Welcome to Scholarship Prep-Oceanside! We are located on the historic campus of the Mission San Luis Rey. We serve over 500 students in the grades TK-8. Our school program focuses on data-driven instruction, arts and athletics electives, and holistic social-emotional learning for students. This report will highlight that we have built and expanded our social-emotional learning (SEL) program over time to meet student needs. To best support our students, we implemented Morning Meeting. This practice ensures that every school day begins the same for every student. Students complete daily wellness check-ins, a weekly universal screener, and receive guidance on building self-esteem, coping skills, and conflict management tools. While Morning Meeting is a new practice, we are thankful to be able to reinstitute pre-pandemic routines. Our families are returning to campus to attend awards ceremonies, fun events, and to volunteer in the classroom. Our staff are able to implement the full Scholarship Prep instructional model with no social distancing or safety protocol concern. We are excited to implement our full program to meet student needs. We have come out on the other side of the pandemic having learned lots of lessons, strengthened our social-emotional and basic needs supports, and coalesced to become a tighter community.

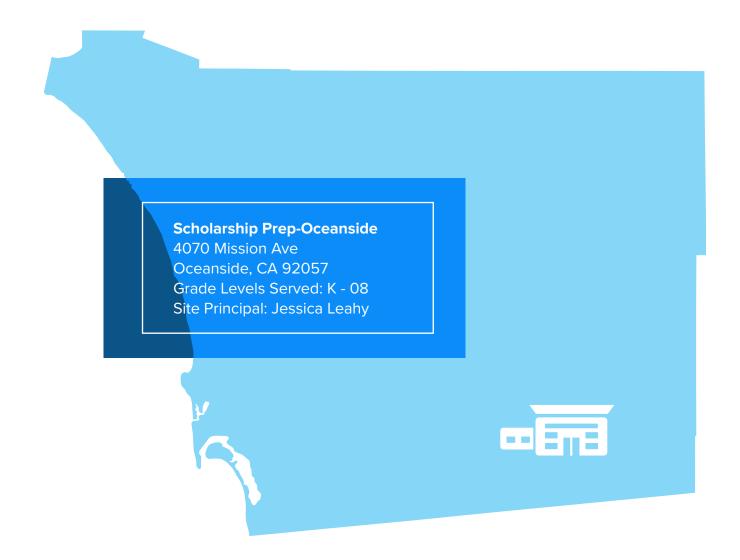

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The greatest challenge Scholarship Prep – Oceanside faces is the increased need for support our students have. The pandemic exacerbated the harsh reality that Oceanside has a hidden community in desperate need of support, whether academic, social-emotional, physical, or mental health wise. Our students and families experienced high levels of stress from the disruption of their daily lives, worries about the health of themselves and loved ones, and anticipated or realized financial strains. Many of our students faced greater food insecurity, loss of family income, loss of family members or friends, and fear of catching the virus themselves. Our percentage of homeless youth has increased from 1% pre-pandemic to 13% this year. Our percentage of Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students has increased from 55% to over 70% this year.

We are most proud of the work we have done to meet our students' basic needs. Each classroom is stocked with a rainbow cart full of food, snacks, toiletry items, and other essentials. Our campus resource center houses additional resources for students and families. We provide phones free of charge to families that include links to school resources, community resources, talk and text, and can serve as mobile hotspots. Our staff holds a summer event to provide dress code items, backpack, school supplies, and food to our most vulnerable families. Our winter event includes providing all those items plus a holiday toy.

We are seeking to improve our academic intervention services. Even through the pandemic we have been able to maintain our strong academic and Dashboard performance, allowing our student to continue outperforming their peers in the surrounding school district. We are working to address the internal gaps in achievement between our subgroups, especially our student with disabilities, English learners, and homeless youth. Actions we have already taken to improve intervention services are redesigning the enrichment block, offering targeted after-school tutoring, and providing additional staff training.

The Scholarship Prep — Oceanside program is unique in that, in addition to high-quality academics, we offer arts and athletics instruction to students free of charge during the school day.

We created a new teacher leader program to support with our WASC visit, and we are excited to share that we had a very successful WASC self-study and was awarded the full accreditation.

