



Jared Fink is no stranger to music. Classically trained in piano and trumpet as a child, Jared shifted to studying Jazz piano as a



The women's soccer program began to build the foundation toward future success under the direction of current SRDS A.D. PJ Petrow, winning their first State Section Title in 2019. The Rebels also won their first Bergen County Basketball Championship and the North Jersey Non-Public B Sectional Basketball Championship in 2016 and have continued as a highly competitive program in New Jersey and in the tri-state area. Since then, they have gone on to win nine consecutive Bergen County titles, breaking the previous Bergen County record held by Paramus Catholic. Most recently, the women's soccer program, under the coaching of PJ Petrow, took the NJIC title in 2024 with an undefeated record in the league.

In addition, the newly formed girls lacrosse program experienced a meteoric rise under the coaching leadership of Paul and Karen McMahon. Led by











sisters Izzy and All-Americans Dani and Michaela McMahon, the women's lacrosse team defeated lacrosse power house

Mountain Lakes to win their first ever Section 1, Group 1 NJSIAA State Championship. CC, Michaela and Alexis were all highly contributing members of the lacrosse team, in addition to playing soccer and baskethall

The men's basketball program also began to experience great success. Damien and Garrett were both instrumental members of the basketball program that saw a bid in the Bergen County Jamboree and an NJIC Patriot League Championship with a perfect 16-0 league record, ending the season with a 20-5





record overall. Both of them were key components in the soccer, lacrosse and track programs during high school.

These five athletes represent the best of what it means to be a "REBEL." More importantly, their success didn't stop after high school. Each of them have gone on to establish themselves as confident and accomplished in their own rights, excelling in their young careers and continuing to carry the Rebel spirit with them. Caroline Carrera had an outstanding lacrosse career at the University of Vermont, earning accolades like America East Defender of the Year in 2023. She's now coaching at the University of Oregon, where she helped guide the Ducks to their first winning season since 2017.

Damien Giannotti pursued Finance at Providence College and remained involved in sports through intramurals. He now works as an auditor for BNY Mellon in NYC. Garrett Kuhlman attended the Gabelli School of Business at Fordham University, where he stayed connected to basketball as a team manager for the men's team while pursuing his degree. He is currently a Customer Success Manager for a startup company Fieldtech Software in NYC, and both he and Damien continue playing basketball in men's leagues in Hoboken.

After SRDS, Michaela McMahon continued her career playing lacrosse at UPenn where she received an Honorable Mention (All-Ivy) and helped win a Gold Medal at the 2019 U19 World Championships with Team USA. The 2020 season was canceled due to COVID and Michaela transferred to the University of Southern California to complete her education, where older sisters Gabby and Izzy also played lacrosse. 

# **Complex College Admissions Landscape**

Over the past five years, the college admissions process has undergone enormous changes; submitting test scores was optional but now it might not be anymore, Al has entered the conversation and the future of the college essay is in doubt, the value of Advanced Placement classes and tests has been questioned, and the cost of a college education has continued to increase.

For parents and students, the constantly shifting landscape of college admissions has become even more stressful and uncertain. Which is why it's comforting to have a knowledgeable, experienced partner for a process and choice that will certainly be one of the most consequential of most high school student's lives up to this point. Beginning this fall at Saddle River Day School, there will be not one, but two full time college admissions counselors in the College Counseling Office to help families navigate the process successfully.

Most Saddle River Day School families are familiar with Director of College Counseling, Karen Ferretti. Last fall, she was joined full time in the CCO by Ms. Jackie Williams. A veteran on both sides of the college admissions process, Jackie comes to Saddle River Day from Ma'ayanot Yeshiva High School where she has worked since 2022. Prior to that,

Jackie spent time in college admissions at Stevens Institute of Technology, the College of Mount Saint Vincent, and NYU. She has an undergraduate degree from Muhlenberg College in Pennsylvania, and a Master's Degree in public administration from NYU. Her extensive knowledge and her network of contacts make her an invaluable and welcome addition to the Saddle River Day School community.

