This school year was nothing short of awesome! We could not of had a successful school year of 2022-2023 without our supportive administration, Alena Crawford (Principal) and Lindsay Sparkman (Assistant Principal). Our goal this year was to continue to fulfill our school's vision of providing an atmosphere of warmth, trust, and respect amongst all. We also wanted to provide our students with the tools that they needed to be successful through differentiated instruction in the classrooms. Another tool to help our students to be successful is strong communication between the school and families. We were excited to once again be an open campus this year, where families could come and join their students for lunch and of course attend some of our Title 1 nights! Some of our very successful Title 1 nights included Bingo for Books and the Chili Cook Off just to name a few! The amount of parent involvement was very exciting not only for us but the students as well.

Students were given many opportunities to be involved in some awesome clubs this year. Once again, the Student Council was an option for students in grades 4th and 5th. Student Council collected donations for pets to provide to our local animal shelter. Those students also assisted with a holiday food drive with provided a ton of food for some of our families in need. Another club that students were able to join was Odyssey of the Mind. This club was a great way for students to test their mind and to show what they know! We had eight students who not only participated in the club but competed against other schools in the district. Garden Club was back in full bloom this year! We had such a large number of fourth and fifth graders who participated that the club had to take place on different days to accommodate all the students were able to participate in a new service club this year for the school and community, Optimist Club. Students in this club provided teachers and staff with goodies throughout the year as well as they held a food drive which provided food to go in caring boxes around the county.

Students pushed harder than ever when it came to reading this year! As a school, we read a total of 147,279,105 words total! Grade level word counts are as follows: Kindergarten-100,961, First grade-3,946,437, Second grade-11,563,001, Third grade-32,023,887, Fourth grade-34,720,733 and Fifth grade-61,730,093. We absolutely must mention some of the top readers who lead the charge! Olivia Tomberlin reached an incredible 7,074,318 words read this year and she is now on the plaque for most words read for a school year. Next up, Joe Edwards came in with 4,458, 901 words read. L20astly, Taylor Thomas had a wonderful year with 4,033,879 total words read. Maddux Crawford in first grade lead the school in most books read, 602 in total!

Our students were motivated more than ever this year to read! We believe this is in part to our amazing librarian Bessie Andrews! She truly helped students to find joy in reading and it was contagious. Mrs. Andrews created our Word Club wall where students were celebrated for reaching their reading goals. There were over students from kindergarten up to 5th grade 200 students pictured on this wall!

Academics was not the only way that students could be celebrated here at CES. As a school we wanted to celebrate other successes such as outstanding behavior, great choices, being role models, and always striving to be better. One way that we celebrated students who stood out was to make them weekly paw pat winners. Students were announced on Friday mornings during announcements and once again celebrated in front of their peers in the cafeteria at lunch where they selected a prize from the prize cart. In addition to paw pat winners, some students were also selected as student of the week and were featured in the Wakulla Sun newspaper. Some of these rockstar students were Aubrey Deborde, Corbin Kinsey, Justice Simmons, Hunter Antrobus, and Sara Barwick.

Crawfordville students also pushed themselves to gain some knowledge in the technology world! Students in grades 4th and 5th participated in the ICT computer program. Students who mastered the program received a certificate at the end of the school year. Between 4th and 5th grade, we had a 95% pass rate!

Here at CES we have truly had a fun year with some special events that took place. One of the special events was Florida Wild Mammal Association came and visited our students and brought along some friends such as a skunk and a pelican to show our students and to teach them about some local animals. FSU also came to visit our students with their Science on the Move program where students were able to engage in hands on activities that promoted the fun in science. Another special event that took place this year was the play Rudolph the Red Nose Reindeer, which was performed by the high school. Many of our grade levels attended the play and really enjoyed it. Our students once again participated in our highly successful fundraiser Boosterthon this year. Students really rocked it, and we raised over \$25,000 for the school! This was celebrated with a fun color run where all students got to participate.