STRATEGIC PRIORITIES

Scholarship Prep – Oceanside identified three overarching strategic priorities for the 2023-24 school year: Family Engagement, Instructional Alignment, and Morning Meeting. The first, Family engagement, was a necessity. The COVID-19 pandemic limited many of the ways in which families have been engaged. We are proud of the way our leadership and staff modified opportunities for virtual engagement. We are excited, however, about the full return to in-person instruction and the opportunities it brings. We have made it a priority to have families back on campus for multiple events so far, including Trunk or Treat, Literature Day, and Semester Awards ceremonies. The second priority, Instructional Alignment, is focused on fully implementing academic protocols including regular grade level collaboration meetings, common writing expectations, video observations, and consistent data analysis. The third, Morning Meeting, addresses the emotional needs of our students. All classroom teachers begin the day by building community with and amongst their students. This structured time to connect provides stability, which is an essential trauma-informed practice. Students are able to know what they are walking into each day without being put on the spot academically first thing in the morning. During this time, teachers and students complete a wellness check-in. This wellness check-in begins with a prompt allowing students and staff to process their current feelings and ground themselves before engaging in academic work.

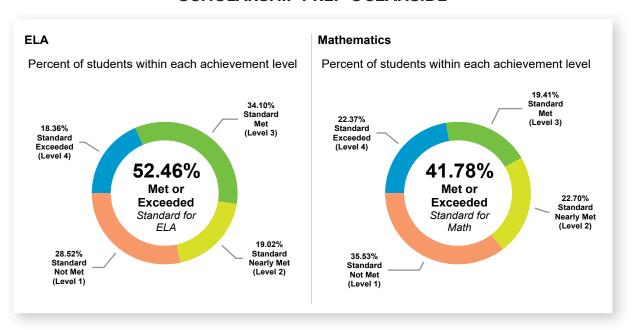

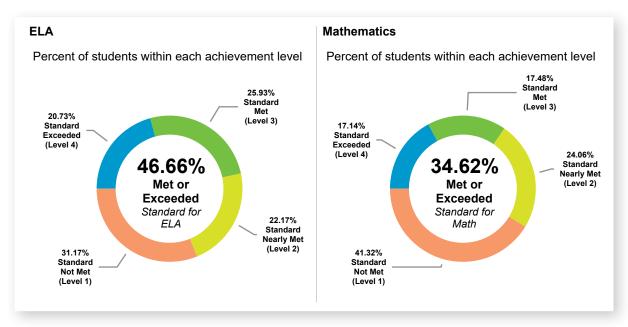

FINANCE **2023-2024**

FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

Scholarship Prep - Oceanside ended the 2022-23 fiscal year with a surplus of \$1.61 million and an ending fund balance of \$4.94 million, representing a reserve for economic uncertainties (REU) percentage of 60.94%. This percentage surpasses the public education industry standard of a 4% REU.

The financial audit report for 2022-23 was completed by Clifton Larson Allen LLP and contained findings related to the transitional kindergarten (TK) program. It was noted that the charter did not meet the TK class enrollment of not more than 24 pupils for the school site or the pupil ratio requirement of not more than one adult for every 12 pupils. Scholarship Prep-Oceanside provided an explanation of how the school cured and corrected the findings. The charter school has developed processes to monitor transitional kindergarten (TK) enrollment and staffing. These processes and protocols include the Deputy Director and Site Administrator reviewing enrollment and staffing plans and providing professional development and ongoing training to office personnel responsible for TK enrollment. The possible financial impact was Average Class Enrollment Questioned Costs \$22,833.88, and Adult to Pupil Ratio Questioned Costs \$12,376.30.

A review of the charter school's 2023-24 second interim report was analyzed in the context of the 2023-24 State Budget Act. Based on that report, it was assessed that the charter school will meet all its financial obligations for the current year and two subsequent years.

Enrollment in the current year is 536 students, an increase of 1.29% from the 2022-23 enrollment of 543 students. The budget for 2023-24 and two subsequent years has been adjusted to reflect the change in enrollment and proportionate Average Daily Attendance (ADA) rates. The projected 2023-24 ending fund balance is \$5.12 million, which represents a reserve percentage of 53.32%. A surplus of \$462,583 is projected for the 2023-24 fiscal year.

Scholarship Prep - Oceanside currently has no long-term debt. The 2023-24 cash flow analysis projects a positive cash balance in all months. The charter school industry recommends that charter schools maintain a cash balance between 30- and 60-days cash on hand. Scholarship Prep - Oceanside projects a range of 136 to 169 days cash on hand.
