Read the scenario and discuss it with your classmates.

Jericho loves to play soccer with his friends. He always has to choose teams. He only chooses players that he likes. He never lets Ziggy play and says that Ziggy has no skills. He is sneaky and pushes Ziggy when the teacher is not looking. He also tries to trip Ziggy when they run to the playground. Is Jericho a fairness MVP?



Read the scenario and discuss it with your classmates.

Sally is friendly to everyone, She always makes sure that each classmate gets a turn and always says, "Good game!" She reminds friends to share materials and stands up for others if they are treated unfairly. Is Sally a fairness MVP?



Read and discuss it with your classmates.

Think of time when you were treated unfairly. How did it make you feel? What would you change about the situation if you could? How can you ensure that your classmates are treated fairly?

Find a game you have at home to play with your family. Focus on **fairness** as you play the game.
