What is required to graduate in Oklahoma?

To graduate, students must complete:

- 23 academic credits
- Oklahoma Schools Testing Program (ACT) and all 11th grade College Career Readiness Assessments (Science and US History)
- Personal Financial Literacy (PFL)
- CPR training
- Individual Career Academic Plan (ICAP)

Starting in 2025, students must also:

- Pass the Citizenship Exam
- Apply for Financial Aid through FAFSA

** there is current, pending legislation that is likely to pass that changes these requirements.*





The Standard High School Diploma

In the state of Oklahoma, students can earn a standard high school diploma using two different curriculum tracks :

- Core curriculum
- College and Career Ready curriculum

All Tulsa Public Schools students are **automatically placed** on the college and career ready curriculum track. To place a student on the core curriculum track, we require a meeting and parent/guardian signatures.





How does the CCR curriculum differ from the core curriculum?

Each curriculum requires students to complete 23 credit hours but there are **three key differences** in what those credits must be:

Differences	College and Career Ready Curriculum Requirements	Core Curriculum Requirements
Math	Math credits must be earned from Algebra I and above	Math credits can be earned from Math of Finance, Intermediate Algebra, and some TulsaTech courses
World Language vs. Computer Technology	Two units of the same world language or computer technology credits	One unit of world language or computer credit
Additional Unit	An additional unit of math, science, social studies, world language or computer technology	No additional unit required





How do we define “On Track” vs “Off Track” for Interim Goal 3.1?

This interim goal reinforces an expectation that most students graduate with the college and career-ready curriculum, the most rigorous pathway to a standard diploma. This metric measures student progress through this curriculum.

- Failing grades in required credits mark the student as currently ‘off track.’
- Required credits include English, math, laboratory science, history and citizenship, world languages, computer technology, fine arts, P.E./health, and other electives.
- *This metric does not incorporate future supports or interventions to help them graduate on time on the college and career ready curriculum.*





Why interim goal 3.1 On-Track for CCR matters

Earning a HS diploma on the college and career ready curriculum track provides students the opportunity to:

- Be academically prepared for the rigors of college coursework without remediation
- Meet the requirements for Oklahoma's Promise
- Satisfy NCAA regulations and be eligible to participate in college athletics
- Qualify for other scholarships