Karen and Jackie have already been hard at work, devising a framework within which they will have the opportunity to really get to know each SRDS Upper School student on an individual basis. Because seniors are so deep into the admissions process, Karen will be their main point person. But Jackie will be teaching the Junior's fall seminar and then moving on to working with the Sophomores as they start their college process each winter, when Karen transitions to instruct the Junior seminar. Their intention is to have a comprehensive understanding of each student's academic record, extracurriculars, and personality in order to help develop a list of colleges and universities that suit their unique needs and preferences.

So how does a student begin to narrow down their choices, and what exactly is the latest on what's happening with all the changes in the college admissions process?





Karen Ferretti says the best way for students to start to understand their choices for college is still to visit the campuses. Students

will very quickly begin to identify the factors that will be important to them during their process. These factors include, but are not limited to: location, distance from home, degrees conferred, research opportunities, campus culture, facilities, investment in career counseling services, and cost. Karen says that often, the university of a student's dreams is just that - a dream. When faced with the reality of a campus in a rural area that's difficult to travel to, or an urban area without a true campus, or a campus that's sprawling (or too compact), students will reevaluate their preferences and priorities. It is the ultimate goal of the College Counseling Office to educate students enough that they go into the application process with more than one ideal school. To this end, Karen and Jackie will be taking the entire Junior class to NYU so they can experience an information session and tour as they begin their process.

There is also, according to Ms. Ferretti, a trend back toward requiring ACT or SAT test scores as schools shrink their admissions departments and need to efficiently differentiate between applicants. She suggests that the fears about AI taking the place of a good, old fashioned personal essay, crafted by a student, are premature. It's still pretty easy for a savvy admissions counselor to tell the difference between an essay written by a student, a robot, or a well-meaning parent. Advanced Placement (AP) classes will still exist and, she suggests, even more of

them might be developed as colleges and universities grapple with how to value these test scores and assess college credit for them.

She hopes that the oversaturation of applications to the same small number of well-known schools will trickle down to students paying attention to often overlooked colleges that have interesting, innovative programs, committed and creative faculty and staff, or other unique, differentiating factors. To foster this, one of the first assignments for students in her seminar is for them to choose a lesser known college to research and present to their class. This exercise often leads students to discover a school (or schools) that would never have been on their radar otherwise.

In the end, the college application process is all about finding the place from which a student can launch their career. Karen and Jackie believe that Saddle River Day School students have a distinct advantage because in their classrooms and with their friends, SRDS students have developed an acute self-awareness, and a confidence in their intelligence that enables them to assess critically, question rigorously, and choose decisively. This is the hallmark of a Saddle River Day School education, and this is one of the many factors that set SRDS students apart from their peers.

## **Where Growth Meets Opportunity**

The Middle School years are a time of enormous growth and change for our children. Cognitively, they are becoming more aware of the world around them and are able to grasp, and articulate, increasingly more intricate concepts and ideas. Academically, expectations as well as stakes are rising, and at the same time, their social interactions are changing in ways both big and small. It's a lot to handle and requires students to remain flexible, inquisitive, and open. It also requires their support systems to maintain continuity while also creating room for them to develop into the people they are becoming. Not only do SRDS Middle School faculty and administrators understand the complexity of the Middle School years, they welcome the challenge, and take great pleasure in helping each of their students achieve success in their own personal and particular ways.

The Middle School at Saddle River Day School has seen unprecedented growth in the past few years. Families who are new to SRDS still cite some of our traditional hallmarks like breadth of enrichment offerings, low student-to-faculty ratio, the tight-knit community, and opportunities to try new things as reasons their children have found their home at SRDS. But it's some of our signature academic and student-focused programs, along with new programs, designed to help students succeed and excel in high school, college, and beyond that have made the SRDS Middle School highly desirable, academically rigorous, and competitive with top Middle Schools all over the tri-state area.



As parents, it is both gratifying and comforting to know that our children have trustworthy adults in their lives who challenge, guide, teach, and care for them when we aren't around. This is the intention of the Middle School Advisory Program. Students meet regularly in small groups with a faculty or staff member who provides information, direction, and advice. Through field trips and overnights, students build community with their groups, and advisors have the benefit of getting to know their students as individuals outside the classroom setting. According to Middle School Head, Anastasia Kelly, the advisory program is "an extension of the SRDS value pillar that 'everyone counts.' The advisors are the point people who are really focused on student's socialemotional growth, and their academic path. Advisors learn their students' passions, skills, and talents and can guide them toward classes, extracurriculars, and enrichment opportunities that advance the big picture and help students plan their futures."

