nondiscrimination - Qualified Students with Disabilities, which can be found on the PR Policy Manual, which is linked to the district's website. Complaints of discrimination or harassment shall be investigated promptly, and corrective action will be taken for substantiated allegations. Confidentiality of all parties shall be maintained maintained to the extent possible consistent with the district's legal and investigative obligations.

Students and third parties who believe they or others have been subject to discrimination, Title IX sexual harassment, and/or retaliation

for reporting of such should promptly report such incidents to the building principal and/ or the Title IX Coordinator. Individuals are encouraged to do so even if some elements of the related incident took place or originated away from school grounds, school activities or school conveyances. A person who is not an intended victim or target of discrimination, but who is adversely affected by the offensive conduct, may also file a report of discrimination The building principal shall promptly notify the Compliance Officer/Title IX Coordinator of all reports of discrimination, Title IX sexual harassment and/or retaliation.

The Compliance Officer/Title IX Coordinator shall promptly contact the complainant regarding the report to gather additional information as necessary and to discuss the availability of supportive measures. The Compliance Officer/Title IX Coordinator shall consider the complainant's wishes with respect to supportive measures.

*On April 19, 2024, the U.S. Department of Education released its Final Rule under Title IX which prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex in education or activities receiving federal financial assistance. These updated regulations are effective August 1, 2024. Policies and administrative regulations will be updated based on the new guidelines. The online version of the PRSD Discipline Code will also be revised.

Surveillance Cameras & Audio Recordings (Polices 810.2 and 817)

Under School Board Policy 817 (Use of Video Surveillance Cameras), the district is permitted to use video surveillance in any school building, on school district property, or on any transportation vehicle being used by the district. The district does monitor district buildings, property, and transportation vehicles with surveillance cameras and individuals using any such facilities should expect that such surveillance may occur. In addition, the use of audio recordings is permitted on school district transportation vehicles (Policy 810.2). The district began recording audio on all equipped buses in the 2017-2018 school year.

Food Service (Policy 808) & Student Wellness (Policy 246)

In 2018, the school board approved a revised Policy 808 Food Services as well as an administrative regulation, which addresses student meal balances and unpaid meal charge procedures.

Pine-Richland School District recognizes that student wellness and proper nutrition are related to students' physical well being, growth, development, and readiness to learn. The board is committed to providing a school environment that promotes student wellness, proper nutrition, nutrition education and promotion, and regular physical activity as part of the total learning experience. In a healthy school environment, students will learn about and participate in positive dietary and lifestyle practices that can improve student achievement. In November of 2017, the board approved a revised Policy 246 Student Wellness.

Child Abuse (Policy 806)

The board requires district employees, independent contractors, and volunteers to comply with identification and reporting requirements for suspected child abuse, as well as the training requirement for recognition and reporting of child abuse to comply with the Child Protective Services Law and the School Code. Complaint Process (Policy 906)

The board welcomes inquiries, suggestions, and constructive criticism from parents/guardians, district residents, or community groups regarding the district's programs, personnel, operations, and facilities. The board welcomes the public at all activities and school-sponsored events, but, the Board also acknowledges its duty to maintain order and preserve school facilities during such events. Student Accident Insurance (Policy 211)

The board recognizes the need for insurance coverage for unforeseen accidents that may occur to students in the course of attendance at school or participation in the athletic and extracurricular programs of the schools. The board shall provide parents/ guardians the opportunity to purchase insurance coverage, at no cost to the board, for injury resulting from accidents sustained by students in school programs, school activities, and while traveling between home and school other than on a school bus. The premium will be paid by the parents/guardians. The board shall maintain insurance coverage by a qualified insurer over and above the first responsibility of family coverage at no cost to the student for injury resulting from accidents sustained while participating in an interscholastic sports program, the cheerleader program, and band program.

Parents/guardians looking for health insurance can review more information about the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). CHIP is there for your kids with quality, comprehensive health insurance coverage for routine doctor visits, prescriptions, dental, eye care, and much more. Student Fundraising (Policy 229)

Fundraising activities must comply with School Board Policy 229 (Student Fundraising) and must be requested in writing to the building principal or director of athletics on a district-approved form. The form must be reviewed and approved at the building/athletic office before any such fundraising can take place. No student instructional time may be used for fundraising. Student Survey (Policy 235.1)

Student Assistance Program (Policy 236)

The district reinforces the connection between emotional well-being and student success through a continuum of the school

and community mental health supports. The Student Assistance Programs and School-Based Mental Health Services are available in all PR schools, K-12. Specifically, all staff members (administrators, teachers, counselors, nurses, coaches, bus drivers, custodial staff, food service personnel) are trained annually on risk factors and warning signs of suicide and appropriate responsible reporting procedures (Observe, Listen, Refer). The district and school suicide prevention coordinators continue to provide age-appropriate curriculum for students K-12 in the development of resiliency, understanding good emotional and physical health, protective factors, healthy coping and problem-solving skills, responsible reporting, and identifying trusted adults at school and in the home environments. Anyone can refer a student to SAP when they are concerned about someone's behavior. Students can go directly to the SAP team to ask for help. The SAP team contacts the parent for permission to proceed with the SAP process. Visit pinerichland.org/sap for more information.

Suicide Awareness, Prevention, and Response (Policy 819)

The board is committed to protecting the health, safety, and welfare of its students and the school community. Policy 819 supports the provision of a comprehensive district program designed to promote behavioral health and prevent suicide. The Board directs the district to provide education on youth suicide awareness and prevention; to establish methods of prevention, intervention, and response to a suicide attempt or suicide death; and to promote access to suicide awareness and prevention resources.
