DCEF is building connections for student success.

DCEF's After School & Summer Enrichment programs, along with Kdg JumpStart, and the Mobile Book Club help students and teachers build connections outside the classroom with hands-on learning and opportunities to explore, create and innovate. Students can meet an author, be an inventor, find out how bugs can walk on water, learn the science of baking, publish a book, program a robot and so much more while building a foundation for success in school and beyond.

Readiness in Kindergarten is important to long-term success in school. Relationships and connections between teachers, students and their families have a positive impact on students' wellbeing and academic

success. Thanks to the support and partnerships with CCRES, Austill's Educational Therapy Services, the CCIU and DASD teachers and parent volunteers, last summer 257 "new to school" incoming kindergarteners participated in Kdg JumpStart and 62 families participated in our summer home visit program giving these students and their families a chance to build connections that will have a lasting impact not only with students' academic, behavioral, and emotional success but also strengthen the school

communities.

ENGAGE

DCEF partners with the school district, community businesses and organizations to promote student engagement. These connections empower students with the resources and support to overcome challenges and prepare them for success in school and beyond. DASD students are set to benefit from three-year grant totaling \$150,000 from West Pharmaceutical Services and facilitated by DCEF. The grant will fund the Building Relationships in DASD to Grow Education (BRIDGE) program and provide students with additional academic support and opportunities for connections outside of the normal school day.

BRIDGE is being piloted this Spring at Bradford Heights partnering teachers and high school students with elementary students. BRIDGE is expected to help students improve their academic performance, develop social skills and build relationships with their peers. Bradford Heights Principal Dr. Ilana Shipe reports seeing students excited to stay after school to learn.

In addition to the school-year's BRIDGE program, the grant will support Camp Narwhal at the Marsh Creek Sixth Grade Center this summer. Camp Narwhal will bring together a cohort of 50 students from all 10 DASD elementary schools for a two-week camp, reinforcing academic skills while easing the transition both between fifth and sixth grade. Marsh Creek Principal Matt Barr notes that physical and team-building activities are included to ensure that the students connect socially and have fun while learning.

We are so proud to be able to partner with local businesses like West Pharmaceutical Services to provide additional resources and assistance to help students thrive.

Based on results from the BRIDGE and Camp Narwhal pilot programs, DCEF hopes to continue and expand support to all K-8 DASD schools. To learn how to become a community partner to support DASD students, please contact Jackie Fenn at JFenn@dcedf.org.


