# **MINUTES**

# March 14, 2022

- 1. CALL TO ORDER Mr. Eric DiTullio, President, called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.
  - A. Moment of Silence The meeting was opened with a moment of silence.
  - B. <u>Pledge of Allegiance</u> Mr. DiTullio led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.
  - C. Roll Call Roll call by Lisa Mislan, Board Secretary, showed the following members in attendance: Ms. Leslie Bredl, Mr. Eric DiTullio, Ms. Susan Harrison, Mr. Timothy Hester, Mr. Mike Jacobs, Mr. James Nickel, Ms. Kathy Whittle, and Mr. Jeffrey Widdowson, Mr. Frederick Peterson was absent.

#### 2. INFORMATION REPORTS

- A. <u>Student/Staff Recognition</u> Seneca Valley Senior Daniel Spear has been named a finalist in the 67<sup>th</sup> Annual National Merit Scholarship Program held by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC). Mr. Spear is one of approximately 15,000 finalists and will now advance to the next level of the program where he will have the opportunity to earn a National Merit Scholarship and, ultimately, the Merit Scholar® title.

D. <u>Eckles Feasibility Study Update</u> - Dr. Sean McCarty introduced Mr. Jeremy Beatty from Eckles Engineering who provided an update as follows:

## Phases of a Feasibility Study

- Define goals
- Collect data
- Analysis
- Develop options

### **Tasks Completed To-Date**

- Engineers and architects have walked each building to observe existing conditions and identify needs
- Write-up of existing conditions and identification of needs
- Meetings with Seneca Valley administration
- Review of the 2015 study, coordinated upcoming improvements and completed maintenance projects
- Analysis of building capacities for elementary schools, including Ehrman Crest

#### **Discussion Points and Future Considerations**

- Potential renovations for existing buildings
- Number of students moving between I H S and SHS buildings
- Enrollment has increased by 312 students since 2015, the majority of growth seen in K-6
- Extended day kindergarten with full-day potential in the near future
- More collaborative and flexible spaces.

## **Next Steps**

- Collaboration meeting to review building capacities, projected enrollment, options
- Follow-up meetings with administration
- Develop potential redistricting strategies with demographer, administration, and transportation
- Update the school board
- Provide draft report
- Finalize report

Dr. McCarty added that Davis Demographics will provide draft summaries next week. Overall findings would determine to what extent, if any, the District would need to consider redistricting. If redistricting is deemed necessary, zone options will be presented to the Board in April. Location, increased enrollment, and extended-day kindergarten will be factors that impact any redistricting decisions. Ehrman Crest is designed for full-day kindergarten, other SV elementary schools are not. A portion of Federal funds received would be used to offer extended-day kindergarten to children identified as needing additional support. Specifically, those who qualify for free or reduced lunch, English language learners, children with special education needs, children in foster care and those experiencing homelessness.

Breakfast, lunch and transportation would be provided to provide these children the opportunity to be successful as they enter first grade.

Dr. McCarty added that approximately 150 students could be provided with this additional support through the program, spread throughout all four of the elementary schools. We should be able to provide options at the April meeting with a final report available in May. Parents should know by June if their children are impacted. Dr. Vitale noted that the goal is for minimal impact and even full day kindergarten offered withing two to three years.

Dr. McCarty stated that an additional four or five teachers would be needed to staff the extended-day kindergarten, supplemented by federal funds.