Students are able to participate in enrichment classes that can either deepen their knowledge and skills in an area of interest, or give them exposure to a new discipline they'd like to learn more about. Best of all Middle School students aren't required to choose between an athletic team and a club or an enrichment class. The Middle School schedule has



been specifically structured so they can do both. Because we know all our students are multi-faceted and deserve the opportunity to excel at both a sport and Odyssey of the Mind, or robotics, or debate. Or, they can try their hand at the performing or visual arts. Or, they can participate in non-competitive sports like bowling or fencing. The combinations and options are as varied and unique as our students.

In addition, students are encouraged to use their Middle School years to experiment and try new things. But for students who want to more deeply immerse themselves in the study of math or science, and who have demonstrated aptitude for higher level work, Saddle River Day School offers the opportunity to apply for an accelerated curriculum that will enable them to take advantage of upper and college level classes, as well as AP classes, once they reach the Upper School. Newer to the program is a selection of business, entrepreneurship, and computer science classes that also lay the groundwork for more advanced coursework in these disciplines once students reach the Upper School.

Regardless of the track our students are on, each Middle School student will participate in a multi-year research curriculum that culminates in an 8th Grade Capstone project that readies them for the demanding work and research that will be critical to their Upper School and college success. Students begin by mastering the fundamentals of research, gradually advancing to deeper analysis of information and sources. This journey culminates in a final presentation that addresses a problem within their chosen area of interest, aligned with the UN Sustainable Development Goals. With increasing emphasis on literacy and critical thinking skills for

college-bound students, Saddle River Day School equips its students with the tools they need to excel and thrive.

Research indicates that the success of first year college students directly correlates to the preparation they received in their pre-college years. It is also becoming evident that the skills students need must be embedded in their academic pursuits as early as possible. Saddle River Day School cultivates an environment of curiosity, innovation, imagination, experiential learning, and personal achievement, all within a supportive, family oriented community. In short, SRDS Middle Schoolers get 'big school opportunities' with all the benefits of a small school setting. With exciting new transformations on the horizon, our students and their parents know we, as a school, will be on the forefront of thought and education. It's how we will fulfill our mission to "inspire each child to achieve their personal and academic best and become a caring and ethical contributor to society."





## **Creating Caring & Ethical Citizens**

The Lower School's Project-Based Learning initiatives are a cornerstone of an SRDS education. Each grade participates in age-appropriate, yearlong, cross-curricular experiences that integrate both core subject and special area teachers. The 4th Grade monthly projects embody one of the school's core values of "creating caring and ethical citizens," as students embark on a journey of service, learning how small actions can create a ripple effect of kindness throughout their community. Through this experience, they have discovered firsthand that this value is more than just words—it's a way of life.



#### **September: A Lesson in Giving**

The school year began with an inspiring presentation about fundraising and giving back. A guest speaker from St. Joseph's Hospital shared stories of how acts of generosity impact lives. Inspired, the students brainstormed ways to make a difference in their own community, setting the foundation for a year of service projects.



#### **October: Pink Pop-Up Shop**

During Breast Cancer Awareness Month, the students launched the Pink Pop-Up Shop. They collaborated with the Graphics and Ideas Lab to design flyers, social media posts, and unique products to sell. The proceeds were donated to Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center. When the students handed over their check, they saw firsthand the impact of their efforts, reinforcing the power of collective action.



#### **November: Fighting Hunger**

As Thanksgiving neared, the focus shifted to those struggling with food insecurity. Students organized a food drive, designing posters and emails to spread awareness. They took a field trip to the Ridgewood Food Pantry, where they stocked shelves, checked expiration dates, and learned about the families they were helping. Seeing the direct results of their work, they left with a renewed commitment to ongoing service.