We were so fortunate this year to receive some grants that we have received in the past to help with continuous learning for our students. Second grade received a grant again to have a chicken incubator and hatch baby chicks for our students to learn about the life cycle. Mrs. Bartnick who is head of our Garden Club was also able to get another grant to support our garden. Sunblest Gardens also donated some wonderful supplies to help get our garden outside the library looking great again.

We all know that it truly takes a village to make a school run successfully. Here at Crawfordville Elementary we have some wonderful teachers who make up that village. Some of these wonderful teachers were also selected as our teachers of the month. Angela DenBleyker was our November teacher of the month and Katherine Hunter was our March teacher of the month. The 2022-2023 school year brought with it many amazing achievements for Wakulla High School and its students. Principal Michele Falk during her speech to the class of 2023, shared with them a reminder to never forget to keep raising the bar. From the growing CTE programs, phenomenal athletic teams, and entertaining Arts, WHS leads by example and continues to raise the bar, bringing many incredible opportunities for students, faculty, and staff.

ACADEMICS Wakulla High School's teachers continue to provide their students with the best education. WHS's 9th and 10th grade English as well as Geometry scored above the state proficiency percentage for their state testing. Biology as well as US History each scored well above state proficiency during the end of year testing. Our class of 2023 had an impressive 318 seniors' graduate. Haley Taylor was named Valedictorian and Brianna Ly was Salutatorian.

CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION At Wakulla High, Career and Technical Education (CTE) continues to have a positive impact on student achievement, giving them opportunities to use the knowledge they've gained even before graduation. 506 Industry Certifications were earned this year through the vocational programs offered at WHS. This year, the Medical Academy had a passing rate of 100%! Welding completed an artificial reef project with Eastern Ship Building and placed 3rd overall in the Lively welding competition. Automotive participated in a NASCAR simulation engine rebuild project. Building Trades raffled multiple projects including bookcases and Adirondack chairs. Our Culinary program prepared many treats for the Senior Citizens Center, shadowed chefs, and prepared meals for multiple programs. HVAC students were placed in on-the-job training (OJT) positions working in their industry. DIT participated in a major Shark Tank event and Engineering created and competed with classroom robots made from scratch.

PERSONNEL Wakulla High School's faculty and staff continue to share their knowledge and enthusiasm for learning, giving our War Eagles the foundation, they'll need as they move on to their next grand adventures. This year, educators Christa Gauger and William Pafford were chosen by their peers as the Teachers of the Month for September and January. Ms. Gauger continues to help her students learn and grow in Math teaching Geometry and Algebra 2 and is a member of the CTE Academy. As a member, she teaches HTML as well as WordPress to our students, which gives them the opportunity to become certified in WordPress. Mr. Pafford provides insightful information when teaching Economics to our seniors. In addition, as the wrestling coach, he helped students achieve Regional Runner up with 8 State Qualifiers and 3 State Placers. Wakulla High School is proud to have Kristina Sanchez as its 2022 Teacher of the Year! Ms. Sanchez is the Theater Instructor and has brought fun and entertainment to not only our school, but to our community as well. Her hard work, dedication, and encouragement to her students brings us fabulous theater productions you don't want to miss!

THE ARTS Wakulla High School's art department continued to excel in the 2022-2023 school year. In October, *The Beverly Hillbillies* earned a Superior rating at District Competition, an award for best tech, an all-star cast award and an overall one act award. During Solo and Ensemble over 25 band and colorguard students participated with over 90% of the students earning a Superior rating. EXCEPTIONAL STUDENT EDUCATION AND STUDENT SERVICES

The goal of the ESE department is always to ensure that students with disabilities are provided with all the excellent educational opportunities that general education students in the Wakulla County School system enjoy. Wakulla's commitment to students with disabilities was demonstrated in the most recent State Performance Plan reporting that Wakulla School District students with disabilities had a graduation rate 98.63%, well above the 82.30% target for the state.

