UNIQUE SEASON-OPENER MAKES LADY CAVS WINNERS IN MORE THAN ONE WAY

There's a new ad for Nike that debuted during the Olympic Games in which the narrator (a very anguished Willem Dafoe) continually asks, "Does that make me a bad person?" while a variety of superstar and little-known athletes provide visual examples of disdain, disrespect, and a general lack of concern for their opponents. It ends with the dubious tagline, "Winning isn't for everyone."

Crockett County Lady Cavalier soccer coach Carli Branson would much prefer what was displayed on her own team's field Tuesday night in Alamo.

For the 2024 season opener – which also featured the return of Branson to the head coaching ranks in Crockett World – the Lady Cavs hosted Jackson South Side. They invited all spectators to wear black – as a token of support for a key member of the OPPOSING team. And they even took up donations for that Lady Hawk player as fans entered the stadium.

Does that make THEM bad persons? Hardly. Just prior to the start of the new school year, South Side's Brynlee Merriweather was involved in a serious automobile accident that claimed the lives of her sister Aaliyah and her sister's boyfriend. Brynlee survived but remains in stable but serious condition, and faces a long road to recovery. Her family will face serious medical expenses, and Tuesday's donations are intended to alleviate the burden somewhat.

It's a gesture you wouldn't see from many schools toward an opposing player. But Crockett County High School lost one of its own athletes just a year ago – softball player and football manager Reese Barker – and the school's students and athletes know what the feeling is like. And they've been trying to <u>#LiveLikeReese</u> ever since.

And you know what? Reese would have organized some kind of fundraiser for Brynlee Merriweather. That's who she was.

So that's what the Lady Cavaliers did Tuesday night. They raised money for an opponent, and then showed that opponent the ultimate level of respect by playing at a high level in a 4-0 Crockett victory. So - in a sense - they won twice in the same night. The other sub-stories were there for the asking, and there was no shortage of them: Branson's return as Lady Cav head coach, after a year of tending to three small children in a decision her family needed her to make at the time; new players from other Crockett sports who were taking on soccer for the very first time – including one with a last name synonymous with local soccer success; position changes for a couple of returnees; and a goalkeeper who was watching her very first official game... from directly in front of the net, trying to keep the Lady Hawks from scoring.

And she did, aided by a strong defensive back line that limited South Side to just four relatively harmless shots on goal – all of which Crockett basketball center Amaria Walker stopped, earning a "clean sheet" (a soccer shutout) in her very first try.

The game also marked the first official appearance for assistant coach Joseph Soriano, who will take on head duties when the boys team begins its season next spring. In the meantime, he's helping Branson and fellow assistant Jennie Agee, and he's been especially active teaching a very young team the ins and outs of soccer strategy, lineups, and formations. And he was as happy as anyone at the game's conclusion. Why? "Because these girls showed us they have been hearing all the things we've been saying," Soriano smiled.

So back to the sub-stories. It is clear as day that Branson belongs on a soccer field somewhere, so it might as well be THIS one. Her enthusiasm for the sport, and her desire for her players to learn the game but still have fun while playing it, is infectious. She knows this squad is young and very short on experience, but she was excited with what she saw Tuesday night.

"Good soccer depends a lot on smart spacing and positioning," Branson said, "and our girls held their positions very well, especially on the defensive back line. We have some pretty good height with our defenders (specifically Dani Rios and Chayse Lewis), and when they stay in front of the ball, it isn't easy to get off many quality shots."

Another sub-story involves multi-sport athletes trying soccer for the first time, like Walker. Basketball player Lanyah Cathey is another, and her athleticism will pay off as she gets more familiar with the sport. She almost punched in a goal during a scrum in front of the net on a pinballing corner kick, but a South Side defender deflected it at the last second after Cathey had pushed it past the sliding goaltender.

But the new player with the most "pressure" is probably softballer Hannah Carter. Her older sister Mary – now at UT-Martin – was the team's leading scorer two years ago. Her younger brother Luke is one of the best players in West Tennessee for the current Cavalier boys. So – naturally – Hannah scored a goal in the very first official game in which she played. "It was fun," she laughed. "I wish I'd started playing sooner."

Highlighting the final sub-story was the play of Lydia Waddey, a Tasmanian Devillike bundle of energy who has been a defensive back wing in the past but is now a center midfielder. It's basically her job to "engineer" the game, always aware of where everyone else is and what needs to be done to get Crockett on the attack.

"Lydia always is conscious of her surroundings," Branson said. "She knows who's around her; she knows how to get the ball to the right people for an offensive attack, and she knows how to clog things up to prevent the other team from attacking. And she never gets tired! She's just a dynamo out there!" Lydia's younger sister Rebecca was just as active keeping the ball distributed on the offensive end.

When all was said and done Tuesday night, the Lady Cavaliers scored twice in each half on their way to the 4-0 triumph. Emme Grace Martin notched the first goal of the season with a high looping kick which she steered directly over the goalie's head from short range. Avery Thornton made it 2-0 with a charge from the right side, somehow pushing a shot through from what seemed like a nearimpossible angle.

Carter notched her first career goal fairly early in the second half, and Stephanie Joyner finished off the Lady Hawks with a rebound boot with about 12 minutes left to play. Joyner also had an assist in the contest, while Rios contributed two and Braniyah Green another.

"Our girls got a late start this summer, but they've been working hard to learn new things and they showed it against South Side," Branson said. "This is a good one to build on."

At the game's conclusion, both the Lady Cavaliers and the Lady Hawks joined in an intermingled circle on the field to offer up a prayer for Brynlee Merriweather and her family.

Sorry, Nike – with all due respect (which you disdain), you don't have to be a jerk to be a winner.

Crockett returns to the field Thursday night at 6:00 for a Senior Night duel with Ripley.