#### **December: Spreading Holiday Cheer**

During the holiday season, the students turned their attention to the children at St. Joseph's Hospital. They collected toys and created heartfelt cards to bring joy to young patients. The experience reminded them that even small gestures, like a handwritten note or a donated toy, could brighten someone's day.





#### **January: Preparing for More Impact**

In the new year, the students dove into planning their upcoming fundraisers. Using the Graphics and IDEAS Lab, they designed promotional materials for two major events: Jump Rope for Heart and Pennies for Puppies. Through this process, they honed their leadership and teamwork skills, understanding the logistics of organizing a successful campaign.

#### **February: Compassion in Action**

The month was packed with activities that combined fundraising with education. In Pennies for Puppies, students collected spare change to support The Seeing Eye, an organization that trains guide dogs for the visually impaired. They eagerly brought their collected coins to a coin drop and counted their donations before delivering them to the organization.

At the same time, they participated in Jump Rope for Heart, raising awareness for the American Heart Association. Through jump rope challenges, they learned about heart health while raising funds for cardiovascular research. The event was not just about fitness—it was about understanding the importance of helping others.

As the year progresses, SRDS students continue to see that being caring and ethical citizens means more than just donating—it means understanding the struggles of others, spreading awareness, and taking action. They have begun to understand that they are not only changing the lives of those they help, but are also transforming into young leaders, ready to make a lasting impact on the world.



## Inspiring the Next Generation: TEDxYouth@SRDS Celebrates a Decade of Ideas Worth Sharing

The 10th annual TEDxYouth@SRDS event's theme was "TEDx: Ten Years of TED" and featured themes of XPloration, XPlanation and XPosition. Student speakers, performers and crew were all involved in making our tenth year a resounding success as they presented to SRDS students in grades 8-12 on April 16th.

Recognizing the power of young voices, TEDxYouth@SRDS provides a platform for students to share their "Ideas Worth Spreading." Launched 11 years ago by four Saddle River Day School Upper School students, this initiative encourages students at SRDS to challenge assumptions, engage in critical conversations, and make their perspectives known. Under the guidance of SRDS Director of Technology Laura Hollis, the program continues to thrive as a space where technical skills intersect with creative vision, empowering students to express their ideas and inspire meaningful action.

Each year, TEDxYouth@SRDS evolves as students bring fresh ideas, introduce new activities, and creatively expand the event's impact, making each iteration a unique reflection of their interests and innovations. The TED organization recently



updated its tagline to "Ideas Change Everything," and TEDxYouth@SRDS aligns with this vision, emphasizing student ideas as catalysts for real-world impact and action.

The 11th annual TEDxYouth@SRDS event will be held on April 16, 2025, during the school day, bringing together students in grades 8-12 to experience talks and performances in the school's Performing Arts Center. Student leaders Jonathan Fromm, Bella Harrison, Mason Lusk, and Josie Brooks—returning TEDxYouth@SRDS speakers—are facilitating the program, which includes organizing talks, artistic performances, and production.

Planning begins each September, with students selecting their own topics and working alongside a faculty mentor. They curate the program, choose a theme, select a faculty speaker and a community keynote speaker, design the event logo, and manage all event-day details from production to the stage. Reflecting on their experience, SRDS seniors Jonathan Fromm and Annabelle Harrison shared, "TEDxYouth pushed us to step outside our comfort zone and explore topics we wouldn't have had the chance to before. More importantly, though, we learned about the power of advocacy when standing up for ourselves and others."

Giving a TEDx talk can be an incredibly powerful experience for student speakers, allowing them to practice research, writing, and public speaking skills in a real-world context. "TEDxYouth@SRDS has taught me to love public speaking. Before joining the club, I thought that people were either natural public speakers or they weren't. It's amazing to see how much improvement is possible with practice. Having delivered three TED talks, I'm now a confident public speaker and even get asked to speak at events in my community," says Josie Brooks, SRDS Junior. This experience is also valuable for students and faculty in the audience, who are exposed to these fresh perspectives and inspired by important messages about big ideas and their impact on the world and the future.