The Legacy Café and the Legacy Boutique continued providing training opportunities for students with disabilities to develop employable skills through hands on participation in all facets of the food service industry and obtain paid positions. Students participating in the Legacy Café plan the menu, shop for the food and supplies, prepare and serve the food, collect money, and perform the maintenance duties (laundry, dish-washing and cleaning). The legacy Café catered two staff training events during the 22-23 school year and received great accolades from the partakers. Participating students come from the Wakulla High School Exceptional Student Education Program and the Program for Adults with Disabilities. Adults with Disabilities create hand crafted items and sell them in our community.

During the 2022-23 school year there were several changes that took place. Nicole Klees, our speech language pathologist serving students in middle and high school for many years, was offered a position with Project 10: The Transition Education Network whose goal is to assist Florida school districts and relevant stakeholders in building capacity to provide secondary transition services to students with disabilities to improve their academic success and post-school outcomes. Mrs. Klees continues to serve Wakulla as well as many other surrounding counties with this important mission.

October is Disability Awareness Month. The district itinerant team, led by staffing specialists Cori Revell and Jennifer Williams initiated several activities across the district to educate all students on the varying exceptionalities and to promote inclusion and appreciation of students with disabilities.

In December students with disabilities from Wakulla High School and Wakulla Institute made their annual visit to the FDLRS building in Tallahassee and showcased their entrepreneur skills. Students from the Legacy Café took orders, prepared and delivered lunches to the staff at the FDLRS building. The Legacy Boutique set up a display and sold handmade holiday crafts to FDLRS and FLDOE staff. Students created every item offered in the boutique, ranging from various types of soap, sugar scrub, and wooden soap dishes to handcrafted jewelry and stamped spoons, plus many holiday gifts.

In February Special Olympics were held at Wakulla High School. This event is organized each year by Mrs. Sharon Scherbarth-Simmons, teacher of students with visual impairments and orientation and mobility specialist. Wakulla County's Special Olympics athletes and their partners competed in an exciting day of track and field events and Bocce. Mrs. Scherbarth-Simmons partners with the Wakulla County Sheriff's Department to provide lunch for all of the athletes and their partners following the event. Wakulla's Special Olympics team progressed to compete in the statewide games in Orlando, Florida.

STUDENT ASSESSMENT

PURPOSE

Assessment is a vital part of the instructional process. The Wakulla County School System utilizes testing to determine appropriate placement of students, to guide instruction, and to assess content mastery. Testing provides administrators, teachers, and parents an opportunity to assess how students compare to other students in Florida and in the Nation. Essentially, assessment results are used to revise the curriculum to better meet the needs of students.

FLORIDA ASSESSMENT OF STUDENT THINKING (FAST)

In 2022-2023, Florida assessed students for the first time using Coordinated Screening Progress Monitoring System assessments, which are aligned to the Benchmarks for Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) Standards. for K-12 and the Florida Early Learning and Developmental Standards for VPK. FAST assessments include VPK through grade 10 English Language Arts and VPK through grade 8 Mathematics. All FAST assessments are computer-adaptive.

FAST assessments are administered three times per year.

PM1 occurs at the beginning of the school year and provides a baseline score so teachers can track student progress in learning the B.E.S.T. Standards from PM1 to PM2.

PM2 occurs in the middle of the school year when students have had an opportunity to learn the grade-level standards. This administration provides a mid-year score to compare to the baseline score from PM1.
PM3 occurs at the end of the school year and provides a summative score that will accurately measure student mastery of the B.E.S.T. Standards.

While PMI and PM2 are for informational purposes only, PM3 is used for school accountability.

END-OF-COURSE& SCIENCE ASSESSMENTS

EOC assessments measure the B.E.S.T. Standards or other state standards for specific courses as outlined in their course descriptions. All students enrolled in Algebra 1, Geometry, Biology, US History, and Civics are required to take the EOC for each respective course. Students must score a Level 3 or above to be considered proficient and EOCs account for 30% of a student's grade in the course.

Students take the statewide science assessment in 5th and 8th grade.

STUDENT SCORE REPORTING

Student statewide assessment scores are accessible on the Florida Family Portal. Parents and guardians can access the Portal through their Focus parent account.
