

## **IMMERSION: SUMMER 2024**

The start of school marks the end of a summer full of immersion trips for the Class of 2025. This year, 8 trips were offered and 93 students and their adult leaders participated in the immersion program. The trips were L'Arche Tacoma; Las Cruces, New Mexico; Agua Prieta, Mexico; Tenderloin; El Salvador; Wheeling, West Virginia; Jerusalem Farm, Kansas City; and Chicago.

Each trip provided students with a unique experience and chance to learn about a new culture. Through the immersion trips, students received the opportunity to expand their understanding of the world around them through stories, prayer, reflection, and visiting historically marginalized communities.

After spending two weeks in Las Cruces, New Mexico, Bridget Stecher '25 stated, "My immersion experience was very eye opening, and I learned many new things about immigration. My favorite experience was visiting a migrant shelter in Juarez, Mexico where we got to sit down with migrants and learn their stories."

Additionally in the El Salvador immersion students visited the school called Amun Sheá and met local students. This shows that immersion was a chance for students to experience issues occurring in our world today, compared to just hearing about these topics on the news.

Although immersion is a time for self reflection, it is also a great opportunity to bond with peers. In the immersion program, leaders try their best to form groups of people that are not close prior to the trip, giving students the chance to branch out.

When asked about her experience on her domestic trip to Chicago, Julia Ting '25 shared, "My experience at immersion was really fun. My group made the experience even better!"

"I would definitely recommend immersion to the rising Junior class because my experience was very unique," concluded Bridget Stecher after reflecting on her appreciation for the immersion experience.

The Immersion experience is sure to be a memorable one and is an opportunity of a lifetime. Embracing and taking on unfamiliar routes will widen one's perspective of our surrounding world and the different populations that fill it.








