GOW ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT CASEY CANN '94

Confidence, discipline, leadership. These are the attributes of a Gow education that alumnus Casey Sullivan Cann '94 said prepared him for his esteemed career in the military. "The Gow School had a huge impact on my life and was a driving force and motivator that guided me dur

School had a huge impact on my life and was a driving force and motivator that guided me during my years in the United States Coast Guard. There is not a day that goes by where I do not think of Gow," said Casey.

Casey started at Gow after struggling for years with dyslexia. He recalls the hours his Gow teachers spent with him and how he eventually became a confident learner. After graduating, he earned an associate's degree before pivoting to the Coast Guard.

Raised in Florida, he was always around boats and was attracted to the Coast Guard because it was a smaller military branch than the Navy. What started as four years in the service turned into a successful 22-year-long career in the Coast Guard. "I think a career in the military is incredible, especially for Govians. Right out of the gate, you get amazing experiences and exposure to a career that takes you across the world," Casey said.

From his initial deployment on a buoy tender in Baltimore working on navigation aids in the Chesapeake Bay and Potomac River, to homeland security and counterterrorism roles in Puget Sound and along the Canadian border, he has embraced every opportunity. Casey worked to protect the DC Harbor after September 11th, taught in Charleston, SC, and deployed to The Middle East as a part of a team that stopped, boarded, and searched vessels of interest in the Arabian Gulf, Strait of Hormuz, and Gulf of Oman.

He retired from the Coast Guard in 2020 and now teaches at the Maritime Law Enforcement Academy in Charleston, SC. A family man with a wife and two daughters, he enjoys speaking to current Gow students who are considering a military career. "Gow gives you the life lessons, the tools, and the discipline to push forward. I call it my positive baggage, and I consider it a gift that my parents gave me which laid the foundation for my career and life," he said.

On any given night after dinner, students can be found sitting around Math Teacher Charlie Brown's dinner table at Hill House. A Gow faculty member for 43 years, Mr. Brown has always welcomed students into his home for nightly extra tutoring and homework help. "One thing that hasn't changed in all my years at The Gow School is the students coming up the hill after dinner for extra math help. David Gow impressed on us as teachers, if we know that a student is struggling, it is our job to give them the help they need," he said.

Shortly after graduating from Amherst College, Mr. Brown was hired in the fall of 1982 by David Gow, the third headmaster of the School. During his decades of service to Gow, he has served as Math Chair, Soccer and Lacrosse Coach, Dorm Parent and Academic Dean of The Gow School Summer Program, and more. Currently, he teaches Calculus and Pre-Calculus and serves as the Director of College Counseling. He points to the transformation of the Gow student as his inspiration. "In my position, I see students come in who are scared of their own academic shadow. But they walk out confident because they know what they can do. So much of the Gow student experience is that they no longer feel ignored when they are struggling. They have a voice in their education and say, 'I know what I need, I know how to get it, and this is not a dream, it's now my reality," he said.

A Buffalo native, Mr. Brown raised his own family right on campus. He and his wife Alice have two children, Louisa and Rowland, who grew up playing in the woods, by the creek, and on the ski hill. "Gow is a big family. It is a great place to raise kids because they can go out and play," he said. When Mr. Brown is not teaching math or hosting extra tutoring sessions, he performs in the choir at St. Matthias Church in East Aurora. Each holiday season, he invites Gow students to join him to sing in the choir for the Handel's Messiah in East Aurora.

"What makes the secret sauce of Gow? It's actually not a secret sauce at all because it's all the flavors and how they come together - the family feeling, figuring out what a student needs, watching them evolve and students gaining confidence. That is the recipe," he said.
