MINUTES

January 10, 2022

1. **CALL TO ORDER** by Mr. Eric DiTullio, President, called the meeting to order at 7:18 pm

- A. **Moment of Silence** - The meeting was opened with a moment of silence in memory of a Seneca Valley freshman who passed away unexpectedly on Wednesday, Dec. 15. As our school counselors and psychologists, along with a team of mental health specialists, provide support in our high schools, we ask all of you to join us in thinking of the family, friends and loved ones during this difficult time.
- B. **Pledge of Allegiance** - Grace Ramos, second grader at Rowan Elementary School, continued the board initiative, "I Led the Pledge," by reciting the Pledge of Allegiance. <https://svtube.svsd.net/play?id=uy7cuqs78y>

2. **INFORMATION REPORTS**

- A. **Student/Staff Recognition** - Ms. Andreassi
1. The Seneca Valley Academic Decathlon Team placed first and won a myriad of medals in the past two local competitions. With a score of 25,020 points, the team took first place against 12 other local schools on Nov. 13. With an almost 4,000-point lead, the SV Academic Decathlon team placed first and took home 23 medals at the local competition on Dec. 4. Students compete science, economics, social science, mathematics, art, music, literature, and essay with the goal of reaching the state and, ultimately, the national championship this spring.
 2. Thirteen Seneca Valley students were accepted into a juried art show, and four were named winners at, Slippery Rock University's (SRU) 2021 Regional High School Art Exhibition in November. Winners included junior Emma Bedell and senior Zatarra Whetstone in the painting/drawing category. Seniors Sydney Hunt won the SRU Potters Guild Ceramics Award and Julia Lingenfelter was awarded the SRU Art Club Students' Choice honor.

3. This past November, auditions were held for the 2021 Pennsylvania Music Education Association (PMEA) District 5 Honors Band. Due to COVID-related health and safety guidelines, this year's honors band was reduced in size from 125 musicians to 95 musicians. Seneca Valley had 36 students selected this year, more than any other school in a four-county area. To audition, students were required to be in grades 9-12, and prepare a piece from a predetermined college-level solo list. District 5 comprises of school districts from Beaver, Butler, Lawrence and Mercer counties.

C. **Agency Reports**

1. Vo-Tech - Mr. Fred Peterson, Jr. noted that the Spring semester is off to a good start. There was nothing further to report at this time.
2. I.U. IV - Mr. Eric DiTullio noted that teacher negotiations will begin this week.
3. WPIAL Update - Mr. Timothy Hester stated the next meeting will be in two weeks at which time he will provide an update.

D. **Legislative** - Mr. DiTullio provided the following update as follows:

The General Assembly convened briefly on January 4 as required by the state's constitution that calls for legislators to meet on the first Tuesday of January each year. The House returned to session today, and the Senate will convene on Tuesday, January 18.

On Tuesday, February 8, Governor Tom Wolf will present his 2022-23 state budget proposal before a joint meeting of the Senate and House of Representatives. With the state showing a surplus of revenues at \$1.5 billion, \$5 billion in federal pandemic relief funding available, the governor is expected to include critical increases for basic and special education in his proposed spending plan.

The Substitute teacher flexibility Act 91 of 2021 was signed into law. This law addresses substitute teacher shortages by expanding the number of individuals eligible to substitute in public schools for school years 2021-22 and 2022-23. Under Act 91, retired teachers are now eligible to fill teacher vacancies on an emergency or short-term basis. Schools can use eligible college students and recent graduates of education programs to serve as substitute teachers. Educators with active Pennsylvania certificates and those with comparable out-of-state certificates can serve as day-to-day substitutes for 20 days or longer under certain circumstances.

Teachers with inactive certificates may substitute for 180 days instead of 90 days per school year. Individuals who are 25 or older, have at least 60 college credits or three years of experience as a paraprofessional, and complete training on classroom management, may serve as “classroom monitors” by delivering preplanned assignments for a teacher.

Also signed into law was the State Broadband Development Authority Act 96 of 2021 which establishes the Pennsylvania Broadband Development Authority to facilitate funds anticipated through a federal infrastructure bill recently approved by Congress. The state is expected to receive at least \$100 million in federal funds. The Broadband Development Authority will consist of an 11-member governing board, charged with creating a statewide broadband plan and distributing grant money for broadband expansion projects in unserved and underserved areas of the state.

