
Our winter sports season has started, please check the district's web page for upcoming basketball games. I know that our athletes would love to look up in the stands and see them filled with cheering fans.

From the Superintendent

Construction is underway! The BCS Board of Education approved contracts for the Capital Improvement Project (CIP) at a special board meeting on October 22, 2019, and the general contractor began working on the project over Thanksgiving break.

Because of the District's ability to grant early access, the new main entrance, with a secure vestibule, and office area is the first part of the project to be under construction. The contractors will have the work area roped off and the doors by the gym will still be able to be utilized. Spectators coming to basketball games will be able to enter the building through the doors by the gym, the new entrance, and off of the playground area.

Construction in the auditorium are will begin immediately after our holiday concerts in December, with planned completion to be the first week in May. It is our goal to use the newly renovated auditorium for spring concerts, the elementary musical, and

graduation in the Spring on 2020. Construction in the new parking area will begin as soon as the weather breaks. Contractors will work to renovate bathrooms while school is in session, beginning in December. The new nurse's office and any other work will be completed during the summer of 2020, and the goal is to have the work completed before school starts in the Fall of 2020. We are very excited for the changes to the building, but we ask for your patience as offices and facility access will be in motion as work is completed.

Last May, over 20 teachers from BCS and neighboring districts participated in a Math & Movement professional development training. Math & Movement uses multi-sensory learning approaches to teach students valuable skills to succeed in math. Math & Movement recognizes that students learn through different styles, which is why their exercises include teaching with visual, auditory, and kinesthetic elements aligned with state standards. Learning through movement helps build student confidence and boosts test scores. The learning process is more effective and easier when students exercise their bodies and minds simultaneously through educational math games, helping students retain more information. This, in turn, increases students' test scores, self-confidence, and retention rates. Best of all, kids love to learn this way! BCS was fortunate enough to be able to purchase several Math & Movement mats through a grant that will allow our teachers to expand their teaching methods and for our students to



reap the benefits of incorporating movement into their learning. In January, BCS will be holding a Math Family Fun Night where we will have representatives from Math & Movement present to provide many fun, engaging experiences for our BCS families. Stay tuned for details!






Artic Adventure Book Fair!

FAFSA It's never too early!

Seniors should be well underway in the college application and financial aid process! Filling out the FAFSA is easier than ever thanks to the IRS data retrieval tool! Simply go online to fsaid.ed.gov to obtain your FSA ID. This serves as your electronic signature! Then go to fafsa. gov and begin filling out the financial information. There is information that applies to the STUDENT and a separate set of information for the PARENT. Make sure you are working on the right section! If you list at least one school in New York state on your FAFSA, you will be eligible to apply for NY State aid using the TAP application which you will be directed to at the end of the FAFSA.

Financial aid for the 2020-21 school year (this year's seniors) is based on your 2018 income taxes, so there is no need to wait until the Spring to apply. Apply now!! If students need help with applications or financial aid, please see Mrs. Heaney in the Guidance Office!

Zane Cartwright, a veteran natural helper, said, "Natural Helpers is important to me because learning to practice empathy is a skill needed throughout our lifetime."






Natural Helpers

Sarah Burdick, BOCES school social worker at BCS, enjoys the opportunity natural helpers provides for improving school culture.










Nurse's Corner


