REMINDERS

ANYONE picking up your child from school

Fire Safety: It Starts At Home

Is your home fire safe? Have you practiced what to do if there ever is a fire in your home? Do you have smoke detectors and have you changed the batteries in the last 6 months?

If you couldn't answer "yes" to the questions above, there are things you can do today that will help ensure you and your family sleep safely tonight.

10 Simple Steps to a Safer Home

• Take Fire Safety Seriously!

If you don't, your children won't!

Make Your "Family Escape Plan."

Create a simple, easy to understand escape plan. Include 2 exit routes from every room and a safe meeting place outside your home (like a specific tree or a neighbor's home) where your family will gather once they are outside.

Practice Fire Safety!

Take time to practice your escape plan as a family several times and then allow your kids to practice by themselves to be sure they know exactly what to do if there ever really is a fire.

Install Smoke Detectors!

Statistics show that more than half of all fire deaths occur in homes with no smoke alarms or with non-functioning alarms. By placing smoke detectors in your home, you can increase the chances by 40-50% that all of your family gets out safely.

- One in every room! It's important that smoke detectors are located throughout your home and especially in every bedroom.
- Test them! Make sure the batteries are good and the smoke detector itself is in proper working condition. Test your smoke
 detectors every month.
- Not sure? Replace them! If your smoke detectors are older, or if you're not sure they are working properly, change them. Newer smoke detectors may provide a better level of protection to your family.

Change Batteries Twice a Year!

A helpful way to remember to do this is to change your smoke detectors' batteries when you change your clocks for Daylight Savings Time. If you can't remember when you last changed the batteries, go ahead and change them now.

Know That Sound!

Make sure your family recognizes the sound your smoke detectors make. The quicker you recognize the sound, the quicker you can react in the event of a fire.

Keep A Look-Out For Safety Hazards In The Home!

Examples of fire hazards include: too many items plugged into one outlet, a shirt or sheet thrown over a lamp, a worn electrical cord, an unattended space heater or stove-top.

• Be Careful When Cooking!

Be sure young children never cook without proper supervision. Keep cooking surfaces clean to avoid grease fires. A majority of fires within the home begin in the kitchen.

• Have A Fire Extinguisher!

Keep a fire extinguisher in a handy location. It is good to keep your fire extinguisher just inside a door or entrance, in an area where a fire is not likely to start, but out of reach of children. Remember, a fire extinguisher is not a substitute for the fire department, but it can be used to stop a small fire from getting out of control. Know how to use it! It's too late to learn once a fire has begun!

Pre K in November!

This month, our Pre K classes will be finishing up Theme Three Safe, Healthy, and Helpful Me. We will learn about eating well and which foods are healthy for our bodies. We will also begin Theme Four Compare and Contrast. We will talk about living and non-living, stories, real and make-believe, and opposites. We are looking forward to growing and learning with our Tiger Cub friends in Pre K!!





We are so excited to be in Quarter 2 of Kindergarten! The students continue to uphold our procedures and expectations of kindergarten and Luling Elementary. We are thrilled to finish Unit 4 and begin Unit 5 in our CKLA skills curriculum. Segmenting is a critical skill for reading. Segmenting is the opposite of blending. They will learn to isolate individual sounds known as phonemes to say two- and three-sound words. At the end of Unit 4, students will be introduced to the first decodable book presented as a Big Book, Pet Fun. The students will learn to identify and draw the "picture" for the /n/, /h/, /s/, /f/, /v/, /z/, /p/, /e/, /b/, /l/, /r/, /u/, /w/, /j/, /y/, and /x/ sounds in Unit 4 and 5. Five new Tricky Words are introduced in Units 4 and 5: a, the, blue, yellow, and look. In knowledge, students will be introduced to reading and answering questions about Nursery Rhymes and Fables in Domain 1 and The Five Senses in Domain 2.

In mathematics, our focus is describing and comparing measurable attributes of objects (such as weight, length, and height), identifying and describing shapes, and describing relative positions of objects (using terms such as above, below, beside, in front of, behind, and next to), and identifying coins and their value.

We look forward to blooming and growing with you and your child. Its GROW Time!!





We made it to November! Thank you to all the grown-ups who helped make our Classroom Fall Celebrations and Trunk or Treat memorable and fun! We enjoyed making our edible Spookley the Square Pumpkins and wearing our costumes as we Trunk or Treated at



school! Now we are excited to continue our learning in quarter 2 and looking forward to more holiday fun!

In math, students are finishing up module 2 that focused on the relationship between subtraction and addition within 20 using varies strategies. We are excited to move into Module 3. In this module, students use the unit of ten to make easier problems by decomposing addends and grouping them in any order. They will learn how they can use strategies such

as counting on, making ten, taking from ten, subtracting to get to a ten,

and relating operations to break down larger addition and subtraction problems. This module also introduces the concept of place value as they start recognizing and using tens and ones. These strategies may seem odd, but please refer to the parent helper in front of each homework assignment for support!

In CK Skills, students have just wrapped up Unit 2, which focused on long vowels and the magic e!



Learning can be FUN!