Governor Wolf vetoed House Bill 1332 which would have required public school entities to provide detailed information about their curriculum available online, including an internet link or title for every book used by the school entity, course syllabus or a written summary and the state academic standards for each instructional course. In his veto message, the governor called the bill overly burdensome and noted that state regulations already require public schools to provide parents with course curriculum and instructional materials upon request.

Dr. Vitale added that the Seneca Valley curriculum is online as well as the Program of Studies.

- F. **Legal Update on School Masking Decision** - Mr. Hoffman, School Solicitor, stated that on December 10, 2021, the Pennsylvania Supreme Court upheld the Commonwealth's Court determination that the acting Secretary of Health's mask order was legally invalid. It was determined that the Department of Health and acting Secretary did not comply with the formal requirements of the Commonwealth Documents Law or the Regulatory Review Act. The result of this decision is that the state-imposed mask requirement is no longer enforced, and the terms of local school district's adopted health and safety plans now govern. Although a school district's powers are not unlimited, the statutory grant is rather broad. In school code, there are provisions that empower the school board to adopt reasonable rules and regulations as it deems necessary and proper. This provision has been construed by courts as providing school boards with significant discretion in the management and operation of its schools. At present, no court has determined that a mask requirement promulgated by a local school board to be beyond its authority. Accordingly, this

board does have the legal authority to continue, modify, or discontinue a mask requirement or other COVID-19 protocols within its Health and Safety Plan.

- G. **COVID-19 Update** - After thanking the nursing staff for working over the weekend to keep up with the data, Dr. Vitale provided an update as follows:

Seneca Valley Dashboard

- 78 active student cases
- 191 students in quarantine
- 12 active staff cases
- 6 staff in quarantine
- Total active cases = 90
- Total in quarantine = 197
- Building-specific data can be viewed on the SV website dashboard

Seneca Valley Zip Codes

- 195 cases were reported yesterday, 1/6
- 499 cases were reported since pulling the data on 1/7 (Friday)

Dr. Vitale asked for patience for our nurses who have been overwhelmed. The dashboard is typically updated daily; however, nursing staff priorities are distributing medications and caring for the students who report to nurses' offices daily.

Butler County

- 14-day rolling average daily case count = 313
- Cases reported on 1/6 increased from 393 to 444
- 487 cases were reported 1/7
- 481 cases were reported 1/8
- 283 cases were reported 1/9
- 7-day incidence rate per 100,000 = 1415

The Butler Health System (BHS) administered over 4,000 COVID-19 tests last week with a percent positivity of over 36% which is higher than what we've been seeing.

As of Thursday, January 6, the BHS COVID cases totaled 48 patients with five in the ICU and one death reported on January 3. As of today, January 10, BHS COVID cases total 57 patients, ages 18-95, with seven in the ICU and one death reported on January 8 and one death reported on January 9.

Timeline for Covid-19 Vaccinations for American Children Aged 5-11

The vaccination regimen for the approved Pfizer vaccine for children is two doses. The child receives doses spread at least three weeks apart followed by two weeks to reach maximum effectiveness (five weeks total from the date of the first dose.)

10/29	FDA Approves Pfizer Vaccine (under EUA) for children aged 5-11
11/3	General availability of the vaccine for children begins
11/3 - 11/17	Two-week window for children to receive their first dose
11/24 – 12/8	Time span for second dose - 3 weeks minimum after first dose
12/8 – 12/22	Fully vaccinated status - 2 weeks past second dose

Scenario 1: Child receives dose on the first day of general availability.

- 11/3 Dose 1
- 11/24 Dose 2
- 12/8 Fully immunized (two weeks past 2nd dose)

Scenario 2: Child receives first dose two weeks after widespread availability. Two weeks is a reasonable time frame for a parent to locate and secure an appointment for the first dose.

- 11/17 Dose 1
- 12/8 Dose 2
- 12/22 Fully immunized (two weeks past 2nd dose)

Test to Stay Program

- This guidance is developed for individuals who are partially vaccinated or unvaccinated. Fully vaccinated individuals do not have to quarantine until or unless they become symptomatic.
- Monitoring of the program would be resource intensive.
- Serial test close contacts instead of quarantine.
- Schools should have a K-12 masking policy in effect.
- Test to Stay students must wear a mask during sports.
- Test to Stay students are encouraged to get alternative transportation to school.

- Test to Stay can only be used for those masked at the time of close contact and for contact that occurred in the school setting.
- Logistics of keeping track of who has to be tested on what dates would be extremely time consuming.
- Testing must be proctored, and the nurses are already stretched physically, mentally and emotionally.
- Many doctors agree that the cost would not be worth the amount of work for an unknown outcome.

