Gow Celebrates Howard Hall Groundbreaking

After years of planning, earth-moving equipment has arrived on campus, and Howard Hall construction has begun behind the Main Building. To celebrate this long-awaited addition to campus, alumni, current students, families, trustees, and friends gathered for a groundbreaking ceremony and speeches to thank those who have already donated \$8.4 million toward our \$10.5 million goal. This 17,000-square-foot



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building will house ten flexible classrooms, a health center for boys and

girls, a Commons area for quiet and collaborative study and conversation, a Little Senior entrepreneurial space with a patio overlooking Cazenovia Creek, ramps, and an elevator to be accessible for all.

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GOW ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT JAY MANDARINO '79

At the Crimson and Navy Spring Weekend Auction, Gow alumnus Jay Mandarino '79 served as the emcee and enthusiastically rallied fellow alumni, families, and students to support his alma mater. Celebrating his 45th reunion with the Class of 1979, Jay shared memories and stories about Gow's impact on his life and career.

As a young child in Ontario, Jay struggled in school and had difficulty making friends. "I was always a slow reader and had difficulty pronouncing words. Professionals told me that I would likely be a gasoline attendant or perhaps a mechanic's apprentice," he said. Life changed when he was diagnosed with dyslexia and ADHD and discovered Gow.


"I entered The Gow School in Grade 10 with fourth-grade reading skills and sixth-grade math skills. Two years later, I graduated with honors and scored a 98% on my geometry Regents Exam. Gow taught me to think outside the box and to make friends. I am grateful for these life-changing skills."

Since his graduation, Jay has been a beacon of success and a testament to the transformative power of The Gow School. He previously served as the President of the Alumni Association and has created a scholarship for Canadian students. He leads The CJ Group of Companies, overseeing the daily operations of 37 companies, including several non-profit organizations such as CJ's SKATEPARK, the world's largest indoor, climate-controlled skatepark which starts with toddlers at age 1½ all the way up to adults and Olympic hopefuls. Jay was the 1st person to hippie jump a Ferrari in 1976 and as an avid skateboarder, he often shares his experiences as a motivational speaker around the globe.

"At Gow, I learned I had talents, a promising future, and how to make lifelong friends. Every student at Gow deserves that, and our gifts make that possible," he said.

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Campus Focus: MARK SZAFNICKI, Gow's Athletic Director

For 36 years, Mark Szafnicki has called The Gow School home. An avid tennis player, he learned about Gow through a friend and former Gow teacher, Mason Winfield. "When I first came on campus, I thought, 'This is like Shangri-La.' I realized through teaching tennis that I loved working with students, and a few years later, I applied for and got a teaching position at Gow," he said.

Mr. Szafnicki has taught Reconstruction Language, or RL, for over three decades. The cornerstone of a Gow education, it gives him great satisfaction to see students who struggle academically unlock the tools needed to read, write, and succeed. In addition to his passion for teaching and coaching tennis, he also assumed administrative roles, serving first as Director of Student Activities and, for the last 21 years, Director of Athletics.





"When I stepped into the role of Athletic Director, I knew I had found my true calling," he shares. "I am particularly proud of my work in expanding our athletic offerings." Under his leadership, Gow has seen the addition of various sports, including golf, cross-country, wrestling, squash, girls' volleyball and dance, weight training, and track and field.

"What I love about Gow's Athletic program is that it instills confidence in each student by giving them opportunities they could not get elsewhere. We have many individual and team sports; through those, we teach students to discover new talents, compete hard, and work well with others."

For Mr. Szafnicki, the future means inspiring and supporting Gow student-athletes and scholars. In his free time, he loves to ski and play tennis. We proudly announce that Mark Szafnicki will be honored for his tennis playing and coaching when he is inducted into the Buffalo Tennis Hall of Fame this summer.