We will now dive into Unit 3. Students will learn the tricky spelling 'oo' as in boot and book. This can be very difficult as it the same letters, but two possible sounds. Students will also



learn, 'ou', 'oi', and 'aw'. Our third reader will focus on fables. Students will read fables with these sound patterns. Students will also start SPELLING TESTS! Spelling words should be practiced nightly.


In CK Knowledge we will start Domain 4: Early World Civilizations! We will learn about the ancient civilizations of Mesopotamia and Egypt. We will focus on how both civilizations thrived because of access to water. They also both created writing systems and had leaders such as kings and pharaohs. We will close the unit by learning of three ancient world religions: Christianity, Judaism, and Islam. Students will learn about important people, buildings of worship, important holidays, and names of

their holy books and followers.

Quarter 2 begins with a new unit in skills and students working hard in our 95% program to be the best readers ever!

Third Grade Geniuses

MATH: This month, third grade students applied their knowledge of the vertical number line to the scale on a scaled bar graph. They represent data in a scaled bar graph and solve addition and subtraction problems related to scaled bar graphs. They explore a variety of addition and subtraction strategies based on place value, the properties of operations, and the relationship between addition and subtraction. The strategies include adding and subtracting like units, making the next ten or hundred, taking from a ten or hundred, and using compensation. Emphasis is placed on thinking flexibly and building toward the use of mental math. Throughout the topic, students share and critique solution strategies for addition and subtraction problems and explain how their choice in strategy helps them to add or subtract efficiently.

SCIENCE: Our third grade students became engineers this month. Students learn about measures communities can take to protect themselves from disasters like the 1900 Galveston hurricane. They explore how modern-day coastal cities implement a combination of solutions to reduce the impact of weather hazards related to hurricanes. Students were able to design a clay seawall to protect their community from flooding.



ELA: Students reread "Bouki Over a Barrel" to understand the non-literal language and note-take the major events in the story and put them into chronological order. Students review the character traits and compare those traits between Bouki and Lapin. Students also discuss what Doucet reveals about Bouki and Lapin through their thoughts and actions in preparation for the section diagnostic.

NOVEMBER

Fourth Grade

Learning Focus

ELA: Students are exploring Greek Mythology and reading the novel The Lightening Thief. They are enjoying the contrast between ancient myths and modern literature.

Social Studies: Students are enjoying learning about the early hunter-gathers and how human civilization has evolved. We have explored human migration across the world and discovered ancient cave paintings in France.

Math: Students have been diving into multiplication and division. We have been learning multiple strategies to solve problems, as well as real world applications, like finding the area of a rectangle, or missing side lengths using measurement.

Science: We started our new module, focusing on Windmills, specifically how they can change wind into light. We have completed several investigations focusing on what energy is, as well as how it relates to speed.

 $\pmb{\mathsf{ELA}} ext{-}$ In November, we will read "The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe" by $\pmb{\mathsf{C.S.}}$



Lewis and a series of related literary and informational texts to explore the question: How can people understand the same experiences differently? We will express our understanding through a narrative that retells a key scene from the novel from a first person point of view. In section 1, our geniuses are learning about the fantasy genre by reading a short description about fantasy, *The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe*, and "Down the Rabbit Hole". Students will connect the real life events of World War II to the creation of fantasy texts. Students will also focus on character traits and setting in fantasy.



Math-The 5th Grade mathematicians have concluded their study of multiplying and dividing with multidigit numbers and adding and subtracting fractions and mixed numbers. During the month of November, they will continue with the exciting world of fractions with multiplication and division. Module #3's unit

begins with a focus on the multiplication of fractions and whole numbers and fractions times fractions using arrays, number lines, area models and tape diagrams. Following their mastery of multiplication, they will close out the month with division of whole numbers and fractions.

Social Studies- Geniuses will continue with the new curriculum "Bayou Bridges". Our 5th grade students will continue discussing Medieval Europe and the ideas and practices that characterized the Middle Ages. They will learn how the fall of the Western Roman Empire contributed to changes in Europe during the middle Ages. They will learn of the influence and role of the Church and the rise of monasticism in Europe as well as the role of Charlemagne in uniting the Western Roman Empire. By the end of the month, students will be able to describe the structures of feudalism and manorialism.



Science- This month, our 5th grade student scientists will continue and conclude their Module 2 of their PhD Science's unit on ecosystems as they investigate their phenomenon question, "How can a tree support so much life?" Science discussions will center on matter cycling among organisms and the nt. how animals receive matter and store energy, and how plants harness energy from the sun. They will

environment, how animals receive matter and store energy, and how plants harness energy from the sun. They will continue to examine the relationships within ecosystems between plants, animals, and decomposers as well as explore how to maintain balance within an ecosystem.








Band News

On another *note*; any 3rd grade student who wishes to join the school band may have an opportunity to do so in January.






In Literacy we are "FLEXING" our reading skills in the 95 Percent Program. Our first grade literacy students have completed the Phonemic Awareness Kit and is moving on to the Phonics Kit. Our second grade literacy students are learning syllable types, blends, and vowel patterns that will help them read words, phrases, and text in literacy and in their classrooms. Our third through fifth grade literacy students are being immersed in multi-syllabic words, advanced phonics, and reading text with appropriation expression, accuracy, and fluency. Remember to practice reading every night!