TEDxYouth@SRDS also has a long-standing relationship with TEDxMidAtlantic in Washington, D.C. From 2016 to 2019, and now again in 2024, SRDS upper schoolers have had the unique opportunity to travel to Washington, D.C., to volunteer alongside professionals and college students—assisting with check-ins, supporting speakers in rehearsal and backstage, and gaining invaluable experience each time.

Reflecting on this opportunity, student volunteer Mason Lusk shared, "It was amazing to see our TEDx event compared to this larger one, and to connect with experts like the Surgeon General of the Army and NASA's Deputy Administrator." As Valentina Vasquez reflects, "I loved meeting speakers and seeing how they prepared, reminding me of the same mix of nerves and pride I felt as a TEDx speaker."

TED's tagline shift from "Ideas Worth Spreading" to "Ideas Change Everything" reflects its mission evolution from merely sharing ideas to empowering change. TEDxYouth@SRDS embraces this approach, encouraging students to tackle topics such as environmental challenges, mental health, and social justice. By using their voices to spark meaningful conversations and actions within the school and beyond, SRDS students embody the transformative power of ideas.

# Saddle River Day School Earns Highest Platinum Distinction on 2024 AP® School Honor Roll

Saddle River Day School earned a place on the prestigious AP® School Honor Roll for the 2023-24 school year for promoting a college-going culture, expanding opportunities for its students to earn college credit, and maximizing college readiness. SRDS received the **Platinum designation**, the highest of the AP® School Honor Roll's four levels of distinction, for exceeding thresholds as set by the College Board in:

**College Culture:** for the Platinum designation, 80% or more of the graduating class must have taken at least one AP Exam during high school. SRDS significantly surpassed this criteria with 100% of the graduating class taking at least one AP Exam.

**College Credit:** for the Platinum requirement, 50% or more of the graduating class must have scored a 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam during high school. SRDS exceeded this criteria with 83% percent of students earning a score of 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.

College Optimization: for Platinum Honors, the minimum requirement is that 15% or more of the graduating class must have taken five or more AP Exams during high school, with at least one of those exams taken in the 9th or 10th grade to ensure that students spread their AP experience across multiple years. SRDS significantly outperformed this requirement, with 44% of students meeting these criteria.



#### Faith Williamson '25 Named National Merit Scholarship Finalist

Faith Williamson '25 has been named a NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARSHIP FINALIST in the 70th annual competition. Finalists qualified by taking the 2023 Preliminary SAT (PSAT) & National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT). Students and a high school official must submit a detailed scholarship application, in which they provide information about their academic record, participation in school and community activities, demonstrated leadership abilities, employment, and honors/ awards received. The nationwide pool of Finalists - representing less than 1% of high school seniors includes the highest-scoring entrants in each state and is proportional to the state's percentage of the national total of graduating seniors, without regard to gender, race, ethnic origin or religious preference. Congratulations to Faith on this prestigious and welldeserved accomplishment!

# Students Compete in New Jersey Regional Science Olympiad

Saddle River Day School proudly sent its first-ever Middle and Upper School teams to compete in the prestigious New Jersey Regional Science Olympiad, held at the New Jersey Institute of Technology (NJIT). Students competed in a diverse array of STEM-focused challenges including Codebusters, Disease Detectives, Geologic Mapping, Optics, Fabrication, Fossils, and Metric Mastery, testing the students' critical thinking, problem-solving abilities, and teamwork in biology, chemistry, physics, engineering, and earth science. With this successful start, the team is already setting its sights on bigger goals, including qualifying for the New Jersey state finals and, potentially, the national competition in the coming years.



#### In other news...

Congratulations to the **RoboRebels** robotics team for their 2025 tournament victory, qualifying them for STATES! The team continues to be ranked as one of the top-contending teams in Bergen County and was recognized for their "ingenuity, creativity, and inventiveness" in their designs. The **Coding Club**, advised by Mr. Paolucci, won 2nd place out of 30 high school teams in Monmouth University's Hawk Hackathon programming competition! The Middle School **Odyssey of the Mind** team qualified for States after their tournament victory.









