- I. **CALL TO ORDER** by Ms. Kathy Whittle, President, called the meeting to order at 7:03 p.m.

Dr. Vitale recognized that each of the retirees are professional experts, amazing individuals with amazing families and that they will be missed. Mr. Nickel shared that he always appreciates what a teacher does in a day, that it takes a village to raise a child and he is thankful for the dedication each of the retirees has shown to all the children over the years.

Ms. Bredl echoed Dr. Vitale and Mr. Nickel's comments, thanking them as well. She recognized that she has children attended Evans City where Ms. Kamarchik worked and shared that her shoes will be hard to fill.

Mr. Jacobs shared that his children are third generation SV students, and he thanked each of them for all they have done.

Ms. Whittle recognized that; together, the retirees worked for SV for 665 years. She shared that teaching is a calling and that the love for students is a choice, thanking them for all they have done.

2. Three Seneca Valley students have been named National Cyber Scholars by the National Cyber Scholarship Foundation (NCSF) as a result of their demonstrating exceptional cyber security expertise in a challenging online cyber security training program, CyberStart America. In recognition for their remarkable achievements, rising sophomores Sawyer Shoemaker and

Madeline Zimmer, along with Haihan Xu, SV Class of 2023, have each earned a scholarship to attend the Cyber Foundations Academy with the chance to earn a GIAC Foundational Cybersecurity Technologies Practitioner Certification (GFACT), a package valued at over \$3,000.

3. The National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) announced Seneca Valley's very own Haihan Xu as a National Merit \$2,500 Scholarship winner. Mr. Xu, a senior, was one of 2,500 Merit Scholar designees who was chosen from a talent pool of more than 15,000 outstanding Finalists in the 2023 National Merit Scholarship Program.
4. Four seventh grade students from Ryan Gloyer Middle School (RGMS) were recently recognized for their award-winning poems at the 2023 Waldman Arts & Writing Awards, hosted by the Holocaust Center of Pittsburgh. The Waldman Arts & Writing awards ceremony took place on May 10, at Chatham University. This annual event allows students in grades 6-12 to compete for financial scholarships and winners are honored with prizes and certificates.
5. The Seneca Valley Biology Club Team tied for first and also won second and third place at the Butler County Envirothon that was held in late April. The Envirothon is the largest high school level environmental education competition in North America. In this competition, students prepare and compete in topics related to wildlife, aquatic ecology, forestry, soils and land use and current environmental issues. The competition is managed by our state agencies including the Game Commission, Fish and Boat Commission, PA Department of Agriculture and Conservation of Natural Resources.

C. Agency Reports

1. Vo-Tech - Mr. Fred Peterson reported that the Vo-Tech ended the year with 968 students; 126 of them being in the welding program. In addition, the Vo-Tech is closed for the summer.

Mr. Jacobs introduced to those in attendance and welcomed, Miss Bella Andreassi to the meeting. Miss Andreassi is a recent SV graduate who was second year welding student that recently competed in the Skills USA competition. Miss Andreassi had a bookshelf with her that was displayed for those to see that she welded as her senior project while at the Vo-Tech.

Miss Andreassi shared that even though she didn't win the Skill USA competition, it was a great experience. She also commented that she chose to go to Vo-Tech because she took the welding class at SV in ninth grade and loved it. She shared that she wished that the Vo-Tech day was longer and that she enjoyed getting to work with her hands while there.

Mr. Peterson shared that she does great welding work and that she should be proud of herself for what she has done.

Mr. Nickel commented that he can tell her passion for welding and thanked her for accepting their invitation to come to the School Board Meeting. Mr. Nickel asked Miss Andreassi what she intends to do now that she has graduated. Miss Andreassi answered that she will be going into the workforce to be a welder.

Mr. DiTullio commented on how good her welds look on the bookshelf she brought with her and encouraged her not to lose the art element of welding.

Ms. Whittle thanked Miss Andreassi for coming to share her story with everyone and that she loves seeing how passionate she is about Vo-Tech and the welding program.

Dr. Vitale said that welding looks easy but knows how hard it is. She shared that Miss Andreassi is brave and that she recognizes that education has changed. Dr. Vitale is proud of Miss Andreassi and encouraged her to follow her passion.

2. I.U. IV - Mr. Eric DiTullio shared that they met on May 24, 2023. He reported that the new five-year contract was approved by both the Pennsylvania State Education Association and the Intermediate Unit Board. The agreement will continue through June 30, 2027.

In addition, Mr. DiTullio reported that Ms. Renee Pitrelli was appointed to serve the remainder of Mr. Justin Kirkwood's term and Mr. Gary Shingleton was appointed to serve the remainder of Mr. Bill Halle's term.

- D. **Legislative** - Mr. Eric DiTullio reported that the State House Appropriations Committee sent to the floor House Bill 611, the 2023-24 state budget bill, which mirrors the plan offered by Gov. Shapiro in March. The full house is expected to vote on it and send it to the Senate.

The Senate returned to session today. Once the House passes a budget proposal, the Senate is expected to pass their version. The two may put together the budgets to complete a final budget, which will be on the governor's desk by the end of the month.

The House of Representatives passed the Mental Health Care Services Clearinghouse; House Bill 409.

The House Education Committee approved House Bill 1097, which requires all public schools to conduct a moment of silence during instructional hours to observe the anniversary of the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001. The bill is now in the Appropriations Committee for further consideration.

