A Message From the Superintendent

This is definitely one of the most challenging times ever for public education. It is critical for our students and families to know that the building is closed, but school is not cancelled. Our BCS staff is working tirelessly to provide instruction and support our families in multiple facets of education. I want to send out several thank-yous and acknowledgements to our entire staff............

- Mrs. Hess and Mr. Bull have been running around like chickens with their heads cut off getting materials for students and teachers while also holding Zoom meetings with teachers and comforting students and parents.
- Mr. Morgan has been all over the District setting up access points and WIFI units and trouble-shooting technology issues for students and families.
- Mr. Schneider and Mr. Miller organize materials to be delivered to students every day.
- Mrs. Enders is coordinating food delivery and ordering food to keep the program functioning.
- Our cafeteria staff are preparing over 800 meals for our families every day.
- Our teacher aides, nurse, and bus drivers are delivering meals and instructional materials to students every day.
- Our custodial and maintenance staff are in the building every day cleaning and sanitizing areas.
- Our teachers, teacher assistants, and therapists are providing instruction and are staying in contact with our families.
- Our counselors are reaching out to our high need students and families to provide support.
- Mr. Lingenfelter and Ms. Dziedzic are continuing to operate the business office (and pay the bills) from their homes; and
- Our secretarial staff is answering phones from their homes and working to keep families calm and informed.

In conversations with people who live or work in other Districts, I can tell you this effort is not everywhere. Our students and families are very fortunate to have our people in their corner to get through this very challenging time in our world.

I have had questions about graduation and support for our seniors. I have ordered banners for each senior (similar to



what we had for graduation last year) and personalized yard signs for each senior's house to recognize our kids. We will have a graduation ceremony for these kids. Obviously the goal is to have graduation as scheduled in June, but if this is not possible, we will schedule a graduation ceremony when we are permitted to gather.

We continue to have a small construction crew

working in the building to continue to prepare the building for everyone's return. Construction has continued on the restrooms by the gym, new office area, new secure entrance and student drop off area, and auditorium. Over the next few months, construction will move into the new nurse's suite, home and careers room, and restrooms throughout the building.

Probably more than ever, our kids and families need and value the intangible things that everyone at BCS brings to the table. I've heard from many families that their children look forward to seeing our staff when food is delivered each day, the act helps to bring a sense of normalcy to many kids. The smiles and well wishes are having a positive impact on a daily basis.

As we continue with the uncertainty of this closure, we will continue to support our families. The emotional support that is needed for the entire community is critical.

- BCS will help students finish work when we get back to school.
- BCS can identify gaps that have been created or increased as a result of this situation when we get back to school.


Nurse's Corner

Everyone Should Clean your hands often

Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds especially after





- If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol. Cover all surfaces of your hands and rub them together until they feel dry.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.



Cover your mouth and nose with a cloth face cover when around others

You could spread COVID-19 to others even if you do not feel sick.

- Everyone should wear a cloth face cover when they have to go out in public, for example to the grocery store or to pick up other necessities.
- Cloth face coverings should not be placed on young children under age 2, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the mask without assistance.
- The cloth face cover is meant to protect other people in case you are infected.
- Do NOT use a facemask meant for a healthcare worker.
- Continue to keep about 6 feet between yourself and others. The cloth face cover is not a substitute for social distancing.
- * No one under 2 years old should wear a mask. It could suffocate them. Instead, keep the little ones out of public settings and have family members wear a mask around the baby. Wash your hands often. And if you must go out, you may place a blanket loosely over the car seat or carrier but never over the baby.

"Good is Hard; Hard is Good" -by Jessica Romance

This is hard! Teaching my students and own children from home is hard. Missing my students is hard. Trying to establish a new routine is hard. Connecting and communicating with colleagues, admin, and students is hard. Learning new technology is hard. Trying to keep the internet from crashing everyday with four people using it constantly is hard. The list could go on and on, but the point is, COVID-19 has made things HARD!

Growing up, my dad used to say, "Good is hard." I didn't really think about that statement as a teen and brushed it off as a retort to my complaining, but recently I have been reflecting on that statement. It's so true-good IS hard. It's easier to give up so that we can feel less uncomfortable. It's easier not to try and in turn, not risk failure. It's easier to do it half-way or with minimal effort. In our current situation, it is so easy to get bitter, point fingers, want to give up, feel sad or angry or both, but if we allow easy to take







over, we settle, and we never get the good!

If our ultimate goal is for our students to become productive, self-sufficient adults, these are the times that will foster that goal. If life is always easy, they never have the opportunity to develop perseverance, grit, determination, and so many other qualities that make adulting do-able. Having your kiddos complete work sent home is hard, but they are learning responsibility and accountability. Learning new technology is hard, but students are learning to problem solve and

become independent learners. Communication without face-to-face interaction is hard, but students are learning different ways to communicate and self-advocate. Learning from home is hard, but students have learned advantages and disadvantages of

flexibility, which has encouraged organization, time management, and self-monitoring.

When all of this started, I thought, "How in the world am I going to teach 7&8 year olds and get them to actually learn without being with them? How will they be able to be successful?" Let me fill you in... my second graders have put my concerns to rest. They're not only learning, they're finding ways to blow the roof off my expectations by expanding their learning and making new discoveries every day. I've been using an app called Flipgrid for all my instruction. Not only can they use it, they are figuring out ways to use aspects of it that I haven't even figured out yet. They have been ridiculously independent. And when they do need help, they request a Zoom session and competently ask good questions and explain their thinking in order to get more







They are not just completing the work to get it done, but are doing it with excellence in mind. Their video responses have shown me that they're not just "doing ok", they're totally rocking this distance learning thing. What a humbling experience to realize they CAN indeed (and they don't need me much at all). Now more than ever, I'm oozing with #BCSBulldogPride. I am especially proud of the sweet souls from my classroom that have proven that hard won't stifle their creativity, energy, drive, or passion for learning—it's only driving them toward greatness.

Perspective matters in times like these. True, good is hard, but just maybe, hard is good.

FAFSA

Filling out the FAFSA is easier than ever thanks to the IRS data retrieval tool! Simply go online to www.fsaid.ed.gov to obtain your FSA ID. This serves as your electronic signature! Then go to www. Fafsa.gov and begin filling out the financial information. There is information that applies to the STUDENT and a separate set of information for the PARENT. Make sure you are working on the right section! If you list at least one school in New York state on your FAFSA, you will be eligible to apply for NY State aid using the TAP application which you will be directed to at the end of the FAFSA.