# Lower School Musical Seussical Jr. Performs before a Full House



#### Highlights include...

Girls soccer had their most successful season to date under the leadership of Athletic Director PJ Petrow, finishing with a stellar 14-3 record overall, advancing to the semifinal round of the NJSIAA Non-Public B State sectionals. The team was named "NJIC Team of the Year" with a 10-0 record in NJIC play. Junior goalkeeper Jillian Gomez was named All Bergen County First Team and NJIC First Team.

Girls volleyball also experienced their most successful season in many years in 2024 under the new leadership of Coach Nick Esposito, led by the efforts of Ava Manolis '25, Kayla Cha, Lauren Cassels '26 and freshman Bianca Kaiser. The highlight of the season was a thrilling win over Gill St. Bernard's in the NJSIAA Quarterfinal round of the NJSIAA Non-Public B North tournament.

Boys and girls basketball once again produced admirable results for REBEL Athletics. The girls team continued to be ranked as one of the best in the tri-state region. Under the leadership of Coach Joe Pedone and the efforts of Seniors Julianna Almeida and Cristina Parrella (two time McDonald's All-American nominee), and Junior Faith Williamson, the No. 10 Rebels defeated Teaneck to win their 8th straight Bergen County Tournament CHP in 2024 and finished with a solid 22-4 record. Julianna Almeida and Cristina Parella '24, and Faith Williamson '25 were named to the First Team All-Bergen County.

The boys finished strong again in the second year playing an independent schedule against some very stiff competition. They advanced to the quarterfinal round of the NJSIAA North Non-Public B Tournament. With only two graduating seniors, the team looks to maintain a strong presence for the 2024-2025 season, led by the efforts of Preston Neuenhaus, Jack Reicherz and Jacob Carmona '25. Junior Shawn Spencer was recognized for All-Bergen County post-season honors

The 2024 girls tennis team was a powerhouse again, reaching the Non-Public, North sectional final where it lost to No. 1-ranked Pingry. The team finished with a 13-2 record overall and took the NJIC Patriot Division championship for the third year in a row and for the fourth time in six seasons. In addition, Saddle River Day was named Team of the Year by NorthJersey. com. In addition, the team cruised to the Bergen County Fall Invitational team championship, led by Sophomore and 2024 All-North Jersey First Team award winner Kylee Hung. The Rebels dominated, as Rachel Magnus '26 (second singles), Jackie Sidler '25 (third singles), Olivia Fujita '26/Alison Rosenson '27 (first doubles) and Emma Yelsky '26/Eva Burgis '27 (second doubles) all came out on top at their respective flights too. Kylee also finished 12-3 in dual matches, garnered a No. 9-16 seed for the NJSIAA singles tournament and reached the state's Round of 16.

Boys tennis also finished with a winning season (spring 2024). Senior Jake Ulrey was named the North Jersey Interscholastic Conference Player of the Week in April as well as to the First Team All Singles.

Misha Theberge, Saddle River Day sophomore (6th, Non-Public B, 17:59) was the first Rebel to ever qualify for the Meet of Champs and was the first runner from SRDS to run in an NJSIAA cross-country championship race. He had an excellent year with a third place finish in the NJIC Meadowlands race... more to come from Misha!





Girls lacrosse had a strong showing once again, finishing the season with a 14-6 record overall. The team defeated Morris Catholic and Princeton Day to advance to the NJSIAA Non-Public B Semifinal round. Senior goalkeeper McAlister (MC) Salter was named to the 2024 All-North Jersey First Team as one of the all-time saves leaders at 820. In her fourth year in the starting net, she stopped a career-high 55.8 percent. Junior midfielder Isabella Pedone was also named to the All-North Jersey First Team. No one in North Jersey scored more points last year than Pedone, who carried on the Rebels' tradition of producing Division I midfielders. She racked up 86 goals and 33 assists and threw in 80 draw controls. Senior midfielder Nia Carrera and senior attacker Abbi Holland were also named to the second team for All-North Jersey. The Rebels also had their first commit to Brigham Young University for boys lacrosse. Congratulations to goalie Zion Alburo '25!

The SRDS golf team finished over .500 with an 8-4 record overall and 5-1 play in the NJIC. Bowling continues at a varsity level, as well as crew; fencing is now being offered as a club.

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
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#### Saddle River Day Honors Faculty and Staff