CDC Transmission Levels

- **Low** = no more than 10 cases per 100,000 people in the past seven days, or a test positivity rate during the past seven days of less than 5%
- **Moderate** = 10-50 cases per 100,000 people in the past seven days, or a test positivity rate during the past seven days between 5-7.99%
- **Substantial** = 50-100 cases per 100,000 people in the past seven days, or a test positivity rate during the past seven days between 8-9.99%
- **High** = 100 or more cases per 100,000 people in the past seven days, or a test positivity rate during the past seven days of 10% or higher

Dr. Vitale thanked the entire staff for their hard work including multiple classroom coverages when needed.

Mental Health Initiatives

Dr. Roberts reported that school counselors and school psychologists will lead training sessions developed by the National Center for Safe Learning Environments this Friday, January 14, or Monday, January 17. This training will focus on helping teachers understand how trauma is impacting students and learning. Racial, poverty, homelessness, natural disaster (flood or fire), and domestic violence traumas will be addressed. The goal of this training is to help staff recognize that childhood exposure to these types of trauma is common. What is different is how students respond to these types of events. In addition, resilience skills can be modeled and explicitly taught by our staff. Lastly, we need to be cognizant that adults in our district can also be impacted by trauma and react emotionally. Employee Assistance Programs will also be reviewed.

Also ramping up are our grief groups organized between the SV counseling department and The Caring Place, offering support to grieving students.

3. ACTION AGENDA

- A. **Public Comment** was heard from Mr. Nick Brower and Mr. Matthew Schnierle.
- B. **Student Trip** - Approved the ski trip to Steamboat Springs, CO on either Wednesday, February 23 - Monday February 28, or Wednesday, March 23 - Monday March 28, depending on what prices are less expensive. The trip will be under the supervision of Mr. Mickey Flood, Club Advisor, and at no expense to the District.

Dr. McKinley confirmed that the students would miss two or three school days, depending on which of the dates the trip takes place.

Ms. Harrison motioned, seconded by Mr. Peterson to approve the student trip as noted above. Motion carried on a roll call vote with those present voting in the affirmative.

- C. **2021-22 Seneca Valley Health and Safety Plan** - Approved the revised 2021-22 Seneca Valley Health and Safety Plan regarding CDC (Centers for Disease Control) quarantine language.

Ms. Williams, Nurse Administrator, noted the following update to the Health and Safety Plan:

Individuals with a confirmed case of COVID-19 should isolate for five days, a change from the original recommendations of ten days. The individual should wear a mask for the additional five days post-isolation. Parents are asked to contact the school nurse to confirm a return date. Some facilities are giving incorrect return dates.

Students who have been exposed to COVID-19 and have completed the series of vaccinations do not need to quarantine but should wear a mask for ten days.

Staff who have been exposed to COVID-19 and have completed the series of vaccinations, including the booster do not need to quarantine but are asked to wear a mask.

Anyone who has been exposed to COVID-19 should get a test five days after exposure. If any symptoms occur, please quarantine until a negative test is confirmed. While awaiting test results, please stay at home. If a negative test has been received and you are awaiting results of a PCR test, you are also asked to stay at home.

Mr. Peterson and Mr. Nickel noted that Ms. Williams and her staff are doing an incredible job. They are pleased that we continue to revisit the Health and Safety Plan regularly and adjust appropriately.

Mr. Jacobs is in support of the plan as currently written but noted that it is important that we revisit the thresholds established back in August when much has changed since then, including availability of vaccines for most students. He agreed that the plan should be revisited monthly to determine if our only threshold should be community transmission since most students are now eligible for vaccine and we now know more about the effectiveness of cloth masks.

Mr. DiTullio agreed that using just one criteria, community transmission, should be revisited as details are everchanging. He encouraged everyone to get vaccinated.

Dr. Vitale added that she has directed the staff to take breaks during the evening hours and over the weekend, asking for grace with returning phone calls or emails.

Mr. Hester thanked Dr. Vitale and staff for their leadership.

Mr. DiTullio motioned, seconded by Mr. Nickel, to approve the revised 2021-22 Seneca Valley Health and Safety Plan. Motion carried on a roll call vote with those present voting in the affirmative.

- SV school nurse retired subs that have subbed for 30+ days this year will move to \$200 per day (approximately \$28.57/hr) after day 30. (*Days do not need to be consecutive and may be cumulative.