The House Consumer Protection, Technology & Utilities Committee approved House Bill 1032, which creates the Solar for Schools Grant Program to expand the use of solar energy at public schools.

In addition, the Senate Education Committee held a hearing to discuss the challenges and possible solutions addressing teacher shortages across the state. Topics considered at the hearing were:

1. "Grow Your Own" and Registered Teacher Apprenticeship incentives to help recruit local community members to become teachers.
2. Interstate Teacher Mobility Compact that allows teacher licenses in other member states to easily transfer over to Pennsylvania.
3. Dual enrollment programs: the committee learned about Lehigh Carbon Community College's (LCCC) dual enrollment/early college program that allows high school students in grades 11-12 to earn associate

degrees before they graduate high school. Students can earn an associate degree in education, helping them to earn their bachelor's degrees more quickly and for less money.

4. Student teacher stipend proposals – panelists spoke in support of programs in Colorado, Michigan, Oklahoma and Nebraska that offer stipends for student teachers. It was noted that the legislation for a student teacher stipend program has been introduced in Pennsylvania under Senate Bill 300.

Senate Education Committee held a hearing to discuss school construction and maintenance issues, focusing on state funding and collection of data on facility needs across the state. They acknowledged that the process for state reimbursement under the PlanCon program was revised under Act 70 of 2019, but that there is a moratorium on accepting applications for the program and no funding has been provided over the last several years. Testifiers included the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE), representatives from school districts who discussed existing problems and issues regarding building construction and repairs, and companies with experience repairing and modernizing schools. All testifiers expressed support for the reinstatement of PlanCon funding under the new process and noted that changing enrollments and demographics impact school space needs. Legislators emphasized the need for the General Assembly to have data from school districts to determine the scope of construction and maintenance needs, and what amount of funding is needed from the state. Legislators also underscored the importance for districts to properly anticipate and plan ahead for meeting needs. It was suggested that the state should require districts to conduct facility assessments and report data to PDE on construction and repair issues and estimated costs.

- E. **Drug Testing Results** – Dr. McKinley provided a report with results collected from July 1, 2022-May 16, 2023, noting that the District's positive rate was 1.1%. Last year, the positive rate was 1.9%, and nationally the average was 4%.

Once testing positive, students must take five follow-up tests. Additionally, Sport Safe continues to use our policy across the state and country as a model for other districts.

Mr. DiTullio asked how many years that the district has been drug testing in which Dr. McKinley responded with more than 20 years.

Mr. Peterson added that he is happy to see the report with the numbers going down.

8. **ADMINISTRATION**

- A. **MIU IV Application** - The Seneca Valley School District Board authorizes the Midwestern Intermediate Unit IV (MIU IV) to file an application to continue a regional Education Leading to Employment and Career Training (ELECT) program. If awarded the grant, MIU IV will implement the ELECT program on behalf of the Seneca Valley School District, which authorizes MIU IV to receive and expend funds for the implementation of the ELECT program and conduct the activities outlined in the program application.
- B. **Board Policy** – Approve board policy 237, Responsible Use of Personal Technology Resources – revised, first and final reading.
- C. **The Day School at The Children's Institute Services Agreement** – Approve the Day School at The Children's Institute Services Agreement for educational and related services during the 2023-24 school year.
- D. **PSBA Voting Delegate** - Appoint Mr. Fred Peterson as the voting delegate for the PSBA Delegate Assembly meeting on Saturday, November 4, 2023.

Mr. DiTullio thanked everyone who helped in coming up with the updates to Board Policy 237 and commented that this is a policy that they have been looking to update for a while. He supports the policy and what the teachers and administrators have put together.

Mr. Jacobs echoed Mr. DiTullio and expressed his gratitude. Mr. Jacobs raised the question if this policy is a next step or is the final step. Dr. Vitale responded to Mr. Jacobs question in that this was a very thoughtful process, there was a lot of research done and this is the next step to the policy that we currently have, but not the final step.

Dr. Vitale also shared that this is the best next step. She believes that the District's approach with educating adults and recognizing this as an evolving topic is key. Dr. Vitale reminded those in attendance that all students in K-12 have a school-issued laptop and that teachers of older children want the use of personal technology for those students. We want to always be educating on responsible use of personal technology.

Dr. Vitale shared that she met with a group of parents, teachers and administrators four times this year discussing personal technology. During this time, it was shared that the District should tighten the policy for younger students, and that as the students get older, the policy should adjust. In addition, she reminded the Board that we have to be able to follow through with the expectations set forth.

Mr. Jacobs agreed that this is a good next step. Points that he is in favor of are the K-6 proposal and the methodical approach. Points that Mr. Jacobs dislikes are that this might be

tough on the teachers and there can be inconsistencies; the use of personal technology in the RGMS Cafeteria and that there are not any specific changes for the IHS. Mr. Jacobs fully supports this proposal as a next step.

Ms. Bredl is in support of this proposal and thanked everyone who put time into writing it. She likes that it is scaled and believes that this needs to be a collaborative approach with parents.

Ms. Whittle is in favor of the policy, believes it is a good next step and appreciates the efforts of those that contributed to the updates.

Mr. DiTullio thanked Mr. Peterson for continually stepping up to be a PSBA Voting Delegate.

Dr. Roberts commented that it takes the same amount of time to travel to Rochester as it did to the location in Butler and that we are encouraging Aldephoi to add additional grades to the Rochester location.

Ms. Whittle commented on the graduation ceremony, the success of the event, and noted the hard work by several departments in planning this annual ceremony.
