A healthy school environment requires the cooperation and effort of us all working together. During this time of year we tend to see a higher incidence of illness in general. There are ways that you can help to protect yourself and your family from many of these illnesses. Follow the Habits for Good Health listed below recommended by the Center for Disease Control.

### **Habits for Good Health**

Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze—throw the tissue away after you use it. If you do not have a tissue, cover your mouth and nose with the inside of your elbow. For more information watch the video@ www.coughsafe.com.

Wash your hands often with soap and water especially after you cough or sneeze. If you are not near water, use an alcohol based hand cleaner.

Stay away, as much as you can, from people who are sick.

If you or your child gets the flu, stay home from work or school. Do not go near other people so that you don't make them sick too.

**If your child is diagnosed with Covid 19**, follow the current recommended school protocol for notification and exclusion.

Try not to touch your eyes, nose, or mouth. Germs often spread this way.

**Dress for the weather**. Come to school dressed for the winter. Wear layers of loose fitting clothing. Wear mittens and gloves. Wear a hat. Remember, the air that is trapped inside your clothing, warmed by your body heat, is the best protection from the cold.

Please note: Children who have a fever or who need to take antibiotics for infections such as strep throat, pink eye, ear infections, etc., should stay home until they have taken the medicine for at least 24 hours, and they are fever-free (without fever reducing medicine), and they feel better. Some children and some illnesses take more time to recover from than others. When children return to their normal sleeping and eating habits they are usually well enough to return to school. Please note that your child should come to school feeling well enough to participate fully in all school activities including going outside in the winter.

### Pre-Kindergarten

Our Pre-K students are jumping into our newest thematic unit, *On The Move*. Through this month-long theme, students will explore many different ways to move.

We will begin by exploring the way we move. Children love to be active and move their bodies. We will learn new dances and exercises. We will discuss ways to be active both indoors and outdoors.

We will then explore different types of transportation. We will look into land, air, and water transportation. We will also investigate ways to travel across the Tundra and what we would see in the Tundra.

We will dive deeper into traveling by discussing different types of destinations. We will talk about how we can travel to visit relatives as well as travel to see new places.

Lastly, we will look into places where kids can go. We will discuss adventures kids can have at the zoo, the children's museum, the beach, and the amusement park. We look forward to seeing what adventures the students have been on or wish to go on!









We are excited to begin lots of new learning in Quarter 3.

We will wrap up Unit 6 and begin Unit 7 in Skills. In this unit your genius will learn about digraphs and clusters. We will continue to learn new tricky words and begin reading in the decodable reader, 'Seth'.

In Math, we will begin working in Module 5, we will focus on addition, subtraction, making sense of problems, and making use of structure.

In Knowledge, we will wrap up Domain 4 on plants and begin Domain 5 which focuses on farms. This domain will introduce students to several farm animals as well as to crops that people grow on farms.

We are excited to watch our geniuses continue to grow!









It's February! Our little first graders have recently celebrated their one hundred and FIRST day of school! It's now been more than 101 days of learning and growing and we're excited to see where our learning will take us.

In math, students are immersed in the world of place value as they see the importance of learning all about the power of TEN! Our first graders are developing an understanding of the base ten system and will continue to advance their use of tens and ones as they compose and compare numbers. Understanding that numbers are composed of tens

and ones, will help make larger, harder

problems into easier problems which will help them be more efficient when adding and subtracting within 100!

In ELA during our phonic CK skills, students are continuing to be immersed in complex first grade texts. Our first graders are learning different vowel pairs, R-controlled patterns and multiple phonics rules that will help with multisyllabic words as they continue their journey on becoming fluent readers. They are learning all about informational text as they learn about different animals while reading The Green Fern Zoo. In CK Knowledge, we have learned



about Early World and Early American civilizations and are excited to be learning all about Astronomy.



We can't wait to see how much we learn and grow this month!



# ATIONAL-SECOND GRAD

Happy February to all our second grade geniuses. This month we are excited to jump into our 2nd semester standards and skills.








### Third Grade Geniuses

MATH: This month, students broadened their understanding multiplication and division concepts to include units of 0, 1, 8 and 9. They also began to explore the relationship between multiplication and area. They used their understanding of polygons to recognize area as an attribute. tiled polygons and labeled side lengths to determine area.



SCIENCE: In science, students explored how organisms get what they need to survive, how they are suited for their environment and how they respond when



the environment changes. As they moved into module 3, students began to discover how animals of the same species share the same characteristics and individuals can be told apart by differences in their traits.

### Fifth Grade Geniuses Taking February By Storm

During the month of February, the 5th Grade math geniuses will continue Module 4 with decimal multiplication and division. Students will refresh their previous learning of multiplication and division of multi digit numbers from Module 1. They will conclude their study of decimals with conversions of metric and customary measurements, by the end of the month. In preparation for the upcoming LEAP assessment, students will be reviewing previous essential standards daily and have homework nightly.

This month students will begin our third and final unit in ELA, Shutting Out the Sky-This unit will have our Geniuses exploring the immigration of Eastern-Europeans into the United States during the start of the 20th century. Students will explore several different immigrants learning what motivated them to make the long and dangerous journey and contemplate on the Unit's overall question of "Was the American dream worth the sacrifice?" Geniuses will read excerpts from four different sources over this unit.

In science, geniuses will continue to investigate how Earth's systems (biosphere, hydrosphere, atmosphere, and geosphere) interact with one another as we continue to discuss rice farming practices in Bali, Indonesia· We'll investigate and discuss how those interactions affect the weather and form landforms on Earth's surface· At the end of the month, we'll investigate the factors that contributed to the Dust Bowl of the 1940s and discuss how they disrupted the balance between Earth's spheres·

During the next few weeks, as part of our study of the Bayou Bridges Louisiana Social Studies Curriculum, your child will be learning about West Africa and the rise and fall of the empires of Ghana, Mali, and Songhai· In this unit, students will identify geographic features in Africa; examine the role of trans-Saharan trade in West Africa; describe the economic, political, and social characteristics of West African kingdoms; identify key events and leaders that shaped the empires of Ghana, Mali, and Songhai; and analyze primary sources and evaluate claims and evidence related to Ghana, Mali, and Songhai· As part of their exploration, students will also learn a little about the role of conquest and the slave trade in West African kingdoms during this time· This information is presented in a factual, ageappropriate way rather than in a manner that suggests the value or correctness of any particular culture or practice·

Sometimes students have questions regarding how the information they are learning relates to themselves and their own experiences. In such instances, we will encourage each student to discuss such topics with you. We recognize that the best place to find answers to those types of questions is with your family and the adults at home.

#### How Can Get Involved With Your Child's School:

Learn what the school offers.

Read the information the school sends home, and ask to receive information in your native language if necessary. Talk to other parents to find out what programs the school offers. Maybe there's a music program, after-school activity, sports team, or tutoring program your child would enjoy. Remember to keep track of events throughout the school year.

Volunteer at your child's school and/or join your school's parent-teacher group.

Teachers appreciate it when parents help out at the school! There are many ways you can contribute. You can volunteer in your child's class or in the school library. You can make food for a school event. If you work during the day, you can attend "parents' night" activities or your child's performances. At most schools, a group of parents meets regularly to talk about the school. This group is usually called the PTA or PTO. The meetings give you a good chance to talk with other parents and to work together to improve the school.
